To the Honorable Mayor and Commissioners of the City of Marquette:

Your physicians' committee beg to report briefly on the subject of the proposed plan of reorganization of the city health department as follows:

We have found that the proposed plan is apparently commanding universal approval. We have had a meeting with the public school board of the city, at which time a resolution, a copy of which is enclosed herewith, was unanimously passed appropriating the sum of six hundred dollars per annum toward the salary of health officer and school inspector, in the event that the proposed plan is put in operation, and provided such an officer is employed at a salary of two thousand dollars per annum, or a sum of seven hundred dollars per annum if his salary is greater than two thousand yearly.

Your committee has also had a meeting with President Kays

of the Northern State Normal School, in which he has agreed to strongly recommend to the state board an appropriation of three hundred dollars per annum, provided the plan is put in force, and in consideration of the inspection by said officer of the Normal School students in a manner identical with the public school inspection.

The attitude of the city school board and of President Kaye has been very encouraging to your committee, and is greatly appreciated. We feel that this co-operation in the public health supervision assures the practicability of the scheme, and it also constitutes a full set of duties for such an officer. The duties devolving upon one as city health officer, sanitary inspector, and general health supervisor, together with those of public and Normal School inspector, would be considerable, and it would require all of one man's time to attend to them properly. We feel that it would not be practicable or wise to seek to combine other duties than those outlined.

Your committee has various lines of inquiry out regarding the possible securing of a proper man. Our data on this point is incomplete at this time, but we feel that we have gone far enough to report that the plan is practicable, more economical by far, in a broad sense, than the old plan, and infinitely more satisfactory and efficient.

As an illustration of the advantages and marked economy of school inspectors, we may cite the following fact:

In Boston during the thirteen years of public school inspection, diphtheria decreased 66 per cent, and scarlet fever decreased 83 per cent.

As an illustration of the urgent need of school inspection in Marquette, we may mention that our committee was informed by a gentleman, a member of the Normal School faculty, who for purposes of his own, recently made a survey of the North Marquette school, that he found there was no city water available for the school and the children were drinking out of a bucket carried in, that there were two drinking cups only, and that while he was there, he saw one pupil dip up a cupful of water, drink half of it, and pour the remainder back into the bucket. The teacher informed him that she once caught a child washing his hands in this bucket of drinking water. Proper medical supervision would quickly devise a closed container for drinking water for this school.

Your committee will later have fuller information on the matter of securing a competent medical man, and if authorized

Honorable Mayor, and Commissioners of the City of Marquette, Michigan, Gentlemen: The Light and Power Department finds that the charge to the General fund of the city for street and park lighting has by the addition of lamps from time to time since the rate per lamp or equivalent was reduced from \$75 to \$60 per year, increased from \$8,122.70 in the year 1910-11 to \$11,000, estimated, for the like period ending March 1st, 1914.

It is apparent that the water power and electric generating and distributing plants, owing to the growth of income from private users, no longer needs the support of a special rate of charge to the General fund for its maintenance and growth.

The department, therefore, recommends that the rate of charge to the General fund for street and park lighting to date from Jan. 1, 1914, be made the same on the per kilowatt hour basis as charges to private persons for like service. This change, we estimate, if the lighting of streets and parks be properly managed will reduce the charge to the General fund on this account to about \$7,000.

A regular meeting of the Commission shall be held on Monday of each week, at 7:30 o'clock p.m.; except when such day falls upon any of the holidays known as New Year's Day, Decoration Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day and Christmas; in which case such meeting shall be held upon the succeeding day at the same hour.

Rule 2. Special meetings of the Commission may be held at any time upon the assembling together of all the members thereof; and shall be held at any time upon written request therefor of two or more members, stating the object, and filed with clerk; whereupon the clerk shall call such meeting and give notice thereof and the object in any practicable manner to each member in the city at least one hour before the time of the meeting; and shall report to the Commission at such meeting and record in the proceedings thereof when and how such notice was given to each member not present at such meeting, or why such notice was not given to each member not so present.

Rule 3. All meetings of the Commission shall be public, and shall be held in the Commission Chamber of the City Hall, except when all members present in the City Hall shall assemble in some other room therein which is open to the public. The Commission may go into committee of the whole in private session at any time, and may take a recess and withdraw from the public meeting place for that purpose.

Rule 4. Unless otherwise ordered by the Commission, consideration and action upon business at each regular meeting shall be in the following order:

1. Correction of the records of previous meetings.
2. Presentation of petitions and communications.
3. Reports and recommendations of departments and officers.
4. Claims and accounts.
5. Orders of the day. (Business required by law, ordinance or special order of the Commission).
6. Miscellaneous business.
7. Adjournment.

Rule 5. The clerk shall record in the proceedings of each meeting, without formal roll call, the names of the members present; and the names of the members voting "aye" and those voting "no" upon each question put to vote of the Commission.
