MOSQUITO NUISANCE AT PRESQUE ISLE PARK.	A communication from the Woman's Welfare Club, relative to the mosquito nuisance at Presque Isle Park, stating that other cities had abated, if not entirely abolished said nuisance by spreading oil occasionally on the stagnant waters near the districts affected, was presented. Moved by Commissioner Pearce, supported by Commissioners Sink, and adopted, that said communication be referred to the department of public works with instructions to carry out the suggestion of said club and experiment along the lines mentioned by them.

(1) That section two of chapter five be repealed.

(2) That section three of chapter eight be amended, so as to read as follows, viz:

"Sec. 3. Before being filed such petitions shall be signed by qualified electors of each electoral district in the city equal in number to twenty-five per centum of the number of electors for the office of governor in their respective electoral districts and on each such petition there shall be indicated the electoral district and place of residence therein of each signer thereof, and the genuineness of the signatures of all the signers of such petitions shall be verified by affidavit of one or more electors of the city affixed thereto. All such petitions for the recall of the same officer or officers shall before being filed be fastened together as one petition, and shall bear thereon the endorsement of the names and addresses of three persons, designated on such petition as filing the same."

(3) That section three of chapter nine be amended so as to read as follows, viz:

"Section 3. The commission shall have authority to enact ordinances and to make regulations, consistent with the Constitution and laws of the state, for the safety, order and good government of the city and the general welfare of the inhabitants thereof. All ordinances adopted by the commission, or the electors, shall be entitled, and the enacting clause thereof shall be

"The City of Marquette ordains," but no ordinance shall be held invalid because of any defect in the title or enacting clause thereof."

(4) That section twenty of chapter twenty-eight be amended so as to read as follows, viz:

All the provisions of the general tax law of this state, as now or hereafter existing, applicable to the making of assessment rolls in townships, and the review, correction, certification and effect thereof, not inconsistent with this charter, shall apply to and govern the making, review, correction, certification and effect of the assessment of this city; and the board of review of this city shall have and exercise in respect to such assessment rolls all the powers and duties of boards of review in townships, with like effect.

When any such assessment roll shall have been completed, reviewed and certified by the board of review, at its annual meeting in each year, the assessor shall proceed to appportion, spread and extend thereon all the taxes authorized to be raised for city and school purposes, including the mill tax, in the same manner as taxes are required to be levied upon assessment rolls of townships by the general tax laws of this state; and shall also in a proper column or columns thereon assess and levy thereon against the respective lots and parcels of land therein or otherwise as may be provided by ordinance, such special assessments against the same as shall be ordered by the commission to be collected upon the general city tax roll.

The assessor shall thereupon, and before the first day of July next thereafter, prepare a copy of said assessment roll with the taxes and special assessments assessed thereon, and affix thereto a warrant signed by him and the mayor, or acting mayor, and sealed with the seal of the city directed to the city treasurer commanding the collection of all taxes and special assessments so assessed and levied; which warrant shall be in the same form, as near as may be, and of like force and effect as warrants issued by supervisors of townships to township treasurers for the collection of township taxes, under the general tax law of this state; which said copy of said assessment roll with such warrant annexed thereto shall be known as "the general city tax roll," and shall be delivered to the city treasurer for collection on or before the first day of July in each year.

All the provisions of the general tax law of this state, as now or hereafter existing, applicable to township treasurers and to the collection and return of taxes upon township tax rolls, not inconsistent with this charter, shall apply to and govern the collection
