The following amendment relative to hawkers, peddlers and transient traders, was presented, read and on motion adopted, and ordered published twice in the Mining Journal:

It is ordained by the Common Council of the City of Marquette: That section three (3) of an ordinance relative to hawkers, peddlers and transient traders, the same being Ordinance Number 17, of the compiled ordinances of 1873. be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 3. Any person soliciting a license as a hawker or peddler shall pay to the City Treasurer therefor as follows: If he intends to travel on foot, the sum of one dollar and twenty five cents per day. If he intends to travel with one horse or other animal two dollars and twenty five cents per day. If he intends to travel with two or more horses or other animals, six dollars per day. Provided, that no license under this Section shall be issued for a less period than ten, nor for a longer period than thirty days, and each renewal thereof shall be deemed and considered a new license.

The following resolution was presented by Alderman Hurley, and on motion adopted:

Resolved, that the City Marshal be and is hereby authorized to procure, at the expense of the City, uniforms for the City Police, at a cost not to exceed \$50 for each uniform, caps and badges not included.

A new special assessment roll for Spring Street sewer was presented and referred to the committee of the whole, to debate the question on Thursday afternoon, May 14th, and report progress.

At a regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Marquette, held at the Common Council Chamber on Monday evening, May 25th, 1874, Present, Mayor Swinford, Recorder Paineau, Aldermen Hurley, Cook, Wagner, Aulow, Crittall and Fraser.

The meeting was called to order by the Mayor

The roll was called and the minutes of the preceding were read and approved.

Petitions and Communications.

The petition of Ann Coyle and seven others, asking the grading of Hampton street between Third and Pandill Streets, was presented, read and referred to the Committee on police, claims and grievances.

The petition of E. W. Wood and forty four others, asking the Common Council to take the necessary steps to relieve them of the nuisance caused by the slaughter house of John Fashender, in the first ward, was presented, read and referred to the Committee on police, claims and grievances.

The street committee presented a profile of Bluff street from Fifth street to Seventh street, which was accepted, adopted, and ordered placed on file.

The committee to whom was referred the petition of John E. Sullivan, and the remonstrance of William O. Bruin relative to the grading, macadamizing & sidewalking of Bluff street between Fifth and Seventh, recommends that the city attorney be instructed to draw an ordinance in accordance with the prayer of the petitioner, John E. Sullivan, and the cost of the same be assessed on the abutting property, which report was adopted.

The petition of Charles Morrison, asking that a sewer be constructed across Lake street, from his property in Penny & Vaughn's addition, was, on motion, laid on the table.

Further time was asked and granted to the Committee on police claims and grievances in regard to the petition of Cornelius Clune relative to the Rock Street sewer.

On petitions of Hampson Gregory and others, asking for the grading and laying of sidewalks on Fourth Street, between Ridge and Ohio, and ^{that} of J. St. Jacobs and others, asking for the grading, macadamizing and sidewalking of Third Street between Sandstone and Jackson Streets, further time for consideration was asked and granted.

"It is hereby ordained by the Common Council of the city of Marquette, that Hampton Street from Lake to Pendell Streets be graded to the width of thirty feet through the center thereof, including gutters, according to profile of said street on file in the office of the Recorder of the city of Marquette, which said profile has been duly accepted and adopted by the Common Council, and that proposals for doing said work be advertised, and that the city assessor be authorized to make and present to said Council a special assessment roll for its approval, and that the work be let, and the expense thereof be assessed upon the property upon said roll, after the same has been duly adopted and confirmed by the Common Council of said city, agreeable to the charter thereof and an ordinance relative to the grading, paving, macadamizing and improvements of streets, alleys and public places.
