A special meeting of the Common Council of the city of Marquette was held in the Council Room on Wednesday the 24<sup>th</sup> day of September A.D. 1890. Mayor Longyear presiding.

At Roll Call there were present Alderman Gillitt, Hennessy, Helmuth Johnson, McGivern Palmer Pendill and J. F. Todd.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read, where Alderman Palmer stated that in the matter of Front Street improvement, the committee did not name any amount it would recommend the city to donate. Said change being made, the minutes were approved.

The petition of W. S. Hill and others, for a sewer along Spruce Street from a point 150 feet North of Michigan Street to Hewitt Avenue, was on motion granted.

The petition of James E. Tuckway and ten others, for a sewer, for a sewer along Hewitt Avenue, from Front Street to the Trunk Sewer, was on motion granted.

The petition of Mrs Anna McHulley, asking to be relieved from paying her Arch Street sewer tax, to wit, twenty five dollars ~~to~~ thirty cents, was on motion granted, and the mayor ~~as~~ Recorder authorized to issue an order for same. Ayes, Alderman Gillitt, Hennessy, Helmuth Johnson, McGivern Palmer Pendill ~~and~~ J. F. Todd. Nays none.

The special assessment roll for grading curbing and macadamizing Seymour Avenue from Washington Street to Ridge Street, also the special assessment roll for grading, curbing and macadamizing Lincoln Avenue from Washington Street to Ridge Street, were submitted to the Council, which on being examined were approved, and the Recorder instructed to give notice as required by the Charter that the Common Council would meet on the 6<sup>th</sup> day of October A.D. 1890.

at 8 o'clock P.M. to consider the final confirmation of said rolls.

The chairman of the Street Committee stated that a new profile of Front street, from Prospect street to Fair avenues, had been prepared, and recommended its adoption.

Moved by Alderman Palmer, seconded by Alderman Hennessy, and carried, that said Front street profile be and is hereby adopted, and that all other profiles between aforesaid limits be repealed.

The profile of Park street, from Pine street to Third street - taking blue line instead of red, where the blue line shows - was, on motion adopted.

On motion of Alderman Hennessy seconded by alderman Pendell, the following ordinance was on motion adopted.

It is hereby ordained by the Common Council of the City of Marquette:

1. That Park street, from Pine street to Third street, be graded to the full width thereof, according to the grade heretofore adopted therfor.

2. That said street, between the limits above specified, be macadamized to the width of Thirty feet in the centre thereof, and that gutters be constructed of planks along each side of such macadamizing. Said gutters and said macadamizing shall be in accordance with the general ordinances of said city relative thereto.

3. That the Recorder be authorized and directed to advertise for a period of ten days in the daily *Miner*, and once in the Weekly Mining Journal, for bids to furnish all material to perform all labor necessary for such grading, macadamizing and gutters, the Council reserving the right to reject any or all bids.

4. That each bid shall be accompanied by two bonds each in the penal sum of the total amount of the bid, one conditioned for the faithful performance of contract if awarded, and the other conditioned for the payment of all labor and material claims arising under such contract.

5. That the expense and cost of such grading, macadamizing and gutters shall be assessed upon the property abutting on said portion of said street and that the city assessor be and he is hereby instructed to prepare a special assessment roll for that purpose as soon as such expense and costs shall have been ascertained.

On motion of Alderman Palmer seconded by Alderman

Hennepin the following ordinance was adopted.

An Ordinance relative to a sewer along Hewitt Avenue from centre of Trout Street to the trunk sewer.

It is hereby ordained by the Common Council of the city of Marquette,

1. That a sewer be constructed along Hewitt Avenue from centre of Trout Street to the trunk sewer of eight inch sewer pipe, in accordance with the grade heretofore adopted therefor.
2. That such sewer be constructed in full accordance with the plans and specifications of the Davis Sewer system of said city except as to grade and size of pipe.
3. That the Recorder be authorized and directed to advertise for a period of ten days in the Daily Mining Journal and once in the Weekly Mining Journal for bids to furnish all material and perform all labor necessary for the construction of such sewer, the city reserving the right to reject any or all bids.
4. That each bid be accompanied by two bonds each in the penal sum of the total amount of the bid, one conditioned for the faithful performance of contract if awarded, and the other conditioned for the payment of all labor and material claims arising under such contract.
5. That the expense and cost of such sewer be assessed upon the property abutting on said portion of said street and that the City Assessor be and he is hereby instructed to prepare a special assessment roll for that purpose as soon as such expense and costs shall have been ascertained.

The Street Committee reported and stated that James Latrell had completed his contract on Genesee Street, and that Hall Anderson and Oberg had completed their Ridge strut contract, and it was moved and seconded that the word be accepted, and that the Mayor and Recorder be and are hereby authorized to issue orders for the amount of balance due them, to wit, James Latrell Two hundred and seven dollars and fifty two cents (\$207.52) and Hall Anderson and Oberg Three hundred and ninety dollars (\$390.00), of which fifteen dollars is for extra work.

On motion, the following Ordinance was adopted:

It is hereby ordained by the Common Council of the City of Marquette:

1. That Front street from North line of Prospect street to Fair Avenue, be graded to the full width thereof, according to the grade heretofore adopted herefor.

2. That said street, between the limits above specified, be macadamized to the width of Thirty feet in the centre thereof, and that gutters be constructed of plank along each side of such macadamizing. Said gutters and said macadamizing shall be in accordance with the general ordinances of said City relative thereto.

3. That the Recorder be authorized and directed to advertise for a period of ten days in the Daily Mining Journal and once in the Weekly Mining Journal, for bids to furnish all material and pay all labor necessary for such grading, macadamizing and gutters and to pay for the work already performed to the parties interested, the council reserving the right to reject any or all bids.

4. That each bid shall be accompanied by two bonds each in the penal sum of the total amount of the bid, one conditioned for the faithful performance of contract if awarded, and the other conditioned for the payment of all labor and material claims arising under

such contract.

5. That the expense and cost of such grading macadamizing and gutter Thre Thousand Dollars shall be paid out of the General Highway fund of said city and the balance including street intersections, shall be assessed upon the property abutting upon said portion of said street equitably, and that the City Assessor be and he is hereby instructed to prepare a Special Assessment Roll for that purpose as soon as such balance of such expense and cost shall have been ascertained.

Moved and carried that the following places be and are hereby designated by the Common Council of the City of Marquette for holding the boards of Registrars of the several Wards of said City to be held on the First day of November 1890, and also for holding the polls at the General Election to be held on the 4<sup>th</sup> day of November 1890.

A regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Marquette was held in the Council room on Monday the 6<sup>th</sup> day of October A. D. 1890. Mayor Longyear presiding.

At Roll call there were present aldermen Gillett, Hennessey, Helmuth, Johnson, McCleary, Palmer, Pendill & R. P. Todd.

The minutes of the preceding meeting were read. When alderman Palmer stated that the resolution for taxes for the current year, it should have stated that the \$5000. was for the general fund. Said addition being made the minutes were approved.

The petition of T. John C. H. Call &c 157. others, stating that portions of the Mesquokie Isle road are in a deplorable condition & asking that it be repaired immediately, etc, was read.

Moved by Alderman Palmer, and seconded by Alderman Pendill, that said petition be laid on the table.

The recorder then read a letter from Mr. Peter White to the Mayor, stating that he (Mr. White) had presented the City with a deed for right of way for a large portion of the Mesquokie Isle road, and urging the necessity of its being repaired at once. Said deed accompanied the letter, also two other deeds from R. H. Hawley and John A. Foot conveying right of way.

Moved by Alderman Hennessey seconded by Alderman Helmuth & carried, as an amendment to the above motion, that the matter be referred to the street committee with power to act.

The following petition was read, and on motion of Alderman Helmuth, seconded by Alderman Hennessey, the same was granted.

To the Honorable City Mayor & Common Council of the City of Marquette, Michigan:

The undersigned, the Marquette City & Mesquokie Isle Railway Company, assignee of the rights of the parties hereinafter named, would respectfully petition that the portion of the ordinance of this city, which requires, that the grantors to the said company, namely, Frederick O. Clark, George W. Hager, Timothy Astor, James Connolly, Joseph A. Varnier & Mervin E. Asire, or their assigns construct & have in operation, by the first of November next, one mile of street railroad in this city, be so modified, that the said company, to whom said Clark

Hager, Lester, Connally, Yanner & Asire have assigned their rights to build said street Railroad, shall not be required to operate the same until the first day of June next, for the reason, that after the first of November, it will be too late in the season to furnish any substantial benefit to the travelling public, or to the said company by the operation of the said road, and for the reason, that said company will have constructed prior to the first of November, about one mile and a half of Road, instead of one mile as required by the ordinance, & for the further reason, that it will be impossible to procure an Electric Plant, constructed & located, as motion power, by the first of November, or during this year, & therefore only horses will be used as propelling force.

That the petition of the Marquette City & Presque Isle Railway Company, as the assignee of the rights of Frederick O. Clark, George W. Hager, Timothy Lester, James Connally, Joseph A. Yanner and Mervin E. Asire to build a street Rail Road in said city praying that the portion of the ordinance of this city which requires that the petitioner as the assignee as aforesaid, construct and have in operation, by the first of November next one mile of Street Railroad in this City, be so modified, that said company shall not be required to operate said street Railroad until the first day of June next, so that the said company may have until that time in which to procure the Electric Machinery and appliances to operate the same and put the same in place.

The petition of Forty one residents and property owners on Washington street west of Fifth street, asking, asking that a sufficient number of all eight arc lamps & properly light the same west of Fourth street be placed along said street, also asking that the Washington street sewer be extended along said

Street as far West as Garfield Avenue, was on motion referred to the Street Committee.

The petition of George C. French & eighteen others, asking that a sidewalk be laid on the south side of Jackson Street from Champion to Lake street, and that two rows electric lights be placed on said street, was on motion referred to the street Committee.

The petition of John A. Brown & two others, asking that Adams street, from Jackson Street to Genesee Street, be graded, curbed & macadamized, was on motion referred to the Street Committee.

James Lattrell requested an advance of six hundred dollars on his Seymour & Lincoln Avenue contracts,

George W. Reed presented the city with a bill of \$33.87 for team work for Burgh & Helling on Jackson Street, the same was on motion rejected.

The special assessment roll for grading, curbing & macadamizing Seymour Avenue from Washington Street to Ridge Street, also the special assessment roll for grading curbing & macadamizing Lincoln Avenue from Washington Street to Ridge street were each on motion confirmed and the recorder instructed to hand to hand said assessment rolls over to the City Treasurer for collection.

The Street Commission's pay roll was on motion approved & ordered paid.

The Street Committee reported & stated that the Alger street contract had been completed & recommended its acceptance, and on motion the work was accepted and the balance, three hundred and eleven dollars & twenty eighth cents (\$311.28) due Eudel Largen was ordered paid.

The following bids to construct the sewer along

Hewitt Avenue from center of Front Street to French  
River were examined.

That of Peterson Johnson & Hall being One dollar  
to 55<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> dollars (\$1 55) per linear foot & fifty dollars

A regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Marquette was held in the Council Room on Monday, the 3<sup>rd</sup> day of November A. D. 1890, Mayor Longyear presiding.

At Roll call there were present Alderman Gillan Hennessy, John Mason, Palmer Pendell, J. P. Todd and R. R. Todd.

The minutes of the preceding meeting were read and approved.

The petition of J. P. Vandevertine and 39 others, asking that in view of the construction of the Street Railway, down Third street and the resulting crowded condition of said street, that the macadamizing on said street from Ridge Street to Fair Avenue be widened as much as possible, and that a sewer be laid at once, was on motion referred to the Street Committee.

The petition of Smith Moore and three others, asking that the grade of High Street be established from the centre of Hewitt Avenue North to the north line of Moore and Gang's addition was, on motion granted.

The petition of P. J. McEllally and thirteen others asking that an electric light be placed at the corner of Ridge and Third streets, was on motion laid on the table.

The petition of Euclid Largeness for Threemonths dollars advance on his Hewitt Avenue Sewer contract was tabled till later in the evening.

The communication of John Beigh Stating that he had completed his Michigan Street Sewer Contract and asking for settlement for same, was on motion referred to the Street Committee.

The street Commissioner's pay roll was presented and on motion approved.

The profile of Arch Street from Cedar Street to Walnut street was on motion adopted.

On motion of Alderman Palmer, seconded by Alderman Hennessy, the following Ordinance was adopted:

It is hereby ordained by the Common Council of the City of Marquette:

1. That Arch Street from Cedar Street to a point four hundred feet east of the East line of Cedar street, be graded to the full width thereof according to the grade heretofore adopted thereto. All sand found within said limits and rock needed for the grading

thereof shall be hauled eastward and left within the lines of said arch strut.

2. That said strut, between the limits above specified, be macadamized to the width of thirty six feet in the centre thereof; and that gutters be constructed of plank along each side of such macadamizing. Said gutter and said macadamizing shall be in accordance with the general ordinances of said city relative thereto.

3. That the Recorder be authorized and directed to advertise for a period of ten days in the daily mining journal and once in the weekly mining journal, for bids to furnish all material and perform all labor necessary for such grading, macadamizing and gutters, the Council reserving the right to reject any or all bids.

4. That each bid shall be accompanied by two bonds each in the penal sum of the total amount of the bid, one conditioned for the faithful performance of contract, if awarded, and the other conditioned for the payment of all labor and material claims arising under such contract.

5. That the expense and cost of such grading, macadamizing and gutters shall be assessed upon the property abutting on said portion of said strut and that the City Assessor be and he is hereby instructed to prepare a special assessment Roll for that purpose as soon as such expense and costs shall have been ascertained.

The Profile of Spruce strut sewer was on motion adopted.

On motion of Alderman Hennessy, seconded by Alderman P. P. Todd, the following ordinance was adopted.

It is hereby ordained by the Common Council of the City of Marquette:

Sundry bills were then presented and read, and among them were the bills of Supervisors Joseph Day, John Connors E. B. Palmer George Wagner and H. Gregory of twenty four dollars (\$24) each for eight days on board of equalization and review in May last.

Moved by Alderman Pendill that said supervisors be allowed two dollars per day each for their services.

Alderman Hennery, seconded by Alderman Gillett, moved, as a substitute, that they be allowed three dollars per day, which was carried. Ayes, Alderman Gillett, Hennery, Johnson and J. F. Todd. Noes, Alderman Palmer Pendill and R. R. Todd.

Moved by alderman Hennery, seconded by Ald. Palmer and carried, that all the bills read, except the Mining Journals and the Marshal's bills be rejected, said bills not having been ordered by the purchasing Committee.

Moved by Alderman Palmer, seconded by Alderman Gillett and carried, that Euclid Largeness be allowed Thru hundred dollars (\$300) on account of his Hewitt Avenue Sewer contract, and that the Engineer's estimate be placed on file.

That the Recorder be authorized and directed to advertise for a period of ten days in the daily Evening Journal and once in the weekly Evening Journal for bids to furnish all material and perform all labor necessary for the construction of such sewer, the same to be completed on or before June 1<sup>st</sup> next, the Council reserving the right to reject any or all bids.

That each bid shall be accompanied by two bonds each in the penal sum of the total amount of the bid, one conditioned for the faithful performance of contract, if awarded, and the other conditioned for the payment of all labor and material claims arising under such contract.

5. That the expense and cost of constructing such sewers shall be assessed upon the property abutting on said portion of said street, and that the city assessor be and he is hereby instructed to prepare a special assessment roll for that purpose as soon as such expense and cost shall have been ascertained.

On motion of Alderman Palmer, and seconded by alderman Hennessy the following Ordinance was adopted:

An ordinance to regulate and control the construction of House Sewer Connections and house drainage.  
It is hereby ordained by the Common Council of the City of Marquette;

Section One. The sewers, drains, vaults, manholes and sewer gas, waste and grease traps and everything pertaining to house drainage shall be under the care and control of the Street Commissioner by whom all applications for permits or other information should be made.

Section Two. Permits shall be taken out in each special case in the name of the owner, agent or person in whose interest the work is to be done before the work is commenced, and in no case shall such work be commenced and prosecuted unless such permit is on the grounds and in possession of the person doing the work.

Each permit shall designate the street and number of the house and sublot and shall include such definite description of the premises as to clearly define the location of the same upon the map.

Section Three. All connections with the main or branch sewer shall be made at the regular connections on junctions, built in the same except by special permit from the Street Commissioner.

Section Four. All branches shall be made with slant or "Y" junctions and in no case shall square or straight junctions be used nor shall openings be cut or broken into the sewer for the purpose of making such connections, but in all cases where connections are to be made where no junction has been provided, a length of pipe shall be removed and a piece inserted with the proper junction upon it. The junction not intended for immediate use shall have their ends closed water tight with brick or stone and cement.

Section Five. No connection shall be made with

any of the public sewers of said city for the purpose of draining any house or other structure unless such connecting sewer or drain shall be provided with a suitable grease trap through which trash pass all sewage matter containing grease, and all applications for permits, as provided in sections one and two of this ordinance, shall contain a statement signed by the person in whose interest the work is to be done or by his other agent, that a suitable grease trap has been built as required by this section; and no permit shall be valid unless such grease trap has previously been constructed.

**Section 6.** All cesspools, vaults and other like receptacles for sewer drainage now constructed and those which may hereafter be constructed upon streets where no proper sewerage is provided, shall be under the law and control of the Health officer and shall be constructed vented and emptied as he shall direct.

**Section Seven.** On and after the passage of this ordinance no house, sewer, drain or waste pipes from any buildings or premises shall be discharged into the cesspool, vault and other like receptacles where such building or premises is provided with proper sewerage accommodation with which the same can be connected, and if at any future time such premises are provided with proper sewerage accommodation the further use of such cesspools, vaults etc, shall be discontinued and the proper sewers and drains constructed whenever the Health officer shall deem the public health demands it.

**Section Eight.** Every person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance or disobeying or neglecting to comply with any lawful direction given under this ordinance by any officer of said city, shall upon conviction thereof before any Court of Competent jurisdiction be punished by a fine of not less than Five nor more than One Hundred dollars or by imprisonment not more than Thirty days or both such imprisonment and fine in the discretion of said court.

On motion of Alderman Palmer, seconded by Alderman Hinnessey the following Resolution was passed:

*It is hereby Resolved by the Common Council of the City of Marquette,*

533

1. That an extension of the Trunk Seawall, that empties into the bay through the Grace Furnace Dock, from its present terminus in the center of Prospect Strut east of Spruce Strut in a northeasterly direction to the intersection of Third and Specular Struts, is a necessary public improvement in the City of Marquette.

2. That such extension will necessarily be located as follows; - Beginning at a point in the center of Prospect Strut one hundred eighty five feet east of the center of Spruce Strut, running thence northeasterly to the center of Pine Strut and Park Struts, thence in a northeasterly direction to the center of Second and Specular Struts, and thence west along the center of Specular Strut to the center of Third Strut.

3. That such Seawall will be for the use and benefit of the public and will be a public improvement.

4. That it is necessary for such a public improvement to take the following private property, to wit; - The right to Construct, Maintain, examine and repair and the right to enter for the purpose of Constructing, maintaining, examining and repairing a Seawall through and across the south fifty feet of the north one hundred feet of lot number Twenty two (22) of Smith Moore's addition to said City of Marquette, which property is owned by William H. Pier of said city of Marquette.

Also, through and across lots numbered 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 60, 61, 62, 63, 87, 88, 89, 90, 91, 99, 100, and 101, of said Smith Moore's addition to said City of Marquette, which property belongs to John T. Farwell of the City of Chicago and State of Illinois.

5. That the City Attorney be and is hereby directed to institute the necessary proceedings in behalf of the City of Marquette in the Circuit Court for the County of Marquette to carry out the object of the foregoing Resolution.

Moved by Alderman Palmer, seconded by Alderman Hennessy and carried, that Euclid Largeness be allowed six hundred dollars  $\text{as } 4\% \text{ rate}$  ( $\$600 \frac{4}{100}$ ) being the amount of work for the construction of the Spruce Strut Seawall.

Also, that said Euclid Largeness be allowed nine hundred and three dollars and ninety seven cents ( $\$903 \frac{97}{100}$ ) on account of his Seventh Avenue seawall contract and that the Mayor and Recorder be

The minutes of the two preceding meetings were read and approved.

The following petition was presented by the members of the Marquette City Band:

To the honorable the Common Council of the City of Marquette, Mich.

Gentlemen,

Your petitioners, the members

of the Marquette City Band, would most respectfully ask your honorable body whelpes in our efforts to keep up our organization. We would most respectfully represent that we find that we cannot command as good pay for the same work as other men who do not belong to the Band, for the reason that it is necessary for us to be away from our work more or less while fulfilling engagements with the band, and for this reason we cannot take positions that require regular service and command the best wages. We feel that the City and Citizens of Marquette should contribute to the support of our leader and the band to an extent that will enable him to look after the interests of the Band a portion of his time, at least, seeking employment for members and making engagements for the Band, &c. We find that we can get from \$10. to \$15. per month now wages by agreeing not to be subject to the Band. We are all desirous of keeping our organization, and to continue in the future as in the past, to do what we can for the interest of our adopted city, but we must look after the welfare of our selves and our families, and think it only reasonable that the City should set aside a certain amount of money to be paid the Band in such amounts and at such times as you may deem proper.

Very respectfully submitted.

Moved and carried that the city attorney furnish a copy of the two portion of the Charter which member of the council to examine.

On motion, the Charter Revision Commission are invited to attend the next meeting of the council.

The Council then, on motion, adjourned till Thursday evening next at 7. o. clock P. M.

An adjourned special meeting of the Common Council of the City of Marquette was held in the Council room on Thursday the 19<sup>th</sup> day of February A.D. 1891. Mayor Longyear presiding.

At roll call there were aldermen Gillitt Hennessy, Helmer Johnson, Mc Givern Palmer and Pendell.

Aldermen J.F. and R.R. Todd arrived soon after.

The minutes of the preceding meeting were read and approved.

On motion the regular order of business was suspended.

Moved by Alderman Palmer, seconded by Alderman Pendell, that this Council take such action as will be necessary to proceed to form in the new charter, a Board of Public Works.

Alderman Hennessy moved an amendment that the Commission be heard on the subject,

Whereupon Messes Clark, Seymour and Judge Brown of said Charter revision commission, addressed the meeting in reference to the same.

Moved by Alderman Hennessy and seconded by Alderman Mc Givern, that Chapter eleven of the revised charter and all sections relating thereto be not adopted. Says aldermen Gillitt Hennessy Helmer Johnson, Mc Givern and Palmer and J.F. Todd. Says, Alderman Pendell and R.R. Todd.

Moved by Alderman Hennessy, seconded by Alderman Gillitt and carried that Section Two of Chapter Four of the revised charter be not adopted, and that appointing power remain in the hands of the Council as heretofore.

Moved by Alderman Palmer, seconded by Alderman Hennessy, and carried, that Section One of Chapter Nine remain as it is, excepting as regards a two thirds vote, which should be "by a majority of all the members of the Council".

Changes were also made, on motion of Alderman Hennessy, in some of the Ward boundaries.

Moved by Alderman Hennessy, seconded by Alderman Palmer and carried that the ordinance relating to Alderman's salaries remain as it is. Corrected, Feb 24<sup>th</sup> 1891

Moved by Alderman Palmer, seconded by Alderman R.R. Todd and carried that the ordinance relating to health offices remain as it is.

Moved by Alderman Palmer seconded by Alderman Pendell and carried that Chapter Sixteen, relating to special assessments be referred back for further consideration to the Commission. Whereupon the said Commission reported

forthwith, and recommended <sup>that</sup> to remain the same as it is in the old charter, and on motion, the said recommendation was sustained.

It was, on motion,

Resolved, That Hon George Wagner be requested to present to the Michigan Legislature the proposed revision of the Charter of Marquette City for adoption as soon as possible.

On motion of Alderman Palmer it was

Resolved, That we endorse the petition asking the Legislature "to establish and provide for the maintenance of a Normal School at some point on the Upper Peninsula" and request that the prayer of the petitioners be granted at this session of the Legislature.

The Council then on motion adjourned.

The Annual meeting of the Common Council of the city of Marquette was held in the Council room on Tuesday the 24<sup>th</sup> day of February A.D. 1891, Mayor Longyear presiding.

At roll call there were present Alderman Gillitt, Hennessy, Helmuth Johnson Pendill and R. A. Todd, Alderman Palmer arrived soon after.

The minutes of the preceding meeting were read when Alderman Hennessy stated that his motion, at the last meeting was "That the recommendations of the Commission in regard to the aldermen's salaries be adopted". Said change being made, the minutes were approved.

The petition of M. R. Mankin stating that he had leased the saw house on Lake Street with north of the approach to the Ore Dock, that he expects to erect for heavy hardware and asking permission to lay a R.R. track toward building, was on motion of Alderman Hennessy and seconded by Alderman Gillitt, not granted.

The petition of the Marquette Valley Milling Co.

stating that the demand for the product of its mills is greatly increasing and that the water from the stream they now use is insufficient to furnish the power required for the prosecution of their business, and asking permission to secure more power by diverting water from Dead River above the upper falls belonging to the city, and that a license be granted to divert the water in the manner specified, or to use it at the river and transmit the power, for a term of ten years and upwards, upon such terms as may be reasonable; was read.

Moved by alderman Hennessy that the petition be granted, which got seconded by Alderman Palmer, seconded by Alderman Pendill, moved as a substitute, that the petition be laid on the table, Ayes Aldermen Palmer Pendill and R. R. Todd.

Nays, aldermen Gillett Hennessy Helmuth and Johnson.

Said motion being lost, Alderman Hennessy, seconded by Alderman Gillett moved that the petition be granted.

Alderman Pendill, seconded by Alderman Palmer, moved an amendment, which was carried, that the petition be granted for a term of five years, with a continuation for another five years, providing the city will have no immediate use for the water. Ayes aldermen Johnson, Palmer, Pendill and R. R. Todd. Nays Alderman Gillett Hennessy and Helmuth.

The following petition signed by D. W. Paull, Hon Horatio Seymour and twenty three others was presented:-

To the Honorable the Mayor and Common Council of the city of Marquette.

Gentlemen,

We, the undersigned, residents of Michigan Street, would respectfully state, we believe that we are neither morally nor legally liable for the amount charged against us by the present assessment for the Michigan Street Sewer, and we respectfully decline to pay the same because we believe it to be erroneous and unjust. But not wishing to avoid our just duty and obligation, we hereby agree to pay our pro rata share of the actual cost of the sewer according to the following schedule, viz:

Moved by alderman Hennessy seconded by alderman R. P. Todd and carried, That the petition be accepted and that the city assessor be instructed to make out another assessment roll for the Michigan Street Seawall according to the figures presented, and the contract for the balance of said Seawall from Cedar Street to the Grand Seawall.

The City attorney reported in the matter of T. Ryans using the land belonging to the city, near the water power, and stated that he had drawn up a form of lease and agreement as instructed by the council, and that Ryan had declined to sign the same.

Moved and carried that the regular order be discontinued in order to proceed with the business for which the meeting was called.

The City Treasurer, Recorder and Street Commissioners submitted to the Council their Annual Reports, which were, on motion, referred to the Finance Committee.

On motion of Alderman Hennessy & seconded by alderman Johnson, the Board of Fire and Water Commissioners were requested to take steps to provide the city with the most modern, and the best fire alarm system obtainable.

The Council then on motion adjourned.
