

Necessary for such grading macadamizing and gutters, the common Council reserving the right to reject any and all bids.

4. That each bid shall be accompanied by two bonds, each in a penal sum of the total amount of the bid, coming to said City, one conditioned for the faithful performance of contract if awarded and the other conditioned for the payment of all labor and material claims arising under such contract.

5. That the expense and cost of such grading macadamizing and gutters shall be assessed upon the property abutting on said portion of said street and that the City assessor be and he is hereby instructed to prepare a special assessment roll for that purpose as soon as such expense and costs shall have been ascertained.

Moved and carried that the petition of C. E. Deane to Rent the City Farm be reconsidered.

The special assessment roll for Sewer on Washington Street from Fifth Street to Centre of Garfield Avenue was submitted to the Council by the City assessor, and on motion consideration of the same, was deferred till next meeting.

The following special assessment rolls were on motion confirmed, and the Recorder instructed to hand the same over to the City Treasurer for collection: -

To wit. For grading curbing and macadamizing Washington Street from Station "3 plus 80" to station "13". Also for grading curbing and macadamizing Morton Street from Fourth Street to LeB Street. Also for grading curbing and macadamizing Arch Street from Cedar Street to a point 400 feet East of the East line of Cedar Street.

The following bids to grade curb and macadamize Fifth Street from Superior Street to the north line of Fisher <sup>Street</sup> read: James Lattrell one dollar and forty four cents, Euclid Sargenes, one dollar and forty two cents, Armand Pellesier, one dollar and fifty cents, and George Reichel, one dollar and thirty cents per lineal foot. George Reichel's bid, not being accompanied by bonds, and Euclid Sargenes' reading "to the south line of Baldwins addition", the contract <sup>for said work</sup> was on motion, awarded to James Lattrell at one dollar and forty four cents ~~\$1.44~~ per lineal foot.

The Chairman of the Finance committee reported

and stated that the City would be compelled to borrow money to meet its obligations in consequence of so many improvements being made, and that the Water Board needed all the money due, ~~in consequence of delinquent taxes etc~~ and moved that the Board of Fire and Water Commissioners be <sup>\$10,000 paid</sup> given ten thousand Dollars (\$10,000) and orders drawn for the following amounts, to wit: July 1<sup>st</sup>, 1891 Five thousand Dollars (\$5,000) and the remaining Five Thousand Dollars on August 1<sup>st</sup>, September 1<sup>st</sup>, and October 1<sup>st</sup>, the payments to be made in Equal amounts.

Ayer Aldermen Agnes Desjardins Follis Gillitt Johnson Kearney Mc Elgon Moore Pendell Powell Sigis Staffors Todd <sup>and</sup> Young. Ayes none.

Alderman Gillitt, of the Committee of Police Claims and grievances reported and stated that the Marshal wished two more men on the Police force, one at night and one fourth day service and moved that the request be granted which was on motion carried and the Marshal thereupon appointed as members of the Police force, Dennis Hogan Isaac Messier Albert Johnson Albert Foubert and Orono Gorman.

Alderman Follis of the purchasing Committee reported and stated, that he could get 50 copies of the Revised City Charter printed by the Mining Journal Co at certain figures, he mentioned, and it was moved by Alderman Pendell seconded by Alderman Powell and carried that the purchasing Committee be authorized to have fifty copies printed in the same type as in the old Charter at 1<sup>00</sup> per page.

The City attorney reported unfavorably on John Burt's petition and the same was on motion laid on the table.

Alderman Gillitt stated that the Marshal requested more Police Badges hand cuffs etc and on <sup>motion</sup> said request granted, and the matter referred to the purchasing Committee as to the requirements needed.

Alderman Todd named Edward O.'Brien as Pound Master of the First Ward, and he was on motion appointed. The Council then on motion adjourned.

A regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Marquette was held in the Council Rooms on Monday the 6<sup>th</sup> day of July A. D. 1891. President Hennessey in the Chair.

Members present, Alderman Agnew Follis Giltitt Hennessey Johnson Kearney Moore Pendill Powell Siegel Stafford Todd and Young.

Minutes of preceding meeting now read and approved.

Alderman Desjardins appeared and took his seat. also Alderman Hermer.

Communication from Horatio Symmer, President of the Peter White Public Library presented, asking that the City pay \$200 per month to defray the expenses of the Library until next January.

Moved by Alderman Siegel that the petition be granted. Pending which Alderman Pendill moved as a substitute that seventy five dollars per month be allowed, which substitute was supported by Alderman Kearney.

Pending which Alderman Desjardins moved that the subject be indefinitely postponed. lost.

The substitute was then adopted by the following vote:

Ayes, Aldermen Follis Johnson Kearney Moore Pendill Powell Todd Hermer and Young. Nays, Aldermen Agnew Desjardins Giltitt Hennessey Siegel and Stafford.

The petition of Smith Moore and 32. others relative to opening Park Street to Seventh Street was referred to the street committee.

Petition of Edward Taphorn and 5. others protesting against the contract for the Fifth Street improvement being awarded to James Lallure, it being known that the petitioners offered to pay the same, <sup>after considerable discussion</sup> was laid on the table.

Communication of W. J. Reusselhoff offering to rent the City farm at \$50 per annum, was laid on the table.

Petition of Felix O. Hegen and 83. others relating to opening Superior Street Westward to Superior Avenue and to connect Superior Avenue with Superior Street was referred to the St. Committee.

The Superior Bonds of William J. Pentland, sureties, Henry Hoch and F. C. Glocks; and of Frank Fassbender, sureties, Timothy Dowdman and John C. Fassbender were approved and accepted.

The following special assessment rolls, being for Grading Curbing and Macadamizing Fair Avenue from Progress Island Road to Powder Mill Road; for Grading Curbing and Macadamizing Fifth Street from Superior Street to North line of Fisher Street; and for Sewer on Washington Street from Fifth Street to center of Garfield Avenue, were submitted by the assessor, which were approved, and the Recorder instructed to give notice as required by the Chapter that the Common Council will meet on the 20<sup>th</sup> day of July A. D. 1891, at 8. O. Clock P. M. to consider the final confirmation of said rolls.

The City Attorney submitted the draft of an Ordinance relating to Bicycle riding, which was referred to the Committee of Parks Cemeteries and public Grounds.

The following bids to Construct Sewer on Lincoln Avenue from the Manhole in the sewer at the intersection of Lincoln Avenue with Washington Street to a point 100 feet north of the north line of Bluff Street.

Chick Peterson, \$1.05, per linear foot, \$50. per Manhole \$300, per Lamp hole, and \$2.50 per cubic yard of rock

John Several bids to Construct Sewer on Lincoln Avenue from the Manhole in the sewer at the intersection of Lincoln Avenue with Washington Street to a point 100 feet north of the north line of Bluff Street were opened; that of Euclid Sargenes being the lowest he was awarded the Contract at thirty five cents (95<sup>¢</sup>) per linear foot, fifty dollars (\$50.00) per man hole, and to be paid Four dollars per cubic yard for Rock if maybe necessary to excavate, in building said sewer.

A number of bids to improve Adams Street were read. The lowest being one dollar and twenty cents \$1.20. on motion of Alderman Todd, the same were rejected, said bids being considered too high.

The bid of J. M. Moyer to grade curb and macadamize Cassin Street, <sup>being the lowest</sup> was, after some discussion, rejected through irregularity in its bond, and contract, <sup>and refused</sup>

A special meeting of the Common Council of the City of Marquette was held in the Council room on Monday the 13<sup>th</sup> day of July A.D. 1891. Mayor Longyear presiding

There were present aldermen Agnew Desjardins Follis Gillett Hennessy Johnson Kearney McGeor Moore Powell Stafford and Todd.

The Minutes of the preceding meeting were read and approved

Alderman Young appeared and took his seat. The regular order was suspended.

Alderman Siegel moved that a Committee of 15. be appointed to entertain the members of Congress.

Alderman Hennessy moved as an amendment, that the Mayor appoint said Committee to be composed of Citizens, and that he act as Chairman of the Committee. amendment adopted.

Moved by alderman Powell that the Four Hundred dollars (\$400) appropriated by the Council be placed at the disposal of the Mayor.

And aldermen Agnew Desjardins Follis Gillett Hennessy Johnson Kearney McGeor Moore Powell Siegel Stafford Todd and Young. Aye none.

Moved by Alderman Desjardins and carried that the Mayor act as chairman of said Committee.

A delegation of the Citizen association appeared to learn what action was being taken in the matter by the Council, which on being explained, the Mayor appointed the following Committee on entertainment: Aratio Seymour Jr. Peter White Abram A. Beech F. B. Spear Jr. O. Claus J. M. Wilkinson M. R. Manhard D. H. Ball J. D. Hauscom, W. F. Fitch John Gillett Timothy Aester C. Y. Osborne C. R. Brown George Royce James Russell H. H. Stafford George Wagner C. H. Call E. M. Watson R. I. Blair S. M. Billings.

The regular order of business was then resumed. Communication of J. C. Fowle, Supt, stating he could deliver finely crushed stone for eighty five cents per ton, was referred to the Street Committee.

The communication from the Park cemetery Commissioner, asking the Council to pass an ordinance prohibiting traffic trains with heavy loads from using the Perzue Isle Drive, stating it was built chiefly by

himself <sup>and a few others</sup> for a boulevard or pleasure drive, and that some persons unknown had cut down a lot of trees on the Lake side, and other piling and hauling slabs, and requesting action to be taken against said parties, was referred to the Street Committee.

Also another relating to persons injuring trees on the Island by piling bark etc, was referred to the committee on Parks, Cemeteries and public Grounds.

Petition from Contractors on L. Muller's Building on Washington Street for use of what the Charter allows in storing material, during construction, was granted.

The petition of Marquette Valley Milling Company asking the Council to consider the matter of donating or charter power, to said Company, below the Electric plant on Dead River, and five acres of land for a large Flouring Mill was referred to a committee appointed by the Mayor consisting of Aldermen Todd, Moore Agnew, Tolleis and Mc Grigor.

The City Attorney announced that Ball & Hausman had commenced a writ in ejectment in the name of the City but at the expense of Peter White against Ellen Cunningham to test the title of the City to Calumet street as platted by Peter White, the firm of which the City Attorney is a member having been retained by Mrs Cunningham some months ago.

The City Attorney also reported that S. G. M. Gates had commenced suit in the Circuit Court against the City to recover three hundred and twenty six dollars & fifty nine cents alleged to have been paid under protest for personal tax of 1890 and that unless otherwise ordered the appearance of the City would be entered in the case and defence made thereto.

The time for the collection of the following special assessments; work for grading curbing and Macadamizing Norton street from South Street to Lee Street; also for grading curbing and Macadamizing Washington Street from Station "3, plus 80" to station "13, was on motion extended to the 17<sup>th</sup> day of August a. d. 1891.

The profile of sewer in South Front Street was adopted.

The following Ordinance was on motion adopted.

An Ordinance for the construction of a sewer in Front Street from a point twenty eight (\$28) feet north of the south line of Superior Street to a point one hundred

and fifty four (154) feet South thereof.

It is hereby ordained by the Common Council of the City of Marquette:

1. That a Sewer be laid in the gutter on the West side of Front Street from the Sewer in Superior Street at a point twenty eight feet north of the South line of Superior Street to a point in said gutter one hundred and fifty four (154) feet south of said point of Commencement.

2. That said sewer be constructed of best vitrified Eight (8.) inch sewer pipe with six (6) inch "Yp" and be laid in accordance with the grade heretofore established therefor, and with two (2) lamp-holes where directed by the City Engineer, and in all respects said sewer shall be constructed <sup>in</sup> accordance with the plans and specifications of the Davis Sewer System, so called.

3. That the Recorder be and he is hereby authorized and directed to advertise for a period of ten (10) days in the Daily Mining Journal and once in the Weekly Mining Journal for bids to furnish all materials and perform all labor necessary for the construction of said Sewer, the Common Council reserving the right to reject any and all bids.

4. That each bid shall be accompanied by two (2) bonds each in the <sup>running to the City</sup> final sum of the total amount of the bid, one conditioned for the faithful performance of the contract, if awarded, and the other running to the people of the State of Michigan, conditioned for the payment of all claims for labor and material arising under such contract.

5. That the expense and costs of said sewer be assessed upon the property benefited thereby and that the City Assessor be and he is hereby instructed to prepare a special assessment ~~roll~~ <sup>roll</sup> for that purpose, as soon as such expense and costs shall have been ascertained.

Alderman Tollis stated that John <sup>Walter</sup> was sickly and had a family to support and found it impossible to pay his sidewalk tax, and moved that said tax be remitted.

Alderman Mennessy moved as an amendment that the street Commission be instructed not to finish

the collection of said tax, until ordered by the Council.

The Council then on motion adjourned.

petition of the Marquette Valley Milling Co, reported  
as follows:

Marquette Mich July 15<sup>th</sup> 1891.

To the Honorable Mayor and Common Council,  
Gentlemen.

Your special committee to which  
was referred the petition of the Marquette Valley Milling  
Co, asking for a site in the City's Water front at Collingwood,  
for their Mill, to increase their facilities to carry on the  
manufacture of Flour, would respectfully recommend  
that they be granted four hundred (400) feet of Water  
front to measure from a point sixty (60) feet of the  
East side of the south end of the present bridge, together  
with five (5) acres of land on the south side of the  
River, to be used as a site for their Plant, said land to  
be bounded on the North by the Water front above described,  
on the East by a line running South from the East limit  
of the Water front six hundred ten (610) feet in length;  
on the West by a line running parallel, and an equal  
distance with the East boundary line, and on the South

by a straight line drawn from the Southern limit on the East side to the same point on the West side; on condition that they remove the present Bridge, and replace it by a new and proper Bridge at a point so far Westward as will place the same outside the limits of the grant and that they will change the present highway to conform to the change in the position of bridge, both changes to be made to the satisfaction of the Street Committee of the Common Council, both as to quality of the Bridge erected and the position of the street, The old Bridge not to be removed, or any part thereof, till the new one is erected and accepted by the City.

Moved by Alderman Pendell that the City Attorney be instructed to make out a lease of the property described, to the Marquette Valley Milling Co for the period of Twenty five years (25), the ~~consideration~~ <sup>consideration</sup> to be one dollar, ~~(+)~~ the same to be forfeited if it is not used as a mill exclusively for one year.

Alderman Stafford moved as an amendment that the term be made ninety nine (99) years. Alderman Hennessy thereupon withdrew his

motion and a vote was taken on <sup>the</sup> Alderman Stafford's amendment which was adopted. Ayes Alderman Agnew Tollis Hennessy Johnson Moore Pendell Powell Sigel Stafford Todd Kerner and Young. Nays none.

The Park Committee reported as follows:

Your Committee on Parks, Cemeteries and public grounds to whom was referred the Communication of Peter White, relative to Presque Isle Park, have had the same under consideration, and respectfully report herewith an ordinance for the protection of Public Parks, cemeteries and grounds, and respectfully recommend that the same be adopted.

On motion of Alderman Moore the report was accepted and the Committee discharged, and the following ordinance was adopted:

An Ordinance for the Protection of Public Parks, cemeteries and Grounds.

It is hereby Ordained by the Common Council of the City of Marquette:

Section 1. No person without lawful authority, shall dig up, fell, cut, girdle, peck, trim, prune or in any manner injure or kill, or permit any animal to injure any tree, shrub, bush or vine, or cut, dig up or remove, drive upon or in any manner injure any sod, grass, greenward or lawn, or any cultivated plant or flower, or dig, move or remove any earth, gravel, stone or rock in or upon any of the public parks, cemeteries or grounds of the City.

Section 2. No person shall, without lawful authority, take down, remove, deface, injure or destroy any monument, sign guide board, bridge, walk, steps, fence railing, seat, stand, bower, booth, pavilion, building, table fountain lamp, swing, flagstaff or other structure or device in any of the public parks, cemeteries or grounds of the City.

Section 3. No person shall make, build or start any open fire or set fire to any brush, grass, leaves or other combustible materials, or shoot off fire or explode any gun pistol or other weapon, or any explosive substance, or make or engage in any disturbance or improper noise, fight or riot or be or become drunk or intoxicated, nor shall

any person shoot, snare, trap or catch, or injure or kill any animal, bird or fowl, or destroy the nest or destroy the eggs of any bird, in any of the public Parks, Cemeteries or grounds of the City.

Section 4. No person shall commit any nuisance, or place, deposit or leave any garbage, refuse, rubbish, dead animal or vegetable substance, wood, lumber, stone or any other article or substance whatever, or cause the same to be done, in or upon any of the public parks, Cemeteries or grounds of the City, and each and every day that any person guilty thereof, shall neglect to entirely remove the same therefrom, shall be deemed a separate offence.

Section 5. No person shall ride or drive any animal, wagon, cart, carriage or other vehicle at a dangerous or imminent rate of speed, or ride or drive or cause to be ridden or driven any vehicle with a greater or heavier load than two hundred pounds for each wheel of said vehicle for each inch in width of tire thereon, in or upon any of the public Parks, cemeteries or grounds of the City.

Section 6. No person shall without lawful authority make, erect, maintain or keep any sign, device, stand, bower, booth, pavilion, shed, building, platform or other structure or scatter, distribute or leave any hand bill, dodger or advertisement, or make or post up any notice, bill or advertisement, or cause the same to be done, in or upon any of the public parks, Cemeteries or grounds of the City.

Section 7. No person shall without lawful authority, sell or offer for sale any goods, wares, merchandise or thing, or be engaged in any business, calling, trade, traffic or occupation for gain, except the transportation of passengers, or engage in any sport, show, entertainment or diversion for which pay is demanded or received, in any of the public Parks, Cemeteries or grounds of the City.

Section 8. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not less than Ten Dollars nor exceeding One hundred Dollars, or by imprisonment in the County Jail or Jail of the City of Marquette for a term of not exceeding Ninety days, or both said fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court. Ayes,

City unless said vehicle be provided with a good bell  
or alarm, nor in the evening or night time unless such  
vehicle shall also be provided with and carry a lighted  
lamp which shall show a bright white light ahead of  
such vehicle and colored lights on either side thereof, nor  
shall any person while riding any such vehicle faster  
than six miles per hour approach or pass any animal  
ridden or driven by any person in or upon any street  
avenue or public way.

Section 2. No person shall ride any Bicycle  
tricycle velocipede or other wheel vehicle upon or along  
any sidewalk within that portion of said City embraced  
in the Fire limits, nor upon or along any sidewalk in said  
City within feet of any other person upon such sidewalk  
at a rate of speed faster than three miles per hour, nor  
shall any person ride upon or occupy any sidewalk with  
any such vehicle so as to prevent any person passing along  
upon and from occupying any such sidewalk to at least  
on half its full width thereof.

Section 3. Any person violating the provisions

of this ordinance upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than (5.) Five dollars nor more than (\$25.00) Twenty five dollars, provided that the provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to children under the age of twelve years.

ed on the north by the water front above described;

and on the South by a straight line drawn from the  
southern limit on the East side of its southern limit  
on the West side; for the term of Ninety Nine Years

to be occupied and used for Milling and Manufacturing  
purposes, but in no case for Brewing or distilling  
business or any business connected therewith, nor  
for Manufacturing Explosives, nor for any manufactur-  
ing business dangerous or detrimental to the said  
Electric Light plant.

Provided, That in case any rent shall be due  
and unpaid, or if default shall be made in any  
of the covenants herein contained, then it shall be  
lawful for the said party of the first part, or its  
certain attorney, to enter into and re-passes the  
said premises, and the said party of the second part,  
and each and every occupant, to remove and put  
out.

And the said party of the second part does  
hereby hire the said premises for the term of Ninety  
Nine Years as above mentioned, and does covenant

and promise to pay to the said party of the first <sup>part</sup>, the annual rent of one dollar in advance and pay all taxes and assessments ordinary and extraordinary that may be levied upon said premises.

And also, that it, the said party of the second part, its successors and assigns, will at its own expense, during the continuance of this lease, keep the said premises and every part thereof in good repair, and will not sub-let said premises or any portion thereof to any person or persons whomsoever, without the written consent of the said party of the first part, and at the expiration of the term, yield and deliver up the same in the like condition as when taken, reasonable use and wear thereof and damages by the elements excepted.

And also, and this lease is on the express condition that it, the said party of the second part, its successors and assigns, will at its own expense, as soon as practicable, remove the present Bridge and replace it by a new and proper Bridge at a point so far Westward as will place the same outside the limits of this grant, and that it, the said party of the second part, its successors <sup>and assigns</sup>, will change the present Highway to conform to the change in the position of the bridge, both changes to be made to the satisfaction of the Street Committee of the Common Council of the City of Marquette, both as to quality of the bridge erected and the position of the street; the old bridge not to be removed, or any part thereof, till the new one is erected and accepted by the City.

And also, and this lease is on the express condition, that it, the said party of the second part, its successors and assigns, shall not use or occupy said premises in any manner so as to interfere with or prevent or impair the full use, exercise and enjoyment by said City, of the Water Power of said river for the operation of the City Electric Plant.

And also, and this lease is on the express condition, that it, the said party of the second part, its successors and assigns, shall, as soon as practicable, erect upon said premises a Grain Milling Plant of a capacity of at least fifty barrels product per day; and that it will, so far as practicable, continuously run and operate the same; and that in the event

that the said party of the second part its successors and assigns shall fail or neglect to so run and operate said Milling plant for the space of twelve months, at any one time then and in that event this lease shall terminate and all rights of said party of the second part, its successors and assigns, in and to said premises shall cease and determine

This lease is made and executed on behalf of the City of Marquette in pursuance of the direction of the Common Council of said City, at meetings thereof held on July 17<sup>th</sup> 1891, and July 20<sup>th</sup> 1891.

And the said party of the first part does covenant that the party of the second part, its successors and assigns, on paying the aforesaid instalments and performing all the covenants aforesaid, shall and may peaceably and quietly have, hold and enjoy the said demised premises for the term aforesaid.

In Witness Whereof, said party of the first part has caused these presents to be executed by its Mayor and Recorder, under its corporate seal, and said party of the second part has caused the same to be executed by its President and Secretary, under its corporate seal, this 20<sup>th</sup> day of July, 1891.

Committee of Police claims and grievances to which was referred petition of Frank Greenwald and others for passage way on South side of Washington Street during construction of buildings repaired, and recommended construction of temporary cross walks opposite Greenwald's store and L'huillier's Grocery store. Report adopted, and committee discharged.

Alderman Todd stated that several petitions had been presented for water mains on Jackson Street and requested report from Committee of Police claims and grievances to which the matter was referred.

Said Committee stated they would report at next meeting.

Communication from City attorney to the Council, was read, in regard to sidewalks, and enclosed plans on file.

Erick J. Johnson's, One dollar and twenty five cents per lineal foot, one dollar and fifty cents per lamp hole, and three dollars per cubic yard of Roofs extra.

Euclid Largeness, Two dollars and fifty cents per lineal foot, said price to include all labor and Rock work if the same be encountered.

Jean Marlow's, Six dollars and seventy three cents per lineal foot, and for three dollars and thirty cents per lineal foot, rock work not included, and for said rock work the sum and price of four dollars and thirty seven cents per cubic yard extra.

Christ Peterson's, one dollar and eighty eight cents per lineal foot of sewer, two dollars and fifty cents per lamp hole, and three dollars and fifty cents per yard extra for Roofs.

On motion of Alderman Powell, Christ Peterson was awarded the contract for a sewer.

The City attorney to whom was referred the Deed of Sidney Adams for right of way on Prospect Street, reported and stated that said deed was in proper form. Whereupon, on motion of Alderman Moore, said deed was accepted.

Moved by Alderman Moore and carried that Prospect Street improvement matter be taken from the table and the Recorder instructed to advertise for bids for the same.

The Street Commissioner's pay roll was on motion approved and accepted.

The Special Assessment Roll for Sewer in Washington Street from Fifth Street to the center of Garfield Avenue was on motion confirmed, and the Recorder instructed to hand said assessment roll over to the City Treasurer for collection.

The Special Assessment for Sewer in Hewitt Avenue from the Trunk Sewer to center of Front Street approved and the Recorder instructed to give notice as required by the Charter that the Common Council will meet on 21<sup>st</sup> day of September A. D. 1891 at 8.0. clock P. M. to consider the final confirmation of said Roll.

The Committee of Police, claims and grievances to which was referred the petition of property holders and residents on Jackson Street for water mains thrown, reported and stated, the Water Board could not do said work this Fall for the lack of funds necessary.

The Special Committee on the Park Street matter reported and stated that they did not deem it advisable to purchase at present the full width of 66 feet and would report that the lowest cost of obtaining 36 ft was \$700, or the full lot 50 feet \$900 <sup>00</sup>/<sub>100</sub> report accepted.

The following ordinance was on motion adopted.

An Ordinance (relative to the construction of a side walk on the West side of Fourth Street, from Superior Street North.

It is hereby ordained by the Common Council of the City of Marquette:

Section 1. That a plank sidewalk be constructed in accordance with the general ordinance of the City relative thereto, on the West side of Fourth Street from Superior Street north to and to connect with the sidewalk now on said West side of said Fourth Street at a point about one hundred feet South of the track of the Duluth, South Shore and Atlantic Railway.

Section 2. That the owners and occupants of the lots and parcels of land abutting on said Fourth Street opposite said sidewalk are hereby required to construct those portions of said sidewalk opposite said lots and parcels of land respectively, at their own expense within thirty days from service upon them of a copy of this ordinance, said service to be made by the street Commissioner upon such owners and occupants or by posting the same upon the lots or parcels of land of such owners and occupants, on or before the 15<sup>th</sup> day of September 1891.

The Street Commissioner report was on motion accepted.

A Special meeting of the Common Council of the City of Marquette was held in the Council room on Monday the 21<sup>st</sup> day of September A. D. 1891. Mayor Longyear presiding.

There were present Alderman Follis Gillett, James Moore Porditt Siegel Stafford Therner and Young. Alderman Hennessey appeared later and took his seat.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The Recorder stated that the ordinance now having been passed for the Prospect Street improvement, therefore after consulting with the City Attorney, he did not advise to for bids for said work, as proceedings would be illegal.

The special assessment roll for sewer on Hewitt Avenue from trunk sewer to Centre of Front Street, was on motion confirmed and the Recorder instructed to hand said assessment rolls over to the Treasurer for collection.

Moved and carried that the Regular order of business be suspended.

The profile of sewer on Front Street from from the manhole in the Centre of Hewitt Avenue to the South line of Ohio Street was on motion adopted.

On motion of Alderman Hennessey the following

ordinance was adopted.

It is hereby ordained by the Common Council of the City of Marquette,

an ordinance for the construction of a sewer in Front Street from the Man-hole in the Center of Hewitt Avenue to the South line of Ohio Street.

1. That a sewer be laid in the center of Front Street from the Man-hole in the center of Hewitt Avenue to the South line of Ohio Street.

2. That said sewer be constructed of best vitrified sewer pipe with four (4) inch <sup>six (6) inch</sup> "sp" and be laid in accordance with the grade heretofore established therefor and with one (1) lamp-hole on the South end of said avenue, and in all respects said sewer shall be constructed in strict accordance with the plans and specifications of the Davis Sewer system, so called, and be entirely completed on or before sixty days from the letting of the contract, and said streets be left in good condition by the contractor for such work.

3. That the Recorder be and he is hereby authorized and directed to advertise for a period of ten (10) days in the Daily Mining Journal and once in the Weekly Mining Journal for bids to furnish all materials and perform all labor necessary for the construction of said sewer, the Common Council reserving the right to reject any and all bids.

4. That each bid shall be accompanied by two (2) bonds each in the penal sum of the total amount of the bid, one running to the City, conditioned for the faithful performance of the contract, if awarded, and the other running to the people of the State of Michigan, conditioned for the payment of all claims for labor and materials arising under such contract.

5. That the expense and cost of said sewer be assessed upon the property benefited thereby and that the City Assessor be and he is hereby instructed to prepare a special assessment roll for that purpose as soon as such expense and costs shall have been ascertained.

The ordinance for grading curbing and macadamizing Prospect Street, from Fourth Street to Spence Street

was read.

Moved by alderman Pendill and carried that said ordinance be changed to read the property benefited instead of "abutting".

On motion of Alderman Moore the following ordinance was adopted;

It is hereby ordained by the Common Council of the City of Marquette:

1. That Prospect Street, from Fourth Street to Spruce Street be graded to the full width thereof, according to the grade heretofore adopted therefor.

2. That said street between the limits above specified be macadamized to the width of thirty feet in the center thereof, and that gutters be constructed of plank along each side of such macadamizing, and that said gutters and said macadamizing shall be done in accordance with the general ordinances of said City relative thereto.

3. That the Recorder be and he is hereby authorized and directed to advertise for a period of ten days in the Daily Mining Journal and once in the Weekly Mining Journal for bids to furnish all material and perform all labor necessary for such grading, macadamizing and gutters, the Common Council reserving the right to reject any and all bids.

4. That each bid shall be accompanied by two Bonds, each in a penal sum of the total amount of the bid, one conditioned for the faithful performance of contract, if awarded, and the other conditioned for the payment of all labor and material claims arising under such contract.

5. That the expense and cost of such grading, macadamizing and gutters shall be assessed upon the property benefited, and that the City assessor be and he is hereby instructed to prepare a special assessment roll for that purpose as soon as such expense and costs shall have been ascertained.

Moved and carried that the Street Committee be instructed to enquire if all the title has been acquired to land necessary for the trunk Sewer extension.

On motion of Alderman Pendill it was Resolved: That there be raised by taxation, this <sup>current</sup> year, the following amounts, for City purposes to wit:
