A special meeting of the Common Council of the City of Marquette was held in the Council room on Friday the 16th day of August A. D. 1889. Mayor Clark presiding.

At roll call there were present Aldermen Donovan Helmert, Mc Graw Palmer James F. Todd and Robert R. French.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read whereat motion "moved and carried that the plans for the culvert at Western Creek be left in the hands of the street committee, was on motion changed to read "in the hands of the street council". Said minute was on motion approved, with the aforesaid amendment.

The Liquor Bond of John Connors, with Isaac Steinberger & Charles Meiske, as security, was on motion approved.

The communication of Robert R. French requesting be allowed Two Thousand Dollars on account of his Third Street Contract was read, and it was moved by Alderman Palmer, seconded by Alderman Helmert and carried that Robert R. French be allowed ^{Two} Thousand Dollars (\$2000) on account of his Third St Contract, and that the Mayor and Recorder be authorized to issue an order for that amount.

The following communication was read and on motion ordered placed on file:

A proposition to the Council from Mr George L. Burris in regard to right of way for Trunk Line through his land was presented, when, on motion of Alderman Palmer seconded by Alderman P. P. Todd it was Resolved

that the proposition made by George L. Burris to the city of Marquette to deed the Sewer Right-of-way be accepted with the modification that the pipe be composed with the Davis system.

The petition of Wilson and Moore asking permission to use one half of Bluff Street during the building of the School house, was, on motion granted.

The petition of Alfred Thurtell and J. F. Follis protesting against the passage of an ordinance regarding horses peddles and transient traders, was read stating; "we believe and we are backed up by the decisions of many judges of supreme and circuit court, in different states including our own, and also including the decision of Chief Justice Bradley of the Supreme Court of the United States that such an ordinance will be unconstitutional" etc., etc., and stating they were ready and anxious to pay their portion of the municipal taxes, and to conform to every fair law governing their business. And also another petition against said ordinance signed by a number of merchants and citizens.

Aforenamed petitions were, on motion of Alderman J. F. Todd seconded by Alderman Donovan, laid on the table pending further action on said ordinance.

Motion by Alderman Helmer, seconded by Alderman Palmer and carried, that a profile be made for a street from the Powder Mill Road to Presque Isle drive along the south line of the fair grounds.

On motion of Alderman Palmer, seconded by seconded by Alderman J. F. Todd the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, By the Common Council of the City of Marquette, that the time for collection of the following assessment rolls, be it: For grading, curbing and Macadamizing First Street from Hewitt Avenue to Prospect Street; For grading, curbing and Macadamizing Third Street from Hewitt Avenue to the fair grounds, and for a sewer on Fourth Street from the south line of Arch Street to sewer already laid on Washington Street, be, and is hereby extended till the 14th day of September A.D. 1889, and the return day of the warrant, and said warrant be extended to and including the said 14th day of September A.D. 1889.

On motion of Alderman Palmer, seconded by Alderman Helmer, the following ordinance was adopted:

X An ordinance to amend section 2. of an ordinance for grading, curbing and Macadamizing Pine Street from the South line of the curbing on Hewitt Avenue to the North line of Moore's addition.

It is hereby ordained by the Common Council of the City of Marquette,

Sec 1. That section 2. of the aforesaid ordinance be changed to read as follows:

Sec 2. That said street, between the limits above specified, be Macadamized to the width of Thirty feet in the centre thereof; and that gutters be constructed of plank along each side of such Macadamizing.

Such planks of the present gutters as shall be accepted by the Street Commissioners may be used again.

Said gutters and said Macadamizing shall be in accordance with the general ordinances of the city relative thereto. And that a Culvert be constructed of Planks in accordance with the Street Commissioner's directions, eight inches by twelve ^{inch} in the clear, and connected with the Bay culvert on the South West corner of Pine & Prospect Streets, and carried diagonally across to the North East corner of said street, thence along the last line of said Pine street to the Natural Water course.

Also that the following section be added to be known as section six:

Section 6. That a sidewalk ^{four feet four inches} ~~front the building~~ in width be laid on the West side of Pine Street to the north line of Moore's addition.

The Council then on motion adjourned.

The minutes of the Council meetings held August 10th A.D. 1889 and September 3rd A.D. 1889, were read & approved.

The resignation of Miss Emma L. Wetmore as Librarian of the Peter White and City Libraries, on account of ill health, to take effect as soon as her successor can be appointed, was on motion accepted.

The following communication was read and on motion ordered placed on file.

The petition of N. O. Gravell and Eleven others, to have Jackson Street graded and Macadamized from Champion Street to Altamont Street, was on motion referred to the Street Committee.

The petition of Flavia M. F. Pendell and Oliver Pendell to have grade established on Ohio Street between High & Pine Streets, was on motion referred to the Street Committee.

The Street Commissioner's Report was read, and on motion accepted and ordered placed on file.

The Clerk of the Circuit Court having filed with the City Recorder a certified copy of verdict and order confirming same in the condemnation proceedings in the case of the City v. S. Walter Potter and others, the following resolution was, on motion of Alderman Palmer

seconded by Alderman Rule, adopted.

Whereas, The Condemnation proceedings on behalf of the City and against Walter Potter, John A. Knue, Richard P. Evans, George L. Burris, Isaac L. Hewitt, Henry Hewitt Jr., and Samuel P. Ely has been finally determined, and,

Whereas, The jury therein by their verdict directed that Walter Potter should be paid one dollar, Isaac L. Hewitt Two dollars, Henry Hewitt Jr. One dollar and Samuel P. Ely, guardian, one dollar therefor;

Resolved, That there be set apart and provided in the treasury of this City the sum above mentioned, and that the Treasurer of this City is hereby directed to pay to the persons above named upon demand the sum mentioned respectively, and that the Mayor and Recorder be hereby authorized to draw orders therefor.

The city attorney having reported that he had negotiated with George L. Burris for right of way for Trunk Street upon payment of Twenty five Dollars (\$25⁰⁰) as consideration, the action of the City attorney was approved and the deed accepted.

On motion of Alderman Rule, seconded by Alderman Mack, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That whereas the Board of Water Power & Electric Light Commissioners have made contracts for Electric Lighting in this City, and whereas it is necessary for the City to sign a memorandum agreement with the Companies making contracts with the City for lighting, as licensee of the right to use the apparatus, machinery and devices of said companies for electric lighting, the Mayor and Recorder are empowered to sign said memorandum agreement for this City as licensee.

On motion of Alderman Helmert, seconded by Alderman Donovan, the following preamble and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, R. K. Hawley and his associates consider that if they should erect a Manufacturing Plant at the mouth of Dead River in this City they should not be called upon to pay municipal taxes, as for water and street lighting, until they shall receive benefit therefrom, or until such time as they shall ask for the same at their location, and shall receive such benefit;

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Council that manufactures should be fostered by this City, and that said R. K. Hawley and associates should have a rebate for

all Water-tax and for all amounts assessed directly or indirectly for Street lighting until such time as said parties shall ask for said privileges and receive the same, and this Council will so rebate so far as it is within its power.

The Street Commissioners pay Roll was presented and on motion approved.

X The several bids to Regrade Macadamize, place culverts, and Cover Pine Street from North line of Hewitt Avenue to Moore's addition were opened, and on motion of Alderman Hennessy seconded by Alderman Helmer, Euclid Largus, being the lowest bidder, was awarded the contract at Eighty cents^{80c} per linear foot.

Alderman Palmer moved that the Street Committee be authorized to employ an engineer to definitely locate the line and fix the grade of the proposed Second Sewer, using the present profile so far as possible, whereat some discussion ensued, when it was

Moved by Alderman Mack seconded by Alderman Drane and carried, that the Street Committee be instructed to secure the Second Sewer profile and report at next meeting.

Moved by Alderman Palmer, seconded by Alderman Helmer, that Sidney Adams be allowed to deposit a note with the City Treasurer, drawing six C. per cent interest, payable in one year from date, for one half of his special assessment on Third Street.

Moved and carried that the matter be referred to the City attorney as to the legality of the same.

On motion John Bergh was allowed Two Hundred dollars on his Fourth Street Sewer Contract.

A special meeting of the Common Council of the City of Marquette was held in the Council Room on Friday the 13th day of September A.D. 1889, Mayor Clark presiding.

At Roll Call there were present Alderman Dolf Hennessey, Helmut Mack, McGeown, Palmer, Rule, James F. Todd and Robert R. Todd. Alderman Donovan arrived soon after.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The following communication was read and on motion of Alderman Dolf ordered placed on file.

Marquette Mich., Sept. 13, 1889.

To the Common Council of the City of Marquette,
Gentlemen,

In regard to the legality of accepting a note from Mr. Sidney Adams for part of his special assessment, I would respectfully report that owing to illness the past two days I have not given the matter careful consideration. I have however, given the matter some thought, and I can see no illegality in taking the note. You will, of course, lose all claim against the property, and will have simply the personal liability of Mr. Adams.

A number of applications were read for the position of Librarian, when, on motion of Alderman Hennessey, a formal ballot was taken, and Miss Rose C. Paternault, having received the largest number of votes cast, was thereupon declared duly elected.

The Street Committee presented the profile of the Grand Trunk, when it was moved by Alderman Palmer, seconded by Alderman Mack and carried, that George P. Cummings' Profile of Grand Trunk be accepted and placed on file.

On motion of Alderman Palmer seconded by Alderman Rule the following ordinance was adopted:

It is hereby ordained by the Common Council of City of Marquette;

1. That a sewer be constructed along the following line, to wit: Beginning at a point in the south face of the Grace Furnace Pier about ten feet from the east face thereof running thence north 45° 6' feet thence north 77° 55' east 19 1/2 feet, thence north 73° 55' east 381. 3,

Thence north $26^{\circ} 5'$ east 197.7 feet, thence north to a point 124 feet north of the north line of Arch Street; thence north $15^{\circ} 15'$ west to the centre of Michigan Street, thence west to the centre of Ohio Street, thence west along Ohio Street to centre of Cedar Street, thence north along cedar Street to centre of Hewitt Avenue, thence west 55 feet 668 feet to centre of Prospect Street. And that the same shall be in accordance with the Plans and Specification of the Davis Sewer System excepting as to grade, which shall be in accordance with the profile prepared by George P. Cummings and hereby adopted.

2. That the Recorder be authorized and directed to advertise for a period of twenty days in the Daily Mining Journal, for bids to furnish all material and to perform all labor necessary for the construction of such sewer, the Council reserving the right to reject any or all bids.

3. that each bid shall be accompanied by a certified check for Two Hundred and fifty dollars as a guarantee that such bidder will enter into a contract with said City, in accordance with said bid if requested, and will give two good and sufficient Bonds, one conditioned for the faithful performance of Contract and the other conditioned for the payment of all labor and material claims arising under such contract. Each bond a penal sum equal to the total cost of such sewer.

4. That the cost of such sewer be assessed upon the property benefitting thereby and that the City assessor be instructed to prepare a special assessment roll for that purpose as soon as such expense and costs shall have been ascertained.

On motion of Alderman Palmer seconded by Alderman Rulz, it was

Resolved, That the City assessor be instructed to establish an assessment district for the purpose of paying for the Trunk Sewer in accordance with the ordinance just passed and the provisions of the City Charter, and that the City attorney be requested to advise the City assessor as to the legality of the said assessment district as to its legality, and that he also report to the Council his opinion regarding the legal mode of paying for said sewer.

The Street Committee reported and stated that Third Street Street was completed, and recommended the acceptance of the work, and it was moved by Alderman Palmer seconded by Alderman Rulz to carry that Robert R. French,

be paid the balance on his contract for said street, to-wit:
Eleven Hundred & Eighty Two $\frac{4}{10}$ dollars (\$1182 $\frac{4}{10}$),
and that the Mayor and Recorder be authorized to issue
an order for the same.

The Street Committee to which was referred the
petition to have Jackson Street, graded, Curbed and
macadamized from Chapman Street to Altamont
Street recommended that the petition be granted, and
on motion of Alderman Palmer, seconded by Alderman
J. F. Todd, the recommendation was sustained.

Moved and Carried that a profile of Jackson
Street between said limits be made.

On motion, Section two of the First Street ordin-
ance was changed to read twenty days instead of ten
days.

Moved by Alderman Palmer, seconded by Alderman
Mack and Carried, that Sidney Adams be allowed
to deposit a note with the City Treasurer on one year's
time, drawing interest at six per cent per annum,
for one-half of his special assessment for the Third
Street improvement.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The petition of Thomas Heffernan and three others to have Division Street graded, curbed and macadamized between Genesee and Jackson Streets, and sidewalks laid on the same, was, on motion, granted.

Moved and carried that the Street Committee have profile made of Division Street.

The resignation of Alderman Rule was read, which is as follows:

To the Honorable Mayor & Members of the Marquette City Council,

Gentlemen, With this I beg to tender my resignation as a member of your Board. I shall ever feel a warm interest in your future labors, all of which I know will tend to the advancement and prosperity of the city.

I have to express my regrets that the necessity of my serving connection with you should arise, but the leaving your city for a time, masks this step inspiration.

On motion of Alderman Hennessy the aforesaid resignation was accepted and ordered spread on the records and placed on file.

Moved by Alderman Hennessy, seconded by Alderman J. F. Todd and carried that:

Whereas, Hon George W. Rule president of this Council, has tendered his resignation as Alderman to this Council on account of his removal from this city, and appreciating his ability and uniform courtesy in our deliberations during the past two years, and regretting his resignation from the Council and removal from our city;

Resolved, that it is the sense of this body that it is losing an able associate and member whose council and advice has been very valuable and that such removal is very much regretted by us, and it is further

Resolved, That this resolution be spread on the records

of this Council and a copy thereof be certified to the honorable gentlemen with the hand and seal of the Mayor and Recorder of this City.

The petition of Mrs Susan Strong, asking the Council to refund the amount of her tax last year - being a widow with seven small children - which was paid in mistake by another person, and who is pressing her for the money, was, on motion, granted, and the Mayor and Recorder were authority to issue an order for the amount.

The Street Committee reported and stated that Robert R. French had completed his contract on Front Street and recommended the payment for same, to wit, Five hundred Forty four dollars (\$544.) and, on motion his bill was ordered paid.

Ayes, Alderman Dolf Hennassy, Helmuth Mack, McGivern Palmer James F. Todd & Robert R. Todd. Nays, none.

The Street Committee also stated that John Bugh had completed his Fourth Street Sewer Contract and recommended the payment of the balance on same, to wit, One Hundred and Twenty nine & 38/100 dollars (\$129 38/100) less the bill of the iron Bay Manufacturing Co. of Thirty four and 67/100 dollars (\$34 67/100)

On motion of Alderman Palmer, seconded by Alderman
 J. F. Todd, the following ordinance was adopted:

It is hereby ordained by the Common Council of the
 City of Marquette.

1. That Jackson Street from Champion Street to Al-
 tamont Street, be graded to the full width thereof, in accordance
 with the grade heretofore adopted thereto.

2. That said Street, between the limits above specified,
 be macadamized to the width of Thirty feet in the center thereof,
 and that gutters be constructed of slanks along each side
 of such macadamizing. Said gutters and said macadamizing
 shall be in accordance with the general ordinances of said
 city, relative thereto.

3. That Culverts be constructed of the size, nature and
 at the places indicated, upon the profile heretofore adopted
 for said Street, and that said Culverts be laid under the
 actual and personal provision of the Street Commissioner.

4. That the Recorder be authorized and directed
 to advertise for a period of eight days in the daily and weekly
 Mining Journal for bids to furnish all material and perform
 all labor necessary for such grading, macadamizing, gutters
 and Culverts, the Council reserving the right to reject
 any or all bids.

5. That each bid shall be accompanied by two Bonds
 each in the penal sum of the total amount of the bid,
 one conditioned for the faithful performance of contract
 if awarded, and the other conditioned for the payment
 of all labor and material claims arising under such
 contract.

6. That the expense and cost of such grading, macadamizing, gutters, and curbs shall be assessed upon the property abutting on said portion of said streets and that the City Assessor be instructed to prepare a special assessment roll for that purpose as soon as such expense and costs shall have been ascertained.

Resolved, That a special meeting of the Board of Registration be held at said Livery Office during the usual hours on the fifth day of October next.

Further Resolved, That the Recorder publish notice of such meeting and special election in the usual manner and that proper registration lists be published.

The Mayor appointed Alderman John F. Mack as president of the Council during Mr. Rule's unexpired term.

Motion was carried that the street Commissioner be instructed to remove the Liberty Pole on the corner of Ridge and Third Streets, which is considered unsafe.

The Council then on motion adjourned

A regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Marquette was held in the Council Room on Monday the 7th day of October A. D. 1889. Mayor Clark presiding.

At and half there were present Alderman Belmont Mack, McGivern, Palmer, James F. Todd and Robert R. Todd. Alderman Hennessey & Doff arrived soon after.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The protest against changing the grade of Ridge Street from Fourth to Fifth Streets was, on motion laid on the table.

The following was presented and read and on motion ordered placed on file:

We, the undersigned inspectors of Election of the Third Ward in the City of Marquette, do hereby certify, that at the Special Election held October 7th 1889, to fill the vacancy in the Third Ward, caused by the resignation of George W. Rule, there were one hundred and fifty two votes cast of which eighty nine were for James Pendell and sixty three votes were for Louis Riedinger.

James Pendell having received a majority of the votes cast, we hereby declare him duly elected as Alderman to fill vacancy.

Moved and carried that if Mr. Pendell presents himself he be allowed to take his seat in the Council at once.

The Mayor thereupon deputed the City Attorney and City Marshal to so inform Mr. Pendell, who afterwards made his appearance.

5. 6. That a side-wall five feet four inches in width be laid on each side of said Street between the aforesaid limits.

The following bids were presented to grade, Curb macadamizing and put Culverts in Jackson Street, from Champion Street to Altamont Street; Bough & Hettling being \$1 30⁰⁰ and Jerome Lattalle \$1 82⁰⁰ per linear foot.

Andruos, of Grand Rapids, agent of a syndicate of Capitalists, for an expression of sentiment as to what the City would be willing to do as an inducement to said Capitalists for locating their proposed Marble works here, and the following communication was presented:

Marquette, Mich., Nov 7th 1889.

To his Honor, the Mayor, and the Common Council of the City of Marquette:

Gentlemen:— Among other available localities looked upon by the Marble interests which I represent, is your City as a point to manufacture the products of the great deposits of Verde antique Marble which we have now under our control in this County. Certain of your citizens have induced me to present this matter to your honorable body for an expression from you as to what your City would do to aid this enterprise to come here in the way of donating Water power privileges and grounds suitable for the location of the plant, which will be needed to Manufacture for the Market, the products of these quarries.

Very Respectfully,

J. P. Andruos, agent.

After a few statements by Mr Andruos concerning the character and extent of said proposed enterprise, and a thorough expression of opinions by the Mayor and several Aldermen and a few remarks from a Mayor Astor on the subject, on motion of Alderman Mack seconded by Alderman Helmut, the following resolution was adopted; Alderman Pendell voting against it, saying he had not thoroughly looked over the ground of the Water Power and thought it necessary not to be too hasty in the matter:

Whereas, J. P. Andruos, of Grand Rapids, Michigan agent representing a syndicate, engaged in developing and intending to develop Marble quarries near Ishpeming, and in other portions of the upper Peninsula, and who is

desirous of locating at a suitable point, a mill for the manufacture of Marble, granite, slate, etc, in all their forms demanded by commerce, and his attention having been called to the Dead River Water Powers, owned by this city, and inducements having been offered to the said syndicate by other parties at other points, for the location of said works, and the said Andrews having learned from this city what inducements would be offered this syndicate for the location of said works on the property of the city at said water powers, has, at the suggestion of citizens of this place, presented to this body a petition for consideration of the question, and whereas, it is proposed by the said syndicate to establish large and extensive works that will employ, at the commencement of its operations, fifty men, with a volume of business, not less than half a million dollars per year, with a certainty of a very large increase, and involve of three years from its commencement at least one hundred men, with the prospect of a much larger number, and whereas the building of a suitable dam, buildings, and the placing of machinery suitable for such enterprise, will involve an outlay of at least fifty thousand dollars at the commencement, and

Whereas, it is the sense of this body that said enterprise should be induced to locate in our midst and upon our water powers.

Resolved: That this city will grant to the said Andrews, as agent for the said syndicate, an option, to take as a donation a perpetual lease or deed of twenty acres of land, for the purpose of locating said works, located located below the present dam built by the City at Dead River, and at such point as shall be selected by the said Andrews, as agent for the said syndicate, and agreed upon by this body, with such amount of frontage upon the River, adjacent to the said dam, to be erected by the said syndicate as shall be necessary for said enterprise, the twenty acres extending back adjacent to the point where the dam shall located, in such form as not to occupy more of the River front than would be necessary for the successful prosecution of said work; and that the said syndicate, if they shall erect said works, in accordance with the expectations herein set forth, shall receive either a perpetual lease of the said property or a deed of the same, upon carrying out the erection of the said works, and shall, upon election before the first day of July next to take said location as a donation, have executed to them an optimal contract.

Moved by Alderman Hennessy seconded by Alderman Mack & carried that the matter be referred to the Committee on Parks Cemeteries & Public grounds.

The Liquor Bond of John B. Taylor, Sureties, George B. Coles & Charles Muske, was, on motion approved & accepted.

On motion of Alderman Palmer seconded by Mack, the following ordinance was adopted:

It is hereby ordained by the Common Council of the City of Marquette:

Section 1. That, Whereas it is the judgement of this Council that the business affairs of the Board of Water Power & Electric Light Commissioners, not only in the erection, but in the improvement & operation of the Dead River Water Power, and of the Electric Lights there generated, should be kept separate, the same as the affairs of the Board of Water & Fire Commissioners of this City, and that the income from the generating of Power & the transmission of the same for Mechanical use, and also, the income from the

Electric lights generated thereby, should be appropriated, First, to pay the interest upon the bonds that have been issued for the purchase of the water power property and the improvement of the same; and, Second, - as a fund for further improvement of said water power, if such improvement should be deemed necessary, and for the payment of any indebtedness incurred by the erection of the electric works upon this water power.

Therefore, it is resolved, That the City pay, out of the general fund, to the Treasurer of the Board of Water Power & Electric Light Commissioners, the sum of Forty dollars per light per year, for each arc light as shall be furnished by the said Board to the City for the purpose of street lighting. Such payments to be made in monthly instalments: viz. \$3.33 $\frac{1}{3}$ per month per lamp.

Section 2. It is further ordained that the said Board of Water Power & Electric Light Commissioners furnish to the City sixty arc lights as now located and until further ordered by the City, and that the Mayor & Recorder be directed to issue a city order monthly, payable to the Treasurer of the Board of Water Power & Electric Light Commissioners for each of the said lights, at the rate of Forty dollars per year, the said amount to be appropriated by the said Board of Water Power & Electric Light Commissioners as their duties may require, in accordance with the previous ordinances of this body.

Section 3. It is further ordained that the said Water Board & Electric Light Commissioners, file with the Recorder a quarterly statement, on or before the first days of January, April, July & October of each year, of the expenditures of the said Board and of its receipts, and sufficiently specific, to inform this body as to the condition of its finances and of its management.

Moved & carried that the midnight Electric Light Circuit be cut off on moonlight nights as suggested by the Board of Water Power & Electric Light Commissioners, be left the manager of the board.

Moved by Alderman Hennacy, seconded by Alderman Nelson & carried, that Mr. C. E. Moore be allowed Three Hundred dollars for the general fund as compensation for services rendered the Electric Light Commission.

Moved by Alderman Palmer & carried that the aforesaid amount be charged up to the Electric Light Fund.

The Street Commission's Pay roll was on motion approved.
The Street Committee to whom was referred the matter of Coasting, reported ^{to} recommended the adoption of the following ordinance, which was, on motion adopted:

An ordinance to amend an ordinance entitled an ordinance for the prevention of Coasting, Skating or Riding on dog sleighs.

It is hereby ordained by the Common Council of the City of Marquette,

1. That section 1. of an ordinance entitled an ordinance for the prevention of Coasting, Skating or Riding on dog sleighs be amended so as to read as follows:-

Section 1. That no person or persons shall hereafter indulge in the sport or pastime of Coasting, sliding on sleighs or driving on dog sleighs on the sidewalks of any of the streets of the City of Marquette, and that no person or persons hereafter shall indulge in the sport or pastime of Coasting upon any portion of First, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth & Seventh Streets, between Ridge Street ^{to Washington Street} in said city.

Section 2. That any person or persons who shall be found violating this ordinance, shall upon conviction thereof be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding five days, or both such fine ^{or} imprisonment in the discretion of the Court before which such conviction is had.

Section 3. It shall be ^{to} is hereby made the duty of every officer of the City to arrest any person violating this ordinance.

On motion of Alderman Palmer seconded by Alderman Hennasy the following preamble ^{to} resolution was passed.

It appearing from the City records that Ridge Street has been heretofore graded ^{to} Macadamized for a distance of 350 ft west of Fourth Street ^{to} regularly assessed against the abutting property ^{to} lot lots 14 & 15. of Harlowe addition No 1. ^{to} 27.1 ft of Lot 1. of Harlowe addition No 6. comes within the 350 ft. Therefore.

Resolved that the said lot 14 & 15. ^{to} 27.1 ft off from the East side of Lot 1. aforesaid be exempted from the special tax assessed thereto, and that the Mayor ^{to} Recorder be authorized to draw an order to cover the amount of the tax viz: for \$174 ¹⁴/₁₀₀ said order to be charged up to the general fund in accordance with Sec 20. page 24. of the City Charter.

Whereas, This Council has had notice from the Board of Fire & Water Commissioners that the pumping plant in use at the City Pumping Station is not equal to the increased service required of it and is in other respects in an unsatisfactory condition, therefore:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Council that the Board of Fire & Water Commissioners should at once institute measures to remodel the said pumping plant with a view to increasing its efficiency & putting it in the best possible condition for the service required of it, and also that the said Board be requested to furnish the Council with an estimate of the cost of re-modelling, and adding to the mechanical equipment of the plant in order that provision for raising the sum may be made. The Council then adjourned.

D. 1890.

On motion of Alderman Palmer seconded by Alderman Dolf the following resolution was passed:

Resolution for Extending Street from Prospect to 3rd Sts. to Sexton's Salary.

Resolved, That a line run from a point in the centre of Prospect Streets 185 feet East of the centre of Spruce Street, thence Northwesterly 2447 feet passing through the centre of Pine & Park Street; thence Westerly 371 feet to a point on Third Street 525 feet North of the North line of Moore & Samp's addition be & is hereby approved as the line fixed for the extension of the Street from to Third Street & that the City Attorney be authorized & instructed to proceed at once to procure a legal right of way for the laying of said Street.

The Committee to which was referred the matter of the Cemetery Sexton's Salary, reported & advised that the recommendation of the Park Commission be sustained. Whereupon it was moved & carried that the Sexton be allowed fifty dollars per month to be paid out of the receipts from the sale of Cemetery lots.

Extending time for Taxes.
