April 7<sup>th</sup> The annual, and adjourned Regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Marquette was held in the Council Room on Thursday the 7<sup>th</sup> day of April A.D. 1892. Mayor Langens presiding.

There was present Aldermen Agnew, Desjardins, Follis, Gullett, Johnson, Kearney, Mc Gregor, Moore, Pundick, Powell, Seiger, Stafford, and Young.

The minutes of the two last preceding meetings were read and approved.

The Mayor then addressed the Council reviewing the work of the Council and progress of the City during the past two years, which address is as follows:

Before taking up the course of regular business tonight, as this is the last time we shall meet in our official capacities, I take this opportunity to express to the members of the Council and to the various city officers my appreciation of the faithfulness and zeal with which each has discharged his duty; of the courtesy which has characterized your intercourse with me and with which you have treated each other during my term of office. Many of you have filled your present positions during the two years in which I have had the honor of occupying the Mayor's chair and to your intelligent zeal in discharging your various duties, I attribute the smoothness and freedom from friction with which the municipal machinery has run.

It is meet that we glance back over the work which has been accomplished during the past two years and note the important part the City government has acted in the two most prosperous and growing years of our City's history. A brief review of the public works shows us that since April, 1890, there have been about four and one-half miles added to the finished (graded, curbed and macadamized) streets of the city, including the rock cut on Front street which involved the removal of 17,000 yards of hard rock; 2,800 feet of the first section and all of one second section—2,400 feet—of the trunk sewer—total 5,400 feet; over 12,000 feet of street sewers and 1,300 feet of lateral sewers have been completed, while

there are now in course of construction over 5,000 feet of street sewers and 5,800 feet of laterals; new pumping plant and building for our water works; extensions of water mains amounting to 11,504 feet; the electric lighting plant has been increased by the addition of one dynamo of 1,500 incandescent lamps capacity and the necessary copper circuit. A new charter was prepared and is now in force; the ordinances of the City have been revised, new ordinances being substituted for those which had become obsolete, or inadequate, and many new and important ordinances have been put in force; the Board of Health has been revived and has been more active than ever before. All these works have required an immense amount of labor by some committees of the Council and by the boards and commissions having the matters in charge. The City has had the benefit of especially valuable services from the members of the street committee, the board of water and fire commissioners and the board of water power and electric light commissioners. These services have been furnished gratuitously by those citizens who have acted in the various capacities required by service on the different committees and boards and must often have been rendered at great personal inconvenience, if not pecuniary loss, by reason of the necessary neglect of personal business while attending to the interests of the City.

The new water works have added to the investments in property owned by the City, about \$75,000, and it is safe to say that few

if any, cities of the size of Marquette have plants of equal capacity. The cost of this plant has been remarkably low and is doubtless much less in amount than could have been obtained under any other system than the one under which we operate. Our water works, under the present management, furnish water to consumers at very reasonable rates, lower than those of most cities. At the same time the City has admirable fire protection; all expenses of the fire department, of operating the works, extending the mains, and interest on the bonds are paid, besides leaving a surplus which will be ample to retire the bonds as they fall due. All this is done without calling upon the taxpayers. Many of our neighboring cities pay taxes to the year for maintaining fire departments, rent of hydrants and other items. From this kind of taxes the Marquette taxpayer is entirely free.

The additions to the electric lighting plant have amounted to \$30,871, and the actual increase in the value of the property has been much more. This property will need careful and intelligent attention in the immediate future. The present capacity of the plant for incandescent lighting is overtaxed and the streets now require the arc lights which can be added to those already in use before reaching the limit of the machinery now in operation. The City owns one 750 incandescent light dynamo but has not the improved power to operate it. There is business now waiting for that machine and it should be put into use at the

earliest possible date. The entire water power owned by the City should be examined and surveyed by a competent engineer, or engineers; a plan for improving the full power be prepared and all future measures for development should be taken in a way which will ultimately enable the City to utilize all the power of Dead River on the City's property. A few more years of the same rapid growth which has prevailed for the past five years will require the full development of all the water power the City owns, for light. This power has been over-rated in the past and if any of it is devoted to any other purpose than furnishing light it will prove to be a mistake. At the present rate of growth, this City will require all the power it now owns, for light, within the next ten years. The establishment of this plant has demonstrated the practicability of ownership of lighting plants by municipalities and of the great economy of water power for the generation of electricity. At rates lower than those paid by any other city in the country the plant has paid expenses, including interest on the bonds, and left a small surplus.

Experience has proved that the rate first named for the arc-lights used by the City, was lower than actual cost. A proper adjustment of the rates for lighting will yield a handsome return on the City's investment and still furnish cheaper lighting than that of any other city of which I have knowledge. It will doubtless be found expedient to readjust these rates occasionally as experience may require.

The Peter White and City Public Librar-

ies have been consolidated and a permanent fund for library purposes has been provided by a separate tax which is so small as to cause no inconvenience or be a burden upon any taxpayer, while benefits to the community from the wise and thoughtful use of this fund will be incalculable. The generous gift by Hon. Peter White of a library building is fresh in our minds and this secures a very desirable and permanent home for this important educational institution.

Taxes for 1890 were a little lower than in the previous year. In 1891 the taxes were over \$16,000, higher than in either 1889 or 1890, owing mainly to a payment of \$10,000, made in 1891 to the water board to cover the deficiency arising from the failure for several years to collect all the water taxes assessed and to the new library tax of over \$3,000. We also paid over \$4,000 of old state and county taxes due from us in former years, mainly 1887. County and school taxes were also higher by about \$2,000 and \$2,500 respectively. The state tax was about \$1,500 less. It appears therefore that the higher taxes of 1891 are chiefly due to deficiencies of former years.

Our charter limits issues of bonds to five per cent of the assessed valuation of all property in the city. The limit of bonded indebtedness should not properly apply to such self-supporting enterprises as our water works and electric light plants, but should apply exclusively to such bonds as must be paid by future taxation. Our bond limit has been reached and, consequently, if we find it necessary or advisable to add to our school houses, water works, lighting plant, or to carry on other public works not provided for by special assessments, it is necessary to assess the entire cost of these improvements upon the tax roll of one year or, possibly, two years. This is unjust to the present tax-payer, as it makes him pay for necessary improvements which otherwise might, and indeed should, be spread over a series of years and the increased values which these improvements tend to produce would thus be enabled to bear their proper share of the expense.

Within proper limits it is certain that growing communities by using borrowed money for adding to, or developing, their

resources and for improvements, add much more to the assessable value of property than the amounts so expended. In many cases a reasonable tax on the new values so created would easily pay the loan at its maturity. But in many, perhaps most, cases the improvements made consist of self-supporting enterprises like our water works or electric-lighting plant and in such cases no increase of taxation results, while property is materially increased in value. Rapidly developing communities like ours are called upon to meet more or less of extraordinary expenses. It is usually advisable to build larger than the present requirements call for and it is right that the posterity for which we build should bear a part of the burden at a time when values will be greatly increased and the burden lighter. Our assessed valuation is now over \$3,000,000; the real estate, buildings and productive machinery owned by the city are worth not less than \$400,000; our bonded debt is \$210,000. Of this amount only \$40,000 is a school loan, which will be paid in the future by the taxpayers. The remaining \$170,000 is invested in our self-supporting water works and lighting plant. Should the next assessment not show a sufficient increase in valuation for the purpose of fully developing the water power owned by the city should be authorized by the next legislature. The careful expenditure of the money in such improvements would add much more than the amount expended to the value of the property owned by the city and with careful management no taxpayer would ever be called upon to pay any part of the bonds, while all property in the city would also receive an increase in value much greater in the aggregate than the amount of the increased bonded debt. Our water works and electric lighting plants could readily be sold with the necessary accompanying franchises, with rates limited to the lowest figures known in the United States, for much more than they have cost. Thus we see the city has live assets for the money expended in these improvements. A city can make no better investments than those made by Marquette in its water works and electric lighting plants.

In this connection I suggest that the idea of improving Presque Isle park, by means

of money raised on bonds if necessary, is entitled to careful consideration by the taxpayers of our city.

Our system of water works and electric lighting has advertised Marquette over the entire continent and letters to the mayor, inquiring for details of our systems, have been received from almost every state, showing that the enlightened and progressive policy pursued by the city has attracted the attention of observant people to an extent which could not have been realized by the expenditure of a large amount of money in direct advertising. That this wide-spread reputation for enterprise and progressive municipal management is of great value to us as a city is self-evident. This advertisement comes to us as a requisite, an additional value to investments for which we had previously received full value.

A glance at the books of the city treasurer shows that the city's indebtedness in April, 1890, amounted to \$28,568.64. This consisted of loans; special deposits; due to school and water boards and old state and county taxes. On March 23, 1892, the indebtedness of the city amounted to \$31,774.64, consisting of amounts due on loans; outstanding orders and due to the school, water and library boards. Deducting the amount due to the library board (\$3,215.13) which is a new fund—the indebtedness was a few dollars less than in April, 1890. This shows that we have closely followed the policy of "pay as you go" in all items of current expenses.

Several thousand dollars have been advanced by the city on contracts not yet completed, which will be returned to the treasury when the special assessments for these improvements are made.

A map on large scale, embracing all the territory included in the city limits, prepared from official records, is becoming more and more necessary. It would be of great service in preparing assessment rolls and in many other ways. The expense need not be great and a lithographic print of the map would no doubt find purchasers enough to nearly or quite defray the cost of its preparation.

Again I thank you for your many courtesies to me and we will now resume the regular order of business.

*Petition of The Marquette Club asking permission to place an addition to their house on French Street was on motion granted, it being shown that the Fire Wardens and Insurance Agent recommended the granting of the same.*

*Petition of August Mackto for permission to erect a two story frame dwelling on his lot, Corner French and Fisher streets, was on motion granted.*

*Petition of John Balke and Stephen Garabek asking the Council to drain, ditch and side-walk on West Fisher St was referred to the Street Committee.*

*Petition of William Hogen for position of High Police, was referred to the Marshall.*

*Petition of Paul Christianson asking the Council to refund \$65 <sup>by approval of them</sup> with interest, since since November 15<sup>th</sup> 1888 on account of alleged illegal tax, was read.*

*Moved by Alderman Desjardins that the petition be referred to the City Attorney.*

*Alderman Cendill moved as a substitute that it be laid on the table which was carried by the following vote: Aye Aldermen Desjardins, Gullett, Johnson, Kearney, Cendill, Powell, Stafford and Young. Nay, Aldermen Agnew, Tullis, Hennsey, McEugor, Moor and Siegel.*

*The Annual Report of the Board of Trustees of the Peter White Public Library was presented.*

*Alderman Hennsey moved that it be referred to a <sup>Special</sup> Committee.*

The Mayor thereupon appointed as such Committee aldermen Powell, Follis and Young.

The Special Assessment Roll for the extension and construction of a Sewer from the center of Prospect Street northwesterly to Third Street, to wit, for Western Sub-district of Sewer, was submitted to the Council and approved and the Recorder was instructed to give notice as required by the Charter that the Council would meet on the 20<sup>th</sup> day of April A.D. 1892, at 8.0. Clock P.M. to consider the final confirmation of said Roll.

The time for collection of the Special Assessment Roll for Sewer in Front Street from the center of Hewitt Avenue to south line of Ohio Street, and also the time for collection of the special assessment roll for Sewer on Front Street from Superior Street to Oak was extended to the 2<sup>nd</sup> day of May A.D. 1892.

The Special Committee appointed to confer with the Board of Water Power and Electric Light Commissioners relative to raising the price of lights, submitted a report recommending the raising of the <sup>City</sup> Arc Lights to \$5. per month and Commercial Arc Lights \$7.<sup>50</sup> per month each, which report was on motion accepted and placed on file.

Alderman Pendick moved <sup>which was seconded</sup> that the Water Power and Electric Lighting Board be instructed to raise the price of arc lights to the price recommended in the report of the committee.

Alderman Desjardins moved, which was seconded, that the matter be indefinitely postponed, The Mayor ruled the motion out of order.

Alderman Moore moved as a substitute, that it be laid on the table <sup>at</sup> the regular meeting. Ayes Alderman Agnew Desjardins Follis Gillett Kearney Moore and Sigel. Nays Alderman Hennessy Johnson Mc Gregor Pendick Powell Stafford and Young. There being a tie, the Mayor cast the deciding vote in the negative.

The original motion was then voted on, as follows: Ayes, Alderman Hennessy, Johnson Mc Gregor Pendick Powell Stafford & Young. Nays, Alderman Agnew Desjardins Follis Gillett Kearney Moore and Sigel. There being a tie, the Mayor cast the deciding vote in the affirmative.

The City Attorney reported the receipt of two quit Claim Deeds, one from Samuel P. Ely, Prescott Ely Philip V.R. Ely and Arthur C. Ely and the other from Lilly H. Ellis and Mabel Grace Ely, conveying one fourth interest in the land taken for

the Extension of Crescent Street to Lake Superior and recommended the payment of \$5<sup>00</sup> to the grantee to cover the expenses of execution of Deeds.

On motion of Alderman Powell the Mayor and Recorder were authorized to issue an order of \$5<sup>00</sup> to pay for the execution of said deeds and the exchange.

Ayes Aldermen Agnew, Desjardins, Follis, Giltitt, Hennessy, Johnson, Kearney, Mc Gregor, Moore, Pundill, Powell, Sigel, Stafford and Young. Nays none.

The City Attorney reported a proposition made by complainants for a discontinuance of the suit brought by Joseph A. Desjardins et al to restrain collection of Special Assessment.

On motion of Alderman Pundill the City Attorney was instructed to enter into a stipulation with said complainants for the discontinuance of said cause without costs upon the re-assessment of the costs and expenses of the improvement being made, provided said complainants stipulate to abide by such re-assessment.

The February report of the Water Power and Electric Lighting Board was referred to the Finance Committee.

On motion of Alderman Hennessy it was

Resolved, that the thanks of this Council are due and are hereby tendered to Mr. J. M. Longyear, retiring Mayor, for his uniform, impartial and courteous treatment of the members of this Council during his two terms of office, and for his interest in and fidelity to the best interests of Marquette.

On motion of Alderman Desjardins a vote of thanks was tendered President Hennessy for the able and impartial manner in which he had presided over the Council meetings in the absence of the Mayor.

The list of bills and accounts was then read by the Recorder when it was moved by Alderman Moore that the bill of Charles E. Deane of \$6<sup>00</sup> for 8 meals furnished the judges of Election and officers of Election of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Ward be not allowed.

Alderman Desjardins, moved as a substitute, that said bill be allowed which was lost by the following vote:

A special meeting of the Common Council of the City of Marquette was held in the Council's rooms on Wednesday the 13<sup>th</sup> day of April A. D. 1892. Mayor Adams presiding.

The now present aldermen Agnew Desjardins Follis Gillett Hennessy Johnmason Kearney McEugor, Powell Siegel Stafford Gravitt and Young. Alderman Moore appeared later and took his seat.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The Recorder read the call for a special meeting of the Common Council at this time, signed by the Mayor and duly filed with him on the 11<sup>th</sup> day of April 1892, also affidavit of service of notice of said meeting upon each and all of the members of the Council upon on April 11<sup>th</sup> 1892. which papers were placed on file.

Communication William Burk was presented, asking the Council to re-advertise for bids to grade curb and macadamize Jackson Street from the East line of Altemoreh Street to the

West line of Albion Street.

The Recorder was on motion instructed to re-advise for <sup>for</sup> aforesaid works.

The Mayor submitted an opinion from the City Attorney relative to the legal status of the Board of Water Power and Electric Light Commissioners.

Said report was, on motion of Alderman Powell referred to the Water Power and Electric Light Committee.

The vote by which the special assessment roll for the extension and construction of a Trunk Sewer from the centre of Prospect Street northwesterly to Third Street was approved was re-considered whereupon Alderman Tollis offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

Your Committee would recommend the adoption of a new ordinance providing for the running and controlling of the Electric Light Plant by a board to be appointed by the Council at its next first Regular meeting in May in each year. The same to consist of four aldermen and the Mayor, the Mayor to be chairman, and that the terms of the aldermen should be such that not more than three shall expire in the same year.
