A Regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Marquette was held in the Council room on Monday the 4<sup>th</sup> day of December A. D. 1893. Mayor Kaufman presiding.

There were present Aldermen Brown Gillett Nemusey Hock Jamerson Moore Putnam Rygaard and Zerbe. Aldermen Homeier and Mullally appeared later and took their seats.

The reading of the minutes was dispensed with. Petition from Sisters of St Francis, again asking that St Mary's Hospital be allowed the free use of water was presented, stating said Hospital is to a great extent a charitable institution, and that since Oct 4<sup>th</sup> 1890, up to the present day they have taken care of ninety seven patients for charity and the time they stayed amounted to Two thousand and seven hundred and sixty three days, and defrayed expenses for burial of eight corpses and furnished for outside poor dressings and medicines very many times, all for the benefit of the City and County.

On motion of Alderman Hock said petition was granted.

The Finance Committee to which was referred the City Treasurer's Quarterly Report, reported by its Chairman, and recommended its adoption.

Said report was, on motion approved and accepted and ordered placed on file, which is as follows: -

An adjourned Regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Marquette was held in the Council rooms on Monday the 18<sup>th</sup> day of December A. D. 1893, at 8.0. clock P. M. Mayor Kaufman presiding.

There were present Aldermen Brown Gillett Hennessy, Koch, Homeier, Hallstrom, Moore Pearl Putnam Rygaard Vandenberg and Zerbe.

Alderman Mellally appeared later and took his seat.

The minutes of the last two preceding meetings were read and approved.

The Controller presented the Street Commissioner's Report, which was on motion accepted.

The Controller presented two bids for construction of the City Hall.

Said bids were then read, which are as follows:-  
From Emil Bruce, Minneapolis, Fifty Two Thousand and Four Hundred and Thirty Seven Dollars (\$52,437.00)  
If steel is used on roof, deduct Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00)

From Chaussee Bros, Sagamu, Fifty Four Thousand Dollars, (\$54,000.00). Deduct Thirteen Hundred Dollars, (\$1,300.00) for steel Spanish tile for roof.

Motion was made by Alderman Hennessy and supported that both bids be rejected, as they exceeded the appropriation and that the controller be instructed to re-advertise for bids.

Alderman Pearl offered the following resolution as a substitute:

Resolved That the Mayor appoint a committee of two, with himself as chairman, to confer with the architects and Mr. Bruce to see if certain modifications cannot be made by which the contractors might bring his bid within the \$50,000 limit.

Said substitute was carried by the following vote, Ayes Aldermen Brown Gillett Koch Homeier Hallstrom Mellally Pearl Putnam Rygaard and Zerbe.

Nays, Aldermen Hennessy, Moore and Vandenberg.

The Mayor thereupon appointed Alderman Pearl and <sup>Gillett</sup> as such committee and the Council took a short recess.

After the recess the Council was called to order and the committee reported and recommended the acceptance

The following resolution was then on motion adopted:

Resolved, That the bid for the construction of the City Hall with steel roof made by Emil Bruce, said bid being for the sum of \$50,937. be accepted, provided, that the said Emil Bruce within ten days enter into a contract with the city of Marquette satisfactory to the Common Council, and furnish two bonds with two or more sureties also satisfactory to the Common Council, one in the penal sum of \$25,000 running to the people in the State of Michigan and conditioned for the payment of all claims for labor done and materials furnished in the construction of said City Hall, and one in the penal sum of \$20,000 running to the city of Marquette and conditioned for the faithful performance of the contract aforesaid.

The following resolutions were also adopted.

Resolved; That the form of the "City Hall" bonds printed by the Marquette Mining Journal company (limited) is hereby revoked and that the form of "City Hall" bond printed by the Wm. Johnston Printing company of Chicago, Ill. is hereby substituted in lieu thereof, and

Resolved, That the controller be and he is hereby authorized and instructed to destroy all "City Hall" bonds printed by the said Marquette Mining Journal company (limited) and numbered from 1. to 100, and to issue in lieu thereof City Hall bonds numbered 1. to 100, printed by said Wm Johnston Printing company of Chicago Ill., and

Resolved, That the Mayor, Recorder and Controller be and they are hereby authorized and instructed to take up, cancel and destroy all "City Hall" bonds printed by said Mining Journal Company (limited) heretofore sold and executed and to issue in their stead bonds of like numbers of the form printed by the Wm Johnston Printing company of Chicago, Ill., being the form of bonds hereby adopted.

Moved by Alderman Peart, supported and carried that a committee of three, including the Mayor as chairman be appointed to confer with the architects and Mr Bruce in regard to any modifications in the plans to bring the amount within the Fifty thousand dollar (\$50,000) limit, and that the committee have authority to assist the City

An adjourned Regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Marquette was held in the Council room on Monday the 26<sup>th</sup> day of December A.D. 1893, Mayor Kaufman presiding.

There were present Aldermen Brown Gillew Hook Homeier Hallstrom Jameson Moore Pearl Putnam Rygaard Schock Vandenberg and Zerbib.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

On motion the regular order of business was despatched with.

The committee appointed to confer with the architects and Mr. Emil Bruce in regard to making changes that would bring the bid within \$50,000, for constructing the City Hall reported that slight modifications in the specifications had been agreed upon with the contractor, which, if made, would reduce the cost of building the City Hall nine hundred and fifty four dollars (\$954) which changes were as follows:

Proposed modifications in City Hall.

1<sup>st</sup>. all round bars in guards and Jail were to be changed from  $7/8$  inch to  $3/4$  inch. all Girts changed from  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inches to  $2$  inches.

2<sup>nd</sup>. First Footings under all inside walls except the two main walls from front to rear (to be omitted)

3<sup>rd</sup>. Art Glass in Council Chambers (omitted) and Plate Glass substituted therefor.

4<sup>th</sup>. Concrete in Jail and annex changed from 14 inches to 8 inches in Marshals office and patrolman's Room - from 8 inches to 3 inches, balance to 4 inches.

5<sup>th</sup>. Trimmings of Hardware on inside doors to be same as Marquette County Savings Bank Building in the City of Marquette.

6. all  $2\frac{1}{4}$  inch Pine doors to be changed to  $1\frac{3}{4}$  inches, and the committee recommended the adoption by the Council of said modifications.

Moved by Alderman Pearl supported and carried, that the plans and specifications for the new City Hall be so modified as recommended by the committee.

On motion of Alderman Pearl, the following Resolution was adopted,

Resolved, That the Mayor and Controller be and they

are hereby instructed to enter into a contract with Emil Bruce for the construction of the City Hall for the sum of \$49,983.00 in accordance with the plans and specifications as modified. Said contract to be ratified by the Common Council before it shall go into effect.

On motion of Alderman Moore the Street Commissioners was instructed to notify the Duluth South Shore and Atlantic Railway Company to remove the snow from all of the streets where it has been scraped on to the streets at Railroad Crossings.

On motion of Alderman Brown the Mayor appointed a committee of three consisting of Aldermen Brown, Moore and Gillitt, to confer with the Marquette City and Mesque Island Railway Company to ascertain if said company intend running their cars during the winter, and if so, to <sup>make some arrangements to keep the streets clear of snow</sup> see what they intend doing in regard to preventing the streets from being blockaded with snow.

An adjourned Regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Marquette was held in the Council Room on Saturday the 6<sup>th</sup> day of January a. d. 1894. Mayor Kaufman presiding.

There were present Aldermen Brown Gillett Hennessy Koch Jamerson Mullally Reid Putnam Rygaard Vandenberg and Williams. Aldermen Hallstrom Moor Schock and Zebbel appeared later and took their seats.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Petition of Mary Farley for exemption from taxation referred to Finance Committee.

Resignation of Francis M. Moor, Supervisor of the Fourth Ward presented, and on motion accepted.

The Chairman of the Special appointed in reference to keeping streets cleared of snow traversed by Street Railway reported verbally and stated that the president had agreed to clear one half of Front Street from Washington Street to top of hill, and to keep 14 feet on one side of the track cleared around the loop and out to the fair ground and one third on Front Street from Washington Street to Superior Street.

Mr. F. O. Clark president of the Street Railway Company was permitted to address the meeting at length and concluded by saying he found the Company would be willing to remove one half the snow on Front Street from Washington Street to top of the hill, and one half on Spruce Street and to keep one half of the road opened around the loop and out to the fair ground sufficient for traffic providing the City attend to the other half, and keep the snow cleared on Front Street from Washington Street to Superior Street.

Moved by Alderman Brown supported and carried that the proposition of the Marquette City and Presque Isle Railway Company be and is hereby accepted.

The Controller presented three Bonds from Emil Bruce to the City for construction of the City Hall, one to the City of Marquette for Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000); Sureties, William E. Hyde, Jos. B. Stanley, Claus O. Peterson, and Aaron Carlson.

One to the People of the State of Michigan for Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000); Sureties William E. Hyde, Jos. B. Stanley, Claus O. Peterson and Aaron Carlson, and another to the City of Marquette for Two Thousand Five hundred Dollars (\$2,500) secured by Cash Deposit in Wilkinson's Bank and



signed by Ferdinand Binding.

# The Recorder read a communication from the Mayor appointing Aldermen Putnam, Rygaard and Schock as a Building Committee to have equal power with architects and Contractors in the erection of the proposed City Hall, according to said resolution relating thereto.

The following resolution was on motion of Alderman Williams unanimously adopted.

Resolved. "The said Emil Bruce shall and will in the construction of said City Hall purchase and use only stone quarried within the limits of the City of Marquette, so far as he is able to purchase the said stone for the same price that it can be purchased outside and laid down in the City of Marquette."

During discussion of the matter President Peard called alderman Provon to take the chair, and gave notice to the Council that at its next meeting he would move a resolution to reconsider the action of the Council in appointing Loveloy and Demar to superintend the building of the new City Hall, and addressed the meeting in regard to the said resolution.

The president then stated that the first order of business under the call for the special meeting was the reconsideration of the action of the Council in relation to the appointment of a building <sup>committee</sup> for the new city hall taken at the Council meeting held January 16<sup>th</sup> 1894, and taking such action in relation to said building committee as the Council may deem best.

Moved by alderman Brown and supported that as the first order of business the Council proceed to the question of the re-consideration of the action of the Council taken at its last meeting relative to the appointment of a Superintendent to superintend the construction of the new City Hall.

Alderman Hennessy moved as an amendment, which was supported, that the Council proceed to the consideration of the question of re-considering the action of the Council at its last meeting relative to the appointment of a building committee.

We have also examined and compared the reports of the City Treasurer and Controller for the balance of the year and we find that the same agree.

We find that the Common Council orders numbered 660, 661, 663 and 665 amounting to \$147<sup>00</sup> are outstanding and unpaid and this amount should be deducted from the cash balance shown in the City Treasurer's report to make the same agree with the Controller's report. Each of these orders were issued on account of Water Power and Electric Fund.

We have also examined the report of the Board of Fire and Water Commissioners and find that the same agree with the Controller's books. As this report covers a different period of time from that covered by the Controller's report, the balances do not agree, but the balance in the fire and water fund at this date

as shown by the books of Secretary John P. Kearn, agrees with the balance as shown in the Controller's report.

He has also examined the report of the Board of Trustees of the Peter White Public Library and find the same to be correct.

He has also examined the report of the Recorder and find that the summary agrees with the total mentioned in the City Treasurer's Statement.

He therefore recommends that the several accounts as set forth in the various statements be declared correct and finally audited by the Common Council.

Resolved, that each physician vaccinating people at the public charge be instructed to keep the name and street address of each one vaccinated by him and present the same together with his bill for payment.

A Regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Marquette was held in the Council room on Monday, the 7<sup>th</sup> day of May A.D. 1894, President Pearl presiding.

Those were present Aldermen Brown, Hank, Hallstrom, Holly, Jamerson, Moore, Mullanly, Pearl, Rositer, Schab, Sherman, Tobin and Vandenberg.

The minutes of the last six preceding meetings were read and as amended approved.

Petition of Johnson and McCarthy for an appropriation to assist them in the publication of their new map was read.

Moved by alderman Hennessy and supported that the City appropriate \$500. for 110 of said maps.

Alderman Brown moved and amended which was supported and carried that the City order of Johnson & McCarthy a number of maps, sufficient to make up that amount in maps.

Petition of Clovis J. Durab for compensation for injuries from falling on slippery sidewalk in March, referred to committee on Police, grievances and litigation.

Petition from Marquette Opera House Building Company asking to be relieved from paying the hundred dollar license, stating that instead of a profit an actual loss is entailed, etc, was referred to the Committee on Finance and taxation.

Petition of D. W. Watt and four others for a sidewalk on the east and west side of Adams street between Jackson and Genesee streets, granted and the street commissioners instructed to proceed with the work.

The following resolutions were then adopted:-

Resolved, That the owners and occupants of the lots and parcels of lands abutting on the east and west side of Adams street between Jackson and Genesee streets be and they are hereby directed to construct a sidewalk in accordance with the ordinances of the City of Marquette relative thereto in front of their respective lots and parcels of land on the aforesaid street within ten days from the receipt of notice to construct said sidewalk, and

Resolved, That the street commissioners be and he is hereby authorized to serve notice of the resolution upon the above named owners and occupants, and

Resolved, That the street Commissioners be and he is hereby directed in the event the said owners or occupants do not cause the sidewalk aforesaid to be constructed within the said time, to forthwith <sup>construct</sup> the said sidewalk, and to assess the cost and expense of

the said sidewalks upon the lots and parcels of land in front of which it is constructed according to the benefits thereby accruing to the said property.

Petition of James O. Reily and thirteen others for sidewalks on west side of Champion street from south side of Fisher street to north side of Genesee street, granted.

The following resolutions, were then on motion adopted:

Resolved, That the owners and occupants of the lots and parcels of land abutting on the west side of Champion street from the south side of Fisher street to the north side of Genesee street be and they are hereby directed to construct a sidewalk in accordance with the ordinances of the City of Marquette relative thereto in front of their respective lots and parcels of land on the aforesaid street within ten days from the receipt of notice to construct said sidewalks, and

Resolved, That the street commissioner be and he is hereby authorized to serve notice of this resolution upon the above named owners and occupants, and

Resolved, That the street commissioner be and he is hereby directed in the event the said owners or occupants do not cause the sidewalks aforesaid to be constructed within the said time to forthwith construct the sidewalk and to assess the cost and expense of the said sidewalks upon the lots and parcels of land in front of which it is constructed according to the benefits thereby accruing to the said property.

Petition of J. H. Ahlson and sixty six others, asking that no license be granted for the saloon at corner of Third and Prospect streets ruled out of order, the license being already being granted, and the Council having no jurisdiction in the matter.

Petition of A. J. A. Hallen and forty three others to have electric light placed on corner of Fourth street and Hewitt Avenue referred to the electric light and power committee by the following vote:--

Aldermen Hoch Homeier Hallstrom Holly Moore Peard Schoch Sherman Tobin and Vandenberg.

Chap, Aldermen Brown Hennessy Jannerson Mullally and Rosetter.

Application of William Frazer for position of Street Commissioner, tabled.

The petition of Emil Preece, by S. M. Marquist, agent, stating that in consequence of his bondsmen being nonresidents he was required to give an additional bond in the sum of twenty five hundred dollars with local sureties until he should get the construction of the city hall well under way, and being a stranger

here he had to deposit the said amount in a bank here as collateral to secure a bondsman, and as the City hall is now well under construction and he needs the money to aid in the work, he asked to be released from said additional bonds.

Alderman Hennessy moved that the petition be granted and the money refunded, which was supported and carried by the following vote:—

Ayes, Aldermen Brown Hennessy Hook Homeris Kallstrom Mellally Rositer Schock and vanderberg.

Nays, Aldermen Holley Jameson Moore Pearl Sherman and Tobin.

The bond of City Treasurer August Muckte, sureties James M. Wilkinson <sup>Bank of Montreal</sup> Mirza K. Manhand and C. H. Call, was on motion accepted.

The Liquor Bonds of Andrew Trudeau, sureties, Charles Meeks and Ferdinand Bending, and of John K. Seebit, sureties, Peter Rasmussen and William Fasshender, were on motion accepted.

On motion of Alderman Hook Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) were ordered to be transferred from the General Fund to the Highway Fund.

The Street Committee to which was referred the resolution to have Bleuff street improved from Fifth street to 100 feet west of Park Avenue, reported favorably.

Moved by Alderman Hennessy supported and carried that the report be adopted and that the Street Commissioners be instructed to proceed with the work.

The Street Committee to which was referred the petition of M. E. Asin and twenty others asking that Progress Lane Avenue be graded and macadamized from where the grade stops, going south, to Hawley street in South Marysville addition, reported favorably and on motion said report was adopted.

The following resolutions were on motion adopted:—

Resolved, That special assessment roll No. 4, covering the cost of construction of a sewer in High street from the Manhole in Hewitt Avenue to a point forty feet north of the south line of Ohio street, be and the same is hereby approved by the Common Council, and

Resolved, That the Recorder be and is hereby directed to give notice by publication in the Daily Morning Journal for a period of twelve (12) days, that the Common Council will meet at 8 o'clock on the evening of Monday, the 4<sup>th</sup> day of June A. D., 1894, in the Common Council room of the City of Marysville to consider the final confirmation of said assessment roll,
