REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND TAXATION.

The Committee on finance and taxation reported as follows:
To the Honorable, the Common Council:

Gentlemen:- your Committee on finance and taxation, has, as has been customary at this time of the year, audited the accounts of the City Treasurer, Controller and recorder, for the fiscal year, ending the 15th, inst, and find them to be correct.

We have examined the reports of the trustees of the Peter White Public Library, the Fire and Water Commissioners, the Park and Cemetery Commission and the Light and Power Commission, and find that their accounts agree with the corresponding accounts of the City Controller.

The joint committee composed of the committees on streets and sewers and railways and public conveyances reported that they had considered the changes proposed to be made by the Marquette and Southeastern Railway Company in the grade of Lake street and in the dock approaches crossing said street and that the chairman of the street committee had received from the chief engineer of said railway company a letter, profiles and sketches relating to said changes. Said joint committee recommended that the proposed changes be authorized and submitted said letter and papers, which were ordered placed on file, and said letter was ordered to be spread at length upon the minutes. Said letter is as follows:

Dear Sir:- We submit herewith the profiles of Lake street showing the present grade of the street from the A. S. S. & A. crossover track to Walnut street and the proposed grade of the Marquette & Southeastern railway's main track now being constructed through Lake street. Also sketch showing the present location of dock No. 4 and the proposed arrangement of said dock approach to permit the Marquette and Southeastern track to be built underneath it; a sketch

showing the present and proposed arrangement at dock No. 1 and a sketch showing the present and proposed arrangement at the approach to dock No. 1.

Referring to the profile, you will note that the grade of the Marquette and Southeastern track and the D. S. S. & A. track at the crossover, above referred to are the same. Both tracks will be lowered, about eight feet underneath the curved approach and dock No. 1 to permit a clear height of 18 1/2 feet to be obtained between the bottom of the stringers in the dock approaches and the top of the rails of the tracks underneath. The grade line gradually rising as it approaches Superior street, at which point the top of rail of tracks will be the same height as the present street grade; that is, the conditions at the crossing of Superior street with the tracks will be the same as it is at present.

From Superior street to Main street we propose to have the top of rail of the tracks at the same height as the present street grade.

From Main street to Washington street there will be no change in the street grade.

From a point about 300 feet north of Washington street we propose to raise the present grade of the street one foot to a point near the Grace Furnace, where we propose to lower the grade of the street 2 1/2 feet.

From the Grace Furnace to Walnut street the grade of the railway tracks will be four feet above the present height of Lake street, it being understood in all cases north of Washington street where we propose to raise or lower the present grade of Lake street the entire width of the street will be raised or lowered to conform to the same height as the grade of the tracks.

Between Superior street and the D. S. S. & A. track scales in Lake street instead of lowering the street to the same height as the rails of the tracks which will be about eight feet below the present height of the street, we propose to build a stone wall across of and parallel with the Marquette and Southeastern track on top of which we propose to build a fence four feet high and leave that portion of the roadway of the street which will be left after the park occupied by the Marquette and Southeastern, at the same height as it is at present. This is fully explained by a sketch which is herewith presented.

At dock No. 4 the D. S. S. A track is now located at the extreme, easterly side of the street, the Marquette and Southeastern track will be built thirteen feet west of and parallel with it and we propose to rearrange the beets now located in the street in such a manner, as will leave a roadway seventeen feet in the clear, between the beets as shown on the sketches above referred to.

At dock No. 1 we propose to rearrange the beets in such a manner, as will leave a clear roadway of sixteen feet, the same as it is at present.

At the curved approach to dock No. 1 there was originally a roadway nineteen feet in width in the clear, but owing to the fact that the said approach is on a sharp curve and makes a skew crossing with the street, it is necessary to contract this width to sixteen feet in the clear, which we propose to do.

The arrangements at each of these docks and the proposed changes are clearly shown on the sketches herewith presented. In all cases we have endeavored to leave the greatest width of street possible under the circumstances, and trust that the work will be acceptable and approved by the Council as it has already been by your Committee.

Provided, That a stone retaining wall, one foot above grade of street roadway, with six-inch coping and close iron fence at least four feet high thereon, be constructed along the

west side of railway where the same shall be constructed below street grade south of Superior street

Resolved, That the consent of the City of Marquette be and the same is hereby given to make the necessary changes in said three approaches; and be it further

Resolved, That the rights of the Duluth, South Shore and Atlantic Railway Company to maintain and use the said three approaches shall not by the said changes be in any manner lessened or impaired, but on the contrary the City of Marquette hereby recognizes and confirms all the rights of maintenance and use thereof heretofore granted to said railway company.

An ordinance amending an ordinance providing the manner of voting upon any question of borrowing money and the holding of elections thereon, by adding two new sections thereto to stand as sections eight and nine.

The City of Marquette Ordains:

Sec. 1. That an ordinance entitled "An ordinance providing the manner of voting upon any question of borrowing money and the holding of elections thereon," adopted July 6, 1897, be and the same is hereby amended by the addition thereto of two sections to stand as sections eight and nine, said new sections to read as follows:

Sec. 8. Whenever any question of authorizing the raising of money by loan upon bonds has been ordered to be submitted to the qualified electors of the City at any special election to be held at the City hall or any place other than in the several wards of the City, such election shall be conducted and the votes be counted, certified and returned in the same manner, as near as may be as in elections for City officers, but no canvass of the votes other than that made by the inspectors of such election shall be required.

Sec. 9. In any such special election mentioned in section eight of this ordinance, the registration of electors provided for in section one of this ordinance shall be dispensed with, but the several ward registration books shall be delivered to the inspectors of such election, who shall during such election enter on permit to be entered in the proper ward registration books the names of such electors of the City as shall appear and make oath to their qualifications as such electors.

An ordinance providing for the borrowing of money for municipal improvements and the issue of bonds therefor.
The City of Marquette Ordains:

Sec. 1. That subject to the approval of the electors of the city, and for the purpose of raising money with which to make the following municipal improvements, viz., to obtain, open and improve new streets, parks and public grounds, and to widen and improve streets and roadways and construct bridges, culverts and sewers in the city; the sum of twenty thousand dollars be borrowed by the city for such time and at such rate of interest as may be hereafter determined, and that bonds be issued therefor pledging the faith and credit of the City of Marquette for the payment of the principal and interest of such bonds.

Sec. 2. The question of raising such loan shall be submitted to the qualified electors of said city for their approval at a special election hereby appointed and called for that purpose to be held at the City Hall in said city on Monday, the 29th day of April, 1901, from 7 o'clock a.m. until 5 o'clock p.m., which election shall be conducted by such inspectors and officers as shall be hereafter appointed by the Council.

Sec. 3. Said question shall be printed upon the ballots and be submitted to the electors in the following form, to-wit:

"Shall the Common Council be authorized to borrow, twenty thousand dollars and to issue bonds therefor for the purpose of raising money for municipal improvements." } Yes

The recorder, election commissioners and the inspectors and other officers of election shall be governed in all things pertaining to said election by the provisions of an ordinance entitled, "An ordinance providing the manner of voting upon any question of borrowing money and the holding of elections thereon," as amended on April 4, 1901.

MAYOR MANGUM'S INAUGURAL ADDRESS.

"Gentlemen of the Council:

"We are entering on a year of municipal government which opens with encouraging promise of proving one of unexampled advancement for our city, both in industrial development and trade activity. I deem it a high privilege and honor to have been called to serve as the executive head of the municipal government at such a time, and I hope, with your loyal co-operation and aid, to succeed in giving the city an administration which will help along the good work, already well begun and under way, to make it an important manufacturing and commercial center.

"Our city has within easy reach vast supplies of the raw materials for iron and wood working manufacturing plants, and the wonder is that we have not before secured and had in active operation here many industries in which these materials would be worked up into finished forms for the market. But whatever of lassitude there has been in the past there is none here at present, and under the able direction of our citizens' committee, loyally and generously sustained by our business men, much has been done within the past three years to utilize our natural advantages and give Marquette the rank to which its position and environments entitle it as a manufacturing town.

"We have about us and easily accessible practically unlimited supplies of iron ore and of hardwood timber suitable for furnace use, as also a vast quantity of choice hardwoods which can be worked up into valuable forms for the market. We are well located for the purpose of distributing manufactured products to a constantly growing market. The conditions for creating here an immense manufacturing interest could not well be better, and at last the right use is to be made of our opportunities.

"An iron furnace industry is about to be established here by the Cleveland-Cliffs iron company as an initial step in an undertaking which has as its ultimate aim creating in Marquette a great iron and steel manufacturing interest, and in connection with that enterprise the company is now constructing a line of railroad which will join the L. S. & I. and Munising roads and open up and make accessible from here a splendid hardwood and farming country which has not hitherto been available for our uses. The building of this piece of road, together with the projected line up the shore to tap another great hardwood region, opens up almost unlimited possibilities to us in the way of hardwood manufacturing, not to speak of the advantage it will give for charcoal iron making here and also in making available for settlers a fine area of farming lands.

"I take this occasion to acknowledge the hearty support and aid given those who have been seeking to advance the welfare of the city by individual citizens. The time, personal influence and means of Mr. Peter White have been at command of the committee at all times, and have contributed much to the accomplishment of what has been done, and to make certain the achievement of what is yet to be done. Others have aided as they might. I would say, also, that I have already been much assisted in the effort to locate a tannery here by Mr. Fitch, general manager of the South Shore road, who has offered ground for the concern on very reasonable terms, as well as other concessions of great value, and who has further assured me that in all I may undertake, as mayor, to promote the industrial development of the city, I can count on his aid and that of his road.

"I think I may be pardoned for alluding to the splendid generosity of Mrs. Mary H. Longyear in giving to the city the valuable property on Front street as a site for our new public library building, and of the munificent gifts in money of other public spirited citizens of Marquette, who have undertaken to make the building fund for the institution adequate for the purpose of giving us a structure worthy to house the library.

"We begin this year of municipal government with our people hopeful of the future, united as they have never before been, with harmony prevailing in the council and all the departments of the city government. Let us so conduct ourselves in this chamber that the end of the year will see the fair promise of its opening well along toward fulfillment, with mayor and council working in perfect accord for the common good, and with Marquette advanced by a long stride toward the accomplishment of its destiny.

"It was not my intention to make any appointments that would be distasteful to the members of the council, and with that object I called the council together in private session Saturday evening last and submitted to the aldermen for their consideration the applications of all persons seeking the appointments for the most important offices, and the council made the selections.

"You will notice that I have not appointed and submitted to this council for confirmation a street commissioner. The matter is now under advisement. The appointment of a street commissioner will, in all probability, be made at the next meeting of the council.

"A precedent has been established by my predecessor, which I deem a very wise one, in leaving the matter of the selection of a janitor of the city hall, poundmasters, dump ground help and policemen to the respective committees having their work in charge, namely: the committees on public buildings, pounds, public health, police and public order.

"In view of the fact that a great number of strangers are expected to be here in the city this year, on account of the building of railroads, erecting of furnaces and other industries that will likely be located here, I would most respectfully recommend to the council that the police force be increased.

"I further recommend to the police committee that a suitable uniform be agreed upon, including a helmet, and that all officers in the performance of their duties shall be attired in uniform, and that no member of the police force shall, when on duty or in uniform, drink any kind of brewed or intoxicating liquor or enter any place in which intoxicating drinks may be sold, except in the immediate performance of his duty.

"I would recommend to the street committee to take into consideration the paving of Front street from Superior to Ridge streets and Washington street from Front to Fourth streets, with suitable material, such as brick, or creosoted wood block.

"I would further recommend to the street committee that they purchase street signs and have them placed on the respective streets in the city at as early a date as possible.

"I understand that our city has no maps of our water and sewer system and I would recommend that suitable maps, charts and drawings should be made by some competent engineer for the use of the common council."

IN REGARD TO
LAKE STREET

To the Common Council of the City of Marquette.

Gentlemen: Private parties having purchased from the government a strip of land off the west side of the government lighthouse reserve, we shall be able to arrange for the construction of our line to the south and east of the Marquette station and water works, instead of the north and west thereof, and for that purpose we desire authority to lay our tracks in Lake Street to said portion of the reserve, under the same terms and conditions of the franchise under which we are now constructing our tracks in other portions of Lake Street.

We desire to suggest that, inasmuch as the present grade of Lake Street is not uniform and the macadam roadway thereon is badly worn and of little value, this Company ought not to be required to grade, curb and macadamize said street as contemplated by the first provision of the resolution adopted by the Common Council on April 4, 1901, granting this Company permission to make certain changes in the grade of Lake Street; but that the cost of rebuilding and improving of said street should properly be defrayed by the City.
