The Marquette Gas Light Company further agrees that if it shall not promptly, as soon as the weather permits, restore the streets as hereinbefore provided, the City of Marquette may restore the same, and the Marquette Gas Light Company agrees to pay the cost of such restoration by the City of Marquette, upon demand.

Whereas, It is rumored that the Duluth, South Shore and Atlantic Railway Company has under consideration the removal of its headquarters from this City and such removal would be a serious loss to the business and social interests of this place;

Resolved, That the citizens of the City of Marquette, believing it to be of great importance to the welfare of this Community and of real advantage to said Company that the headquarters of "The Marquette Route" shall remain at Marquette, hereby express the hope that before such removal shall be determined upon, full consideration will be given to all the advantages this City affords for the permanent location of such headquarters; and be it

Resolved, That the people of this City entertain the most appreciating and friendly sentiments towards the Duluth, South Shore and Atlantic Railway Company and towards its managing officers and employees residing here, and would regret exceedingly the severance of the pleasant personal relations long enjoyed with them in business and social circles; and

Resolved, That, as the chief employer of labor and services in the City, the Duluth, South Shore and Atlantic Railway Company always has had proper claim for

consideration of its requirements upon the official representatives of this community; and the Common Council have always cheerfully recognized such claim, deeming that they were well serving the interests of the people by permitting, whenever and wherever requested, the construction of tracks, trestles and other structures in the streets, and in likewise granting other privileges calculated to promote the interests and convenience of said railway company; and be it further

Resolved, That the Common Council, in accordance with their past policy toward the employing industries of this city, hereby pledge themselves to meet all reasonable requirements of said railway company in future for rights of way and other privileges, for the policing and fire protection of its property, and for all such other beneficial action as is within the power of the Council to grant or to provide; and be it further

Gentlemen - your petitioners, the Board of Fire and Water Commissioners of the City of Marquette, would respectfully request that for the purpose of defraying the cost of maintaining the fire department of the City they be allowed the sum of thirty dollars (\$30.00) per hydrant for each of the public hydrants now in service and maintained for the fire protection of the City.

This is the general custom throughout the country, whether the plant is operated by public or private owner, (although the charge is usually much more than \$30.00), and is based on the principle that the maintenance of a fire department should be a general public charge, and not be at the expense of the water consumer, as is the case here, and this is the only city of which we have knowledge where this system prevails.
