Pioneer Iron Company Report on Filtration of Water

To the Honorable, the Mayor and the Common Council of the City of Marquette:

Gentlemen—Your request, communicated to us through City Recorder Daniel S. Donovan, that we experiment along the lines suggested by Dr George A. Koenig in his report relative to the contamination of the city water supply, together with a copy of his report, have been duly received and given careful attention.

Dr. Koenig attributes the taste which was noticeable some months ago, to the floating particles of tar in the water, and says that he has proven to his satisfaction that all liquid matter, including tar, oils, etc., which are in solution, is inoffensive because such matter loses both its taste and odor by dilution before it reaches the intake. In this conclusion he is probably correct. The discussion is thus narrowed to the floating tar, and the course to be followed in reference to it.

Dr. Koenig suggests filtration. Our chemist, Dr. Hudson, has carefully experimented with a filter of charcoal-braze and sand as requested, and reports that from a scientific standpoint Dr. Koenig is apparently correct in saying that such a filter will remove all tar in suspension. He finds, however, that Dr. Koenig is incorrect in saying that the tar and charcoal will then be valuable for and can be used as fuel, because the charcoal also becomes mixed with a considerable quantity of lime from the stills and with sand from the filter, which destroy its value for fuel.

It will be readily apparent that a laboratory experiment on a sample of the water, however satisfactory to the chemist, does not demonstrate either the feasibility or the practicability of applying the same process to 30,000 gallons of liquor every twenty-four hours for 365 days in the year, from a business standpoint. We have asked our chemist and engineers to consider and prepare a careful, conservative estimate of the cost of constructing and operating such filtration plant as they would deem sufficient, and they report that the cost of construction would be approximately \$1400, while the annual cost of operation, owing to the labor required in placing and removing the charcoal braze and sand would be approximately \$1,800, besides the value of the charcoal braze per week, which we are now using as fuel. It might, however, cost more, as only a practical demonstration lasting for some time can determine how large a plant would be needed and whether there is being provided a sufficient quantity of braze. We are glad to get this plan of filtration from Dr. Koenig. It is a new idea to us, and to the charcoal furnace business, but for that very reason, no hasty action should be taken, as its practicability is not clearly demonstrated.

We respectfully urge that this company is operating its plant in the usual and customary method, that it is doing nothing different from what was contemplated when it was built, or than is done in other places. What has occurred has been the inevitable result of bringing industries to Marquette, and

no matter what course may be taken in dealing with our plant, you will still be confronted by this problem of your water supply, as Marquette increases in population and in the number of its business interests. As a large tax payer, and as a company interested in the welfare of your city, and representing a large number of its citizens, we respectfully suggest that instead of requiring us to assume a regular fixed charge, in the nature of a penalty for operating at Marquette, it would be a wiser course and one better calculated to promote the best interests of your city, to adopt at general expense a plan, if one can be devised, that will protect your water supply from all sources of contamination, not only that arising from increasing population, but also that arising from other industries which we all hope may be induced to establish themselves in our midst.

We have suggested such a plan in the extension of the intake. Dr. Koenig says this is a doubtful remedy. He did not investigate this plan. Such work is outside of his special field of research. His report seems to us at least to be that of a partisan, rather than one proceeding from an unbiased mind, which this subject merits. He says that it is only the floating tar which caused the trouble, and that this tar is now retained by the ice, so that neither current nor wind carried it to the intake. If this is true, why will not the extension of the intake into deeper water serve at all times to remove it from this floating, surface tar, which does not pass beneath the ice. The funnel of the present intake turns upwards, and is so near the surface that the suction may be observed, and of course such a funnel catches the surface tar. Dr. Koenig loses sight of this fact, and also of the further point that experience has shown that the furnace intake which is about 1,750 feet long but has a funnel that turns downward and draws from the lower strata of water has not been affected at all, although it is located only a short distance from the discharge into the lake.

In view of these features of Dr. Koenig's report, and the fact that there has been no difficulty with the water supply for several months last past, and the further fact that with our acetate plant in operation there will be less objectional matter going into the lake, so that it is likely there will be no further trouble of importance, is it not the wise and reasonable course to still further postpone a decision on this matter until a sufficient time has elapsed to enable us to determine more clearly what would be the best plan for all parties interested. We have yet to hear Mr. Benzenberg's views on this subject.

We can thus give this subject further and careful consideration without injuring anyone. This company is ready to treat the problem of your water supply in a reasonable manner, and when the best course is decided upon, to bear its just proportion of the burden of putting it into execution.
