Regular meeting at City Hall, May 8, 1922, 7:30 p. m.

A six-inch vitrified pipe sanitary lateral sewer extending from the north line of Hematite street south on Second street to a point 40 feet north of the north line of Specular street, a distance of 310 feet, which improvement is hereby designated "The Extension of Sewer in Second Street;" and
