The clerk produced the certificate of the election computing board of the results of the election held in the several precincts of the city on Monday, December 3, 1923, for mayor and for supervisor for the Fourth precinct, to fill vacancy.

Resolved, That the commission does hereby determine and declare that John Robertson, by the preferences of a majority of the votes given in the several precincts of said city at said election, is duly elected to fill the office of mayor for the term of five years to succeed Harlow A. Clark.

does hereby determine and declare that Frank Frei, by the preferences of a majority of the votes given in the several precincts of said city at said election, is duly elected to fill the office of supervisor of the Fourth precinct for the unexpired term of one year.
