Mayor Robertson presented the following:

To the Commission of the City of Marquette:

Gentlemen—At my request the city attorney has prepared a formal opinion as to the legal status of the Peter White Public Library, copies of which have been furnished to each of your number. Supplemental opinions have also been furnished me bearing on the terms of office of the hbrary trustees and the validity of our tax levies for general city purposes which embrace therein moneys for library purposes.

I am convinced, from the authorities cited in said opinions, that the Library is a part of the educational system of the State and is entirely under the control of the legislature. That body in 1891 adopted the spe-

cial act for the incorporation, organization, management and control of the Library. Under this act the mayor is given the power, with the consent of the commission, to appoint the trustees for terms of five years. The commission is given the power to remove trustees from office for misconduct, and the city treasurer is made treasurer of the Library corporation. I am advised and am satisfied that all the lawful authority which the mayor and commission have in respect to the Library is contained in the special act of its incorporation, and that it was not within the power of the electors by the adoption of the revised charter under the home rule law to repeal said special act or to affect in any particular its provisions.

I am also strongly of the opinion that better functioning may be expected from a board of five members than one of only three members. The school board and the Commission itself are illustrations of the advantages derived from the larger number of members on a board.

I am also seriously concerned as to the legality of our general city tax levies, should they be questioned on the ground that they embrace considerable sums for library purposes.

I recommend prompt recognition by the mayor and commission of the continuance in effect of the Library Act, the repeal of the city ordinance on the subject, and the appointment of such trustees as may be necessary to bring the library board up to the statutory number of five trustees. By so doing we shall relinquish to the legislature its constitutional control of the Library, and relieve ourselves of unauthorized responsibilities. We shall continue to be responsible for the appointment and continuance in office of competent persons as trustees, a duty which we should perform to the best of our ability.
