The city attorney presented the final draft of the form for a proposed ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Providing for a Gas Franchise," drawn in conformity with the city charter and the directions of the commission and in conference with Mr. A. E. Miller, attorney for the Michigan Gas & Electric company; which form was then read.

Moved by Commissioner Webb, supported by Commissioner Hudson, that said proposed ordinance be adopted as read, subject to the approval of the electors of the city.

Pending the adoption of the proposed ordinance providing for a gas franchise, it was moved by Commissioner Pearce and supported by Mayor Robertson, that the following preamble and resolution for the amendment of such proposed ordinance be adopted, viz:

Whereas, municipal ownership and operation of public utilities, including gas plants, is recognized as a proper public function and is meeting with growing favor throughout the country;

And whereas, the experience of

this city in municipal ownership warrants the opinion entertained by many of our citizens that it is desirable, when it shall appear practicable to do so, for the city to purchase at a fair value and to operate the gas plant now located in the city:

And whereas, the electors of the city, with such project in view, incorporated in the new city charter and adopted the following provision,

"Every grant or franchise may provide certain dates or periods thereafter upon and at which the city shall have the right to purchase of and from the firm. person or corporation holding and operating under such grant and franchise, all right, title, interests, property and business used, owned, operated or conducted in connection with or under or by virtue of such grant and franchise, and may provide for the taking over of the same by the city upon the payment therefor of its then fair valuation; provided, that the proposition to purchase such franchise at the price fixed or agreed upon shall receive the affirmative vote of three-fiffiths of the electors qualified to vote thereon of said city voting thereon at a regular or special municipal election."

And whereas, the proposed ordinance providing for a gas franchise does not provide that the city shall ever have the right to make such purchase, notwithstanding that three-fifths of the voters so desire;

Resolved, that the proposed form of ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Providing for a Gas Franchise," be amended before the adoption thereof by adding to Section 16 thereof the following words, viz:

"The years 1930, 1940 and 1950 are hereby specified in which the city shall have the right to purchase of and from the company all rights, title, interests, property and business used, owned, operated or conducted in connection with or under or by virtue of this grant and franchise; and upon the payment

therefor of its fair valuation as determined pursuant to the city charter, or otherwise, all such property shall be taken over by the city and be operated and conducted by, under and as a part of the Department of Light and Power of the city; provided, that in the determination of such fair valuation the then fair cash value only of the tangible property of the company necessarily and in good faith employed in the business of furnishing gas to the inhabitants of the city shall be considered. Which preamble and resolution was lost."

Nays—Commissioners Hudson, Mc-Cormick and Webb.

The original motion of Mr. Webb that the ordinance be adopted subject to the approval of the electors was then adopted.

Resolved, that the question of granting such franchise be submitted for adoption or rejection to the vote thereon of the qualified electors of the city at a special election hereby called for that purpose, to be held in the respective precincts of the city on Monday, April 6, 1925, during the hours of said day when the polls of the general election in said precincts shall be open;

And resolved, that the form of the ballot and the form in which the question shall be submitted on the ballot and the instructions thereon shall be as follows:

"Shall the Michigan Gas and Electric Company, a Michigan Corporation, its successors and assigns, be irrevocably, except for cause, granted for the period of 30 years, the right, power and authority to own, maintain and operate in the City of Marquette, a plant or plants for the production, distribution and sale of gas for fuel, illumination, power and other purposes, and to lay in, under, along and across the public streets, avenues and alleys of the city, as specified in said ordinance, a system of gas mains, pipes, conductors and other necessary and convenient devices appropriate to and for the purpose of distribution and sale of gas, and to repair and renew the same from time to time; on the terms and conditions of the proposed ordinance, entitled, "An Ordinance Providing for a Gas Franchise," and that the total number of ballots cast at such election by such voters on said question was four hundred and thirteen, of which ballots three hundred and fifty eight were marked and cast "For the ordinance," and fifty-five were marked and cast "Against the Ordinance."

For the Department of Public Works: the amount of said sums, to-wit, one hundred eleven thousand one hundred fifty (\$111,150.00) dollars;

For the Department of Public Health and Safety: the amount of said sums, to-wit, sixty-three thousand two hundred thirty (\$63,230.00) dollars;

For the Department of Light and Power: the amount of said sums, towit, one hundred forty-six thousand eight hundred forty-two and 57-100 dollars (\$146,842.57); to be derived from the income of that department.

For the Department of Water: the amount of said sums, to-wit, forty-three thousand eight hundred eighty-eight and 87-100 (\$43,888.87) dollars; to be derived from the income of that department.
