Regular meeting at the City Hall, September 3, 1935, 7 p. m.

Present—Mayor Jacques, Commissioners Anderson, McGinley, Patrick and Tierney.

Fees reported collected by city clerk, \$4.25.

Minutes of the previous meeting approved as read.

Moved by Commissioner Anderson, supported by Commissioner Patrick, and adopted, that the petition to have a room in the annex renovated be referred to the Department of Light and Power, with power to act.

Yeas—Mayor Jacques, Commissioners Anderson, McGinley, Patrick and Tierney.

Moved by Mayor Jacques, supported by Commissioner Patrick and adopted, that South Marquette Project No. 2 and North Marquette Project No. 3, be financed by electric utility earnings and Lincoln Avenue, Project No. 1, Baraga avenue to Fisher street on Sixth street and Hampton street sewer projects be financed by water utility earnings.

Regular meeting at the City Hall, September 9, 1935, 7 p. m.

Present — Mayor Jacques, Commissioners Anderson and Patrick.

Fees reported collected by city clerk, \$5.25.

Minutes of the previous meeting approved as read.

The petition of Mr. W. G. Miller requesting permission to use a portion of the sidewalk during erection of a new store front in the Gregory Block was presented.

Moved by Commissioner Anderson, supported by Commissioner Patrick, and adopted, such request was allowed.

Moved by Mayor Jacques, supported by Commissioner Anderson, and adopted, that the communication from Mr. John D. Chubb, Architect, be referred to the department of public health and safety.

Yeas — Mayor Jacques, Commissioners Anderson and Patrick.

The petition of Mr. Frank McMaster and eight others requesting that the water system on Wilkinson avenue from the corner of Longyear avenue and Harlow street be extended was presented.

Moved by Mayor Jacques, supported by Commissioner Anderson, and adopted, said petition was referred to the department of water for report at the next meeting.

Moved by Mayor Jacques, supported by Commissioner Patrick that the following be adopted:

Whereas, it appears by affidavit on file with the city clerk that notice has been published once in each week for four consecutive weeks that the commission would meet at the city hall on Monday, July 29, 1935, at 7 o'clock p. m., pursuant to the resolution of the commission to vacate, discontinue and abolish a roadway running in a north-wester-

ly direction from the intersection of Wilkinson avenue and Center street, crossing Van Evert avenue at Norwood street, to the intersection of Neidhart avenue and Wright street; and

Whereas, said hearing was duly adjourned to Monday, the 9th day of September, 1935, at the City Hall in said City of Marquette, at 7 o'clock p. m., and

WHEREAS, opportunity has been given all persons to be heard hereon, and no objections to the vacation of said roadway, as described above, having been made, and due consideration having been had by the commission;

RESOLVED, that all of the said roadway, as described above, be, and the same is, hereby vacated.

Gentlemen:

When I was a candidate for Commissioner I advocated the building of a sewage disposal plant in Marquette. At that time I mentioned that although Marquette is located on the largest body of fresh water in the world, its citizens are being forced to drink water which is polluted to such an extent that extra-

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ordinary treatment is necessary to make it safe for drinking purposes.

After election I requested that a committee be appointed to look into the situation. Commissioners Anderson, Tierney and McCormick were appointed on that committee. A few weeks later the committee reported that it recommended that the consideration of building a sewage disposal plant be deferred until such time as the surface water situation was remedied. As a result, we are still drinking chemicalized soup, and under any such program we probably would be for many years to come.

I have heard that under the work relief program the Federal government intends to spend about 2½ million dollars in Marquette county. The number of projects this Commission has recently submitted represents an inconsequential proportion of this amount. Further, I understand that all proposed Federal projects must be submitted by September 7th. I would appreciate, therefore, if the Commission would give immediate consideration to proposing the following project so that if agreeable it may be submitted by September 7th.

The project I have in mind is building a new water intake from the present pumping plant to a point in Lake Superior adjacent to Partridge Island, leaving the present intake pipe as it is for possible emergency purposes. The information I have assembled would indicate that a continuous supply of absolutely pure water could be obtained from a spot about 500 feet north by east of Partridge Island where the water is some 78 feet in depth. Such water would not be contaminated by the city sewers, the Prison sewer, or by the Ishpeming sewer which empties into Carp River. Also, it is beyond the realm of probability that such water would have any taste on account of Furnace chemicals, because the natural flow of Lake Superior is from west to east and because the Furnace proper is located south of Dead River, which empties into the bay in an easterly direction.

If the foregoing information is correct, it would seem that the Commission might well give consideration to requesting that the government undertake this as a 100% Federal project. If it were found that the city would be expected to pay at least a part of the material costs,

consideration could then be given to the amount and method of financing. If the proposition is practical, which it presently appears to be, it would seem that the present time is the time to go after it, as the city could no doubt obtain a pure water supply at as low a cost as it ever will be able to in municipal history.

Unless there are some objections to the proposition I do not know about, I think it would be in order for the Commission to hold a special meeting to give the matter further consideration. This proposition could at least be submitted as a tentative one, pending an authoritative report on the matter by qualified engineers. Would suggest that each of the Commissioners advise the Mayor of his reaction and that if the majority of sentiment is favorable toward giving the matter further consideration that the Mayor call a special meeting to discuss the situation.

Gentlemen:

Reference is made to my letter of September 5th regarding proposed new water supply intake. The Mayor has since advised me that he had contacted Federal authorities and they advised him that if the matter were taken up at the regular meeting next Monday night it would be in time for the application to be considered. I now find that, unless I can postpone the engagement, I will be unable to attend Monday's meeting, as I have been called out of the city, to leave Monday morning.

For your information, I would like to state that the information I have assembled in the last day or two indicated that even though a new intake were put in we could not be definitely assured that it would solve the water problem. I have also learned, unofficially, that the Federal authorities would undoubtedly give more favorable consideration to a proposal for a sewage disposal plant, probably because of the fact that the city is now violating the law by emptying its sewage in Lake Superior.

I would appreciate, therefore, if

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the Commission would give consideration to both propositions Monday night, with particular reference to a sewage disposal plant. Also, I would like to have the City Clerk embody my letter of the 5th, and this one, in the minutes of proceedings, if I am not personally in attendance at Monday's meeting.
