Regular meeting at the City Hall, September 16, 1940, 7 p. m.

Present — Mayor Biegler, Commissioners Anderson, McGinley, Patrick and Tierney.

Moved by Commissioner Tierney, supported by Commissioner Anderson, and adopted, that the petition for the installation of a street light on Seventh street between Harrison and Crescent street, be referred to the department of light and power.

Moved by Commissioner Patrick, supported by Commissioner Anderson, and adopted, that the petition for the installation of water main on Wright street, west of the cemetery, be referred to the department of water for report.





Avenue Street Improvement," and
appointing this day and time when
the commission would hear any
suggestions and objections that may

be made by persons interested with
respect to such improvement and
when the commission and assistant
assessor would meet to review said
special assessment roll and the re-
spective assessments therein; and

Whereas, all suggestions and ob-
jections made to said improvement
and to said assessment roll and the
respective assessments therein,
having been heard and considered;
and

Whereas, said assessment roll
and the assessments therein hav-
ing been reviewed by the commis-
sion and the assistant assessor, and
all needful correction of the same
having been made;

Resolved, that said assessment
roll, to-wit: Special Assessment
Roll No. 215, and the respective as-
sessments therein, are hereby con-
firmed.

Whereas, the United States of
America, by act of congress ap-
proved July 12, 1886, 24 Stat. 144,
duly granted to the city of Mar-
quette, a municipal corporation of
the state of Michigan, in trust for
the purpose of a public park, frac-
tional section 1 and lot numbered
4, section 2, township 48 north,
range 25 west, Michigan meridian,
except a tract 220 feet by 190 feet,
containing one acre on the ex-
treme north end of said tract, sub-
ject to the provision that if the
same should cease to be used for
park purposes, it should revert to
the United States; and

Whereas, the United States Coast
Guard desires to erect on a part

of the said land so granted to said city of Marquette a lookout tower to be used in connection with the Marquette Coast Guard Station; and

Whereas, the Marquette City Commission is of the opinion that the erection of such a tower at the proposed location would be of great value as a protective measure to the persons navigating the waters adjacent thereto.

Now, therefore, in consideration of the premises, and to permit of the construction of said lookout tower, the city of Marquette, hereby abandons that portion of the land granted to it as aforesaid, more particularly described as follows:

All that certain piece or parcel of land located in section 1, township 48 north, range 25 west, in the town of Marquette, Marquette county, Michigan, being a parcel 40 feet square, which is centered 1 degree, 30' east 40 feet from the northernmost corner of a parcel reserved by the United States of America for lighthouse purposes under the terms of an act of congress, approved July 12, 1886, 24 Stat. 144, and described as beginning at a point, an iron pin, recently established as the west corner of said parcel and located 2,575 feet north and 945 feet east of the 1-4 corner between sections 1 and 2, township 48 north, range 25 west, and running thence north 66 degrees 33' east 190 feet to the north corner, an iron bolt leaded in bare rock and located 2,650.5 feet north and 1,119.3 feet east of the 1-4 corner between sections 1 and 2, township 48 north, range 25 west, thence south 23 degrees 27' east 220 feet to a point in the lake cove, thence south 66 degrees 33' west to the south corner an iron pin located 2,373.2 north and 1,032.5 east of the 1-4 corner between sections 1 and 2, township 48 north, range 25 west, thence north 23 degrees 27' west 220 feet to the place of beginning, the said 40 foot square parcel being further particularly described as beginning at a point located north 1 degree 30', east 20 feet from the most northerly corner of the parcel of land reserved by the United States of America, as above described, and running thence south 88 degrees 30' east 20

feet thence north 1 degree 30' east, 40 feet, thence north 88 degrees 30' west 40 feet, thence south 1 degree 30' west 40 feet, and thence south 88 degrees 30' east 20 feet to the place of beginning: Provided, that this abandonment shall not be operative or effective unless and until congress adopts an act ratifying and confirming in all respects the aforesaid grant of July 12, 1886, except as to the parcel of land last above specifically described.

Commissioner Tierney offered the following resolution and moved its adoption: Resolved, that, under the provisions of Section 9759 of the Compiled Laws of the state of Michigan for the year 1929, the annual license fee for any person, corporation, copartnership or firm desiring to carry on the business of dealer in second-hand goods, or junk dealer, with in the city of Marquette, be, and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of ten (\$10.00) dollars.

Commissioner Patrick seconded the foregoing resolution.

A vote was taken on the adoption of said resolution which resulted as follows: Ayes—Mayor Biegler, Commissioners Anderson, McGinley, Patrick and Tierney.

Nays—None.

Carried.

Moved by Commissioner Patrick, supported by Commissioner Anderson, and adopted that the following report of the special committee appointed to consider the proposals of the employes of the department of public works be approved to take effect immediately:

All work performed on Sundays and legal holidays will be paid for at the rate of time and one-half. All other work performed in excess of the regular work period shall be paid for only at the regular wage rate. No employe shall be required to work fewer hours than the regular work period per day because of overtime employment on previous days.

All overtime work shall be equally divided, as nearly as possible, between all employes in any particular classification group, it being the intent to allow each employe in any particular classification equal opportunity to earn overtime wages.

When an employe is required to report to work at a regular starting time and is prevented from working by weather conditions or other conditions beyond his control, he shall be paid for the actual time elapsing until instructed that there is no work for that day, and in any event, shall receive pay for a minimum of two hours for such day.

As soon as possible after the adoption of these regulations, a seniority list or roster shall be compiled, based upon the date of original hire by the city as shown by the records of the city treasurer. A list shall be prepared for each classification group and the date of original hire shall be shown on said lists.

In the event that it becomes necessary to reduce the number of employes in any classification groups, layoffs shall be made on the basis of the order of names

appearing on the seniority list, provided, however, that if a layoff is made in a higher wage classification group, any such employe so laid off who is capable and desirous of a position in a lower wage group, and who possesses a higher seniority rating, shall replace the employe in the lower wage classification group having the lowest seniority rating, providing he has the necessary fitness and ability. That a committee be appointed immediately after the first of the year to make necessary classifications and consider wage increase and that action of the commission be effective as of January 1, 1941.

Grievances by employes will be heard directly by the commission.





Minutes of an adjourned meeting of the board of city canvassers of the city of Marquette, in the county of Marquette, and state of Michigan, held in the council chamber of the city hall in said city of Marquette, on the 11th day of December, 1940, at nine o'clock a. m.

Present: Mayor Biegler, Commissioners Anderson, McGinley and Patrick and Mary A. Hogan, clerk of the board. Mr. William H. Schneider appeared in person and by Mr. John N. Fegan, his attorney. Mr. John Tierney appeared in person and by Messrs. R. R. Eldredge and Harlow Clark, his attorneys.

The following statement was thereupon made by Mr. Eldredge:

"Mr. Tierney, being advised that his petition for a recount was probably premature, and being desirous of a recount in Precinct 5-B only if one is had in other precincts by Mr. Schneider, hereby respectfully withdraws his petition for recount heretofore filed, for the same reasons and with the same reservations as are contained in Mr. Schneider's application to withdraw his petition, and requests a refund of his deposit."

Moved by Commissioner Anderson, supported by Commissioner McGinley, and adopted, that the clerk be and she is hereby directed to refund the sum of \$5.00 paid by John Tierney at the time of filing petition for recount.

It appearing to the board of canvassers, upon proceeding with the canvass of votes cast at the municipal election held December 2, 1940, that there were no available returns from the inspectors of election in precinct 1-A and precinct 5-B, on motion of Commissioner Patrick, supported by Commissioner Anderson, and adopted, it was ordered that the ballot boxes used in said precincts be brought up for the purpose of ascertaining whether or not the return of inspectors of election from said precincts was erroneously placed in said boxes prior to sealing.

Of the votes so cast it was determined that William H. Schneider received 225 votes for the office of city commissioner; that said John Tierney received 237 votes for the said office of city commissioner; that two ballots were void.

On opening and counting the ballots in the ballot box used in precinct Five A at said election, it was found that the total number of votes cast was 476.

Of the votes so cast it was determined that William H. Schneider received 255 votes for the office of city commissioner; that said John Tierney received 215 votes for the said office of city commissioner and that six ballots had been spoiled.

John Tierney, candidate for city commissioner, having by Ralph R. Eldredge, his attorney, publically announced his withdrawal of his petition for a recount of the votes cast in precinct Five B, the board of canvassers thereupon determined from the official returns of the election inspectors of said precinct Five B that the said William H.

Schneider had received 449 votes for the office of city commissioner and the said John Tierney had received 89 votes for said office of city commissioner at said election in said Precinct Five B. The board of canvassers found that at said election votes were cast for candidates for said office as follows:
For commissioner:

John Tierney 2,508
William H. Schneider 2,494

On motion of Commissioner Anderson, supported by Commissioner McGinley, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, that the city commission has ascertained and determined from a canvass made by them of the returns of the inspectors of the municipal election held in the several precincts of the city on December 2, 1940, of the votes cast therein for commissioner, and does hereby determine and declare that the following person, by the greatest and highest number of votes given in the several precincts at said election, is duly elected to the following office, viz: Commissioner —John Tierney.
