S. Highway 41, on the south by the south line of the alley running east and west between Furnace Street and Sandstone Street produced, and on the west by a line running north and south 200

feet east of Adams street.

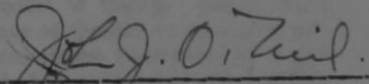

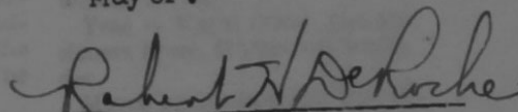

SEPTEMBER 6, 1949

Regular meeting at the City Hall, September 6, 1949, 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present — Mayor O'Neil, Commissioners Bruce, Brumm and Schneider.

Moved by Commissioner Bruce, supported by Commissioner Brumm and adopted, that request of Eugene J. Belmore for permission to operate a public transportation system between Marquette Township and the City of Marquette, be referred to the City Manager for study and report.

Yeas — Mayor O'Neil, Commissioners Bruce, Brumm and Schneider.

A communication from Harold F. Sloan was read suggesting that the matter of use of Daylite Saving Time so called, in the City of Marquette be submitted to the voters to decide whether or not the time should be changed twice a year or if the citizens would prefer the use of Daylite Saving Time, so called, during the entire year. Moved by Commissioner Schneider, supported by Commissioner Brumm and adopted, that this question be placed on a ballot for the vote of the people at the September 27, 1949 municipal primary election and that the City of Marquette remain on Eastern Standard Time at least until after the results of the said election can be determined.

Shall Sections 1 and 2, Chapter 3, City of Marquette Charter, be amended to provide that at the regular Municipal Election held in 1950, 1 Mayor and 2 Commissioners be elected for a term of 2 years and 2 Commissioners be elected for a term of one year, said terms to commence on January 1, 1951 and upon the expiration of said terms, said Mayor and Commissioners be elected for a term of 2 years, and further that the terms of the incumbent Mayor and Commissioners shall expire at midnight, December 31, 1950.

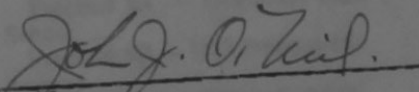

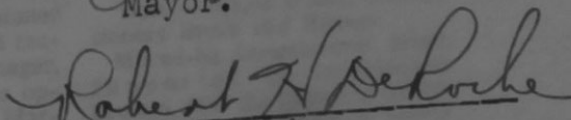

Regular meeting at the City Hall, September 12, 1949, 7:00 o'clock p.m.

Present — Mayor O'Neil, Commissioners Bruce and Brumm.

Moved by Commissioner Bruce that request of the International Oil Corporation for permit to install two 24,000 barrel tanks and one 28,000 barrel tank for storage of petroleum products upon property leased from the DSS&A Railroad Company be referred to the City Manager for report. A discussion followed wherein it was shown that the installation of such tanks would be in conflict with existing fire limit regulations. Commissioner Brumm moved that the fire limits be changed and that permission be given to this concern to install the tanks as requested. After further discussion, Mayor O'Neil supported the motion made by Commissioner Bruce, conditioned upon the settling of this matter at a special meeting to be held September 14, 1949 at 7:00 o'clock p.m. The motion then carried with the following vote:

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY
COMMISSION.

SEPTEMBER 14, 1949

A special meeting of the City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall September 14, 1949, 7:00 o'clock p.m.

Present — Mayor O'Neil and Commissioners Schneider, Bruce and Brumm. In the absence of the City Clerk, John J. Walsh, City Attorney, was designated by the City Commission to act in that capacity.

The Mayor thereupon announced that the following matters would be brought up for consideration at the meeting:

The request of the International Oil Corporation for a change in the fire limits to permit of the erection of oil storage tanks on the lake shore;

The request that payroll deductions be authorized covering money which might become payable to a proposed credit union of employes;

The proposed revision of certain rules pertaining to Park Cemetery.

James A. Clulo, City Manager, then read his report upon the request of the International Oil Corporation for the change in fire limits. It was moved by Commissioner Brumm and supported by Mayor O'Neil, that the fire limits in fire district No. 1 be and the same are hereby revised to read as follows:

Beginning at a point where the center line of Lake Street produced in a southerly direction is intersected by a line 132 feet south of and parallel with the south line of Rock Street; thence west along the line parallel with and 132 feet south of the south line of Rock Street to the center line of Third Street; thence north along the center line of Third Street to the center line of Spring Street; thence west along the center line of Spring Street to the center line of Fifth Street; thence north along the center line of Fifth Street to the center line of Bluff Street; thence east along the centerline of Bluff Street to a point midway between Third and Front Streets; thence north to a point on the center line of Ridge Street midway

between Third and Front Streets; thence east along the center line of Ridge St. to the center line of Blaker Street; thence along the center line of Blaker Street to a point on a line 150 feet south of and parallel with the south line of Ridge Street; thence east along the line parallel with and 150 feet south of the south line of Ridge Street to an intersection with the north line of Lake Street; thence south to the center line of Lake Street; thence southwesterly along the center line of Lake Street to the intersection of the center line of Lake Street and the center line of Baraga Avenue; thence southerly along the center line of Lake St. produced to the point of beginning.

The vote taken on the adoption of said motion resulted as follows:

Ayes: Mayor O'Neil and Commissioner Brumm.

Nays: Commissioners Schneider and Bruce.

There being a tie vote, the Mayor thereupon cast the deciding vote and declared the motion carried.

James A. Clulo, City Manager, then read his report on the request of certain employes for payroll deductions. Following the reading of said report it was moved by Commissioner Schneider, that the report of the City Manager be approved and confirmed as well as the action which he said he would take authorizing payroll deductions.

Ayes: Mayor O'Neil Commissioners Bruce, Brumm and Schneider.

A map of Park Cemetery showing the portion of the cemetery subdivided and in use previous to September 2, 1947 was then presented to the City Commission by the City Manager, which map was identified with the signature of the City Manager and bore date the 14th day of September, 1949. It was moved by Commissioner Schneider, seconded by Commissioner Brumm, that the map so presented be and the same is hereby approved and adopted.

It was moved by Commissioner Bruce, seconded by Commissioner Schneider, and carried, that Rule

10-b governing Park Cemetery be and the same is hereby revised to read as follows:

Rule 10-b, Park-plan portions of Cemetery. In certain portions of the cemetery to be developed after September 2, 1947, no monuments will be permitted. These portions shall be determined by the City Commission when such areas are divided into lots and the areas opened for use.

It was next moved by Commissioner Brumm, supported by Commissioner Schneider, and adopted, that Rule 17-a of the rules governing Park Cemetery be and the same is hereby revised to read as follows:

Rule 17-a. Designs must be approved. All monuments shall be designed with reference to the location in which it will be placed, consideration being given to the number, size and character of monuments standing near it. No mausoleum, vault, monument or marker of unusual design shall be placed in the cemetery until the design and location thereof has been submitted to and approved by the Superintendent.

Thereupon it was moved by Commissioner Bruce, supported by Commissioner Brumm, and carried, that Rule 17-b of the rules governing Park Cemetery be and the same is hereby revised to read as follows:

Rule 17-b. One monument to lot. Only one monument will be allowed upon a lot as platted. Every monument must be placed in a location approved by the Superintendent at the time of review of the monument design. No monuments will be allowed upon a lot platted for less than four burials, and none will be allowed covering more than six per cent of the lot areas, however, this requirement shall not be applicable to the older portions of the cemetery subdivided and in use previous to September 2, 1947. Monuments or stones of any kind shall not be permitted on the graves in certain sections to be determined by the City Commission.

It was moved by Commissioner Schneider, supported by Commissioner Bruce, and carried, that Rule 17-f of the rules governing Park Cemetery be and the same is

hereby revised to read as follows:

Rule 17-f. Grave markers. All grave markers shall be flush marker type, except that where there are existing markers on a lot, additional markers of a duplicate material and similar type may be used on that lot. No monument other than flush markers shall be permitted on the first tier of lots adjacent to any roadway. Markers must be so cut as to go into the ground not less than four inches nor more than twelve inches. All flush grave markers must be placed on foundations and must be set so that the tops are level with the sod and size is not to exceed twenty-four inches by twelve inches. In no case shall more than one marker be allowed on a grave; where headstones are used footstones will not be allowed. Provisions of this rule referring to flush markers shall not be applicable to the older portions of the cemetery subdivided and in use previous to September 2, 1947, provided that only flush markers shall be permitted on the first tier of lots adjacent to any roadway.

It was next moved by Commissioner Schneider supported by Commissioner Brumm, and carried, that Rule 17-n of the rules governing Park Cemetery be and the same is hereby revised to read as follows:

Rule 17-n. Removals of monuments, etc. If any vault, tomb, sarcophagus, mausoleum or like structure in which bodies are interred, be erected in or upon any lot, and same shall fall into a state of delapidation or decay, which shall be determined by the Superintendent to be offensive or in any way injurious to the appearance of the surrounding lots or grounds, no adequate provision having been made by the owner for the repair and preservation of such structure, the Cemetery Management shall have the right and it shall be their duty to enter upon such lot and remove the said offensive or unsightly structure and inter the body or bodies in the earth upon said lot, the cost to be assessed to the heirs, and afterwards maintaining the lot in good condition similar to other lots where earth burials are made. No monument or marker shall be removed from the cemetery unless the written

order of the lot owner be presented at the cemetery office or unless the person claiming the right to remove such monument or marker shall present the contract under which he claims such right of removal to the sexton for re-

view by the City Attorney. Thereupon on motion duly made, seconded and carried, the meeting adjourned.

Hore shall not, however, be required to maintain or extend service over any route or routes shown by an actual traffic check extending over a period of thirty days to be unprofitable or impracticable, or to put into effect any reduction of rates which will
