OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

JANUARY 7, 1952

Regular meeting at the City Hall, January 7, 1952, 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present — Mayor York, Commissioners Brumm, Harmon, Raish and Tuominen.

A communication from the City Employes Committee requesting changes in the Employment Code was read. It was agreed that the City Commission would meet with the Employes Committee on January 9, 1952, at 7:00 o'clock p. m. to discuss this matter.

The commission proceeded to elect by ballot one of the commissioners to be mayor pro-tem for the ensuing year. Commissioner Brumm received four votes and Commissioner Raish received one vote, whereupon Commissioner Brumm was declared mayor pro-tem for the year 1952.

Mayor York appointed commission members to approve the expenditures of the various city departments for the ensuing year as follows: Public Affairs Department and Accounts and Finance Department, Mayor York; Public Works Department, Commissioner Brumm; Light and Power Department, Commissioner Tuominen; Police Department and Parks and Recreation Department, Commissioner Raish; Health Department, Fire Department and Water Department, Commissioner Harmon. Moved by Commissioner Brumm, supported by Commissioner Raish and adopted that said appointments be confirmed.

Yeas — Mayor York, Commissioners Brumm, Harmon, Raish and Tuominen.

Moved by Commissioner Raish, supported by Commissioner Harmon and adopted that John J. Walsh be appointed City Attorney for the ensuing year.

Yeas — Mayor York, Commissioners Brumm, Harmon, Raish and Tuominen.

Moved by Commissioner Tuominen, supported by Commissioner Brumm and adopted, that Commissioner Raish be appointed

Chairman of the Board of Review for the ensuing year.

Yeas — Mayor York, Commissioners Brumm, Harmon, Raish and Tuominen.

The commission then proceeded with public hearing upon the proposed amendment to Paragraph 5 of Section 6 of the Zoning Ordinance for Marquette, Michigan, and interested persons were heard. The hearing was then declared closed and it was moved by Commissioner Tuominen and supported by Mayor York that the proposed amendment be adopted. A vote taken on the motion resulted as follows:

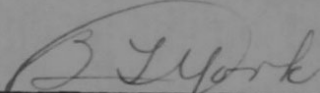

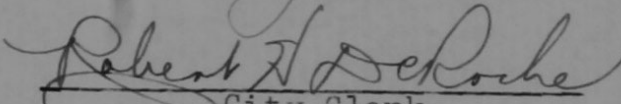

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

JANUARY 9, 1952

A special meeting of the City Commission was duly called and held January 9, 1952, 7:00 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of meeting with the City Employes Committee for a discussion of proposed changes in the Employment Code and for any other business that may properly come before the meeting.

Present — Mayor York, Commissioners Brumm, Raish and Tuominen.

Moved by Commissioner Brumm, supported by Commissioner Raish and adopted that sections 12-1, 13-5 and 14-2 of the Employment Code for the City of Marquette be amended, effective January 1, 1952, to read as follows:

12-1. The following shall be considered as regular holidays: New Year's Day, Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Armistice Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day. Special holidays or temporary suspension of business may be declared from time to time by the City Commission. Employees who are required to work on the above listed holidays shall receive double time. When any of the above holidays fall on Sunday, the double time will be paid to the employees who are required to work on the first Monday following the holiday.

13-5. Vacation time may be waived by employes, but in no case shall an employe be paid salary or wages for vacation time not used; provided however, that if an employe is discharged, or quits and provides his department

head with at least two weeks written notice of his intention so to do, and has vacation time earned in the previous calendar year accumulated and unused and/ or has a credit for vacation time earned in the current year, he shall be entitled to receive compensation therefore at his regular salary or wage rate.

14-2. An employe, other than an employe of the fire department, shall be entitled to one working day sick leave for each month he worked during the preceding 12 calendar months, with pay. An employe of the fire department shall be entitled to one day sick leave for each 13 shifts he was on duty during the preceding 12 calendar months, with pay. In no case shall more than 10 days sick leave be allowed in any calendar year, except that unused sick leave may be cumulative to a maximum of 90 days.

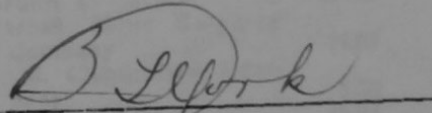

JANUARY 21, 1952

Regular meeting at the City Hall, January 21, 1952, 7:00 o'clock p.m.

Present Mayor York, Commissioners Brumm, Harmon and Tuominen.

Moved by Commissioner Harmon, supported by Commissioner Brumm and adopted, that invitation from the Marquette Township School Board to attend open house to be held in the new Vandenboom School on January 26th and 27th to be received and that a letter of appreciation be sent to the Marquette Township School Board.

Yeas — Mayor York, Commissioners Brumm, Harmon and Tuominen.

Moved by Commissioner Harmon, supported by Commissioner Brumm that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby adopted:

WHEREAS, by resolution of the City Commission duly adopted on December 4, 1951, it was determined that the City of Marquette would advertise for bids for the purchase of One Million (\$1,000,000.00) Dollars Water Supply and Sewage Disposal System Revenue Bonds, said bids to be opened on Thursday, February 14, 1952 at 7:00 o'clock, p.m.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the City Clerk shall cause Notice of Sale of said One Million (\$1,000,000.00) Dollars Water Supply and Sewage Disposal System Revenue Bonds to be published in the Michigan Investor and/or the Bond Buyer at least fourteen (14) full days prior to date for receiving bids for the purchase of said bonds.

Sealed Bids for the purchase of Water Supply and Sewage Disposal System Revenue Bonds of the City of Marquette, Marquette County, Michigan, of the par value of \$1,000,000.00, will be received by the undersigned at his office in the City of Marquette, Michigan, until Thursday, February 14, 1952, at 7:00 o'clock p.m., Eastern Standard Time, at which time and place they will be publicly opened and read.

The bonds shall be dated as of July 1, 1951, and mature serially as follows:

\$10,000 July 1st of each of the years 1954 to 1957, both inclusive;

\$15,000 January 1st of each of the years 1954 to 1965, both inclusive;

\$15,000 July 1st of each of the years 1958 to 1969, both inclusive;

\$20,000 July 1st of each of the years 1970 to 1979, both inclusive;

\$20,000 January 1st of each of the years 1966 to 1975, both inclusive;

\$25,000 January 1st of each of the years 1976 to 1981, both inclusive;

\$25,000 July 1st of each of the years 1980 and 1981.

Said bonds shall be coupon bonds, registerable as to principal only, of the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, numbered consecutively in the direct order of maturity from 1 to 1,000, inclusive, and shall bear interest from their date at a rate or rates not exceeding three (3%) per cent per annum, expressed in multiples of $\frac{1}{4}$ of 1%, and said interest shall be payable on January 1, 1952 and semi-annually thereafter on July 1st and January 1st of each year, both principal and interest being payable at a bank or trust company to be designed by the purchaser of the bonds. Accrued interest to the date of delivery of said bonds must be paid by the purchaser at the time of delivery.

Coupon No. 1 evidencing interest from July 1, 1951 to January 1, 1952, will not be printed. Coupon No. 2 attached to the bonds shall evidence interest from January 1, 1952 to July 1, 1952. The interest rate for each coupon period on any one bond shall be at one rate only.

Outstanding bonds of this issue may be called for redemption as a whole on any interest payment date on or after July 1, 1954, but only for the purpose of refunding in connection with a plan of refinancing deemed necessary or advisable by reason of the need for additional funds to construct major extensions or improvements to either the Water Supply or Sewage Disposal System.

Unless called as a whole in accordance with the above provisions, bonds numbered 1 to 480, inclusive, maturing in the years 1954 to 1969, inclusive, shall not be subject to redemption prior to maturity.

Bonds numbered 481 to 1,000, inclusive, maturing in the years 1970 to 1981, inclusive, shall be callable for redemption prior to maturity at the option of the City, in inverse numerical order, on any interest payment date on or after July 1, 1961.

Bonds called for redemption in accordance with the foregoing provisions, shall be redeemed at par and accrued interest plus a premium as follows:

If called as a whole prior to July 1, 1961:

\$40.00 on each bond, if such call is made prior to July 1, 1955;

\$35.00 on each bond, if such call is made on or after July 1, 1955, but prior to July 1, 1958;

\$30.00 on each bond, if such call is made on or after July 1, 1958, but prior to July 1, 1961;

If called on or after July 1, 1961, either as a whole or in part:

\$25.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after July 1, 1961, but prior to July 1, 1964;

\$20.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after July 1, 1964, but prior to July 1, 1968;

\$15.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after July 1,

1968, but prior to July 1, 1971;

\$10.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after July 1, 1971, but prior to July 1, 1974;

\$5.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after July 1, 1974.

Thirty (30) days' notice of the call of any bonds for redemption shall be given by publication in a paper circulated in the State of Michigan which carries, as part of its regular service, notices of sale of municipal bonds, and in case of registered bonds, thirty (30) days' notice shall be given by mail to the registered address. Bonds so called for redemption shall not bear interest after the date fixed for redemption, provided funds are on hand with the paying agent to redeem said bonds.

No proposal for less than all of the bonds, nor for less than their par value will be considered.

Said bonds are to be issued under Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended, for the purpose of paying the cost of constructing additions, extensions and improvements to the Water Supply and Sewage Disposal System of the City.

Said bonds are not a general obligation of the City, but are payable solely from the revenues of the Water Supply and Sewage Disposal System of the City, and are a first and prior lien on all such revenues, subject only to payment of expenses of administration, operation and maintenance. For the purpose of awarding the bonds, the interest cost of each bid will be computed by determining, at the rate or rates specified therein, the total dollar value of all interest on the bonds from March 1, 1952, to their maturity and deducting therefrom any premium. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder whose bid on the above computation produces the lowest interest cost to the City of Marquette.

A certified or cashier's check in the amount of \$20,000.00, drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of the Treasurer of the City

of Marquette must accompany each bid as a guaranty of good faith on the part of the bidder, to be forfeited as liquidated damages if such bid is accepted and the bidder fails to take up and pay for the bonds. No interest shall be allowed on the good faith checks, and checks of unsuccessful bidders will be promptly returned to each bidder's representative or by registered mail.

Bids shall be conditioned upon the unqualified opinion of Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone, attorneys of Detroit, Michigan, which opinion shall be furnished without expense to the purchaser of the bonds prior to the delivery thereof, approving the legality of the bonds. The City shall furnish bonds ready for execution at its expense. Bonds will be delivered at the bank or trust company designated at the place of payment or at such other place as may be agreed upon with the purchaser.

The right is reserved to reject any and all bids.

Envelopes containing the bids should be plainly marked "Proposal for Bonds." Any interested bidder will be furnished, upon request, a report of the essential facts pertaining to the financial condition of the City. Such request should be directed to Matthew Carey, financial adviser for the City, Box 3703, Kercheval Station, Detroit 15, Michigan, or the undersigned.

Voluntary Credit Clearance

On May 23, 1951, the Midwestern Investment Banking Voluntary Credit Restraint Committee expressed the view that the offering of said bonds appears to be in harmony with the principles of the Voluntary Credit Restraint Program.

Moved by Commissioner Tuominen, supported by Commissioner Harmon, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, Section 14-4 of the Employee's Code

be amended to read as follows:

14-4. In case of accident or injury to an employee in line of duty, resulting in a disability, which becomes compensable or non-compensable, the employee may if he so desires, elect to take sick leave during the period of disability providing there exists a credit of sick leave to the account of the disabled employee. In the event the injury is compensable and the employee has been paid for sick leave during the period of disability, then a deduction from the employee's pay shall be made in the amount of compensation paid the employee under the compensation act. The employee shall be given credit for sick leave in proportion to the Workman's Compensation payments received by him during the period of disability for which sick leave has been allowed.

WHEREAS, the provisions of a recently enacted statute requires the posting of signs on all of the city streets prior to the enforcement of such so-called overnight

parking regulations by a municipality, and

WHEREAS, the excessive cost of erecting and maintaining and signs in effect prevents our municipality from maintaining such regulations and the lack of overnight parking regulations has seriously affected snow removal operations so as to inconvenience the entire general public and make our public streets less safe for vehicular travel, and

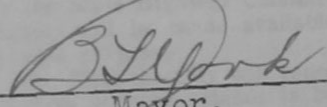

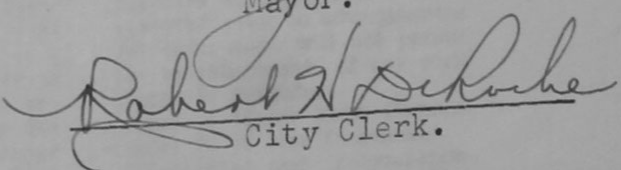

NOW THEREFORE, Be it resolved:

(1) That the City hereby requests the State Highway Commissioner to proceed with said improvement.

(2) That the City's share of the estimated cost of said improvement will be paid to the State Highway Commissioner for deposit with the State Treasurer for credit to the State Trunkline Fund when the improvement is placed under contract, or at such later time as may be mutually agreed upon by the City and the State Highway Commissioner, from

Weight and Gasoline Tax Funds made available to the City by Acts 51, 54 and 55, Public Acts of 1951; or from other funds provided by the City, and that if the City fails to make payment of its share of the cost when due, the City hereby authorizes the Auditor General to withhold a sufficient amount from funds becoming available to the City from the Acts named above to cover the City's indebtedness to the State Highway Commissioner, and the City expressly consents to such withholding. Withholding shall begin with the first distribution after the indebtedness becomes delinquent, and shall continue from succeeding distributions until the indebtedness is paid in full.

(3) That upon determination of the actual cost of the improvement, any adjustment necessary to reconcile the estimated cost with actual cost will be made.

(4) That upon completion of the improvement, parallel parking, in accordance with State statutes, will be enforced by the City.

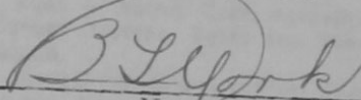

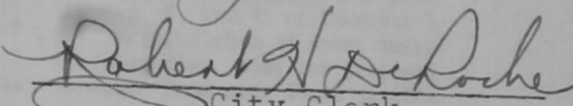
