

# OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

MAY 12, 1952

Regular meeting at the City Hall, May 12, 1952, 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present—Mayor Brumm, Commissioners Halverson, Harmon, Raish and York.

Moved by Commissioner Harmon, supported by Commissioner Raish and unanimously adopted that petition for the installation of a street light at the corner of Norway and Magnetic Streets be referred to the City Manager and Superintendent of the Light and Power Department for study and report.

Moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner York and unanimously adopted that statement from nine business establishments in the 200 block south Front Street stating they had no objection to the allowance made in the past for the parking of three cabs in front of the Belmore Taxi Company office, be received and placed on file.

On motion of Commissioner York, supported by Commissioner Raish, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, Elba L. Morse, R.N. of this City, Superintendent of the Northern Michigan Children's Clinic of the Children's Fund of Michigan has been chosen Nurse of the Year by the Michigan State Nurse's Association at their state convention, and

WHEREAS, Miss Morse has tirelessly cared for the stricken and handicapped children of Northern Michigan for the past twenty-three years, and

WHEREAS, the people of our community have long admired and deeply appreciated her selfless devotion to our afflicted and helpless children, and

WHEREAS, our citizens have found in Miss Morse's devotion to suffering humanity an inspiration and encouragement to better living among themselves, now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that this Commission on behalf of the citizens of our community join with

the members of Miss Morse's profession in honoring her at this proud hour, and

Moved by Commissioner Raish, supported by Commissioner York and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the City Assessor be authorized to prepare an assessment roll for the construction of curbing on the north side of Ohio Street between High and Pine Streets.

Moved by Commissioner York, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the City Assessor be authorized to prepare an assessment roll for the construction of curbing on Magnetic Street between 7th and 8th streets and on Seventh Street between Magnetic Street and College Avenue and that the City Manager be authorized to set up the specifications for this improvement and to solicit bids for the construction.

A report from the City Manager which included a report from consulting engineers, Drury, McNamee and Porter, relative to the use of glazed tile instead of common brick in the finishing of the Sewage Treatment Plant interior, was read. Moved by Commissioner Harmon, supported by Commissioner Raish and unanimously adopted that the use of glazed tile be authorized in finishing those parts of the plant's interior which had been scheduled for common brick finishing.

A communication from Max P Allen, Faculty Chairman for the Vital Issues Conference to be held in this city on May 22, 23 and 24, 1952, was read wherein it was requested that the city have the flags in place on those days as is common for conferences and other gatherings. Moved by Commissioner York, supported by Commissioner Raish and unanimously adopted that this request be referred to the City Manager with power to act.

Mayor Brumm announced his appointment of Mary B. Deasy as Trustee of the Peter White Public Library for a term of five years commencing May 1, 1952, subject to confirmation by the City Com-

mission. Moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Raish and unanimously adopted that this appointment be confirmed.

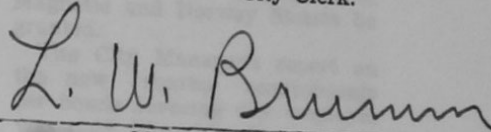

ing procedure.

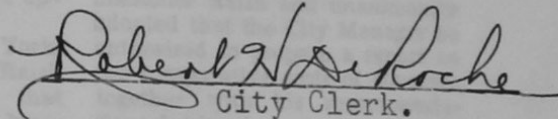

JUNE 9, 1962

Regular meeting at the City Hall, June 9, 1952, 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present—Mayor Brumm, Commissioners Halverson, Harmon, Raish and York.

Moved by Commissioner Raish, supported by Commissioner Harmon and unanimously adopted that request of AMVETS Marquette Post. No. 124 for permission to stage a professional hockey game in the Palestra during September, 1952 be referred to the City Manager and Recreation Director to meet with the AMVETS to determine if this can be worked out and to make an estimate of the cost involved in preparing for such an event.

Moved by Commissioner York, supported by Commissioner Raish and unanimously adopted that communications received from Elba L. Morse, R. N. and from the Michigan Nursing Center Association relative to the naming of Miss Morse as Nurse of the Year, be received and placed on file.

Moved by Commissioner Harmon, supported by Commissioner York and unanimously adopted that communication from the Marquette Federation of Women's Clubs listing the names of nine women for consideration of the Commission in appointing a member to the Marquette Planning Board, be received and placed on file.

Moved by Commissioner York, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted that report of the Public Service Commission on their inspection of the Lake Superior and Ishpeming Railroad Company signal at the Walnut Street crossing, be received and placed on file.

The City Manager's report covering charter requirements for bonds on city employes was read. Moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Harmon and unanimously adopted that the City Manager's recommendation be accepted, that a blanket bond be obtained for 33

Class "A" employes, 10 Class "B" employes and 30 Police Officers and Firemen and that all other city employes not be bonded.

The City Manager's report on the petition previously received for the grading and gravelling of an extension of Schoolcraft Road to connect with U. S. Highway 41 was read. Moved by Commissioner York, supported by Commissioner Raish and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the City Assessor be authorized to contact all property owners in the assessment district in order to obtain their consent prior to preparing an assessment roll.

1952 at the Marquette County Court House and,

WHEREAS, The Michigan Public Service Commission has requested that all interested parties attend the hearing and present such evidence as may be deemed necessary in the matter;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED That this Commission on behalf of the citizens of this city express to the Michigan Public Service Commission our contention that public necessity and convenience require the operation of these trains between Marquette and Calumet as they have been operated continuously for many years past, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this Commission authorize the City Attorney to attend the hearing at the designated time and place to represent the city's interests in the matter.

Moved by Commissioner York, supported by Commissioner Harmon and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager, low bid of Laramie Construction Company for the painting of the metal tower and trim of Fire Station No. 1 and the metal roofs of the residences at 125 and 131 Spring Street for the sum of \$656.50 be accepted, provided that Mr. Laramie carry Workmen's Compensation Insurance, Public Liability and Property Damage Insurance and furnish a contract bond, the cost of the contract bond to be borne by the City of Marquette.

The City Manager's report and estimate of cost for construction of a sewer to connect the properties on Champion Street between Blemhuber Avenue and Whetstone Creek with the city sewer system was read. Moved by Commissioner Raish, supported by Commissioner Harmon and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the City Assessor be authorized to contact the property owners involved for their consent to assessment for this improvement.

Moved by Commissioner Raish, supported by Commissioner Harmon that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

Regular meeting at the City Hall, August 11, 1952, 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present—Mayor Brumm, Commissioners Harmon, Raish and York.

Moved by Commissioner York, supported by Commissioner Harmon and unanimously adopted that petition of 6 property owners for the installation of a street light in the 900 block West Bluff Street be referred to the City Manager and Light and Power Department for study and report.

Moved by Commissioner York, supported by Commissioner Raish and unanimously adopted that petition of 12 property owners for the installation of street lighting in Shiras Hills be referred to the City Manager and Light and Power Department for study and report.

A petition signed by 141 city employees was read wherein they request a \$20.00 per month wage increase and three weeks vacation privilege after 10 years of service. Moved by Commissioner Raish, supported by Commissioner Harmon and unanimously adopted that the City Manager obtain information from other communities on salary scales and that the City Commission hold a special meeting at an early date to consider this matter.

A communication from Drury, McNamee and Porter, Consulting Engineers on the sewage treatment plant project, was read wherein they recommend that a change order be authorized for the construction of diversion chamber and sewer connection to the Walnut Street Pumping Station from the existing Walnut Street outlet. Moved by Commissioner Harmon, supported by Commissioner Raish and unanimously adopted that the City Manager study the report and prepare a statement for the Commission in this matter before action is taken.

Moved by Commissioner York, supported by Commissioner Raish and unanimously adopted that the City of Marquette enter into an agreement with the Lake Superior and Ishpeming Railroad Company for the right by the City to construct and maintain an electric transmission line over and across the railroad company's right-of-way at a point about 150 feet east of the center line of Highway M-28 in the NW ¼ of the NW ¼ of Section 35, T 46 N R 23 W, at Dukes, Michigan, and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to execute such agreement in behalf of the City of Marquette.

Moved by Commissioner Raish, supported by Commissioner Harmon, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, the City of Marquette will need approximately 6½ cubic yards of concrete for miscellaneous city purposes, and

Moved by Commissioner York, supported by Commissioner Harmon, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

AUGUST 25, 1952

Regular meeting at the City Hall, August 25, 1952, 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present —Mayor Brumm, Commissioners Halverson, Harmon, Raish and York.

Moved by Commissioner Raish, supported by Commissioner Harmon and unanimously adopted that petition of nine property owners requesting the installation of boulevard lights in the 900 block Spruce Street be referred to the City Manager and Department of Light and Power for study and report.

Moved by Commissioner Harmon, supported by Commissioner York and unanimously adopted that petition of twenty-one property owners requesting that sidewalks be completed in front of the last three lots on East Park Street next to Pine Street, be referred to the City Manager for study and report.

Communications from the Marquette Lions Club, Rotary Club of Marquette and petitions of 138 non-residents and 1228 residents requesting that parking of vehicles be prohibited on the east side of Front Street from Washington to Main Street to provide wider traffic lanes in Front Street, were read. A communication from Mr. A. L. Huetter was read wherein he requested, that the parking of vehicles in this area be allowed so as not to penalize the businesses in that block. Moved by Commissioner Harmon, supported by Commissioner Raish and unanimously adopted that these communications and petitions be received for study by the Commission.

Moved by Commissioner Raish, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted that report of the City Manager relative to the purchase of a quantity of copper conductor from the Chase Brass and Copper Company for the sum of \$2,894.45 be approved and placed on file.

Moved by Commissioner York, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager, low bid of the Badger Meter Company in the sum of \$1,338.86 for a quantity of water meters be accepted.

The City Manager's report on insurance requirements for taxicabs in other Michigan cities was read. Moved by Commissioner York, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted that effective on and after September 1, 1952, the insurance protection provided by taxicab companies operating within the City of Marquette shall be in the following amounts for each taxicab operated: \$25,000.00 for injury to, or death of, one person and \$50,000 for injury to, or death of, more than one person resulting from a single accident and \$10,000.00 for damage to property (including personal belongings or baggage of passengers) as a result of one accident.

Moved by Commissioner York, supported by Commissioner Raish and unanimously adopted that request of the Blackstone Taxi Company and Belmore Taxi Company for approval of increased rates schedule, filed with this commission on July 14, 1952, be granted effective September 1, 1952.

A report from the City Manager submitting schedules of industrial wage rates now in effect in Marquette and municipal wage rates in effect throughout the Upper Peninsula, as well as electric utility wage rates prevailing in this area, was read. Moved by Commissioner York, supported by Commissioner Raish and unanimously adopted that the report be received for study by the commission for a period of at least two weeks before action is taken upon the request of the city employes for a wage increase previously filed with the commission.

VanEyck of the firm of Drury, McNamee and Porter, relative to the awarding of the work for the Walnut Street diversion chamber and appurtenances, be placed on file pending receipt of new quotations from the contractors for this work.

Bids solicited for one pipe trailer for the Water Department were opened. Only one company bid on the equipment. Moved by Commissioner Raish, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted that the bid be tabled pending further study by the City Manager on the possibility of obtaining more bids on this item.

Moved by Commissioner Raish, supported by Commissioner Harmon and unanimously adopted that bids received for the installation of a replacement boiler at the Veterans' Building, be referred to the City Manager for study and report.

Moved by Commissioner Raish, supported by Commissioner Harmon that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, the lack of a sidewalk on the north side of College Avenue between Eighth Street and Lincoln Avenue presents a hazard to pedestrians using that portion of College Avenue,

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED, That, to abate said hazard, owners of lots fronting on said portion of College Avenue forthwith cause a sidewalk to be constructed in front of their respective lots, said sidewalk to be built in accordance with specifications now on file in the office of the Department of Public Works regulating the construction of sidewalks in the City of Marquette.
