JANUARY 4, 1954

A special meeting of the City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall, January 4, 1954 at 7:00 o'clock p. m. for the purpose of meeting with a committee of Marquette Lodge No. 405, B.P.O. Elks, to discuss their application to sponsor a carnival within the City the week of July 5th to 11th, 1954.

Present — Mayor York, Commissioners Brumm, Halverson, Raish, and Tuominen.

Application of the B.P.O. Elks for permission to sponsor shows of the Amusement Company of America in Marquette during the week of July 5 to 11, 1954 was read. Communications from the Marquette Ministerial Association, The United Church Women of Marquette, the Woman's Christian Temperance Union and the Retail Merchants Division of the Chamber of Commerce opposing the granting of permission to sponsor these shows in the city were read. Moved by Commissioner Tuominen, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted that the meeting be opened to public discussion on the matter

before the Commission and a general discussion was held. It was then moved by Commissioner Brumm, supported by Commissioner Raish and adopted that the Marquette Lodge No. 405, B.P.O. Elks be granted permission to sponsor shows of the Amusement Company of America in the City of Marquette during the week of July 5 to 11, 1954; that the license fee requirement be waived; that the Amusement Company of America be required to file with the City of Marquette evidence of insurance by way of proper certificate, showing that they carry bodily injury liability coverage with limits of not less than \$25,000 per person and \$50,000 per accident, and property damage insurance to the extent of at least \$5,000 and that a deposit of \$50.00 be made to guarantee proper clean-up of grounds.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

JANUARY 11, 1954

Regular meeting at the City Hall, January 11, 1954, 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present — Mayor York, Commissioners Halverson, Raish and Tuominen.

Moved by Commissioner Tuominen, supported by Commissioner Raish and unanimously adopted that report of the City Manager on the request of the Employees Committee for changes in the Employment Code, be accepted and placed on file.

Request of Michael DeFant, Attorney, to address the Commission in behalf of Local 643, Fire Fighters Association, which is made up of employees of the Marquette Fire Department, to present views for a reduction in the weekly work schedule was read. Mayor York then read the section of the Employment Code which provides that an employees organization may designate an agent to express their views on matters pertaining to their employment. Mayor York then allowed Mr. DeFant fifteen minutes to address the Commission and Mr. DeFant so addressed the Commission.

Moved by Commissioner Tuominen, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted that easements for highway and parking purposes on the south and west sides of the Northwest Public School, tendered by the Public Schools on the City of Marquette, be accepted.

Moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Raish that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, The citizens of Marquette are entitled to the best possible service commensurate with the budgeted sum in excess of \$78,000.00 set up for police protection,

BE IT RESOLVED, That the City Manager be advised and authorized to require the setting up of a training program, based upon materials to be prepared under the Direction of the Chief of Police and

his Administrative Assistants, as follows:

1. A complete training schedule for beginning police officers, covering in detail the development of the abilities to meet the general law enforcement responsibilities they will meet as employees of the Police Department, including the use of firearms.

2. A complete specialized training schedule for beginning and permanent police officers dealing with the techniques and procedures to be followed in the cases of offenders under 21 years of age, both in the juvenile age-group and in the age-group between the juvenile and adult over 21 years of age.

3. A complete set of Police Department Regulations covering the conduct of officers, on and off duty, the responsibility of the officer in the care and handling of city-owned property, the degree of proficiency required in the use of firearms by officers so armed, and any and all other regulations necessary to the proper administration of the Police Department.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the above described training schedules and regulations be prepared in mimeographed or other duplicated loose-leaf form, and that all police officers be furnished copies of the same as rapidly as they are prepared as a training and in-service aid, together with a notebook cover to hold same, the above materials to remain the property of the City and be loaned to each officer while he is in the employ of the Police Department; further, the training schedules and regulations described in suggested form above will be furnished as rapidly as they become available to the City Manager and Members of the Marquette City Commission, the final date for the completion of all materials above being set as ninety (90) days after the approval date of this Resolution.

Regular meeting at the City Hall, January 25, 1954, 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present — Mayor York, Commissioners Brumm, Halverson, Raish and Tuominen.

Communication from Michael F. DeFant, Attorney, in behalf of Local 643, Fire Fighters Association was read, wherein he requested the Commission to act publicly at this meeting on the request of the members of the Marquette Fire Department for a reduction in the weekly work schedule. It was then moved by Commissioner Tuominen that the communication be tabled. The motion was declared lost for lack of support. It was then moved by Commissioner Brumm that the request for reduction of the weekly work schedule be denied until consideration of the matter may be had during the preparation of the next fiscal year's budget. The motion was declared lost for lack of support. It was then moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Raish and unanimously adopted that the matter of work hours for members of the Fire Department be referred to the City Manager for study, report and consideration during the preparation of the next fiscal year's budget.

Moved by Commissioner Raish, supported by Commissioner Tuominen that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

Moved by Commissioner Tuominen, supported by Commissioner Halverson that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, on application of the Upper Peninsula Power Company, this Commission adopted a franchise ordinance at its meeting on December 28, 1953, granting to the Upper Peninsula Power Company a franchise and license to furnish electrical energy to the Munising Wood Products Company, the Cliffs Dow Chemical Company and the Lake Superior & Ishpeming Railroad Company, which franchise ordinance was to be referred to a vote of the people prior to the taking effect thereof, and,

WHEREAS, because of certain legal technicalities said the Upper Peninsula Power Company has requested that said franchise ordinance of December 28, 1953 be revoked and that a new ordinance, which they have filed with this Commission, be adopted and referred to the electorate,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the franchise ordinance adopted by this Commission at its meeting on December 28, 1953 granting to the Upper Peninsula Power Company the right to furnish electrical energy to the Munising Wood Products Company, the Cliffs Dow Chemical Company and the Lake Superior and Ishpeming Railroad Company be and the same is hereby revoked and annulled.

Commissioner Halverson introduced an ordinance entitled as follows: "An ordinance granting to the Upper Peninsula Power Company, a Michigan corporation, of Houghton, Michigan, its successors and assigns, a franchise and a li-

cense to do business within the City of Marquette, Marquette County, Michigan, including the right, privilege, permission, consent and authority to erect, construct, operate, maintain, and own generating and power lines, poles, towers, wires, cables, conduits, equipment, appliances and other apparatus for use in generating, transmitting, converting, supplying and delivering electric energy in, on, along and across the streets, highways, alleys, bridges and other public places within the said City, and to supply and deliver such electric energy for the purposes of lighting, heating and furnishing power to persons, firms and public and private corporations, and to exercise the right to transact a local business in said City; provided, however, that the only persons, firms and corporations to whom electric energy may be delivered within the boundaries of the City of Marquette shall be the Munising Wood Products Company, the Cliffs Dow Chemical Company and the Lake Superior and Ishpeming Railroad Company." FEBRUARY 8, 1954

Regular meeting at the City Hall, February 8, 1954, 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present, Mayor York, Commissioners Brumm, Halverson, Raish and Tuominen.

Moved by Commissioner Raish, supported by Commissioner Tuominen and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the City Assessor be authorized to contact property owners for consent to assessment for the construction of an 8 inch sanitary sewer in Park Street between Pine and High Streets and in High Street between Park and Crescent Streets.

Communication from Ernest Hoppe was read wherein he stated that he was dissatisfied with the outcome of his appeal on recent demotion from heavy equipment operator to light equipment operator in the Public Works Department on January 5, 1954. Members of the Commission indicated orally that Mr. Hoppe should be granted permission to address the Commission and he so addressed the Commission. William Monroe, Superintendent of Public Works, was then asked to address the Commission on his views in this matter and he so addressed the Commission. It was then moved by Commissioner Brumm that the decision of the City Manager concurring in the action taken by the Superintendent of Public Works be followed in this case. The motion was declared lost for lack of support. Moved by Commissioner Tuominen that Mr. Hoppe be paid for wages lost for that period of time for which he was penalized. The motion was declared lost for lack of support. Commissioner Halverson moved that Mr. Hoppe be reimbursed for one half of the wages lost because of the demotion, that upon statement by Mr. Hoppe that such offer was not acceptable, the motion was withdrawn. Mr. Hoppe then requested that permission be granted to Mr. Charles J. Wilderspin, Business Representative of the Michigan

Council of County and Municipal Employees, to address the Commission in his behalf and this permission was denied for lack of written request to so address the Commission. Commissioner Tuominen moved that the rules be suspended in this instance and that Mr. Wilderspin be granted permission to be heard. The motion was declared lost for lack of support. Moved by Commissioner Brumm, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted that the matter be tabled for a period of not to exceed thirty days to allow the Commission time for further consideration.

Moved by Commissioner Raish, supported by Commissioner Tuominen and unanimously adopted that because of the holiday on February 22, 1954, the next regular meeting of this Commission be set for February 25, 1954 at 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Moved by Commissioner Tuominen, supported by Commissioner Brumm and unanimously adopted that bids received for the razing of two city owned dwellings on Spring Street be referred to the City Manager for study and report.

Moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Raish and unanimously adopted that bids received on a gasoline powered bituminous paver be referred to the City Manager for study and report.

Moved by Commissioner Brumm, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted that the City Manager and Superintendent of Public Works submit report to the Commission on the expected future need for a bituminous paver and that the report be submitted together with the report of bids received for this equipment.

Regular meeting at the City Hall, February 25, 1954, 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present — Mayor York, Commissioners Halverson, Raish and Tuominen.

Moved by Commissioner Tuominen, supported by Commissioner Raish and unanimously adopted that petition of property owners for the installation of sidewalks on Albert Street between Pine and Spruce Streets where they do not now exist be referred to the City Manager for study and report.

Moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Tuominen and unanimously adopted that communication from the Marquette Tourist Association submitting recommendations on the erection of informational signs at the entrances to the city be referred to the City Manager for study and report.

The City Manager's report relative to the bids previously taken for the razing of two city owned dwellings on Spring Street was read. Two bids had been received; one for \$850.00 and the low bid from Elmer Dagenais for the sum of \$2.00. The low bidder, however, did not offer insurance coverage as required in the specifications for bids. Moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Tuominen and unanimously adopted that the bid be awarded Mr. Dagenais if he is able to comply with the insurance coverage requirement within 5 days and if not that the city advertise for new bids.

Moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Tuominen and unanimously adopted that the recommendation of the Planning Board for approval of Rintala's Subdivision No. 1, be referred to the City Attorney for study in relation to the requirements of the Ordinance of the City of Marquette relative to the Subdivision of Land.

Moved by Commissioner Raish, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted

that upon recommendation of the Planning Board, preliminary plat of Kildahl's Subdivision No. 2 be approved.

Moved by Commissioner Raish, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted that the City of Marquette enter into an agreement with the Lake Superior and Ishpeming Railroad Company for the use by the city of a portion of the railroad company's warehouse building at the corner of Lake and Washington Streets for recreational purposes and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to execute said agreement in behalf of the City of Marquette.

A public hearing was then held upon the adoption of an Ordinance of the City of Marquette, more particularly described in the following resolution. It was then moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Tuominen that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted.

WHEREAS, the Upper Peninsula Power Company of Houghton, Michigan, on the 25th day of January, 1954, filed with this Commission an ordinance entitled as follows:

"An Ordinance granting to the Upper Peninsula Power Company, a Michigan Corporation of Houghton, Michigan, its successors and assigns, a franchise and a license to do business within the City of Marquette, Marquette County, Michigan, including the right, privilege, permission, consent and authority to erect, construct, operate, maintain and own generating and power lines, poles, towers, wires, cables, conduits, equipment, appliances and other apparatus for use in generating, transmitting, converting, supplying and delivering electric energy in, on, along and across the streets, highways, alleys, bridges and other public places within the said City, and to supply and deliver such electric energy for the purposes of lighting, heating and furnishing power to persons, firms and public and pri-

vate corporations, and to exercise the right to transact a local business in said City; provided, however, that the only persons, firms and corporations to whom electric energy may be delivered within the boundaries of the City of Marquette shall be the Munising Wood Products Company, the Cliffs Dow Chemical Company and the Lake Superior and Ishpeming Railroad Company" and,

WHEREAS, Such ordinance was duly received and placed on file, and, by motion duly made, seconded and carried, it was determined that a public hearing thereon be held on the 25th day of February, 1954, in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of the City of Marquette and the statutes of the State of Michigan in that respect, and due notice of said public hearing was given by publication of such notice in The Mining Journal, a public newspaper printed, published, and circulated in the said City of Marquette, on the 29th day of January and the 5th day of February, 1954; and

WHEREAS, Such public hearing was held at the City Hall on the 25th day of February, 1954 at 7 o'clock P. M., Eastern Standard Time, in accordance with said resolution and said notice, which was more than thirty (30) days after the application had been filed, and no person in attendance offered any objection or suggestion in connection with the adoption of the ordinance or its referral to the electorate.

It was moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Tuominen, that the ordinance aforementioned be approved by the said Commission for referral to the electorate and that the vote thereon be held on the 5th day of April, 1954, and that notice thereof be given on the same dates and in the same manner as notice of the general election which shall be held on the same date; that the persons entitled to vote thereon shall have the same qualifications as those who shall be duly qualified to vote at said general election, and that they cast their votes at the same polling places respectively as they cast their general bal-

lots; and that poll books be kept, the ballots counted, and the return of the vote be made by the election officials who shall officiate at said general election in the same manner as with reference to the general election ballots which shall be cast at said general election.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a suitable paragraph be inserted in the City Code for the City Manager and also to provide for vacation time and sick leave benefits on the same basis as is now provided for department heads and executive aides.

Commissioner Halverson introduced an ordinance entitled: "An Ordinance to Limit and Control the Placing of Snow, Ice, or other Material in the Streets of the City of Marquette."

1. No person, firm, corporation or occupant shall take or remove, or cause to be taken or removed, any snow, ice or other material from any property owned, occupied or controlled by him and pile or dump same within the lines of any street of the City of Marquette except as herein provided.

2. Any such person, firm, corporation or occupant may take and remove snow or ice from a driveway twelve (12) feet or less in width on such property and pile same in a public street, but only along, parallel with and as a part of the bank of snow formed by the City of Marquette in its snow plowing operations. Such snow or ice shall be piled on the bank immediately in front of and adjacent to the property so owned or occupied and in no event shall the snow or ice so placed extend more than two feet (2') further into the roadway than the existing bank.

3. No person, firm or corporation or occupant shall take or remove, or cause to be removed, any snow, ice or other material from any public walk or from the banks of snow formed by the City of Marquette in its plowing operations and pile or dump same within the street right-of-way in such manner as to reduce the width between the banks of snow formed by the City of Marquette in its plowing

operations by more than two feet (2'). When owners or occupants require large areas to be cleared adjacent to their properties and do not desire to wait until normal plowing or removal operations are carried out such owner or occupant shall carry out the necessary removal operations at their own expense.

4. Snow, ice or other material moved, piled, or dumped in violation of this ordinance may be moved by the city and the expense of such removal charge to the party found in violation of the ordinance.

5. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction be fined not less than \$5.00 or more than \$50.00 together with the costs of prosecution or by imprisonment in the county jail of Marquette County, for a term of not more than 10 (ten) days.

Moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Raish, and unanimously adopted that action on this ordinance be had at the next meeting of this Commission to be held at the City Hall on Monday, April 12, 1954 at 7:00 o'clock P. M. Eastern Standard Time.

Present—Mayor Brumm, Commissioners Alholm, Halverson, Hammerschmidt, and Tuominen.

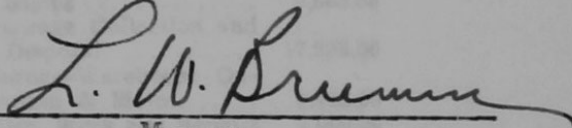
Moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, and unanimously adopted that the tentative budget include a wage and working hour adjustment as follows: All hourly paid personnel be granted a 3c per hour increase, and all monthly salaried personnel be granted an equivalent increase except the Police and Fire Departments and that

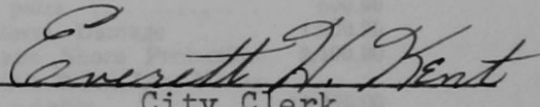
a 2% increase be granted all administrative personnel and Department Heads. The Police Department having received a wage adjustment in October of 1953 are not to be re-adjusted at this time. The Fire Department will go from a 73 to a 70 hour work week, in lieu of a wage adjustment and that the hiring of two additional firemen be authorized.

Moved by Commissioner Tuominen, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted that the request of Leo Roberts for a SDM license be granted.
