Regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission held at the City Hall, January 10, 1955 at 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present — Mayor Brumm, Commissioners: Alholm, Halverson, Hammerschmidt and Tuominen.

Moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Tuominen and unanimously adopted that the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting be omitted.

Moved by Commissioner Tuominen, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted that the request made to the Liquor Control Commission for transfer of ownership of '54 SDM license with Living Quarters Permit to Agnes V. Tousignant from Theodore Dagenais, 500 West Baraga Avenue, Marquette, Michigan, be granted.

Moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Tuominen and unanimously adopted that the request made to the Liquor Control Commission by George Rouman, to transfer location of '54 Tavern-SDM licenses from 629 N. Third Street to the southeast corner of North Third Street and Prospect Street, Marquette, Michigan, be granted.

Moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager the bid of Fuel Oil Terminals, Incorporated of Chicago at 9½¢ per gallon for 500,000 gallons of diesel fuel oil, be accepted.

JANUARY 31, 1955

Regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission held at the City Hall, January 31, 1955 at 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present — Mayor Brumm, Commissioners: Alholm, Halverson, Hammerschmidt and Tuominen.

Moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted that the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting be omitted.

Moved by Commissioner Tuominen, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted that the petition of eight residents on Chamberlain Street for sanitary sewer, grading, curbing and paving of Chamberlain Street from Fourth Street west to the west line of the Cleveland Iron Mining Company replat of the Cleveland Iron Mining Company Subdivision, be referred to the City Manager for study and report.

Moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted that the petition of one-hundred, twenty-six residents of North Marquette for the leveling and paving of Presque Isle Avenue between Wright and Hawley Streets and for sidewalk repair between Wright and Union Streets, be referred to the City Manager for estimate of cost and recommendation, to be considered in the forthcoming budget.

Moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted that the petition signed by twenty-four firemen for an increase in the wage scale of the Fire Department be referred to the City Manager for study and report.

Moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted that the petition of the Employees Committee for various changes in the Employment Code be referred to the City Manager for study and report.

A communication from City Manager, J. A. Clulo, was read wherein the Annual Municipal Report was submitted, and it was then moved by Commissioner Hammer-

schmidt, supported by Commissioner Tuominen and unanimously adopted that the Annual Municipal Report be accepted and placed on file.

Moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Tuominen and unanimously adopted that the request made to the Liquor Control Commission by Olie E. Oberg, 131 East Michigan Street to drop Donald E. Mellin as partner on '54 SDM license be granted.

Moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted that the report of the City Manager and the recommendation of the Planning Board with regard to the rezoning of the Armory Area, be tabled for further study by the Commission.

A report by the City Manager and an opinion of the City Attorney as requested by the Commission at a meeting held November 29, 1954 was read, setting forth specific powers and the procedure to be followed by the Commission in the event that a decision is made to transfer city held property to the School Board for the proposed East Side Elementary School. Present—Mayor - Pro - Tem Alholm, Halverson, Hammerschmidt and Tuominen. Mr. Paul B. Brown of Harley, Ellington and Day, Detroit architects engaged for Palestra renovation plans, J. A. Clulo, City Manager, W. D. Monroe, City Engineer, L. McKie, Superintendent of Parks and M. Gingrass, Recreation Director.

Moved by Commissioner Hammer-

schmidt, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted that Harley, Ellington and Day be authorized to prepare basic plans, specifications and estimates on plan number four for Palestra renovation submitted by Mr. Brown and incorporating in the basic plans changes and suggestions offered by City Commissioners and others present keeping in mind that the Palestra is to be developed for all season community use and that the plans are to be submitted to the commission at the earliest date possible.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

FEBRUARY 14, 1955

Regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission held at the City Hall, February 14, 1955 at 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present — Mayor Brumm, Commissioners Alholm, Halverson, Hammerschmidt and Tuominen.

Moved by Commissioner Tuominen, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted that the reading of the minutes of the previous regular meeting be omitted.

Mayor Brumm requested that the minutes of the special meeting held February 1, 1955 be read.

A discussion was held concerning the basic plan and the amount of the contemplated bond issue in connection with the renovation of the Palestra building and site. It was then moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt that this matter be placed on a ballot of the forthcoming election to be held April 4, 1955 and that the amount to be voted upon not to exceed \$500,000.00.

It was then moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone, attorneys of Detroit, Michigan, be authorized to prepare the necessary ordinances and legal documents for a general obligation bond issue to cover the estimated cost of renovation and reconstruction of the Palestra building and site in the maximum amount of \$500,000.00 to be adjusted as to amount at such time as construction bids are received, if such adjustment is necessary and further, that Harley, Ellington and Day, Inc., Architects and Engineers of Detroit, Michigan, be authorized to initiate the steps required for the taking of bids on the proposed construction plan No. 4 at the earliest date possible.

On motion of Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted that the City of Marquette engage the firm of Matthew W. Carey, Financial Consultant to prepare prospectus in connection with the anticipated general obligation bond issue for the renovation and reconstruction of the Palestra build-

ing and site in accordance with proposal set forth in Mr. Carey's letter of February 3, 1955 and that the Major and City Clerk be authorized to sign the necessary agreement in behalf of the City of Marquette.

A communication from Herman E. Olson, President of the Board of Education was read wherein a request was made for a Quit-Claim Deed to property now owned by the City of Marquette. Moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted that the City Manager contact Mr. Olson and arrange a joint meeting of the School Board and the City Commission for a more thorough discussion of this matter.

A communication from the City Clerk bearing the approval of the City Manager, J. A. Clulo, was read wherein it was recommended that the rates of pay to the election board workers be increased. It was then moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted that the compensation for election inspectors and clerks be as follows: \$10.00 for not less than 13 hours service; \$10.00 for members of election counting boards and \$15.00 for service on both day board and counting board.

A communication from Philip B. Spear, Secretary of the Shiras Institute was read wherein he submitted the annual report of the Shiras Institute for the year ending 1954. Moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Tuominen and unanimously adopted that this report be received and placed on file.

A report from City Manager, J. A. Clulo, was read wherein he recommended that the paving of Kaye Avenue between Pine and Russell Streets be included in the next fiscal year budget as requested by the petitioners in their petition of September 27, 1954. Moved by Commissioner Tuominen, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager the paving of Kaye Avenue between Pine and Russell Streets be placed on the next fiscal budget.

Official Proceedings of the City Commission —Continued

Moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Tuominen that the following resolution be and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, State Trunkline Highway US-41 on Washington Street in the City of Marquette is in need of improvement between the West line of Third Street and the East line of Front Street in order to serve traffic in a safe and expeditious manner and to reduce maintenance costs, such improvement to consist in surfacing with 8" reinforced concrete, and

WHEREAS, The city is to participate in the cost of such improvement in accordance with the provisions of Michigan Law (see Compiled Laws, 1948, Sections 250.31 to 250.41 and Act 53 of 1951).

NOW, THEREFORE, Be it resolved,

(1) That the City hereby requests the State Highway Commissioner to proceed with such improvements.

(2) That the City's share of the estimated cost of such improvement be paid to the State Highway Commissioner for deposit with the State Treasurer, for credit to the State Trunkline Fund when the improvement is placed under contract, or at such other time as may be agreed upon by the City and the State Highway Commissioner, from Weight and Gasoline Tax Funds made available to the City by Acts 51, 54, 55, Public Acts of 1951; or from other funds provided by the City; and that if the City fails to make payment of its share of the cost when due, the City hereby authorized the Auditor General to withhold a sufficient amount from funds becoming available to the City from the Acts named above to cover the City's indebtedness to the State Highway Commissioner and the City expressly consents to such withholding. Withholding shall begin with the first distribution after the indebtedness becomes delinquent and shall continue from succeeding distributions until the indebtedness is paid in full.

(3) That upon determination of the actual cost of the improvement any adjustment necessary to reconcile the estimated cost with actual cost will be made.

(4) That upon completion of the improvement, parallel parking, in accordance with State Statutes,

will be put into effect and thereafter enforced by the City.

(5) That as much of the Street surface, now or in the future, as is necessary for safe and efficient movement of rolling traffic, when so determined by the State Highway Commissioner will be made available for said purpose.

(6) That the City will cause all curb business stands to be removed prior to advertisement for bids; and will not permit the establishment of any curb stands in the future.

Mayor Brumm then announced his appointment of Henry J. Bothwell, Henning R. Anderson and Floyd J. Bowden to the Planning Board, subject to confirmation by the Commission. Moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted that the appointments be confirmed.

Mayor Brumm then announced his appointment of Chester Kiltinen and Thomas Swenor to the Board of Review for a three year period, subject to confirmation by the Commission. Moved by Commissioner Tuominen, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted that the appointments be confirmed.

Moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of Mayor Brumm, City Manager, J. A. Clulo, be authorized to have the Charter Commission reconvene to consider changes in the Charter.

A report from City Manager, J. A. WHEREAS, The City Commission of the City of Marquette has been informed that legislation is being considered in the Michigan State Legislature which will regulate the working hours of certain departments in the cities of this State, and

WHEREAS, The City of Marquette is a municipality directly affected by the proposed legislation regulating certain affairs of the cities of the State which have up to the present been under the control of local governing bodies of the cities of the State, and

WHEREAS, The City of Marquette operates under a Charter adopted in accordance with the so-called Home Rule Act (Act No. 279, P.A. Mich. 1909) and the City Commission believes that the fixing of working hours of municipal employes is a matter for the regulation by local government and the City Commission believes that the control of such matters at the local level should be continued in the control of local government, and

WHEREAS, The City Commission of this City is of the opinion that such an act as that proposed is an unwarranted interference by the State Government in a matter of local government and that such legislation designed to regulate affairs at the local level is unwarranted.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this Commission go on record as being opposed to the passage of such proposed legislation, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Commission does support the right of all City employes and other citizens to seek improved conditions through their own municipal legislative bodies and without regulation by the State legislature.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Honorable G. Mennen Williams, Governor of the State of Michigan, to the Honorable Philip Rahoi, Senator of the 31st Senatorial District and to the Honorable Dominic Jacobetti, State

Representative from Marquette County.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

APRIL 28, 1955

A special meeting of the City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall April 28, 1955, at 4:00 p.m. o'clock.

Present — Mayor Alholm, Commissioners Bur Halverson, Hammerschmidt and City Manager J. A. Clulo.

Absent—Commissioner Clark.

A communication from the Armory Board was read wherein the use of the Armory for purposes other than military were listed. It was then moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Bur that the following resolution with regard to the Armory as submitted at the April 25, 1955 meeting be and the same is hereby unanimously adopted.

WHEREAS, the resolution of the City Commission, City of Marquette, Michigan adopted 17 May 1954 and the motion of the Military Board, State of Michigan, adopted 19 May 1954 constitute the offer and acceptance of a contribution toward the construction of the Marquette Armory under the provisions of Section 32.66, Compiled laws of Michigan 1948, and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the above actions the State of Michigan has caused plans and specifications to be prepared for said Marquette Armory by Harley, Ellington & Day, Inc., Architects, and is prepared to solicit bids for the construction of the armory.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED as follows:

I. The plans and specifications for the construction of the Marquette Armory, as prepared by Harley, Ellington & Day, Inc., are hereby approved for The City of Marquette as noted thereon.

II. There is herewith delivered to the Quartermaster General of Michigan the sum of \$35,000 (Thirty-five Thousand Dollars) to assist in defraying the cost of constructing and furnishing said armory. The terms of this contribution are such that should the bids received exceed the sums available and prevent the awards of contracts, then this contribution shall be returned to the City of Marquette or otherwise held as directed by the City until awards of contracts

can be made. If the bids are such that contracts for the armory construction may be awarded, then this sum shall be deposited to the credit of the Marquette Armory construction account.

III. The plans and specifications prepared by Harley, Ellington & Day, Inc., Architects, for said Marquette Armory for the extension of utility services to the building and site improvements are hereby approved for the City of Marquette as noted thereon.

IV. The further obligation of the City of Marquette to contribute money (estimated \$45,000) as provided in the above-mentioned offer and acceptance shall be fully discharged in the following manner:

1. By supply of the labor and materials necessary and construction of the following items according to the plans and specifications above-mentioned for utility extensions and site improvements:

a. Exterior Utilities.

(1) Sanitary Sewer

(2) Storm Sewer

(3) Electrical System

(4) Water Main

(5) Lighting Fixtures for Flood lights

b. Roads.

(1) Base Course

(2) Stone or Gravel Finish Course

(3) Wearing Course

(4) Curbs and Gutters

c. Parking Areas.

(1) Base Course

(2) Stone or Gravel Finish Course

(3) Wearing Course

(4) Curbs and Gutters

d. Sidewalks.

e. Lawns.

f. Plantings (as specified by the Armory Board of Control).

g. Flag pole (as specified by the Armory Board of Control).

2. The City of Marquette shall initiate construction of each portion of the above-mentioned work (items I a to g incl.) at such times and shall accomplish the same in such manner as will facilitate the construction of the main edifice and will complete all work except the application of the wearing surface (paving) to the roads and parking lot within 30

days after the completion of the main structure by the state and in the construction of said utility extensions and site improvements shall at all times be subject to the inspection by the representatives of the State of Michigan and shall co-ordinate the work with that of the contractors of the main edifice and upon the failure of the City of Marquette to so proceed with said construction the State of Michigan is hereby authorized to proceed at the expense of the City of Marquette.

3. The City of Marquette, Michigan shall complete the wearing course (paving) (items 1, b (3) and c (3) above within one year after completion of the main structure or upon the failure of the City to so do the State may proceed at the expense of the City.

4. The City of Marquette, Michigan shall hold the State of Michigan harmless from all liabilities which may arise by operation of

law out of the use of labor and supply of materials for the work herein agreed to be performed by the City of Marquette and shall assume full responsibility under the applicable laws for workmen's compensation, for the payment of mechanics and materialmen and for public liability or property damage.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, this Memorandum of Agreement constituting the contribution of the City of Marquette to the construction of the Marquette Armory is signed and accepted this 28th day of April, 1955.

The Commission then proceeded to review the proposed budget for the Finance Division, the Division of Assessments, Division of Treasury, the Police Department and the Fire Department.
