

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

JANUARY 9, 1956

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall, Monday, January 9, 1956, at 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present: Mayor Alholm, Commissioners Bur, Clark, Halverson and Hammerschmidt.

A communication from Mrs. Harlow A. Clark and family was read wherein the Commission was thanked for the resolution sent their family at their late bereavement. Moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that this communication be received and placed on file.

A communication from Dorothy Inch, Secretary of Bishop Baraga Parent - Sisters Club was read wherein she states that that Club has adopted a resolution in favor of a curfew law for the City of Marquette. After a short discussion, it was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted, that this communication be received and placed on file.

A communication from Elvin J. Olds, Proprietor of Shoreland Bowling Alleys, and Everett Senobe, Secretary, Marquette City Bowling Association, was read wherein it was asked that consideration be given the problems of these organizations if a curfew law were put into effect in the City of Marquette. Following a lengthy discussion, it was moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that this communication be received and placed on file.

A communication from George E. Bishop, Secretary-Manager of the U. P. Development Bureau, was read wherein he requested \$500.00 for color advertisements in the 1956 Lure Book from the City of Marquette. It was then moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Clark and unanimously adopted, that this communication be received and placed on file to be given consideration until such time as the budget meetings for the coming year are held.

Moved by Commissioner Clark,

supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of City Manager, George T. Meholick, Jr., the low bid of the Soo Hardware Company with a total discount of 39% for the 1956 annual supply of lamps for the City of Marquette be accepted.

Moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that the City of Marquette enter into an agreement with Leo F. Gannon for the leasing of certain City owned property now occupied by Mr. Gannon to be used by him for a saw mill site, and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign said agreement in behalf of the City of Marquette.

Mayor Alholm then announced his appointment of Mr. Charles Erickson to a three year term to serve on the Board of Review subject to confirmation by the Commission. It was then moved by Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted, that the appointment of Charles Erickson, 355 Harrison Street, Marquette, Michigan, to a three year term on the Board of Review be confirmed.

Mayor Alholm announced that the reason for this meeting was to receive and place on file the report of the Upper Peninsula Power Company. City Manager, George T. Meholic, Jr., then read a letter of transmittal from the Upper Peninsula Power Company, wherein it was stated that eight copies of the report were enclosed for study by the officials of the City. Following the reading of the letter of transmittal, Mr. Meholic then stated that through telephone conversation with authorities of the Upper Peninsula Power Company, they would like to meet with the Commission to discuss the details

of the foregoing report.

It was then moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Clark and unanimously adopted that the report of Stone & Webster Service Corporation, submitted in behalf of the Upper Peninsula Power Company be accepted, and referred to the City Commission, the City Manager, and the Superintendent of the Light and Power Department, for study until the meeting to be held Thursday, January 26, 1956, at 7:00 o'clock p. m. at which time this matter will be discussed with the representatives of the Upper Peninsula Power Company.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

JANUARY 30, 1956

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall, Monday, January 30, 1956 at 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present: Mayor Alholm, Commissioners Bur, Clark, Halverson, and Hammerschmidt.

The Clerk announced that item one on the agenda would be a report on analysis of power supply problem for the City of Marquette.

Mayor Alholm then introduced Mr. J. H. Warden, President of the Upper Peninsula Power Company and asked if he cared to address the Commission with regard to the power situation for the City of Marquette.

Following Mr. Warden's address, City Manager, George T. Meholick, Jr., asked Mr. Warden for clarifications of questions that had arisen following the receipt of a telegram from him to the City of Marquette.

After several technical questions were discussed, Mr. Meholick then proceed with an analytical report prepared by Mr. Mosher, Superintendent of the Light and Power Department, and himself, both being registered engineers.

After presenting and discussing all phases of the power deficiency problem, it was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted, that the City Commission act in accordance with the recommendations of Vogt, Ivers, Seamen and Associates, Engineers and Architects to acquire two (2) 3640 KW and one (1) 2550 KW diesel generating units for use in the Light and Power Department.

Mayor Alholm then commended City Manager, George T. Meholick, Jr., and Mr. Claude L. Mosher, Superintendent of the Light and Power Department, on their efforts and report as presented to the Commission.

Mayor Alholm also thanked Mr. Warden and the other officials of the Upper Peninsula Power Company for attending the meeting.

A petition signed by 11 residents in the 700 block on West Magnetic Street for the paving of that block was read. It was then moved by

Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Clark and unanimously adopted, that this petition be referred to the City Manager for study and report.

A petition signed by three citizens of Marquette requesting a franchise to operate a cab company in the City was read. It was then moved by Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that these three parties be granted a franchise provided they meet all of the requirements of the City Taxi Cab Ordinance.

A communication from Edward Bernard regarding a nominating petition filed in the office of the City Clerk was read. Following a short discussion, it was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted, that this matter be referred to the City Attorney for a legal opinion.

A communication from Mrs. Dorothy Inch, Secretary of the Bishop Baraga Parent-Sister Club was read wherein she stated that that organization had passed a resolution requesting the City Commission to take steps in acquiring a full-time health officer.

A communication from Mrs. Carl Martin containing a resolution adopted by the Council of the Marquette Parent-Teachers Association was also read with regard to filling the vacancy of a full time health officer for the City. It was then moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Clark and unanimously adopted, that the City Manager be authorized to draft a letter to Mrs. Dorothy Inch and Mrs. Carl Martin stating the City's position at the present time and what has been and is being done with regard to the hiring of a full-time health officer.

Mr. George T. Meholick, Jr. then stated that ads are being run in various medical journals trying to fill the existing vacancy.

A communication from Kenneth C. Case, Jr., Judge Advocate, Marine Corp League, was read wherein he requested permission for that organization to conduct orchid sales in down town Mar-

quette on Friday and Saturday, March 30 and 31, 1956. Following a short discussion, it was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that permission as requested be granted.

A communication from J. D. Mason, Chairman of the Christmas Lighting Contest Committee, was read wherein he thanked the Commission for their cooperation in taking part in conducting the Christmas Lighting Contest. Moved by Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that this communication be received and placed on file.

Moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Bur that the following resolution be and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

Favoring legislation for connecting channels of Great Lakes.

RESOLVED, That the St. Lawrence Seaway project is now under construction so that, when it is completed, large ocean going vessels will be able to move as far west as Toledo, Ohio. It will be of great benefit to the United States if it is made possible for these large ocean going vessels to reach Detroit and other cities on the Great Lakes.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the City of Marquette, Michigan, urge its senators and representatives in Congress to adopt legislation whereby connecting channels may be deepened and improved so that ocean going vessels will be able to reach ports and harbors in all of the Great Lakes.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be mailed by our City Clerk to our senators and representatives in Congress.

Moved by Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

FEBRUARY 13, 1956

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall, Monday, February 13, 1956, at 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present: Mayor Alholm, Commissioners Bur, Clark, Halverson and Hammerschmidt.

A petition from Earl H. Closser, President of the Shiras Hills Development Company, requesting an extension of the water mains in Shiras Hills Subdivision No. 1 was read. Moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Clark and unanimously adopted, that this petition be referred to the City Manager for study and report.

A petition signed by 56 residents and taxpayers in the City of Marquette, living in the vicinity of the Munising Wood Products Company, requesting that something be done about the damaging smoke and soot created by that Company was read. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted, that this petition be referred to the City Manager for study and report.

A communication from Warner E. Bartram, Secretary of the Wisconsin Park & Recreation Society, was read wherein he quoted the dates of the 1956 meeting of that organization. It was then moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that this communication be referred to the City Manager for action.

A report from George T. Meholick, Jr., City Manager, and Everett H. Kent, City Clerk, regarding the changes in the Election Law was read. It was then moved by Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that this report be received and placed on file for study.

A report from City Manager George T. Meholick, Jr. and Claude L. Mosher, Superintendent of Light and Power Department, with reference to the Supplementary Report presented by the Upper Peninsula Power Company on February 9, 1956, was given by Mr. Meholick.

Following this detailed report, Mayor Alholm stated that this Commission wishes to express their gratitude to Mr. Meholick and Mr. Mosher for the exceptionally fine work done by them in making up their reports on this power situation.

Commissioner Clark introduced the following motion supported by Commissioner Bur and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

After careful study of the facts and the weighing of advantages and disadvantages in this problem, I do not think that the Upper Peninsula Power Company has provided sufficient evidence to indicate that the City of Marquette would benefit more from purchasing power from them under the terms submitted than from expanding our municipally owned utility as described in action taken on January 30, 1956.

I do, however, appreciate greatly the Upper Peninsula Power Company's interest in our city and their part in our community.

I feel that this problem has been studied fully and an unbiased recommendation has been submitted by the City Manager and the Superintendent of the Light and Power. Many hours of toil over facts and figures on their part and on the part of the Mayor and City Commission have been spent and we, as a body, are fully qualified as business and professional men to pass judgment in this matter and are not swayed by personal desires, but have acted in the best interests of the city as a whole.

I therefore move that the action taken on January 30, 1956, be ratified and made firm.

A communication from William E. Dennison, Secretary-Treasurer of the Michigan State Association of Supervisors, was read wherein he notifies the City of their annual dues in that organization. Moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the dues for membership of the City in the Michigan State Association of Supervisors be paid.

Moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Clark that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

The City of Marquette hereby grants permission to the Upper Peninsula Power Company to render temporary electric service to the City for W. D. M. J. Television Company at their Mount Mesnard relay station in Marquette, Michigan.

The purpose of this temporary electric service is to expedite television service to this area, due to a lack of understanding by the television company as to the electric service available at the Mount Mesnard location.

The duration of time covered by this temporary permit shall be until the City's electric service is available at the Mount Mesnard location, at which time the Company will be notified by the Marquette City Manager.

A communication from Mrs. M. J. Keranen of 991 W. College Avenue, was read wherein she commented on the accumulation of smoke and soot in that vicinity. This situation has been drawn to the attention of this commission at a previous meeting and referred to the City Manager for study and report. Commissioner Bur asked if the City Manager had a report on this situation at the present time. City Manager, George T. Meholick, Jr., then stated that pre-

liminary work and meetings had been held with various officials with regard to this situation and he stated that additional time be given for a more thorough City wide study of this condition. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted, that this communication from Mrs. M. J. Keranen be received and placed on file.

Commissioner Hammerschmidt offered the following resolution and moved its adoption:

WHEREAS, Section 13 (e) of Act 51, Public Acts of 1951 provides that each incorporated city and village to which funds are returned under the provisions of this section, that "the responsibility for all street improvement, maintenance and traffic operation work shall be coordinated by a single administrator to be designated by the governing body who shall be responsible for and shall represent the municipality in all transactions with the State Highway Commissioner pursuant to the provisions of this Act".

WHEREAS, The Michigan Legislature in regular session enacted Public Act No. 205, P. A. 1951, as amended by Act No. 39, P. A. 1955, to enable the State of Michigan or political subdivisions thereof to secure coverage for their employes under the Old Age and Survivors' Insurance provisions of Title II of the Social Security Act as amended, and

WHEREAS, An agreement has been entered into between the State of Michigan and Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare to extend the benefits of the federal Old Age and Survivors' Insurance system to employees of the state or of any political subdivision thereof.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED; That the governing body of the City of Marquette, Michigan, hereby elects coverage under the Old Age and Survivors' Insurance, as provided by Act No. 205, P. A. 1951, as amended by Act No. 39, P.A. 1955.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That George T. Meholick, Jr., City Manager, be, and he is hereby authorized and directed on behalf of the City of Marquette to enter into agreement with the department for the extension of the benefits under Title II of the Social Security Act subject to the provisions of Sec. 8 of Act No. 205, P. A. 1951, as amended by Act No. 39, P.A. 1955.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the proper fiscal officers be, and they are, hereby authorized to make all required payments into the Contribution Fund established by the said Enabling Act and to establish such system of payroll deductions from the salaries of employees and officers as may be necessary to their coverage under said Old Age and Survivors' Insurance System.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the proper officials of the state or of the political subdivision do all things necessary to the continued implementation of said system.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED,

That any funds payable to the City of Marquette from any department of the State of Michigan may be withheld by said department and transferred to the State Employees' Retirement Board to be used in the payment of any default on the part of said City of Marquette in accordance with paragraph V (c) of the contract between the State of Michigan and the City of Marquette.

The following positions are hereby designated as those which are to be excluded:

Fee Basis Positions.

For the purpose of carrying out the provisions of Title II, Sec. 218 of the Federal Social Security Act, and amendments thereof, the agreement entered into between the State of Michigan, with the approval of the Attorney General, and the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare is made a part of this Resolution and shall be termed as an agreement between this political subdivision and the Department, and shall become a part of the agreement or modification of the agreement between the State of Michigan and the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare. This Resolution shall be in full force and effect upon passage and approval, for all intents and purposes, except that active coverage shall begin on the 1st day of January, 1955.

A legal opinion by Acting City Attorney, George C. Quinnell, was read, wherein he cited similar and pertinent cases and decisions pertaining to political activities of city employees with particular regard to the 1955 Code Book for the city. Following the reading of this opinion, it was moved by Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Halverson, and unanimously adopted, that steps be taken to clarify this section of the City Code Book in accordance with the opinion of the Acting City Attorney.

A communication addressed to George T. Meholick, Jr., City Manager, from Matthew Carey of the firm of Kenower, MacArthur & Company was read wherein he submitted a schedule of fees for services as a financial advisor in the city's expansion of the generating capacity of the Electric Department. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Com-

A Communication from William Veaser, of the Upper Peninsula Power Company, was read wherein he acknowledged receipt of the temporary permit granting permission for that Company to render electric service to the WDMJ Television Company relay station in Marquette. It was then moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted, that this communication be received and placed on file.

A communication from James Pineno, campaign director for the 1956 March of Dimes, was read wherein he thanked the Commission for their co-operation in support of the campaign in the city of Marquette. It was then moved by Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that this communication be received and placed on file.

A report from City Manager, George T. Meholick, Jr., containing the tabulation of bids received for a quantity of fire hose, was read. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager and the Fire Chief, the low bid of Soo Hardware Company of Marquette, meeting all specifications, for 1500 ft. of 2½ in. double jacket fire hose in 50 ft. lengths at a cost of \$1.32 per ft., less 2% — 10 days, FOB Marquette, be accepted.

A report from City Manager, George T. Meholick, Jr., containing a tabulation of bids on eighteen (18) voting machines, was read. It was then moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the contract for these voting ma-

\$100,000.00 July 1st of each of the years 1957 and 1958;

\$125,000.00 July 1st of each of the years 1959 and 1960;

\$150,000.00 July 1st of each year from 1961 to 1964, both inclusive;

\$170,000.00 July 1st of each year from 1965 to 1969, both inclusive;

\$175,000.00 July 1st of each of the years 1970 to 1971.

Said bonds shall be coupon bonds, registrable as to principal only, of the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, numbered consecutively in the direct order of maturity from 1 to 2250, both inclusive, and shall bear interest from their date at a rate or rates not exceeding four (4%) per cent per annum, expressed in multiples of $\frac{1}{4}$ of 1%, said interest shall be

Bonds called for redemption in accordance with the foregoing provisions shall be redeemable at par and accrued interest plus a premium as follows:

\$30.00 on each bond called for redemption prior to July 1, 1968;

\$20.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after July 1, 1968, but prior to July 1, 1969;

extending, enlarging and improving the existing Electric Utility System of the City of Marquette.

Said bonds are not a general obligation of the City but are payable solely from the revenues of the Electric Utility System of the City, subject only to payment of expenses of administration, operation and maintenance and a statutory first lien thereon has been created.

For the purpose of awarding the bonds, the interest cost of each bid will be computed by determining, at the rate or rates specified therein, the total dollar value of all interest on the bonds from

to their maturity and deducting therefrom any premium. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder whose bid on the above computation produces the lowest interest cost to the City of Marquette.

A certified or cashier's check in the amount of \$45,000.00 drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of the Treasurer of the City of Marquette must accompany each bid as a guaranty of good faith on the part of the bidder, to be forfeited as liquidated damages if such bid is accepted and the bidder fails to take up and pay for the bonds. No interest shall be allowed on the good faith checks and checks of unsuccessful bidders will be promptly returned to each bidder's representative or by registered mail.

Bids shall be conditioned upon the unqualified opinion of Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone, attorneys of Detroit, Michigan, which opinion will be furnished without expense to the purchaser of the bonds prior to the delivery thereof, approving the legality of the bonds. The City shall furnish bonds ready for execution at its expense. Bonds will be delivered at Chicago, Illinois or New York, New York.

Additional bonds of equal standing with the bonds of this issue may be issued, but only for the purpose and on the terms and conditions expressed in the authorizing Ordinance.

The right is reserved to reject any and all bids.

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was held at the City Hall, April 9, 1956, at 7:00 o'clock p.m.

Present: Mayor Alholm, Commissioners Bur, Clark, Halverson, and Hammerschmidt.

The Commission proceeded to elect, by ballot, one of its members to serve as Mayor for the ensuing year. Commissioner Hammerschmidt received three (3) votes, Commissioner Halverson received two (2) votes. Whereupon, Commissioner Hammerschmidt was declared duly elected to the office of Mayor for the ensuing year and he assumed the chair and proceeded with the meeting.

The Commission then proceeded to elect, by ballot, one of its members to serve as Mayor Pro-Tem for the ensuing year. Commissioner Clark received three (3) votes, Commissioner Bur received one (1) vote, Commissioner Halverson received one (1) vote. Whereupon Commissioner Clark was declared elected to the office of Mayor Pro-Tem for the ensuing year.

Mayor Hammerschmidt appointed Commission members to audit the bills for the ensuing year as follows:

Public Affairs and the Accounts and Finance Department — Mayor Hammerschmidt.

Public Works — Commissioner Clark.

Police Department and the Parks and Recreation Department — Commissioner Halverson.

Light and Power Department — Commissioner Bur.

Water Department, Health Department, and Fire Department — Commissioner Alholm.

A communication from Max P. Allen, Chairman, Marquette City Board of Review, was read wherein he reported the activities of the meetings of that Board and recommended that certain sections of the Charter for the City of Marquette be considered for changes. It was then moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Clark and unanimously adopted, that this report be accepted and placed on file until

such time as a thorough study of the Charter can be made and these recommendations fitted to charter changes.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that the request of Thomas L. Swenor, 318 South Front Street, Marquette, Michigan, for a new SDM license in conjunction with a Class "C" license be granted.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Clark and unanimously adopted, that the bids on electrical equipment and switch gear for the Power Plant Expansion Program be referred to the City Manager, the Superintendent of the Light and Power Department, and Voegt, Ivers, Seaman, and Associate Engineers, for study and report to the Commission.

Moved by Mayor Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that the estimate of Brebner Machinery Co., Inc., in the sum of \$1,279.60 for a major repair and over-haul job on a D-6 caterpillar-tractor for the Public Works Department be accepted.

The 1955 Annual Report of the Shiras Institute was read and ordered placed on file.

A communication from Rev. Wilbur M. Gibbs, Chairman, Executive Committee, Marquette Council of Social Agencies, was read wherein he listed various reasons opposing a curfew for the City of Marquette. It was then moved by Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that this communication be received and placed on file.

It was then moved by Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that all appointments made by the City Commission to the Board of Supervisors be revoked and that the City Commission act as the five appointive supervisors for the City of Marquette. Mayor Hammerschmidt then directed the City Clerk to notify all appointive members to the Board of Supervisors of this change.

Mayor Hammerschmidt announced the purpose of this meeting was to receive the Tentative 1956-57 Budget as well as the revised Capital Out-Lay schedule for the same period.

A communication from George T. Meholick, Jr., City Manager, was read wherein he presented the 1956-57 Tentative Budget and cited the various sections of the City Charter covering this action. Also included in this communication was the revised schedule of capital out-lay expenditures for the next six fiscal year periods. It was then moved by Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that permission as requested be granted.

A prepared statement was read by Commissioner Halverson wherein he cited unfinished business to be brought before the Commission. It was then moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Bur and adopted, that the City Attorney be instructed to institute legal proceedings against the Cliffs Dow Chemical Company for the collection of their past due account in the sum of \$3,765.98 unless payment is made by April 26, 1956. Mayor Hammerschmidt requested that he be allowed to abstain voting whereupon Commissioner Halverson demanded that he vote, and since unanimous consent was not granted to abstain, in accordance with Paragraph C of Section 6.7 of the City Charter.

The Commission then proceeded to audit the tentative budget for the Water Supply and Sewage Disposal Plant and the Electric Utility Departments.

Moved by Commissioner Bur supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager and the Superintendent of the Light and Power Department, a quantity of approximately two hundred thousand gallons of light crude oil be purchased from the Fuel Oil Terminals, Inc. of Chicago, Illinois, at a cost of 8.9 cents per gallon to be used in the Light and Power Department.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, and the Superintendent of the Light and Power Department, the low quotation of Oneida Cedar & Lumber Company in the sum of \$3,400.00 for a quantity of light poles to be used in the Light and Power Department, be accepted.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Clark and unanimously adopted, that the

motion adopted by this Commission on April 18, 1956, placing an order for the switch gear from the General Electric Company for the diesel plant expansion program which was contingent upon the approval of the Bond Issue by the Municipal Finance Commission, now be made firm since approval by this body was had on April 24, 1956.

Meholick, Jr. was read wherein he recommended that the City of Marquette purchase two (2) 3640 KW diesel units from the Nordberg Manufacturing Company, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, their being low bidder meeting all basic specifications in the sum of \$953,463.00, with the further provisions that the engine purchases include 12,470 volt generators instead of 2,400 volt generators at a cost of \$33,770.00; one (1) set of spare coils at a cost of \$870.00 and transformers costing \$10,574.00; heat recovery units amounting to \$6,652.00 and minimum conversion parts for dual fuel operation amounting to \$9,060.00 and that a credit of \$8,000.00 be allowed to the City for changing the two (2) D. C. exciters from direct connected to V-belt drives. The total cost of this contract, with the additions as outlined above, total \$1,006,389.00. The form of contract has been approved by Acting City Attorney, George C. Quinnell and pursuant to adoption of Bond Ordinance No. 186 and approval of the Municipal Finance Commission on April 24, 1956, it was moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign said agreement dated April 26, 1956, in behalf of the City of Marquette.

It was then moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that this request be granted, and, in this instance, the five hundred dollar (\$500) fee as required by ordinance be waived, and that a fifty dollar (\$50) deposit be made to guarantee the proper cleaning of the area used by this Show after it has departed from the City, and that there be a rental agreement in the sum of one dollar (\$1.00) for the use of the proposed site.

A communication from John H. Huss, Director, Michigan Municipal League, was read wherein he notified the Commission that the City of Marquette has been chosen as the place where the Annual Upper Peninsula Meeting of the Michigan Municipal League will be held on June 21st and 22nd. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Clark and unanimously adopted, that this communication be received and placed on file.

A communication from Mrs. Veda Durocher, Secretary, Marquette County Humane Society, was read and ordered placed on file.

Moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the Planning Board, the request for the rezoning of an area now occupied by the E. J. Longyear Manufacturing Company, classified as "General Residence" be rezoned to a conforming use and made "Industrial District" and that a public

hearing on the change of zoning be held before the Commission on May 28, 1956, at 7:00 o'clock p.m., and that notice be given by publication in the Mining Journal, a daily newspaper published in the City, at least three (3) times during the fifteen (15) days next prior to said public hearing.

A public hearing was then held on a proposed ordinance to repeal an ordinance to amend an ordinance relative to the placement of accessory buildings on residential lots, which ordinance was introduced at the March 26, 1956 regular meeting of this Commission.
