JANUARY 14, 1957

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall, Monday, January 14, 1957 at 7:00 o'clock P. M.

Present: Mayor Hammerschmidt, Commissioners Alholm, Bur, Clark and Halverson.

Moved by Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting be omitted.

A petition signed by 74 citizens of the City of Marquette was read wherein it was petitioned that Spruce Street be established a through street from East Ridge Street to East College Avenue. This petition was referred to the City Manager for a study and report.

A communication from L. L. Perry, Vice President and General Manager, Michigan Gas and Electric Company, was read wherein he thanks the officials of the City of Marquette for the effort spent in conducting a special election granting that Company a franchise to operate in the City of Marquette. This communication was ordered placed on file.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that the request of John F. Martin, 120 South Front Street for permission to drop R. C. Zander from partnership on a 1956 SDD license be granted.

Moved by Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that the request from Joseph Borro to add James Borro as partner on a 1956 Class C—SDM license located at 317 South Front Street, Marquette, be granted.

A communication from Clyde Y. Cundy, Plant Manager, & Forester, Osmose Wood Preserving Company, was read wherein he states that his Company is in a position to supply treated wood for any construction job the City may be contemplating. This communi-

tion was ordered received and placed on file.

Moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Clark, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, The Charter of the City provides that this Commission may by resolution transfer annually not over fifty (50) per cent of the net income of the Light and Power Utility to the general fund of for City for budgeted Municipal purposes; and

WHEREAS, Such transfers must be based on the net income earned in the fiscal year immediately proceeding the transfer and must be made only after the completion of the audit of such year; and

WHEREAS, The budget adopted for the fiscal year 1956-57 contemplated such a transfer of funds for the final balance; and

WHEREAS, the annual audit report determines that the net income for the Light and Power Utility for the fiscal year 1955-56 was \$185,285.81;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED, That the sum of \$92,642.90 be transferred from the Light and Power fund to the general fund of the City.

A report from City Manager, George T. Meholick, Jr. including an agreement between the Upper Peninsula Power Company and the City of Marquette which provides for an extension of the wholesale purchase power contract for a period of three months at one month intervals was read. It was then moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Clark and unanimously adopted, that the City enter into an agreement with the Upper Peninsula Power Company for an extension of the wholesale purchase power agreement with that Company and that the Mayor and City Clerk be au-

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thorized to sign said agreement in behalf of the City.

A report from City Manager, George T. Meholick, Jr., was read wherein an agreement was attached for a snow dumping site to be utilized in place of the Lake Shore Engineering Dock dumping site. It was then moved by Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that the City enter into an agreement with the D.S.S. & A. Railroad Company for a parcel of land at the end of Baraga Avenue to be used for a snow dumping area and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign said agreement in behalf of the City of Marquette.

A communication from Steve Johnson, Chairman, Marquette City Planning Board, was read wherein that Board recommended the approval of the final plat plan of the Pinecrest Subdivision. It was then moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Clark and unanimously adopted, that this subdivision be accepted upon the posting of a performance bond by the subdivider to complete and gravel the streets in this subdivision.

JANUARY 28, 1957

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall, Monday, January 28, 1957 at 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present: Mayor Hammer-schmidt, Commissioners Alholm, Bur and Halverson.

Excused absence: Commissioner Clark.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting be omitted.

Moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Alholm, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, the people of the City of Marquette and the Officers and Employees of their City Government were profoundly shocked by the news of the untimely death of WILLIAM E. MILLER;

AND WHEREAS, WILLIAM E. MILLER has served the City of Marquette as its Auditor for the past fourteen years with a conscientious devotion to his duties that has left a record of achievement which will remain as an example of unusual consideration for the interests and welfare of the City of Marquette;

AND WHEREAS, he has served his community otherwise by giving freely of his time to the service of the people of his community through various organizations of which he was an active member;

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Mayor and City Commissioners of the City of Marquette, Michigan, do hereby recognize the outstanding record of accomplishment of WILLIAM E. MILLER, and convey to his family their sincere sympathy in this time of bereavement;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of these

resolutions be spread on the records of the City of Marquette, and that a copy under the City Seal be prepared and sent to his family.

A petition signed by 13 property owners in the 900 block on West College Ave. was read wherein the petitioners requested the installation of curbing in that block. It was then moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted, that this petition be referred to the City Manager for study and report.

A petition signed by 10 residents on Logan, Garfield and Cleveland Streets, requesting the installation of water mains on those streets, was read. It was then moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that this petition be referred to the City Manager for study and report.

Moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that the south 30 feet of lots 12, 13 and 14 in block 7 of Harlow's Addition No. 1 be rezoned from "Residential District" to "General Business and Neighborhood Shopping District" and that a public hearing on this change be held before the City Commission on February 25, 1957 at 7:00 o'clock p. m. and that notice be given by a publication in the Mining Journal, a daily newspaper published in this City, prior to said public hearing.

A communication from Warner H. Biekkola, President, Marquette Yacht, Dock and Harbor Association, was read and ordered received for study.

A communication from Frank P. Zeidler, Mayor, City of Milwaukee, was read and ordered placed on file.

A detailed report from City Manager, George T. Meholic, Jr., was read wherein he recommends the sale of a parcel of City owned property on the northeast corner of the intersection of Fourth and

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Magnetic Streets, at a price of \$1,500.00 as determined by the City Assessor. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted, that the recommendation of the City Manager concerning the sale of a parcel of City owned property to the Messiah Evangelical Lutheran Church be concurred with, that it is determined that no advantage to the City would result from competitive bidding therein and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign said agreement in behalf of the City of Marquette.

A report from City Manager, George J. Meholick, Jr., was read wherein he reports that a suitable site has been found where bank run gravel can be obtained at a cost of 10c per yard for a quantity of 10,000 yards. It was then moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that the City enter into an agreement with Martha Bacon Clark Adriance and the Estate of Harlow A. Clark, deceased, for the right to remove a quantity of gravel from the S.E. ¼ of the N.E. ¼ of Section 30, T. 49 N., R. 25 W. as per the terms set forth in the agreement and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign said agreement in behalf of the City of Marquette.

A report from City Manager, George T. Meholick, Jr., was read wherein he submitted a tabulation of bids received on the crushing of a quantity of gravel. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that the Commission concur with the recommendations of the City Manager and that the City accept the low bid of Ken Hodgins & Sons Construction Company, Marquette, Michigan, in the sum of 50c per ton for the crushing of a quantity of gravel, and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign the agreement in behalf of the City of Marquette.

A report from City Manager, George T. Meholick, Jr., was read where in he recommends that Section 7.65 of the City Code be amended to include persons hand-

ling and selling produce grown or produced by them. It was then moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that this matter be referred to the City Attorney and Health Officer, who are hereby authorized to prepare such an amendment for consideration by the Commission.

A report from City Manager, George J. Meholick, Jr., was read wherein he recommends the purchase of a quantity of transformers for use in the Light and Power Department. It was then moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that in order to take advantage of a saving of \$614.90, it is determined that no advantage to the City would result from competitive bidding, the City purchase a quantity of transformers from Kuhlman Electric Company in the sum of \$6,149.00.

A communication from J. H. Stephens, Director, Railroad Division, Public Service Commission, was read wherein he informs the City that Trains Nos. 1 and 2, between Marquette and Ishpeming, will be discontinued on or after February 3, 1957. This communication was ordered received and placed on file.

A communication Carlton H. Morris, Chairman of Senate Study Committee for the State of Michigan, was read and ordered placed on file.

A report from City Manager, George T. Meholick, Jr., was read wherein he presented an outline of the insurance coverage of power plant No. 4. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that authority be granted the City Manager to carry out a six point program as outlined in this report.

A report from City Manager, George T. Meholick, Jr., was read wherein he tabulated the bids on fireman's uniforms. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Halverson and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the low bid of Getz Department Store in the sum of

FEBRUARY 7, 1957

A special meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall, Thursday, February 7, 1957 at 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present: Mayor Hammerschmidt, Commissioners Alholm, Bur, Clark and Halverson.

A report from City Manager, George T. Meholick, Jr., was read wherein he recommends the appointments of Miss Sarah VanCleve to the office of Accountant, Mr. Thomas McNabb to become Assistant Purchasing Agent and Mrs. Bertha Mukkala to assume the duties of handling delinquent accounts. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that the recommendations of the City Manager in filling these offices be confirmed.

Bids were then opened on the purchase of a third diesel engine. Following the opening of the bids, it was moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner

Bur and unanimously adopted, that the bid of Baldwin-Lima-Hamilton Company of Lima, Ohio in the sum of \$390,000.00 for a 2550 KW engine, Fairbanks-Morse of Chicago, Illinois in the sum of \$380,375.00 for a 2500 KW engine and the bid of Nordberg Manufacturing Company of Milwaukee, Wisconsin in the sum of \$411,075.00 for a 2700 KW engine be referred to the City Manager, the Superintendent of the Light & Power Department and Mr. Ackerman, consulting engineer, for study and report to the Commission.

Mayor Hammerschmidt then asked if the representatives of the various bidding concerns would explain some of the features of their engine to the Commission. Whereupon the representative of the Nordberg Manufacturing Company and the representatives of the Fairbanks - Morse Company addressed the Commission.

FEBRUARY 11, 1957

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall, Monday, February 11, 1957 at 7:00 o'clock P.M.

Present: Mayor Hammerschmidt, Commissioners Alholm, Bur, Clark and Halverson.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that the reading of the minutes of the previous meetings be omitted.

A communication from James Smith, School Chairman, March of Dimes Program, was read wherein he requested permission for the Future Nurses Association of Graveraet High School to hold their annual "Blue Crutch Sale" on February 15, 1957, in downtown Marquette. Moved by Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that this request be granted.

It was then moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that the following traffic control measure be made permanent:

Parking on the north side only of Magnetic Street from Front Street to Third Street.

A report from City Manager, George T. Meholick, Jr., was read regarding a petition from 74 citizens living along Spruce Street, who requested that a study and action be made in regard to traffic conditions in that area. It was then moved by Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the City Commission direct the erection of "Yield Right-of-way" signs at the intersections of this street for a ninety day trial period, and that signs be purchased for erection upon their arrival.

A communication signed by Steve Johnson, Chairman, Marquette

City Planning Board, and Robert H. Clark, President, Peter White Public Library Board, was read wherein the Commission was notified of meetings held in the past between these two boards regarding the Library Expansion Program. It was also recommended that various members as well as the President of the Library Board be present at this Commission meeting to discuss this proposition. An opinion of City Attorney, Waldo A. McCrea, was read regarding various laws covering a bond issue for an expansion program of this nature. Following the reading of the opinion of the City Attorney, the resolutions adopted by the Library Board were then read regarding the financing of the proposed expansion program. After considerable discussion regarding this matter, the following preamble and resolution was offered by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, the City Commission deems it necessary for the public welfare of said City to expand and remodel the Library building of The Peter White Public Library of the City of Marquette, by erecting an addition to said building, replanning and equipping the rooms in the present building and providing more adequate facilities and services to the public in the use of said library;

AND WHEREAS, plans and specifications for said capital improvements have been prepared by Harold S. Starin, an architect of the City of Duluth, Minnesota, who has estimated the cost thereof at not exceeding Three Hundred Thousand (\$300,000.00) Dollars;

AND WHEREAS, it will be necessary to borrow the sum of not to exceed One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars to supplement funds now on hand with the board of trustees of said library, to pay the cost of said capital im-

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provements and to issue bonds of the City therefor:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

1. 5. Said proposition shall be stated on a separate ballot in substantial-

ly the form set forth in the preceding paragraph;

6. The City Clerk shall cause notice of the submission of said special proposition to be published and posted as part of the election notice of the Regular Municipal Election in manner required by law;

7. The notice of the submission of said special proposition to be included in the notice of election shall be in substantially the following form:

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that at the Regular Municipal Election to be held in the City of Marquette, County of Marquette, Michigan, on Monday, the 1st day of April, 1957, from 7:00 o'clock A.M. to 8:00 o'clock P.M., Eastern Standard Time, the following proposition will be submitted to the electors of the City:

Shall the City of Marquette, Michigan borrow the sum of not to exceed One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars and issued general obligation bonds of the City therefor for the purpose of paying the cost of expanding and remodeling the building of The Peter White Library by providing a new addition thereto, more book storage space and reading areas, auditorium and meeting rooms, and an elevator for access to the second floor?

Only those qualified and registered electors who have property in the City assessed for taxes or the lawful husband or wife of such person are qualified to vote on the foregoing bonding proposition at said election.

On motion of Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting be omitted.

A petition signed by eight (8) property owners on Wetton and Neidhart Streets was read wherein they requested the installation of a sewer in these streets. It was then moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Clark and unanimously adopted, that this petition be referred to the City Manager for a study and report.

A petition signed by two (2) property owners on Neidhart Street north of Clark Street was read wherein they petitioned the City for water to serve a total of 15 lots on that street. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur supported by Mayor Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that this petition be referred to the City Manager for study and report.

It was then moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Bur that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

A communication containing a resolution from Ben E. Knauss Secretary, Retail Merchants Division, Marquette Chamber of Commerce, was read and ordered placed on file. Mayor Hammerschmidt then requested a report from City Manager George T. Meholick, Jr. regarding the total cost and income to the City from the parking meters showing the expenditures of the revenues received from this source. Mayor Hammerschmidt then directed the Clerk to prepare a resolution to set up a parking meter fund separate from other city funds with the intent to utilize the excess revenues for capital expenditures on parking facilities.

WHEREAS, The City is to participate in the cost of such improvement in accordance with the provisions of Michigan law (see Compiled Laws 1948, Sections 250 31 as amended).

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,

(1) That the City hereby requests the State Highway Commissioner to proceed with such improvement.

estimated cost of such improvement will be paid to the State Highway Commissioner for deposit with the State Treasurer for credit to the State Trunkline Fund when the improvement is placed under contract, from Weight and Gasoline Tax funds made available to the City by statute (see C. L. 1948, Section 250.34, and Acts 51, 54 and 55, P. A. 1951 as amended); or from other funds provided by the City.

(3) That upon determination of the actual cost of the improvement, any adjustment necessary to reconcile the estimated costs with actual cost will be made.

A communication from City Manager, George T. Meholick, Jr., as read in which he conveyed the appreciation of the Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army, to the City Commission for the facilities rendered, it was then moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Alholm, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS a public hearing on the need and advisability of further harbor improvement for present and deep craft commerce at the upper (Presque Isle) and lower (Marquette) harbors located in the City of Marquette was held on Thursday, February 21, 1957, in the Commission Chambers, City Hall, Marquette, Michigan at 10:00 A. M. o'clock EST, and

WHEREAS, the District Engineer, St. Paul District, Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army has been directed to make an interim survey report of the advisability of further improvements of the Marquette and Presque Isle harbors, pursuant to resolutions by the Committee on Public Works, U. S. Senate, dated May 8, 1956 and the Committee on Public Works, U. S. House of Representatives, adopted June 27, 1956 and,

WHEREAS, pursuant to the above Congressional resolutions the U. S. Army, Corps of Engineers has been assigned the responsibility for undertaking the comprehensive Great Lakes Harbor survey report, and to consider the

advisability of deepening the upper and lower harbors in the City of Marquette to depths comparable to the controlling depth of 27 ft., now being provided in the Great Lakes connecting channels and in the St. Lawrence Seaway, and,

WHEREAS, the Marquette City Harbor Committee, duly appointed and representing the City of Marquette, the Lake Carriers Association, the L. S. and I. Railroad Company, the Upper Peninsula Generating Company, and the Duluth South Shore Railroad Company presented valuable evidence and information directly related to the considered deepening of the upper (Presque Isle) and lower (Marquette) harbors in the City of Marquette which vitally effects the economic and industrial growth of the Marquette area.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Commission in behalf of the City of Marquette does hereby endorse the proposal of the various organizations in regard to the deepening of the upper and lower harbors in the City of Marquette and urgently request that the utmost consideration be given to improve and deepen both the outer and inner channels of the upper (Presque Isle) and lower (Marquette) harbors to 27 feet which would accommodate present and prospective vessels carrying larger tonnages and economical cargoes resulting in substantial benefits to the general public, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this resolution be forwarded to the District Engineer, St. Paul, District, Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army, and be attached as an addendum and made part of the minutes of the Public Hearing held in the City of Marquette on February 21, 1957 at 10:00 A. M. o'clock, EST, regarding the need and advisability of further harbor improvements in the City of Marquette.

A communication from George T. Meholick, Jr., City Manager, was read wherein he recommended that the City Attorney be authorized to obtain a sixty-six (66) foot right-of-way necessary for the realignment of Lincoln Ave-

nue extending approximately 1320 feet southerly from Wright Street from the Marquette County Road Commission, and a portion of this right-of-way approximately 660 feet long averaging 20 feet in width to be acquired from the Northern Michigan College. The acquisition of these right-of-ways on Lincoln Avenue will be obtained at no cost to the City. It was then moved by Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that the City Commission concur with the recommendation of the City Manager.

A communication from Walter M. A public hearing was then held upon the petition filed with this Commission January 28, 1957, for the rezoning of the south 30 feet of lots 12, 13 and 14 in block 7 of Harlow's Addition No. 1, from "Residential District" to "General Business and Neighborhood Shopping District". It was then moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Clark, that an Ordinance entitled "AN ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH DISTRICTS OR ZONES WITHIN THE CITY OF MARQUETTE, MARQUETTE COUNTY, MICHIGAN, WITHIN WHICH DISTRICTS OR ZONES, THE USE OF LAND, THE HEIGHT, NUMBER OF STORIES AND SIZE OF BUILDINGS AND OTHER STRUCTURES, THE PERCENTAGE OF LOT WHICH MAY BE OCCUPIED, THE SIZE OF YARDS, COURTS AND OTHER OPEN SPACES, THE DENSITY OF POPULATION, THE LOCATION AND USE OF BUILDINGS, STRUCTURES AND LAND FOR TRADE, INDUSTRY, RESIDENCE AND OTHER PURPOSES MAY

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall, Monday, March 25, 1957 at 7:00 o'clock p.m.

Present: Mayor Hammerschmidt, Commissioners Alholm, Bur, Clark and Halverson.

On motion of Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting be omitted.

A petition to have Russell Street opened between Kaye and College Avenues signed by Arthur V. Patrick was read and referred to the City Manager for study and report.

A communication from Anthony Balice, Chairman of Michigan Week, Mayor Exchange Committee, was read wherein he informed the Commission that the City of Marquette and the Village of Hesperia were scheduled to exchange Mayors on May 20, 1957 and inquired as to whether the City of Marquette would participate in the Mayor Exchange Program this year. After considerable discussion, it was moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Mayor Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that due to the fact that the Mayor of the City of Marquette had requested the Mayor Exchange Committee to seriously consider Mayor exchanges between cities of somewhat comparable size last year and had received no reply, and also in view of the time, travel and other expense involved, that the City of Marquette decline participation in the Mayor Exchange Program this year and that the City Clerk notify the Michigan Week Mayor Exchange Committee of its action.

A communication from Claude Ver Duin, Executive Secretary, Great Lakes Harbors Association, was read wherein he outlined and solicits the aid of a resolution to be passed by the City Commission opposing water diversion bills that are being presented to the House

of Representatives and Senate in Washington, D. C. This Communication was referred to the City Attorney requesting that he draw up resolutions objecting to the diversion of the Great Lakes Waters to another watershed.

A report from City Manager, George T. Meholick, Jr., was read regarding TV publicity for the coming annual ice review. This report was ordered received and placed on file.

A communication from City Manager, George T. Meholick, Jr., was read wherein he submitted a tabulation of bids received on two 200 H. P. electric motors for the pumping station of the Water Department. Following a discussion, it was moved by Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager and the Superintendent of the Water Department, the bid of Industrial Engineering Company of Marquette, Michigan in the sum of \$7,048.80 for two 200 H.P. Louis-allis electric motors as per specifications, be accepted.

A communication from City Manager, George T. Meholick, Jr., was read regarding a request from the Graveraet Grades PTA to have the opening date of the Shiras Pool advanced as early as weather permits. Mr. Meholick pointed out in this communication the cost of the installation of chlorinating equipment and related piping as well as the need for a suitable type of fencing to inclose approximately one half of the perimeter of the pool and the remainder to be enclosed with a snow fence as was done last year. This Communication also outlined a means of financing the acquisition of this needed equipment in order to obtain approval of the Michigan Department of Health. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Clark and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Man-

ager, bids be called for to obtain the necessary equipment for the operation of the Shiras Pool.

A communication from City Manager, George T. Meholick, Jr., was read wherein he informs the Commission of complaints received regarding magazine solicitors. Following considerable discussion, it was moved by Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that this communication be referred to the City Attorney who is directed to draft an amendment to the Peddlers Ordinance for the City of Marquette for consideration of adoption by the City Commission.

A communication from R. B. Dibble, Assistant to the Deputy Commissioner - Chief Engineer, Michigan State Highway Department, was read wherein he informs the Commission that the City's share of project 52042 C2-U namely, the paving of West Washington Street from Lincoln Avenue west to the city limits to be estimated at \$2,800.00 In his communication, Mr. Dibble points out the necessity of this money being deposited with the Michigan State Highway Department before the Attorney General's Office will approve the contract for execution. It was then moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that the City's share in the sum of \$2,800.00 be deposited with the State Highway Department for this paving project, and that the City of Marquette concur in the awarding of this paving bid to the Thornton Construction Co. of Hancock, Michigan by the Michigan State Highway Department, at its bid opening held on March 19, 1957 at Escanaba, Michigan.

A communication from City Manager, George T. Meholick, Jr., was read wherein he recommends that bids be called for the purchase of a quantity of bituminous aggregate to be used for maintenance and repaving as well as special assessment paving in the City of Marquette. Mr. Meholick also points out that in letting bids for this material at this time of year,

the City will realize considerable savings on this summer's construction program. These specifications will be prepared to request the bidder to bid in two ways.

1. Price of bituminous aggregate at the belt of the bidder's plant, which will be picked up by a fleet of city trucks, and delivered to the city's paver and roller.

2. Price of bituminous aggregate completely laid in place by the contractor, upon streets designated by the city.

Following a considerable discussion regarding the matter of repaving and paving certain streets in the City of Marquette, it was moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Clark and unanimously adopted, that the City Manager and the Superintendent of the Public Works Department be authorized to call for bids on a quantity of bituminous aggregate to be used in the coming construction season.

A detailed report by City Manager, George T. Meholick, Jr., was read containing information on the 1957-58 budget. This report was ordered received and placed on file.

On motion of Commissioner Halverson, supported by Commissioner Clark, the following resolution be, and the same is hereby adopted:

Pursuant to the requests made by MacDonald Construction Company, the duly engaged contractors for the erection of the building for said program, for extensions of time beyond November 1, 1956 for the enclosing of the new diesel power plant as provided for in Section 1.08, on page 7, of the specifications for said diesel electric plant expansion program;

The Clerk proceeded to administer the oath of office to the newly elected Commissioners.

The Commission then proceeded to elect by ballot one of its members to serve as Mayor for the ensuing year. Commissioner Clark received three votes and Commissioner Halverson received two votes. Moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Alholm, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, Hearings have been scheduled before the Committee of Public Works of the House of Representatives at Washington, D. C. on bills introduced into Congress relative to increased diversion of Great Lakes waters at Chicago, Illinois; and,

WHEREAS, The present levels of the Great Lakes are now at a low point and a possibility exists that they may be lower even without further diversion of waters, all of which now seriously affects the use and enjoyment of the Great Lakes and may affect the development of the St. Lawrence Waterway planning; and,

WHEREAS, The rights to the use of the waters of the Great Lakes in the natural use by communities and States bordering on the lakes and the riparian owners individually for water supply and in connection with fishing and hunting grounds, beaches, summer resorts and public parks, will be seriously impaired and encroached upon if any further diversion of waters from the Great Lakes is permitted;

WHEREAS, The proposed diversion of waters is an unnatural transfer of waters from the areas in which they are naturally collected into another area in which the States and their residents who now enjoy the use and benefit of the waters of the Great Lakes will have no interest and will receive no benefit; and that such transfer of waters will result in great and irreparable damage to the States and their residents who now enjoy the use and benefits of the waters of the Great Lakes; and,

WHEREAS, The waters of the Great Lakes are international and interstate in character, and the matter of the diversion of waters therefrom is one to be considered judicially and by treaty with the Dominion of Canada, and by agreements among the States affected;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That the City of Marquette, Michigan, protests the further diversion of waters of the Great Lakes at Chicago, Illinois as proposed in the bills now before the Congress, and request the Congress of the United States to reject any such bills and any further bills that would result in the diversion of waters from the Great Lakes;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to the Congressman for this dis-

trict and the Senators from the State of Michigan, requesting that they appear before the Committee on Public Works of the House of Representatives and the House of Congress in opposition to all water diversion bills now pending or which may hereafter be introduced which would result in the further lowering of the water levels or the diversion of the waters of the Great Lakes or any of the Great Lakes.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to the Michigan Lakes and Harbors Association with the request that they be included among the exhibits presented by hearings on said bills before both houses of the Congress of the United States.

Moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, At a Regular Municipal Election held in the City of Marquette, County of Marquette, Michigan, on April 1, 1957, between the hours of 7:00 o'clock A. M. and 8:00 o'clock P. M., Eastern Standard Time, the proposition hereinafter set forth was submitted;

AND WHEREAS, Returns from the voting precincts at said election have been filed with the City Clerk and have been presented and examined by the City Commission;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:
