

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

MAY 5, 1958

A special meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall Monday, May 5, 1958 at 4:00 o'clock P. M.

Present: Mayor Pro-tem Rydholm, Exchange Mayor Ralph W. Crego of Lansing, Michigan, Commissioners Alholm and Hammerschmidt.

Excused Absence: Mayor Bur and Commissioner Clark.

Mayor Pro-tem Rydholm introduced Mayor Crego and stated that following the matter of the final budget for 1958-59 Mayor Crego would take the chair as Marquette's Mayor for May 5, 1958.

Mayor Pro-tem Rydholm requested that City Manager George T. Meholick Jr. present his introductory letter of the final budget. Following the presentation by Mr. Meholick, it was

AND RESOLVED, That this Commission has estimated the

Official Proceedings of the City Commission
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revenue which will be forthcoming during the current year and has determined the amount necessary to balance the budget to be the sum of Three-hundred Seventy Seven Thousand, One-hundred Fifty-nine Dollars and Thirteen Cents (\$377,159.13) of which Three-hundred Twenty-nine Thousand, Seven-hundred Seventeen Dollars and Seventy-three Cents (\$329,717.73) is hereby fixed as the amount to be raised for general city tax purposes, and Forty-seven Thousand, Four-hundred Forty One Dollars and Forty Cents (\$47,441.40) is hereby fixed as the tax to be raised for the Peter White Library.

AND RESOLVED, That this Commission do meet on Monday, May 19, 1958 at 7:00 o'clock P.M. Eastern Standard Time for a public hearing upon said estimates and for the passage of the Annual Appropriation Bill; and that the City Clerk publish said estimates and notices of said hearings as required by the City Charter.

that the following Resolution be, and the same is hereby adopted:

RESOLVED, That on April 8, 1958 the City Commission received a resolution unanimously adopted by the Board of Education of the City of Marquette requesting a School Tax Levy of Four-hundred Ninety Two Thousand, Four-hundred Sixty Three Dollars and Seventy Five Cents (\$492,463.75);

AND RESOLVED, That the Board of Education has estimated all of the revenue which will be forthcoming during their 1958-1959 budget year and has determined this amount necessary to balance the school budget of which Three Hundred Ninety Eight Thousand Dollars (\$398,000.00) was determined for current operation expenses, and Ninety-Four Thousand, Four Hundred Sixty Three Dollars and Seventy Five Cents (\$94,463.75) was determined for payment of bonded indebtedness of School construction,

AND RESOLVED, That this Commission do meet on Monday, May 19, 1958, at 7:00 P. M. Eastern Standard Time for a public hearing upon said School Tax Levy and for the passage of the Annual School Tax Appropriation Bill; and that the City Clerk publish same estimate and notices of said hearing as required by City Charter.

Mayor Pro-tem C. Fred Rydholm stated that he would at this point turn the meeting over to Exchange Mayor Ralph W. Crego. Mayor Crego assumed the chair and proceeded with the meeting by commending the Commission on a fine budget for the coming fiscal year. He also commended the City Officials for their contribution to this fine budget.

A communication from Glen B. Wilson, Director, Civil Defense, was read wherein he informed the Commission of the status of the Emergency Hospital Unit that is to be shipped and stored here at Marquette. Moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that this communication be received and placed on file.

The Commission unanimously adopted the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the City of Marquette, Michigan has received with deep regret, the news of the untimely passing of Daniel J. Vaughan, whose countless kindly and unselfish contributions to this City have marked him as one of our most civic minded citizens;

AND WHEREAS, Daniel J. Vaughan served with distinction as a member of the Marquette Charter Commission in the study, preparation and adoption of our present City Charter, and has otherwise displayed a sustained interest in the affairs of our city government;

AND WHEREAS, his keen interest and devotion in the development and promotion of programs for the benefit of our youth, of out-door recreational projects, his outstanding annual Christmas display of ice sculpture at his home, and the betterment of his fellow

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men through his service in civic and fraternal organizations, will serve as an example of good citizenship for many years to come.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

1. That the City Commission of the City of Marquette, Michigan hereby expresses its deep regret in the passing of Daniel J. Vaughan, and commends his devotion to the betterment of this community as an example of civic interest and leadership;

2. That the City Commission further recognizes his able assistance and wise counsel in the governmental affairs of this City, and more particularly, in the preparation and adoption of the Marquette City Charter;

3. That a copy of these resolutions be spread on the minutes of this Commission, and that copies be sent to the members of his family.

A communication from Ben L. Peterson, President, International Lions Club of Marquette, Michi-

gan, was read wherein he requested permission for that organization to sell White Canes in the City of Marquette on May 9, 1958. It was moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that this request be granted.

City Manager George T. Meholick, Jr. presented Mayor Crego with a set of pictures taken of the various events during Mayor Exchange Day.

Commissioner Hammerschmidt presented Mayor Crego with a quantity of charcoal as a gift of our local industry.

Mayor Crego presented a certificate of meritorious service of forty-four years to Wendel Bystrom, Chief of the Marquette City Fire Department.

Mayor Crego thanked all of the Commissioners and City Officials for their part in making Mayor Exchange Day a tremendous success.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

MAY 12, 1958

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall, Monday, May 12, 1958 at 7:00 o'clock P. M.

Present: Mayor Pro-tem Rydholm, Commissioners Alholm, Clark, and Hammerschmidt.

Moved by Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that the absence of Mayor Bur be excused because of his illness.

Moved by Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that the reading of the minutes of the previous meetings be omitted.

A communication from Franz Menze was read wherein he submitted his resignation as a member of the Marquette City Planning Board. It was moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that this communication of resignation be accepted with regret and the Clerk be directed to send a letter of appreciation along with a certificate of recognition for Mr. Menze's appreciated services.

A communication from Al Jandron, Buddy Poppy Chairman, Veterans of Foreign Wars, was read wherein he requested permission for that organization to sell Buddy Poppies in the City of Marquette on Friday and Saturday, May 23 and 24, 1958. Moved by Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that permission as requested be granted.

A communication from J. K. Moyle, General Chairman, U. P. Elks Association, was read wherein he commended the Police Department and City Officials for the cooperation extended that Lodge in handling the large group of people present at their convention. This communication was ordered received and placed on file.

A communication from Gervase

T. Murphy, President, Upper Peninsula Development Bureau, Inc. was read wherein he extended an invitation to the Commission to attend the First Annual Upper Peninsula Tourist and Resort Institute to be held in Iron Mountain on May 12 and 13, 1958. This communication was ordered received and placed on file.

A communication from James A. Smith, Grand Knight, Knights of Columbus, was read wherein he requested permission for that Organization to sponsor a carnival in the city limits of Marquette on June 9th to the 14th, inclusive, and that the \$500 daily fee as required by the City Ordinance be set aside. It was moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that permission as requested be granted and that the \$500 daily fee be waived in view of the fact that the grounds are to be left in a workmen-like manner and that a bond be posted to insure the proper cleaning up.

A report from City Manager George T. Meholick was read wherein he tabulated bids received for the removal and construction of curbing. It was moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the low bid of N. R. Hongisto, Marquette, Michigan, in the sum of \$8,644.40 for the removal of approximately 2700 lineal feet of curbing at a cost of 15c per foot and the construction of 4,861 lineal feet of new curbing at a cost of \$1.69½ per foot be accepted and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign the agreement in behalf of the City of Marquette.

A report from City Manager George T. Meholick was read wherein he tabulated bids received for the bituminous aggregate to be used in the 1958 paving program. Following considerable discussion regarding this report, it was moved by Commissioner Clark,

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supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the low bid of Northern Asphalt Company of Escanaba, Michigan on Proposal No. 1 in the sum of \$5.80 per ton for a quantity of bituminous aggregate be accepted, and that the City Attorney be authorized to prepare a contract containing the detailed specifications governing the plant production as provided for in the specifications of Proposal No. 1 and further that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign said agreement in behalf of the City of Marquette.

A report from City Manager George T. Meholick was read wherein he tabulated bids submitted for 20,000 gallons of MC-5 asphalt to be used in the 1958 road construction program. It was moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Clark and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the low bid of Socony Mobil Oil Company, Minneapolis, Minnesota in the sum of \$2,088.00 for a quantity of MC-5 asphalt be accepted.

A report from City Manager George T. Meholick was read wherein he informs the Commission of the need for a sewer roding machine. It was moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the city purchase a sewer roding machine mounted on a four-wheel trailer as per specifications from the Trojan Tool Equipment Company of Evanston, Illinois in the sum of \$4,599.00.

A report from City Clerk was read wherein he informed the Commission that the ninety day trial period is now ended regarding the traffic control measure on Champion Street. It was moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Clark and unanimously adopted, that the following traffic control measure be made permanent: Parking on the east side only of Champion Street from

Blenhuber Avenue to Genesee Street.

A communication from Ralph W. Crego, Mayor, City of Lansing, was read wherein he thanked the City Officials for the wonderful day that he and Mrs. Crego experienced in our City. Mayor Pro-tem Rydholm directed that this letter be forwarded to Mayor Bur.

Commissioner Clark commented on his and Mayor Bur's trip to Lansing.

Commissioner Clark stated that he felt that Mayor Pro-tem Rydholm and Mr. Meholick were to be commended for the fine job well done here at Marquette on Mayor Exchange Day.

Mayor Pro-tem Rydholm stated that at the last regular meeting of the City Commission a motion was adopted to table a request to discontinue fluoridation of the Marquette City drinking water. Mayor Pro-tem Rydholm stated that he has had an opportunity to read considerable material pro and con on this subject and that he felt that the city in continuing fluoridation of the drinking water was doing the proper thing. At this point in the meeting, Mayor Pro-tem Rydholm opened the meeting to comments from the floor. Several interested citizens addressed the Commission from the floor regarding this subject. Following a discussion period on this matter the Commission unanimously agreed that there be no change in the present program regarding this matter.

MAY 19, 1958

A special meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall, Monday, May 19, 1958 at 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present: Mayor Bur, Commissioners Alholm, Hammerschmidt and Rydholm.

Absent: Commissioner Clark.

Mayor Bur stated that the purpose of this meeting was to hold a public hearing on the Annual Appropriations Bill and Tax Levy for the fiscal year 1958-59.

Mayor Bur declared the public hearing open. Interested citizens were heard regarding playground supervision for this coming season. City Manager George T. Meholick explained to those in attendance that appropriations were made in the present budget for supervision at the various playgrounds. Mr. Meholick then explained in detail the reason for an increase in the millage. Following a discussion on this matter, Mayor Bur declared the public hearing closed.

It was then moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Alholm, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, on May 5, 1958, this Commission made and adopted estimates of all expenditures which will be required to be made from the several funds of the city during the current year, and for the payment of interest and indebtedness to fall due during the year, for departments, objects and purposes therein specified and also fixed the date of May 19, 1958 for public hearing upon said estimates, and

WHEREAS, said estimates and notices of said meetings and the purpose thereof have been published in The Mining Journal, a daily newspaper published in the city, for at least one week before said meeting of May 19, 1958,

RESOLVED, that the several sums and amounts of money esti-

mated and determined upon in the said estimates are hereby determined to be required for the respective objects and purposes specified in said estimates to defray the expenditures and liabilities of the city corporation for the current fiscal year; and

RESOLVED, that there is hereby appropriated for the present fiscal year out of the money in and to come into the City Treasury, not otherwise appropriated or belonging to any other general or special fund, the following sums and amounts for the several departments and particular objects and purposes respectively specified in said estimates and the above determination, viz:

For the DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC AFFAIRS: The amount of said sums: to-wit One Hundred Ninety-Four Thousand, One Hundred Sixty-Five Dollars and Seventy-Two Cents. ... \$194,165.72

For the DEPARTMENT OF ACCOUNTS AND FINANCE: The amount of said sums: to-wit Forty-Eight Thousand, Eight Hundred Ninety-Six Dollars. \$48,896.00

For the DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH: The amount of said sums: to-wit Twenty-Four Thousand, Nine Hundred Twenty-Eight Dollars. \$24,928.00

For the POLICE DEPARTMENT: The amount of said sums: to-wit One Hundred Two Thousand, Four Hundred Sixty-Five Dollars. \$102,465.00

For the FIRE DEPARTMENT: The amount of said sums: to-wit One Hundred Forty-Four Thousand, Five Hundred Thirty Dollars. \$144,530.00

For the DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS: The amount of said sums: to-wit Two Hundred Eighty-Two Thousand, Eight Hundred Ninety-Eight Dollars and Seventy-Five Cents. ... \$282,898.75

For the PARKS AND CEMETERY DEPARTMENT: The amount of said sums: to-wit Seven-

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

JUNE 30, 1958

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall, Monday, June 30, 1958 at 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present: Mayor Bur, Commissioners Alholm, Clark, Hammerschmidt and Rydholm.

Moved by Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting be omitted.

A communication from John J. Guelff, Secretary, Shiras Institute, was read wherein he submitted the 1957 Annual Report of that institute. It was moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that this Annual Report be received and placed on file.

It was moved by Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted, that a transfer be made from the Water Supply and Sewage Disposal System Receiving Fund to the Operation and Maintenance Fund, sufficient to cover the operating expenditures for the balance of the 1957-58 fiscal year in accordance with Section A, Ordinance No. 165.

It was moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted, that a transfer be made from the Electric Utility System Receiving Fund to the Operation and Maintenance Fund, sufficient to cover the operating expenditures for the balance of the 1957-58 fiscal year in accordance with Section A, Ordinance No. 186.

A request for permission to address the Commission signed by Frank J. Russell and Thomas Renn was read. Moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Clark and unanimously adopted, that the request of Frank J. Russell and Thomas Renn to address the Commission regarding the proposal providing com-

munity T.V. service to the City of Marquette be granted. Mayor Bur asked that Mr. Russell address the Commission regarding this matter. Whereupon Mr. Russell proceeded to outline the request for a franchise to operate a community T.V. system for the City of Marquette in coordination with Mr. Renn. He informed the Commission that if a franchise is granted the Marquette Community System, day time T.V. would be available to this community and surrounding areas. The Commission unanimously agreed that the proposed ordinance should be in writing and presented to the Commission at the forthcoming regular meeting.

A communication from George T. Meholick, City Manager, was read wherein he tabulated bids on Workmen's Compensation Insurance. Mr. Meholick recommended that the City of Marquette place its Workmen's Compensation Insurance with the Michigan Mutual Liability Company and accept Proposal No. 2 which provides for a Retrospective Plan "D" with the minimum premium set at 60% and maximum premium set at 117.6% with a loss conversion factor of 1.30 and tax factor of 1.026 based on the excellent safety record that the City of Marquette has maintained during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1958. Following considerable discussion on this matter, it was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Clark and unanimously adopted, that the Commission concur with the recommendations of the City Manager in the purchasing of Workmen's Compensation Insurance.

A communication from George T. Meholick, City Manager, was read wherein he tabulated bids received on Fleet Insurance. In his communication, Mr. Meholick recommended that the bid for fleet insurance be awarded the Employers Mutuals of Wausaw in the amount of \$1,708.42 to cover the entire fleet of vehicles owned by the

City of Marquette which included fire and theft, non-ownership endorsement, hired car endorsement, along with comprehensive liability. The following endorsement also to be included without additional costs: 1. Endorsement excluding governmental function as a defense; 2. Endorsement providing automatic coverage of new equipment; 3. Endorsement providing permission to use trailers, road drags, scrapers and other appliances. Following considerable discussion regarding this matter, it was moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Clark and unanimously adopted, that the Commission concur with the recommendation of the City Manager.

A communication from City Manager George T. Meholick, was read wherein he tabulated bids received on two new patrol cars to be used in the Police Department. Mr. Meholick recommended that the City accept the low bid from Northland Motors on option No. 2 in the specifications in the amount of \$3,383.90 for two 1958 Plymouth Plaza 8 cylinder standard transmission police special sedans. Following a short discussion regarding the specifications of these automobiles and the reason for going from 6 cylinder to 8 cylinder cars, it was moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the City purchase two 1958 Plymouth Plaza Automobiles at a cost of \$3,383.90 from the Northland Motors Company, Marquette, Michigan, plus trade-in.

A communication from George T. Meholick, City Manager, was read wherein he tabulated bids for a quantity of water meters. It was moved by Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the low bid of Well Machinery and Supply Co. of Fort Worth, Texas for a quantity of water meters in the sum of \$2,572.45 F.O.B. Marquette, be accepted.

A communication from City Manager George T. Meholick was read wherein he tabulated bids received for a quantity of curb stops and corporation stops according to specifications. It was then moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the low bid of Traverse City Iron Works of Traverse City, Michigan, in the sum of \$928.50 less 2% for a quantity of curb stops and corporation stops be accepted.

The regular scheduled meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called. There being no quorum present, it was moved by Mayor Pro-tem Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that the regularly scheduled regular meeting be adjourned until 4:00 o'clock P. M. Wednesday, July 16, 1958.

JULY 16, 1958

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called, reconvened and held at the City Hall, Wednesday, July 16, 1958, at 4:00 o'clock P. M.

Present: Mayor Bur, Commissioners Alholm, Hammerschmidt and Rydholm.

Moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that the absence of Commissioner Clark be excused, he being away from the City on business.

On motion of Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted, that the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting be omitted.

A communication from Steve Johnson, Chairman, Marquette City Planning Board, was read wherein that Board recommends to the City Commission the rezoning of an area on the north side of Fair Avenue the depth of the first lot from Third Street to Presque Isle Avenue from "Single Family Residence District" to "General Business District." It was moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted, that the City Commission concur with the recommendations of the Planning Board and that a public hearing be held on this matter of rezoning on August 11, 1958.

A communication from Steve Johnson, Chairman, Marquette City Planning Board, was read wherein that Board recommends

that the City Commission consider the rezoning of an area beginning 275 feet east of the center line of West Avenue on the south side of Fair Avenue; thence south to the center line of Piqua Street extended; thence east along Piqua Street to the center line of McClellan Avenue; thence north along the center line of McClellan Avenue to Fair Avenue; thence west from Fair Avenue to the point of beginning from "Industrial Area" to "General Residence Area." A communication from George T. Meholick, City Manager, was read wherein he outlined the procedure to be followed in the repealing of the Jerrold Electronics Corporation Franchise. Moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted, that the following Ordinance be approved as to form and substance and that Monday, July 28, 1958 at 7:00 o'clock P. Following considerable discussion and comment on this communication, it was moved by Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Rydholm, that the following resolutions be, and the same are hereby unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, The City of Marquette, Michigan, herein called the "Applicant," after thorough consideration of the various aspects of the problem and study of available data has hereby determined that the construction of certain water works improvements, generally described as

IMPROVEMENTS IN MARQUETTE WATER DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM AND THE ERECTION OF A ONE MILLION GALLON STEEL RESERVOIR,

is desirable and in the public interest and to that end it is necessary that action preliminary to the construction of said works be taken immediately; and

WHEREAS, under the terms of Public Law 560, 83rd Congress, as amended, the United States of America has authorized the making of advances to public bodies to aid in financing the cost of engineering and architectural surveys, designs, plans, working drawings, specifications or other action preliminary to and in preparation for the construction of water works expansion; and

WHEREAS, the Applicant has examined and duly considered such Act and the Applicant considers it to be in the public interest and to its benefit to file an application under said Act and to authorize other action in connection therewith;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY The Marquette City Commission, the governing body of said applicant, as follows:

1. That the construction of said water works expansion is essential to and is to the best interests of the Applicant, and to the end that such water works expansion may be provided as promptly as practicable

it is desirable that action preliminary to the construction thereof be undertaken immediately;

2. That George T. Meholick, City Manager, be hereby authorized to file in behalf of the Applicant an application (in form required by the United States and in conformity with said Act) for an advance to be made by the United States to the Applicant to aid in defraying the cost of plan preparation for the above described water works expansion, which shall consist generally of

Field work — final, \$1,600.00

Office and other — final, \$13,400.00

Advance requested — preliminary, \$5,000.00; final, \$15,000.00; total, \$20,000.00.

3. That if such advance be made, the Applicant shall provide or make necessary arrangements to provide such funds, in addition to the advance, as may be required to defray the cost of the plan preparation of such water works expansion;

4. The Said George T. Meholick is hereby authorized to furnish such information and take such other action as may be necessary to enable the Applicant to qualify for the advance;

5. That the officer designated in the preceding paragraph is hereby designated as the authorized representative of the Applicant for the purpose of furnishing to the United States such information, data, and documents pertaining to the application for an advance as may be required; and otherwise to act as the authorized representative of the Applicant in connection with this application.

6. That certified copies of this resolution be included as part of the application for an advance to be submitted to the United States.

A communication from Steve Johnson, Chairman, Marquette City Planning Board, was read wherein that Board recommends to the City Commission, that the preliminary plat plan of Badger Brook Subdivision be accepted. After examining the preliminary plat plan as presented, it was moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt,

supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the Marquette City Planning Board, the City Commission accept the preliminary plat plan of Badger Brook Subdivision.

It was then moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Clark and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the Marquette City Planning Board, the area known as Badger Brook Subdivision be rezoned from "Greenbelt Area" to "General Residence Area" and that a public hearing on this rezoning be held before the City Commission on August 11, 1958.

A communication from Clyde Bucklin, Adjutant, Disabled American Veterans, Marquette, Michigan, was read wherein he requested permission for that Organization to conduct its Annual Forget-me-not Flower Sale on Friday and Saturday, August 1st and 2nd, 1958. Moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that this request be granted.

Mayor Bur then announced that this was the date set for the public hearing on an Ordinance Amendment upon Section 1.111 of Chapter 6, of Title I — Administration, of the Code of the City of Marquette. Following a short discussion on this matter, the public hearing was declared closed. Upon motion of Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Rydholm, the following Ordinance Amendment was unanimously adopted:

"The City of Marquette Ordains:

"Sec. 1. Sec. 1.111, of Chapter 6, of Title I — Administration, of the Code of the City of Marquette is hereby amended to read as follows:

"1.111. Membership. The City Planning Commission shall consist of nine members, seven of whom shall be representative, insofar as possible, of different professions or occupations and shall be appointed by the Mayor subject to approval by the Commission, and two of whom shall be ex-officio members, namely: the City Manager, and an

administrative officer of the City selected by the City Manager. All members shall serve for a term of three years, except that the terms of ex-officio members shall correspond to their respective official tenures.

"Sec. 2. This Ordinance shall become effective ten (10) days after the enactment thereof.

Mayor Bur then announced a public hearing on AN ORDINANCE TO REPEAL AN ORDINANCE GRANTING A FRANCHISE TO JERROLD ELECTRONICS CORPORATION AND TO TERMINATE THE FRANCHISE THEREIN GRANTED.

Following a short discussion on this matter, Mayor Bur declared the public hearing closed. On motion of Commissioner Clark, supported by Commissioner Alholm, the following Ordinance Amendment is unanimously adopted:

"The City of Marquette Ordains:

An ordinance granting a Franchise to Jerrold Electronics Corporation adopted on May 31st, 1955 is hereby repealed and the franchise therein granted terminated for the reason that said corporation failed to start operations under said franchise in a substantial manner satisfactory to the City of Marquette within one year from the date thereof, said corporation having been given thirty (30) days notice of the intention of the City of Marquette to terminate same heretofore, as provided in said ordinance.

Mayor Bur then announced that this was the date set for a public hearing to determine the necessity for the following improvements: the installation of paving on West College Avenue between Eighth Street and Northrup Street in the City of Marquette. Following a discussion regarding this improvement, it was moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Rydholm, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, It appears by the affidavit of the City Clerk that due publication has been made of

notice, as required by the City Charter, that it is the intention of the City Commission to make certain improvements, and to determine the necessity of such improvements as follows:

The installation of paving on West College Avenue between Eighth Street and Northrup Street in the City of Marquette and appointing this day and time when the City Commission would meet to determine the necessity of such improvement; and

WHEREAS, It appears further by said affidavit that a like notice has been sent by mail to each owner of property subject to assessment therefore; and

WHEREAS, All suggestions and objections made to said improvements have been heard and considered;

RESOLVED, That the City Commission determines that such project and improvements are necessary and proper;

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the proportion of the costs of such improvements which shall be defrayed by special assessment upon the property especially benefited thereby and the proportion to be defrayed as the general obligation of the City, if any, shall be as follows:

Eighteen Lot Owners — \$1,855.76.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the report of the City Manager, the plans and specifications, and the estimated costs of such improvements, are hereby approved and determined accordingly; that said special assessments may be paid in five installments, at the rate of four per cent per annum thereon; and that a special assessment district to be assessed therefore is hereby designated as follows:

College Avenue property owners between Eighth Street and Northrup Street in the City of Marquette.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City Assessor shall forthwith prepare an assessment roll in accordance with this Resolution.

Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Clark,

moved that a FRANCHISE ORDINANCE TO THE MARQUETTE SERVICE CORPORATION be approved as to form and substance, and that Monday, September 8, 1958 be fixed as the date for a public hearing thereon and the consideration for adoption, and that the Clerk publish this Ordinance in full in a notice of the public hearing thereon, at the expense of the Marquette Service Corporation, such notice to contain information that the ordinance is on file in his office for public examination and inspection until the date of the public hearing, and that reference to the ordinance in the minutes of this meeting may be by title only.

Commissioner Clark addressed the Chair requesting permission to read a communication to the Commission. Mayor Bur granted this request whereupon Commissioner Clark read a letter containing his resignation from the City Commission of the City of Marquette. His reason for resignation is that he is moving from the city. Mayor Bur stated that this letter is received with reluctance but under the circumstances surrounding this letter it be received for action at the next regular Commission meeting in compliance with the City Charter for the City of Marquette.

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall, Monday, August 11, 1958 at 7:00 o'clock P.M.

Present: Mayor Bur, Commissioners Alholm, Hammerschmidt and Rydholm.

Absent: Commissioner Clark.

It was moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted, that the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting be omitted.

Mayor Bur stated that this would be the proper time to take action on the resignation of Commissioner Clark as was presented at the last regular meeting. It was then moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that the resignation of Commissioner Clark be received with regret.

A communication from William H. Nestle, State Inspector of Jails, was read and ordered received and placed on file.

A communication from Louis J. Rumaggi, Major General, USA Division Engineer, was read wherein he notifies the public of the Great Lakes Harbor Study and interim report on Presque Isle Harbor, Michigan. Mayor Bur ordered this communication received and placed on file.

A report from City Manager George T. Meholick, was read wherein he tabulated bids received for a quantity of pipe and fittings to be used in the Water Department. It was then moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the low bid of Glamorgan Pipe and Foundry Company, Chicago, Illinois, in the amount of \$14,768.09 F.O.B. Marquette, Michigan, for a quantity of pipe, tees, plugs, reducers and other fittings be accepted.

A report from City Manager, George T. Meholick, was read wherein he tabulated bids on hydrants, gate boxes, valves and sleeves to be used in the Water Department. Following a short discussion, it was moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the low bid of Traverse City Iron Works of Traverse City, Michigan, in the amount of \$4,011.07 F.O.B. Marquette, Michigan, for a quantity of hydrants, gate boxes, valves and sleeves be accepted.

A report from City Manager George T. Meholick was read wherein he tabulated bids received for the installation of water mains. It was then moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the bid be awarded to the L. W. Brumm Co. of Marquette, Michigan, in the amount of \$5,250 for the installation of 4,375 lineal feet of six inch mechanical joint pipe; that Company meeting all specifications and being low bidder.

The installation of paving on West College Avenue between Eighth Street and Northrup Street in the City of Marquette, and appointing this day and time when the City Commission and Assessor would meet to review said assessments and special assessment roll therein; and

WHEREAS, It appears further by said affidavit that a like notice has been sent by mail to each owner of property subject to such assessment; and

WHEREAS, All suggestions and objections made to said assessment roll therein, have been heard and considered; and

WHEREAS, Said assessment roll and the assessments therein having been reviewed by the Commission and the Assessor and all needful corrections of the same having been made;

RESOLVED, That said assessment roll, to-wit: Special Assessment Roll No. 303, and the respective assessments therein, are hereby confirmed;

FURTHER RESOLVED, That such assessments may be paid in five equal annual installments at the time fixed for the payment of regular city taxes, together with interest on such installments at the rate of four per cent per annum from the date of the confirmation of said special assessment roll.

City Manager George T. Meholick recommended that the Commission pass a resolution regarding the installation of water mains and that the Subdivider be required to place on deposit three-fourths ($\frac{3}{4}$ ths.) of the total costs as estimated and approved by the Commission and that upon request of the person, firm, or corporation, the City will issue and sell special assessment bonds in accordance with Chapter 11 of the City Charter and that four-

fifths ($\frac{4}{5}$ ths.) of the amount deposited be returned to the person, firm, or corporation, when the special assessment bonds are sold. It was then moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted,

That any person, firm or corporation requesting the City of Marquette for the installation of water mains during this 1958 Construction Season place on deposit with the City Treasurer, prior to the commencement of any water main installation, their required three-fourth ($\frac{3}{4}$ ths.) of the total cost as estimated and approved by the City; and

That the City, if requested by the person, firm or corporation concerned, will issue and sell special assessment bonds not to exceed five (5) years as provided for under Chapter 11 of the City Charter, within a six months period; and

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY
COMMISSION

AUGUST 25, 1958

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall, Monday, August 25, 1958 at 7:00 o'clock P. M.

Present: Mayor Bur, Commissioners Alholm, Hammerschmidt and Rydholm.

It was moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting be omitted.

A communication from Paul L. Adams, Attorney General, was read wherein he thanked the Commission for the cooperation shown in the recent hearings held in Ingham County Circuit Court regarding the discontinuance of passenger service into the Marquette area. This communication was ordered received and placed on file.

A communication from George T. Meholick, City Manager, was read wherein he presented the Annual Municipal Maintenance Contract between the State of Michigan and the City of Marquette for the fiscal year 1958-59. It was moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign the 1958-59 Municipal Maintenance Contract between the State of Michigan and the City of Marquette for the maintenance of Highways US-41 and M-28 in the corporate limits of the City of Marquette and that Mr. V. E. Swan be designated as the Municipal Maintenance Superintendent.

Moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Rydholm, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, It appears necessary and desirable to create a Health Council to serve only in an advisory capacity to the Board of Health and City Health Officer;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That a Health Council is hereby created and constituted, whose duties shall be to serve only in an advisory capacity to the Board of Health, the City Manager and the City Health Officer in matters relating to public health, sanitation, and the prevention of disease and the spreading thereof. The Health Council shall consist of such number of qualified persons as the City Commission may deem advisable from time to time, to be appointed by the Mayor subject to the approval of the City Commission, and to serve at the pleasure of the City Commission. The members so appointed shall serve without compensation for such services.

It was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that the date previously set for a public hearing on An Ordinance Granting a Franchise to Marquette Service Corporation be adjourned from Monday, September 8, 1958 to Monday, September 29, 1958 to permit publication thereof and the public inspection of the full text of the Ordinance for at least four weeks after such publication.

A notice of hearing from the State of Michigan Department of Conservation was read wherein they notified the Commission of the date, time, and place of a public hearing on the Great Lakes Submerged Land Act No. 247, P. A. 1955, as amended by Act No. 94, P. A. 1958. This notice was ordered received and placed on file.

Moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Alholm, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted.

WHEREAS, A petition has been received and filed requesting the following improvement:

Sewer and water mains in Lakeview Heights Subdivision.

RESOLVED, That the City Manager is directed to prepare plans,

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City Manager file same with the City Clerk who shall make same available for public examination;

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City Clerk shall fix a day for a public hearing on the determination of the necessity for such improvement by the City Commission, and shall cause notice of the time and place of same to be published once in the official newspaper of the City not less than 10 days prior to such date of hearing, such notice to state also that the report of the City Manager, and the plans, specifications and estimate of costs, are on file in his office for public examination, and that he shall also serve a like notice upon each owner of property subject to assessments for such improvement, by United States Mail, at least 10 days prior to such hearing; and that he shall further make proof of such publication and service by affidavit.

Moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Rydholm, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, A request has been received and filed requesting the following improvement:

An extension of sewer and water mains, approximately 1,000 feet in West Nicolet Boulevard — Shiras Hills Subdivision.

RESOLVED, That the City Manager is directed to prepare plans, specifications and estimate of costs of such improvement, and attach thereto his recommendation as to the proportion of the costs to be paid by special assessment and of the proportion, if any, to be

paid as the general obligation of the City; the number of installments for payment; the interest rate thereon; and the land to be included in the special assessment district;

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City Manager file same with the City Clerk who shall make same available for public examination;

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City Clerk shall fix a day for a public hearing on the determination of the necessity for such improvement by the City Commission, and shall cause notice of the time and place of same to be published once in the official newspaper of the City not less than 10 days prior to such date of hearing, such notice to state also that the report of the City Manager, and the plans, specifications and estimate of costs, are on file in his office for public examination, and that he shall also serve a like notice upon each owner of property subject to assessment for such improvement, by United States Mail, at least 10 days prior to such hearing; and that he shall further make proof of such publication and service by affidavit.

A communication from Robert D. MacDonald, Recording Secretary, Marquette County Labor Council, was read wherein he notified the Commission that the National AFL-CIO establish September 1st. through 7th. as Union Label Week and request that the Mayor proclaim that week as Union Label Week to honor the members of organized labor and the goods and services they pro-

duce. It was then moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Hamerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that the request of Mr. MacDonald in behalf of the Labor Council AFL-CIO be granted. The proclamation follows:

WHEREAS, it is well-recognized that trade unions and their activities in behalf of labor in the City of Marquette, Michigan have made an important place for themselves in this community particularly through the contributions made by union workers and their families to the benefit and general good of our entire community; and

WHEREAS, the continuation and increase of such benefits would result from purchasing of products bearing the Union Label and using services identified by Shop Cards and Service Buttons;

NOW THEREFORE, I, RICHARD R. BUR, Mayor of the City of Marquette, Michigan, do hereby proclaim the week of September 1st through 7th, 1958 as UNION LABEL WEEK to honor members of organized labor and goods and services produced by them, and their contribution to this community.
