

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

MAY 4, 1959

A special meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall, Monday, May 4, 1959 at 7:00 o'clock P. M.

Present: Mayor Rydholm, Commissioners Alholm, Bur, Hammerschmidt and Smith.

Mayor Rydholm stated that the purpose of this meeting was for the Commission to meet in accordance with Section 8.4 of the City Charter to adopt a Tentative Budget for the 1959-60 fiscal period.

Moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Bur, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

RESOLVED, that this Commission hereby makes and adopts the following estimates of all expenditures which will be required to be made from the several funds of the City during the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1959, and for the payment of interest and indebtedness to fall due during the year for the following Departments and purposes respectively, viz:

Commission has estimated the
revenue which will be forthcoming

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during the current year and has determined the amount necessary to balance the budget to be the sum of Four Hundred Twenty-Nine Thousand, Three Hundred Eighty-Nine Dollars and Twenty Cents (\$429,389.20) of which Three Hundred Eighty Thousand, Seven Hundred Thirty-Three Dollars and Twenty Cents (\$380,733.20) is hereby fixed as the amount to be raised for general city tax purposes, and Forty-eight Thousand, Six Hundred Fifty-six Dollars (\$48,656.00) is hereby fixed as the tax to be raised for the Peter White library.

AND RESOLVED, that this Commission do meet on Monday, May 18, 1959 at 7:00 o'clock P. M. Eastern Standard Time for a public hearing upon said estimates and for the passage of the Annual Appropriation Bill; and that the City Clerk publish said estimates and notices of said hearings as required by the City Charter.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

RESOLVED, that on March 6, 1959 the City Commission received a Resolution adopted by vote of the Board of Education of the City of Marquette requesting a School Tax Levy of Five-Hundred Four Thousand, Three - Hundred - Eighteen Dollars and Seventy-Five Cents (\$504,318.75);

AND RESOLVED, that the Board of Education has estimated all of the revenue which will be forthcoming during their 1959-60 budget year and has determined this amount necessary to balance the school budget of which Four-Hundred Sixteen-Thousand Dollars (\$416,000.00) was determined for current operation expenses, and Eighty-eight Thousand, Three-hundred-eighteen Dollars and Seventy-Five Cents (\$88,318.75) was determined for payment of bonded indebtedness of school construction,

AND RESOLVED, that this Commission do meet on Monday, May

18, 1959, at 7:00 o'clock p. m. Eastern Standard Time for a public hearing upon said School Tax Levy and for the passage of the Annual School Tax Appropriation Bill; and that the City Clerk publish same estimate and notices of said hearing as required by City Charter.

A communication from Walter M. Noack, Director of Enforcement, Liquor Control Commission, was read wherein he informs the Commission of a request to that Organization for the transfer of a SDM license from Vincent and M. Vyne Belisle, 129 E. Hewitt Avenue, Marquette, Michigan, to the Spot, Inc. Moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the Chief of Police and the City Manager, the City Commission approve of this request.

Mayor Rydholm then gave an oral report on the meeting of the Water Resources Commission at Lansing, Michigan which Commission recommended that the City and the Cliff Dow Chemical Company meet for the purpose of mutually resolving the alleged water pollution problem at Marquette, which meeting will be scheduled at an early date.

On motion of Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, the report and recommendation of the City Manager for the purchase of the South 8½ feet of Lot 13, Pinecrest Subdivision and the sale of the North 8 feet of Lot 11, Pinecrest Subdivision in the City of Marquette, and that no advantage would result to the City from competitive bidding because of the uniqueness of the two properties as to location and the necessity thereof for street purposes, be accepted and approved, and that the Mayor and Clerk be authorized to negotiate and effect such sale and purchase, for a nominal consideration.

Adjourned.

The City Commission reconvened in a special meeting at 10:00 P. M. on May 4, 1959 for the purpose of authorizing the advertising

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of bids for the construction of a 1,000,000 gallon steel reservoir to be used in the water expansion and improvement program. The Mayor and all Commissioners were present and waived notice of the time and purpose of such meeting and the fee for their attendance.

Moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Alholm, and unanimously

adopted that the City Manager be so authorized to solicit such bids in accordance with specifications submitted by the firm of McNamee, Porter and Seeley of Ann Arbor, the City's consulting engineers on such project.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

MAY 11, 1959

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held in the Commission Chambers at the City Hall, Monday, May 11, 1959 at 7:00 o'clock P. M.

Present: Mayor Rydholm, Commissioners Alholm, Bur, Hammerschmidt and Smith.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Smith and unanimously adopted, that the reading of the minutes of the previous meetings be waived.

A petition signed by 29 residents in the south part of the City of Marquette was read wherein they requested that action be taken to reduce the fire and health hazards created by the city dump. Mayor Rydholm stated that recently he had made a trip to this site and he had noticed sparks flying in the wind and a large volume of acrid smoke. Mr. Meholick also stated that during the weekend many people travel to the dump and throw out rubbish including considerable amounts of old newspapers and magazines, thus causing a fire hazard. Commissioner Hammerschmidt reminded those present that a study is about to be made of this situation and this should be brought to the attention of the people interested enough to petition this Commission. Mr. Meholick also stated that he felt water should be available to the attendant at the dump grounds so that he could control the burning there. Mayor Rydholm asked if there were any citizens in attendance who would be interested in addressing the Commission regarding this situation. Following an open discussion on the matter of controlling the city dump, Mayor Rydholm ordered this petition received and placed on file.

A communication from Walter M. Noack, Director of Enforcement, Liquor Control Commission, was read wherein he informs the Commission of a request for a transfer of a 1958 SDM license

from Kathleen Lupien to Jean M. Specker and request the local governing body to express their approval or disapproval of this request. It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that this request be granted.

A communication from Willard J. Huff, Adjutant, Marquette Post No. 2439, Veterans of Foreign Wars, was read wherein he requested permission for that Organization to sell "Buddy Poppies" in the City of Marquette on Friday and Saturday, May 22nd. and 23rd., 1959. It was moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Smith and unanimously adopted, that this request be granted.

A communication from Walter J. Hackett, Grand Knight, Knights of Columbus, Marquette Council No. 689, Marquette, Michigan, was read wherein he requests permission for that Organization to sponsor a carnival in the City of Marquette the week of June 8th. to June 13th., 1959, and that the daily fee as required by Ordinance be waived in this instance. It was moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that this request be granted and that the Knights of Columbus be required to post a fifty (\$50.00) dollar cleanup bond to insure proper cleaning of the area when this carnival closes and that the five hundred (\$500.00) dollar daily fee as set up by city ordinance be waived in this instance.

A contract for engineering services in connection with the Water Supply Improvements between the City of Marquette and the firm of McNamee, Porter and Seeley of Ann Arbor, Michigan, was read. Moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that the City enter into an agreement with the engineering firm of McNamee, Porter and Seeley in accordance with this agree-

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ment and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign said agreement in behalf of the City of Marquette.

The following preamble and resolution were offered by Commissioner Bur and supported by Commissioner Alholm:

WHEREAS, by authority of a resolution of the City Commission, the following proposition was submitted to vote of the qualified electors of the City of Marquette, County of Marquette, Michigan, at the Biennial Spring Election held in said City on Monday, April 6, 1959:

Shall the City of Marquette, Michigan, borrow, the sum, not to exceed Four Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$450,000.00) Dollars and issue General Obligation Bonds of the City pledging the full faith and credit of the City therefor, for the purpose of paying the cost of expanding and improving the water supply and sewage disposal distribution system of the City of Marquette by providing a ground level elevated storage tank, improvements in the distribution system and water works pumping station?

AND WHEREAS, more than three-fifths (3/5) of the qualified electors voting at said election voted in favor of said proposition, and it has been duly determined by the City Commission that said proposition was carried by more than a three-fifths (3/5) vote;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

1. Bonds of the City of Marquette be issued in the aggregate principal sum of Four Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$450,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of paying the cost of acquiring and constructing said water improvements.

2. Said issue shall consist of 450 bonds of the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, numbered consecutively in direct order of maturity from 1 to 450, both inclusive, dated as of August 1, 1959, and payable serially as follows:

\$10,000.00 August 1st of each year from 1961 to 1965, both inclusive;

\$15,000.00 August 1st of each year from 1966 to 1970, both inclusive;

\$20,000.00 August 1st of each year from 1971 to 1976, both inclusive;

\$25,000.00 August 1st of each year from 1977 to 1983, both inclusive;

\$30,000.00 August 1, 1984.

Said bonds shall bear interest at a rate or rates not exceeding five per cent (5%) per annum, payable on February 1, 1960, and semi-annually thereafter on August 1st and February 1st of each year, both principal and interest to be payable at a bank or trust company to be designated by the purchaser of the bonds.

Bonds numbered 1 to 110, both inclusive, maturing in the years 1961 to 1969, both inclusive, shall not be subject to redemption prior to maturity.

Bonds numbered 111 to 450, both inclusive, maturing in the years 1970 to 1984, both inclusive, shall be subject to redemption prior to maturity at the option of the City, in inverse numerical order, on any interest payment date on or after August 1, 1969, at par and accrued interest, plus a premium as follows:

\$30.00 on each bond called for redemption prior to August 1, 1972;

\$25.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after August 1, 1972, but prior to August 1, 1975;

\$20.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after August 1, 1975, but prior to August 1, 1977;

\$15.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after August 1, 1977, but prior to August 1, 1979;

\$10.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after August 1, 1979, but prior to August 1, 1981;

\$5.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after August 1, 1981, but prior to August 1, 1982;

No premium shall be paid on bonds called for redemption on or after August 1, 1982.

Thirty days' notice of the call of any bonds for redemption shall be given by publication in a paper circulated in the State of Michigan

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which carries, as part of its regular service, notices of sale of municipal bonds. No further interest payable on bonds so called for redemption shall accrue after the date fixed for redemption, provided funds are on hand with the paying agent to redeem said bonds.

3. The Mayor and City Clerk shall sign and execute said bonds on behalf of the City and cause the corporate seal of the City to be affixed thereto, and interest coupons shall be annexed to said bonds bearing the facsimile signatures of the Mayor and City Clerk, and said bonds when executed shall be delivered to the City Treasurer and be delivered by him to the purchaser thereof on payment of the purchase price therefor.

4. The form of said bonds and the attached coupons shall be in substantially the following form:

Both principal of and interest on this bond are hereby made payable at , Michigan, and for prompt payment of this bond, both principal and interest, the full faith, credit and resources of the City of Marquette are hereby irrevocably pledged.

This bond is one of a series of four hundred fifty (450) bonds of even date and like tenor, except as to date of maturity , aggregating the sum of \$450,000.00, issued for the purpose of paying the cost of expanding and improving the water supply and sewage disposal distribution system of the City of Marquette by providing a ground level elevated storage tank, improvements in the distribution system and water works pumping station, and has been authorized by a three-fifths (3/5) vote of the electors of said City voting thereon at the Biennial Spring Election held in said City on April 6, 1959, and in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of the City.

Bonds of this issue numbered 1 to 110, both inclusive, maturing in the years 1961 to 1969, both inclusive, are not subject to redemption prior to maturity.

The right is reserved of redeeming bonds numbered 111 to 450, both inclusive, maturing in the years 1970 to 1984, both inclusive, at the option of the City, in inverse numerical order, on any interest payment date on or after August 1, 1969, at par and accrued interest, plus a premium as follows:

\$30.00 on each bond called for redemption prior to August 1, 1972;

\$25.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after August 1, 1972, but prior to August 1, 1975;

\$20.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after August 1, 1975, but prior to August 1, 1977;

\$15.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after August 1, 1977, but prior to August 1, 1979;

\$10.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after August 1, 1979, but prior to August 1, 1981;

\$5.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after August 1, 1981, but prior to August 1, 1982;

No premium shall be paid on bonds called for redemption on or after August 1, 1982.

Thirty days' notice of the call of any bonds for redemption shall be given by publication in a paper circulated in the State of Michigan which carries, as part of its regu-

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lar service, notices of sale of municipal bonds. No further interest payable on bonds so called for redemption shall accrue after the date fixed for redemption provided funds are on hand with the paying agent to redeem said bonds.

This bond is payable out of the debt retirement fund of said City of Marquette, and it is hereby certified and recited that all acts, conditions and things required by law precedent to and in the issuance of this bond exist and have been done and performed in regular and due time and form as required by law, and that the total indebtedness of said City of Marquette, including this bond, does not exceed any constitutional or statutory limitation.

5. The City Clerk shall make application to the Municipal Finance Commission for approval of the issuance and sale of said bonds and of the form of notice of sale in accordance with the provisions of Act 202, Public Acts of Michigan, 1943, as amended.

6. The City Clerk shall cause notice of sale of said bonds to be published in the Michigan Investor of Detroit, Michigan, and The Mining Journal of Marquette, Michigan, a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Marquette, as soon as the form of notice of sale is approved by the Municipal Finance Commission, fixing the date of sale of said bonds for the first regular or special meeting of the City Commission to be held more than seven (7) days after such publication.

Sealed bids for the purchase of General Obligation Water System Bonds of the City of Marquette, County of Marquette, Michigan, of the par value of \$450,000.00, will be received by the undersigned at the City Hall in said City until, the day of, 1959, at 8:00 o'clock p. m., Eastern Standard Time, at which time and place they will be publicly opened and read.

Said bonds will be dated August 1, 1959, will be numbered consecutively in direct order of maturity from 1 to 450, both inclusive, and will mature serially as follows:

- \$10,000.00 August 1st of each year from 1961 to 1965, both inclusive;
- \$15,000.00 August 1st of each year from 1966 to 1970, both inclusive;
- \$20,000.00 August 1st of each year from 1971 to 1976, both inclusive;

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\$25,000.00 August 1st of each year from 1977 to 1983, both inclusive;

\$30,000.00 August 1, 1984.

Said bonds shall be coupon bonds of the denomination of \$1,000.00 each and shall bear interest from their date at a rate or rates not exceeding five per cent (5%) per annum, expressed in multiples of $\frac{1}{8}$ of 1%. Said interest shall be payable on February 1, 1960, and semi-annually thereafter on August 1st and February 1st of each year. Both principal and interest will be payable at a bank or trust company designated by the purchaser of the bonds. Accrued interest to date of delivery of such bonds must be paid by the purchaser at time of delivery. The interest rate for each coupon period on any one bond shall be at one rate only.

Bonds numbered 1 to 110, both inclusive, maturing in the years 1961 to 1969, both inclusive, shall not be subject to redemption prior to maturity.

Bonds numbered 111 to 450, both inclusive, maturing in the years 1970 to 1984, both inclusive, shall be subject to redemption prior to maturity, at the option of the City, in inverse numerical order, on any interest payment date on or after August 1, 1969, at par accrued interest, plus a premium as follows:

\$30.00 on each bond called for redemption prior to August 1, 1972;

\$25.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after August 1, 1972, but prior to August 1, 1975;

\$20.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after August 1, 1975, but prior to August 1, 1977;

\$15.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after August 1, 1977, but prior to August 1, 1979;

\$10.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after August 1, 1979, but prior to August 1, 1981;

\$5.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after August 1, 1981, but prior to August 1, 1982;

No premium shall be paid on bonds called for redemption on or after August 1, 1982.

Thirty days' notice of the call of any bonds for redemption shall be

given by publication in a paper circulated in the State of Michigan which carries, as parts of its regular service, notices of sale of municipal bonds. No further interest payable on bonds so called for redemption shall accrue after the date fixed for redemption provided funds are on hand with the paying agent to redeem said bonds.

For the purpose of awarding the bonds, the interest cost of each bid will be computed by determining, at a rate or rates specified therein, the total dollar value of all interest on the bonds from (here insert the first day of the month next following the date of receiving bids or the date of the bonds, whichever is later) to their maturity and deducting therefrom any premium. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder whose bid on the above computation produces the lowest interest cost to the City.

No proposal for the purchase of less than all of the bonds, nor for less than 100% of their par value, will be considered.

The City is authorized by law to levy upon all of the taxable property therein such ad valorem taxes as may be necessary to pay the bonds and interest thereon, without limitation as to rate or amount.

A certified or cashier's check in the amount of \$9,000.00, drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of the Treasurer of the City of Marquette, Michigan, must accompany each bid as a guaranty of good faith on the part of the bidder. OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

JUNE 29, 1959

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held in the Commission Chambers at the City Hall Monday, June 29, 1959 at 7:00 P. M.

Present: Mayor Rydholm, Commissioners Bur, Hammerschmidt, and Smith.

Absent: Commissioner Alholm.

Moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Smith and unanimously adopted, that the absence of Commissioner Alholm be excused because of urgent business.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting be waived.

Commissioner Bur moved that the following ordinance be accepted as to form, that it be published in full in the published minutes of this meeting, and that Monday, July 13, 1959 be fixed as the meeting date at which time a public hearing will be had thereon and the ordinance considered for adoption. Motion supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that An Ordinance to Amend Sections 2.100 and 2.101 of Chapter 17 of Title II, "WATER SUPPLY AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL RATES," of the Code of the City of Marquette, Michigan.

The City of Marquette Ordains:
Section 1. Section 2.100 and Section 2.101 of Chapter 17 of Title II, "WATER SUPPLY AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL RATES," is hereby amended to read as follows:

2.100 Water Rates. The rates to be charged for water service furnished by the Water Supply and Sewage Disposal System of the City shall be as follows:

(1) Metered Service:

- 1st. 2400 cu. ft. per month . . . 18.75 cents per 100 cu. ft.
- 2nd. 2400 cu ft. per month . . .

15 cents per 100 cu. ft.

3rd. 2400 cu. ft. per month . . . 11.25 cents per 100 cu. ft.

All over 7200 cu. ft. per month . . . 5.625 cents per 100 cu. ft.

To the foregoing there shall be added a monthly service charge, based on the size of the customer's meter, as follows:

5/8" meter	\$ 0.69 per month
3/4" meter	0.94 per month
1" meter	1.25 per month
1 1/4" meter	1.56 per month
1 1/2" meter	1.88 per month
2" meter	2.50 per month
3" meter	5.00 per month
4" meter	10.00 per month

The minimum bill for any month for metered customers shall be \$1.25.

(2). Flat Rate Water Service:

For dwelling of 4 rooms or less — \$0.94 per month

For each additional room — \$0.13 per month

For each private water closet — \$0.25 per month.

For each bath tub or shower — \$0.25 per month.

For each kitchen sink — \$0.25 per month.

For each wash basin — \$0.25 per month.

During the months of June, July, August and September, flat rate customers shall be charged an additional amount for lawn sprinkling service as follows:

\$0.50 per month for the first 3,000 sq. ft. or less of lot area.

\$0.15 per month for each additional 1,000 sq. ft. of lot area or major portion thereof.

Minimum monthly bill — \$1.25.

(3). Construction Service or other service where water is Taken from an unmetered outlet.

A \$1.88 service charge shall be made for this service plus a charge of 25 cents per 100 cu. ft. estimated

use.

Flat rate service will be given only where it is not feasible to give metered service.

Special water rates may be estimated by the City Commission to meet special circumstances or situations where, in its judgment, a special rate is deemed proper and advisable.

2.101 Sewage Disposal Rates. Charges of sewage disposal service shall be levied upon each lot or parcel of land or premises having any sewer connection with the Water Supply and Sewage Disposal System on the basis of the charges made by the City for the water used therein or thereon on the following basis:

(1). Metered Service:

1st. 2400 cu. ft. per month . . .
20.63 cents per 100 cu. ft.

2nd. 2400 cu. ft. per month . . .
16.50 cents per 100 cu. ft.

3rd. 2400 cu. ft. per month . . .

. . . 6.19 cents per 100 cu. ft.

To the foregoing there shall be added a monthly service charge, based on the size of the customer's meter, as follows:

The minimum bill for any one month for metered customers shall be \$1.38.

(2) Flat Rate Water Service:

For each bath tub or shower — \$0.28 per month.

For each kitchen sink — \$0.28 per month.

For each wash basin — \$0.28 per month.

Where sewage disposal service is furnished to users not connected to the water system, or in cases where users make use of large quantities of water which may be discharged into storm sewers, or for other miscellaneous uses of water for which special consideration should be given, special rates may be fixed by the City Commission.

Sewage disposal rates for the months of June, July, and August shall be based on the average of the quantity of water billed for the previous months of April and May, regardless of the quantity of water used during these three (3) months.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect ten (10) days after its adoption, and shall apply to the computation of all billings thereafter.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

July 13, 1959

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held in the Commission Chambers at the City Hall, Monday, July 13, 1959 at 7:00 P. M.

Present: Mayor Rydholm, Commissioners Bur, Hammerschmidt and Smith.

Absent: Commissioner Alholm.

On motion of Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Smith and unanimously adopted, the absence of Commissioner Alholm be excused, he being away from the City.

It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Smith and unanimously adopted, the reading of the minutes of the previous meetings be waived.

A communication from Walter M. Noack, Director of Enforcement, Michigan State Liquor Control Commission, was read wherein he informs the Commission of a request from Flory P. Pompo, 239 W. Washington Street, Marquette, Michigan, to drop Raymond Pompo as a partner on a 1959 Class "C" license. It was moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager and the Chief of Police, the request be granted.

A communication from Albert Leppanen, Marquette, Michigan, was read wherein he offered to dedicate a strip of land 33 feet in width for street purposes. It was moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that the City of Marquette accept a quit claim deed for this property subject to having the same developed for street purposes at the time that unplatted property owned by Mr. Leppanen has been platted.

Mayor Rydholm then declared the public hearing open on an Ordinance to amend Sections 2.100

and 2.101 of Chapter 17 of Title II "Water Supply and Sewage Disposal Rates" of the Code of the City of Marquette, Michigan. There being no comments from the floor, Mayor Rydholm declared the public hearing closed. On motion of Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, the ordinance as amended be adopted as follows:

The City of Marquette Ordains:

Section 1. Section 2.100 and Section 2.101 of Chapter 17 of Title II "WATER SUPPLY AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL RATES," is hereby amended to read as follows:

2.100. Water Rates. The rates to be charged for water service furnished by the Water Supply and Sewage Disposal System of the City shall be as follows:

(1) Metered Service:

1st. 2400 cu. ft. per month — 18.75 cents per cu. ft.

2nd. 2400 cu. ft. per month — 15 cents per 100 cu. ft.

3rd. 2400 cu. ft. per month — 11.25 cents per 100 cu. ft.

All over 7200 cu. ft. per month — 5.625 cents per 100 cu. ft.

To the foregoing there shall be added a monthly service charge, based on the size of the customer's meter, as follows:

5/8" meter	\$ 0.69 per month
3/4" meter	0.94 per month
1" meter	1.25 per month
1 1/4" meter	1.56 per month
1 1/2" meter	1.88 per month
2" meter	2.50 per month
3" meter	5.00 per month
4" meter	10.00 per month
6" meter	15.00 per month
8" meter	25.00 per month

The minimum bill for any month for metered customers shall be \$1.25.

(2). Flat Rate Water Service:

For dwelling of 4 rooms or less — \$0.94 per month

For each additional room — \$0.13 per month

For each private water closet — \$0.25 per month

For each bath tub or shower — \$0.25 per month

For each kitchen sink — \$0.25 per month

For each wash basin — \$0.25 per month

During the months of June, July, August and September, flat rate customers shall be charged an additional amount for lawn sprinkling service as follows:

\$0.50 per month for the first 3,000 sq. ft. or less of lot area.

\$0.15 per month for each additional 1,000 sq. ft. of lot area or major portion thereof.

Minimum monthly bill — \$1.25.

(3). Construction Service or other service where water is taken from an unmetered outlet.

A \$1.88 service charge shall be made for this service plus a charge of 25 cents per 100 cu. ft. estimated use.

Flat rate service will be given only where it is not feasible to give metered service.

Special water rates may be estimated by the City Commission to meet special circumstances or situations where, in its judgment, a special rate is deemed proper and advisable.

2.101 Sewage Disposal Rates. Charges for sewage disposal service shall be levied upon each lot or parcel of land or premises having any sewer connection with the Water Supply and Sewage Disposal System on the basis of the charges made by the City for the water used therein or thereon on the following basis:

(1). Metered Service:

1st. 2400 cu. ft. per month — 20.63 cents per 100 cu. ft.

2nd. 2400 cu. ft. per month — 16.50 cents per 100 cu. ft.

3rd. 2400 cu. ft. per month — 12.38 cents per 100 cu. ft.

All over 7200 cu. ft. per month —

6.19 cents per 100 cu. ft.

To the foregoing there shall be added a monthly service charge, based on the size of the customer's meter, as follows:

5/8" meter	\$ 0.75 per month
3/4" meter	1.03 per month
1" meter	1.38 per month
1 1/4" meter	1.73 per month

The minimum bill for any one month for metered customers shall be \$1.38.

(2). Flat Rate Water Service:

For dwellings of 4 rooms or less — \$1.03 per month

For each additional room — \$0.14 per month

For each private water closet — \$0.28 per month

For each bath tub or shower — \$0.28 per month

For each kitchen sink — \$0.28 per month

For each wash basin — \$0.28 per month

Where sewage disposal service is furnished to users not connected to the water system, or in cases where users make use of large quantities of water which may be discharged into storm sewers, or for other miscellaneous uses of water for which special consideration should be given, special rates may be fixed by the City Commission.

Sewage disposal rates for the months of June, July, and August shall be based on the average of the quantity of water billed for the previous months of April and May, regardless of the quantity of water used during these three (3) months.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect ten (10) days after its adoption, and shall apply to the computation of all billings thereafter.

July 21, 1959

A special meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held in the Commission Chambers at the City Hall Tuesday, July 21, 1959 at 3:00 o'clock P.M.

Present: Mayor Rydholm, Commissioners Alholm, Bur, and Hammerschmidt.

Moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that the following ordinance be adopted as an emergency ordinance and be given an immediate effect: AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 2.102 of CHAPTER 17, of TITLE II, WATER SUPPLY AND SEWAGE RATES OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF MARQUETTE, MICHIGAN.

The City of Marquette Ordains:

Section 1. Section 2.102 of Chapter 17 of Title II "WATER SUPPLY AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL RATES" is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 2.102: Rates Outside City Limits. The rates charged users of the service furnished by the water supply and sewage disposal system outside of the corporate limits of the City shall be double the rate structure as provided in Sections 2.100 and 2.101 of Chapter 17 of Title II, "Water Supply and Sewage Disposal rates". Wholesale sale of water and/or sewer services to any consumer or consumers outside of the City shall be fixed by the City

Commission.

Section 2. This Ordinance is declared to be an emergency Ordinance and shall be in full force and effect immediately after its adoption and shall apply to the computation of all billings thereafter.

A report from City Manager George T. Meholick was read wherein he tabulated bids received for the installation and removal of a quantity of curbing throughout the City of Marquette. Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that the low bid of N. R. Hongisto in the sum of \$0.10 per lineal foot for the removal of old curb and \$1.53 per lineal foot for the installation of new curbing, be accepted.

It was moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to enter into a rental agreement for the use of a street sweeper to be used in the City of Marquette from the Hunter Tractor and Machinery Company of Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign an agreement retaining the Kaiser Engineers to make a study of all assets of the Light and Power System of the City of Marquette.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

August 4, 1959

A special meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall, Tuesday, August 4, 1959 at 7:00 o'clock P. M.

Present: Mayor Rydholm, Commissioners Bur, Hammerschmidt and Smith.

Absent: Commissioner Alholm.

It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Smith and unanimously adopted, that the absence of Commissioner Alholm be excused, he being away from the city.

It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, the merchants of the City of Marquette have planned to hold a sidewalk sale between the hours of 9:00 A. M. and 9:00 P. M. on the 5th day of August, to make such sale possible it will be necessary to close off traffic on South Front Street from Spring Street to Washington Street and on Washington Street from Front Street to Tihrd Street in the City, the same being the route of M-28 and US-41;

RESOLVED, that permission is hereby given to so close off those portions of South Front Street and Washington Street to enable the merchants of the City of Marquette to hold a sidewalk sale during the hours mentioned, and the City Manager and Police Departments are hereby directed to route traffic over an alternate route and to direct the traffic accordingly;

RESOLVED FURTHER, that this resolution is subject to the approval of the Michigan State Highway Department.

At this time Mayor Rydholm declared a recess in order that work may be finished on the tabulation

of bids received on Contract No. 3 of the Water Expansion Program. Following the recess, City Manager George T. Meholick stated that August 4th. was the date set for the receiving of bids on Contract No. 3 of the Water Works Improvement Program and introduced Mr. S. D. Porter of McNamee, Porter and Seeley, Consulting Engineers on the Water Improvement Project.

Mr. Porter then read a communication wherein certain recommendations were made regarding bids received on Sections A, B and C of the Water Works Improvement Program known as Contract No. 3. Mr. Porter recommends that Section A, Divisions 1 and 2 and Section B be awarded to Reed and Noyce of Lansing, Michigan, they having submitted the low bid for that work in the sum of \$177,198.40 and that Section C of this Contract be awarded to Edward Johnson Construction Company of Marinette, Wisconsin, in the sum of \$60,607.90. Following discussion regarding these contracts and certain stipulations to be written into the working agreements, it was moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that the Commission concur with the recommendations of the Engineers and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign the working agreements for the Contract so bid in behalf of the City of Marquette contingent upon the sale of the bonds for the financing of such program and that said bidders be notified forthwith of this contingent action.

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held in the Commission Chambers at the City Hall Monday, August 10, 1959 at 7:00 P. M.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that the reading of the minutes of the previous meetings be waived.

A communication from John Zabelski, Safety Consultant from the office of the Automobile Club of Michigan, was read wherein he presented the City of Marquette an Honorable Mention Award in the 1958 AAA National Pedestrian Protection Contest. Mayor Rydholm then acknowledged acceptance of the award in behalf of the City of Marquette. A communication was then read from Honorable G. Mennen Williams, Governor of the State of Michigan, congratulating the City for its remarkable record of safety which prompted this recognition.

A communication from Glenn S. Allen, Jr., President, Michigan Municipal League, was read wherein he requests the City to acknowledge and sign a proxy to be used by the League in voting to continue the corporate term of the League. Mayor Rydholm directed that this proxy be filled out in behalf of the City of Marquette and forwarded to the League Headquarters.

A report from City Manager George T. Meholick was read wherein he tabulated bids received for bituminous aggregate for the 1959 paving program. Following a short discussion on this matter, it was moved by Com-

missioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Smith and unanimously adopted, that the City Commission concur with the recommendation of the City Manager, and award the contract to the Thornton Construction Company of Hancock, Michigan, for the lying in place of a quantity of bituminous aggregate and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign this agreement in behalf of the City.

A report from City Manager George T. Meholick was read wherein he tabulated bids received for a quantity of water pipe and fittings. The City of Marquette Ordains:
Section 1. Sections 5.44 and 5.48 of Chapter 24 of Title V — Zoning and Planning — of the Code of the City of Marquette is hereby amended as follows:

5.44 Board of Appeals "SECTION X — BOARD OF APPEALS."

1. A Board of Appeals is hereby established. The Board of Appeals shall consist of five freeholders who meet the eligibility requirements contained in Section 5.1 of the Charter and who during their term of office shall not be city or school board officers or employees or be nominees or candidates for elective city or school board office, who shall be appointed by the City Commission, and shall serve for a term of three years; provided, that upon the effective date of this Ordinance, or as soon thereafter as may be, two such members shall be designated to serve for terms expiring on January 15, 1960, two for terms expiring on January 15, 1961, and one for a term expiring on January 15, 1962. The members shall serve without compensation but may employ a secretary and such other employees as may be necessary to transact official business as required herein, with the approval of the City Manager. The Marquette Planning Board shall appoint one of its members to attend meetings of the Board of Appeals. The person so appointed shall have the right to enter into the discussions held in matters of appeal but shall have no vote. Three of the five designated members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The members of the Board shall select one of its members as Chairman on January 15th of each year, and the Chairman shall have equal voice and vote with other members.

5.48 General Powers of Board.

5. The Board of Appeals may reverse or affirm wholly or in

part or may modify any order, requirement, decision or determination appealed from and shall make such order, requirement, decision or determination as in its opinion ought to be made in the premises and to that end shall have all the powers of the administrative official appealed from. The concurring vote of 3 members of the Board of Appeals shall be necessary to reverse any order, requirement, decision or determination appealed from or to decide in favor of the applicant on any matter on which it is required to pass or to effect any variation in the requirements of this Ordinance.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall take effect ten days after its adoption and publication.

A communication from George Brown was read wherein he petitions the Commission to purchase a designated parcel of city owned property. Following considerable discussion on this matter, it was moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that this request to purchase city owned property be referred to the City Manager, the City Assessor and the City Attorney for a study and report to the Commission.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

August 26, 1959

A special meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held in the Commission Chambers at the City Hall Wednesday, August 26, 1959 at 4:00 P. M.

Present: Mayor Rydholm, Commissioners Alholm, Bur, Hammerschmidt and Smith.

Mayor Rydholm announced that the purpose of this meeting was to discuss various matters with the Nordberg Manufacturing Company and to consider the letting of the contract for Section 2, namely: the Booster Station and Tank Foundation for the Water Expansion Program and other matters pending before the Commission.

A report from City Manager, George T. Meholick, was read wherein he called the Commission's attention to certain options in the City's contract with the Nordberg Manufacturing Company of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, dated February 18, 1957, to purchase certain repair and spare parts, and submitting a proposed supplemental agreement for the exercising of that option and also for the purchasing of crude fuel oil treating equipment for use in the City's Diesel Generating Units. Such report also recommended that competitive bidding would not result in any advantage to the City because most of the parts and equipment are obtainable only through the Nordberg Manufacturing Company. It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

RESOLVED, That the City of Marquette exercise its option to purchase certain repair and spare parts, and services and equipment provided under its contract dated February 18, 1957, with the Nordberg Manufacturing Com-

pany of Milwaukee, Wisconsin; that no advantage would result to the City by taking competitive bids for same because such parts and equipment are obtainable only through such company; and that the Mayor and City Clerk are hereby authorized to execute the proposed Supplemental Agreement extending and changing the terms of payment from the original contract between the City of Marquette and the Nordberg Manufacturing Company to be effective August 26, 1959; and that the method of payment as provided in Paragraph 6 of such Supplemental Agreement and the payment of the amount covered by Paragraph 5 of such Supplemental Agreement, are hereby authorized and approved, and further that the Mayor and City Clerk are hereby authorized to execute an agreement dated August 26, 1959 to purchase crude fuel oil treating equipment.

A communication from M. R. VanEyck of the firm of McNamee, Porter and Seeley, Consulting Engineers, was read wherein he tabulated bids received on Tank Foundation and Booster Pumping Station under Contract No. 2 of the Water Works Improvement Program. The bids as tabulated in his communication are as follows: Proksch Construction Company, \$47,845.00; C & C Construction Company, Inc., \$47,850.00; Acton Construction Company, Inc., \$48,677.00; McDonald Construction Company, Inc., \$55,610.00. Following a short discussion on this matter, it was moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the Consulting Engineers, Contract No. 2 of the Water Works Improvement Program be awarded to the Proksch Construction Company of Iron River, Michigan, they being the

low bidder meeting all specifications. This contract being let contingent upon the sale of the bonds and that a letter of intent be sent the Proksch Construction Company to this effect.

A communication from William H. Nestle, State Inspector of Jails was read wherein he commended the Chief of Police for a fine job in keeping the city jail clean and run in an orderly manner. Mayor Rydholm ordered this communication received and placed on file.

A communication from John H. Huss, Director of Michigan Municipal League, was read wherein he suggests that the officials be registered for the annual convention prior to convention dates. Included with this communication is a form to be used in listing the officials who will attend the annual meeting. Mayor Rydholm then directed that this communication be received and placed on file.

A report from City Manager, George T. Meholick, was read regarding engineering services connected with the Water Works Improvement Program. In his report, Mr. Meholick recommends that the resident engineers supervision of this construction be handled by the City's Engineering Division, under the general supervision of the Consulting Engineers. Following a discussion on this matter, wherein Mr. VanEyck, Consulting Engineer of the firm of McNamee, Porter and Seeley, addressed the Commission, assuring them that the resident engineer and the firm of McNamee, Porter and Seeley would work very close on all construction connected with this improvement pro-

gram and that the consulting engineers would continue with general engineering services as outlined in the agreement of May 11, 1959. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that the City Commission concur with the recommendations of the City Manager, George T. Meholick, regarding the engineering of the Water Works Improvement Program.

Health Officer, Doctor Beatrice Bolan, addressed the Commission regarding a certain health hazard in the City of Marquette. The Commission unanimously agreed that the Health Officer was doing a wonderful job throughout our community and that the Commission wholeheartedly endorse the work that the Health Department is doing. Doctor Bolan brought to the attention of the Commission a bill, now before the Federal House of Representatives, concerning the control of pollution in navigable waters of Michigan. This bill is referred to as H. R. 8494. The Commission asked that they be furnished copies of this bill, that they might better familiarize themselves with its contents. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Smith and unanimously adopted, that the City Attorney be directed to prepare a resolution on the matter of this bill to be acted upon at the next regular Commission meeting.

There being no further business before the Commission, the meeting was adjourned.

It was moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted that this petition be referred to the City Manager, George T. Meholick, for study and report.

A report from City Manager, George T. Meholick, was read wherein he tabulated bids received on a new boiler for the Palestra Building. It was moved by Commissioner Alholm and supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager, George T. Meholick, the low bid of Dressler & Sons, Marquette, Michigan, in the sum of \$2,236.79 for the installation of a Stoker Fired Boiler at the Palestra Building be accepted.

A report from City Manager, George T. Meholick, was read containing a cost estimate for the installation of a sidewalk along the south side of Ohio Street from Oak to Sixth Street. Moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Smith, that the following resolution be and the same is hereby unanimously adopted,

WHEREAS, A petition has been

received and filed requesting the following improvement: Sidewalk—South Side of Ohio from Oak to Sixth Street.

The Board of Appeals shall consist of five freeholders who meet the eligibility requirements contained in Section 5.1 of the Charter and who during their term of office shall not be city or school board officers or employees or be nominees or candidates for elective city or school board office, who shall be appointed by the City Commission, and shall serve for a term of three years; Provided, that upon the effective date of this Ordinance, or as soon thereafter as may be, two such members shall be designated to serve for terms expiring on January 15, 1960; two for terms expiring on January 15, 1961, and one for a term expiring on January 15, 1962. The members shall serve without compensation but may employ a secretary and such other employees as may be necessary to transact official business as required herein, with the approval of the City Manager. The Marquette Planning Board shall appoint one of its members to attend meetings of the Board of Appeals. The person so appointed shall have the right to enter into the discussions held in matters of appeal but shall have no vote. Three of the five designated members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The members of the Board shall select one of its members as Chairman on January 15th

of each year, and the Chairman shall have equal voice and vote with other members.

5.48 General Powers of Board.

5. The Board of Appeals may reverse or affirm wholly or in part or may modify any order, requirement, decision or determination appealed from and shall make such order, requirement, decision or determination as in its opinion ought to be made in the premises and to that end shall have all the powers of the administrative official appealed from. The concurring vote of 3 members of the Board of Appeals shall be necessary to reverse any order, requirement, decision or determination appealed from or to decide in favor of the applicant on any matter on which it is required to pass or to effect any variation in the requirements of this ordinance.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall take effect ten days after its adoption and publication.

Upon the close of the public hearing, it was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, that

the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, It appears further by said affidavit that a like notice has been sent by mail to each owner of property subject to such assessment; and

WHEREAS, All suggestions and objections made to said assessment roll therein, have been heard and considered; and

WHEREAS, Said assessment roll and the assessments therein having been reviewed by the Commission and the Assessor and all needful corrections of the same having been made;

RESOLVED, That said assessment roll, to-wit: Special Assessment Roll No. 317, and the respective assessments therein, are hereby confirmed;

FURTHER RESOLVED, That such assessments may be paid in five equal annual installments at the time fixed for the payment of regular city taxes, together with interest on such installments at the rate of four per cent per annum from the date of the confirmation of said special assessment roll.

It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted that the report of the City Health Department concerning recommended action for the condemna-

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tion of premises described as Lot 48 of Harlow's Addition Number 1, also known as No. 545 West Spring Street, Marquette, Michigan, be received; that the City Clerk fix a date for a public hearing thereon and serve notice thereof upon the owners and occupants of said premises at least ten days prior to such date of public hearing, such notice to conform to the requirements of the ordinances of the City in such case.

A report from City Manager, George T. Meholick, was read wherein he informed the Commission of the state of repair of the concrete oil storage tank at Diesel Electric Plant No. 4. Following considerable discussion regarding this storage tank it was moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager, Intrusion Prepakt, Inc. of Cleveland, Ohio be engaged to make the necessary repairs on this oil storage tank and that pursuant to Section 12.1 the City refrain from competitive bidding on this work because of the nature of the specialized material to be used for this repair work. The Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign the contract between the Intrusion Prepakt, Inc. and the City of Marquette, estimated cost to be approximately \$1,900.00.
