

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

January 11, 1960

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held in the Commission Chambers at the City Hall Monday, January 11, 1960 at 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present: Mayor Rydholm, Commissioners Alholm, Bur, Hammerschmidt, and Smith.

Absent: None.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Smith and unanimously adopted, that the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting be waived.

A communication from City Manager George T. Meholick was read wherein he presented a fire protection agreement between the City of Marquette and K. I. Sawyer Air Force Base. It was moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the City enter into a mutual aid agreement with K. I. Sawyer Air Force Base for fire protection, and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign said agreement in behalf of the City of Marquette.

A communication from City Manager George T. Meholick was read wherein he informs the Commission of an opportunity to lease a parcel of city owned property for office and warehouse purposes, a part of his communication being a diagram showing the building site desired for leasing. It was then moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the City Attorney be authorized to draw up a lease agreement covering this parcel of city owned land.

A communication from City Manager George T. Meholick was read wherein he attaches an easement agreement between the D.S.S. & A. Railroad Company and the City of Marquette for the right

to install and maintain a sanitary sewer line underneath their property at the Wright Street intersection. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the City enter into an easement agreement between the D.S.S. & A. Railroad Company and the City of Marquette granting the City permission to install and maintain a sanitary sewer line at the railroad survey station 78.00, commonly referred to as the Wright Street intersection, and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign said agreement in behalf of the City of Marquette.

A communication from John B. Bennett, Representative, 12th. District of Michigan, was read wherein he informs the Commission of action he intends to take before the House Appropriations Subcommittee. This communication was ordered received and placed on file and that a letter of acknowledgment be forwarded to Honorable John B. Bennett.

A communication from the Chairman of the Marquette City Election Board was read wherein a resolution designating the polling places in the City of Marquette was enclosed. It was then moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Smith, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

RESOLVED, That the following places be designated as polling places in the respective precincts for the Annual Spring Primary Election to be held Monday, February 15, 1960, the Annual Spring Election to be held Monday, April 4, 1960, the August Primary, and the November General Elections; the polls to be open on said days from 7:00 o'clock a. m. until 8:00 o'clock p. m. Eastern Standard Time:

Mayor Rydholm then entertained a resolution fixing the salary of the City Attorney. It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Smith, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

RESOLVED, That the compensation for the services of the City Attorney be fixed at \$5,000.00 per annum, to be effective January 1, 1960, and that same shall apply to and be in contemplation of the normal duties of this office as described in Section 4.11 of the Charter and all other duties required of him by the Commission or at its general direction which may be consistent with his office, except such services as described in Section 4.12 of the Charter, which shall be required and compensation provided for specifically in each instance at the discretion of the Commission.

A discussion was held concerning the Administrative officers of the Department of Public Works. The office of City Engineer - Superintendent of Public Works was proposed along with a subordinate position of Street Superintendent. The City Engineer - Superintendent is to be responsible and in charge of the Department of Public Works. The subordinate position of Street Superintendent would assist the City Engineer - Superintendent by being responsible for the operation and maintenance of the streets, sidewalks, sewers and garbage disposal. It was moved by Commissioner Hamerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Bur, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

RESOLVED, That the Office of the Superintendent of Public Works and the Office of the City Engineer be established as one administrative office and hereafter be known as City Engineer - Superintendent of Public Works, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City Manager be authorized to establish the position of Street Superintendent which will be subordinate to the Office of City Engineer - Superintendent.

A special meeting of the Marquette City Commission was held in the Commission Chambers at the City Hall, Monday, January 18, 1960 at 4:00 o'clock P. M.

Present: Mayor C. Fred Rydholm; Commissioners: Alholm, Bur, Hammerschmidt, and Smith.

All members of the Commission were present and waived the Written Notice of this meeting as provided in Section 6.2 of the City Charter.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss with representatives from the Marquette Insurance Association the following insurance programs:

1. Comprehensive General Liability Insurance Coverage
2. Boiler and Machinery Insurance Coverage

After considerable discussion on both types of insurance coverage, it was moved by Commissioner

Bur, supported by Commissioner Smith and unanimously adopted that the City Manager call for bids on Comprehensive General Liability Insurance for the City of Marquette on the following basis:

100/300 Bodily injury and Property Damage

alternative:

250/500 Bodily injury and Property Damage

On motion of Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, the matter of Boiler and Machinery Insurance Coverage was referred to the City Manager to advertise for bids on same with the breakdown of the limits as discussed on the pieces of equipment involved.

January 25, 1960

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held in the Commission Chambers at the City Hall Monday, January 25, 1960 at 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present: Mayor Rydholm, Commissioners Alholm, Smith and Hammerschmidt.

Absent: Commissioner Bur.

Moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that the absence of Commissioner Bur be excused, he being away from the City on City and County business.

Moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Smith, that the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting be waived.

A communication from Miss Marguerite Hammersmith, Faculty Sponsor, Future Nurses Club, Graveraet High School, was read wherein she requested permission to conduct a blue crutch sale on the streets of the City Friday, February 5, 1960 between the hours of 10 a. m. and 5 p. m. It was moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that this request be granted.

A communication from City Manager George T. Meholick was read wherein he pointed out the importance of receiving petitions for street, sidewalk, curb, and all other capital construction early in the fiscal year in order that these requests be figured into the current fiscal budget. It was moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that only petitions to be financed by special assessment which are received on or before the last regular meeting in March will be placed upon the agenda of the City Commission for its consideration for the completion of such improvements during

the season immediately following; and that all such petitions received thereafter will be so considered only upon the discretion of the City Commission.

A communication from City Manager George T. Meholick was read wherein he informs the Commission of a request made by the City of Sault Ste. Marie to have three of their employees come to the Marquette City Sewage Disposal Plant for a period of from eight to ten weeks to gain experience in operating the plant at Sault Ste. Marie now being constructed. It was then moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that the recommendation of the City Manager to approve the request of the City Manager of Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan, for the City of Marquette to provide the arrangements for three employees of that City to receive training and experience in the operation of a sewage disposal plant in this City be accepted, and that the City Manager and the City Attorney prepare an agreement to cover the arrangements therefore wherein such training will be at no cost or expense to the City of Marquette and that this City will be saved harmless from any claims for injuries or damages to said three employees and for damage to any property or equipment of the City of Marquette.

A report from City Manager George T. Meholick was read regarding the impact of 1960 federal decennial census on City revenue. In his report several comparison charts were shown regarding the increase in population over the past years and the percentage rate of increase and what effect it will have on monies diverted by the State back to the City. Following considerable discussion on this report and comments by the Mayor and the City Commission, it was

ordered received and placed on file.

A report from City Manager George T. Meholick was read wherein he informs the Commission of a request for two hour customer parking in the 500 block on North Third Street. Following a short discussion, it was moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the following traffic control measure be placed in effect on a ninety (90) day trial basis: Two hour customer parking between the hours of 9:00 a. m. and 5:00 p. m. in the 500 block on North Third Street.

A report from City Manager George T. Meholick was read regarding a traffic control measure on Washington Street from Fifth Street west to Garfield Avenue. Following considerable discussion regarding the matter of a traffic control measure on this street, it was unanimously decided by the Commission that this matter be referred back to the City Manager for study and recommendation.

A report was read regarding a certain traffic control measure that has temporarily been in effect for a ninety (90) day trial period. It was moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Smith and unanimously adopted, that the following traffic control measure be made permanent: No parking on the north side of Waldo Street from Presque Isle Ave. west to the dead end at the College property.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

February 8, 1960

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held in the Commission Chambers at the City Hall Monday, Feb. 8 1960 at 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present: Mayor Rydholm, Commissioners Alholm, Bur, Hammerschmidt and Smith.

Absent: None.

✓ Mayor Rydholm welcomed the presence of the girl scout troops numbers 58 and 61 along with their leaders.

On motion of Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Smith, and unanimously adopted, the reading of the minutes of the previous meetings be waived.

✓ A communication from Walter N. Noack, Director of Enforcement, Liquor Control Commission, was read wherein he informs the Commission of a request received from Frank P. L'Huillier to drop John R. Inch and add Garnet M. L'Huillier as a partner on a 1959 tavern and SDM license. It was then moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the Chief of Police and the City Manager this request be granted.

✓ A communication from George T. Meholick, City Manager, was read wherein he presented a resolution regarding the relocation of U. S.-41 and M-28 in and through the City of Marquette. It was then moved by Commissioner Alholm, supported by Commissioner Bur, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the proposal by the Michigan State Highway Department for the alignment of US-41 and M-28 in and through the city of Marquette, all as set forth in a map of said alignment herewith

submitted to the City on January 26, 1960 be, and here-by is, approved.

THE DESCRIPTION OF THE ALIGNMENT is as follows:

Beginning at the west city limits near the intersection of U. S.-41, M-28, and Westwood Road, thence southeasterly to the intersection of the Duluth, South Shore, and Atlantic Railroad at the west city limits, thence easterly and southeasterly in the vicinity of Whetstone Brook to existing US-41 (Front Street) and M-28.

AND, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City of Marquette hereby grants the Michigan State Highway Department permission to take over and designate this route as part of the State trunkline system.

YEAS: Mayor Rydholm, Commissioners Alholm, Bur, Hammerschmidt and Smith.

NAYS: None.

✓ Attached to the previous resolution was a memorandum of understanding between the City of Marquette and the Michigan State Highway Department concerning US-41 and M-28 in the City of Marquette, limited access highway. This memorandum lists road closures, separations, intersections at grade and frontage roads. It was then moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that the measures as set forth in this memorandum be approved and that the Mayor and Clerk be authorized to sign same in behalf of the City of Marquette.

✓ A detailed report from City Manager George T. Meholick was read regarding sanitary landfill — garbage and refuse collection. In his report the City Manager shows a chronology of operation cost of the garbage and refuse program from 1954 to 1959 showing operation cost and labor cost as well

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as the number of men to carry on this operation. Mr. Meholick also informs the Commission of the number of units necessary to carry on this work as well as the cost of same. He also shows the estimated operating cost of sanitary landfill and combined garbage — rubbish pickup. A breakdown of this overall cost showing the actual cost to each citizen for this improvement service was given. The City Commission commented on this very thorough report and decided that this matter should be taken up at a special meeting where all details can be discussed at length. This special meeting to include any interested citizens who may wish to be heard. Mayor Rydholm then announced that a special meeting of the City Commission will be held February 17, 1960 at 7:00 p. m.

A communication from the City Clerk was read wherein he informs the City Commission that certain traffic control measures have now been in effect for a ninety (90) day trial period. It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that the following traffic control measures be made permanent: Yield right-of-way signs placed so that Magnetic Street yields to Seventh Street; Seventh Street yields to College Avenue, and that parking be permitted on the east side only of Second Street from Magnetic Street to Fair Avenue.

It was then moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Smith and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager and the Chief of Police, the following traffic control measures be placed in effect for a ninety (90) day trial period: Yield right-of-way signs placed so Lee Street yields to College Avenue, Hebard Court yields to College Avenue, Eighth Street yields to College Avenue, Norway Avenue yields

to College Avenue.

It was then moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that yield right-of-way signs be placed so that Bluff Street yields to Seventh Street, and Ridge Street yields to Seventh Street. These traffic control measures to be placed in effect for a ninety (90) day trial period.

A communication from Ken Dorman, Member, Steering Committee, Upper Michigan Tourist Association, was read wherein he requested permission to address the Commission regarding the participation of the City of Marquette in the Upper Peninsula Tourist Association, Tourist and Travel Promotion. Mayor Rydholm then invited Mr. Dorman to address the commission. Following Mr. Dorman's address, the Commission unanimously agreed that the City participate in this worthwhile promotion.

Mayor Rydholm then appointed Mr. Franz Menze and Mr. Ray Muck to serve three year terms on the Board of Review. The Commission unanimously favored these appointments.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

That the approval and consent of the City of Marquette be and is hereby given to the establishment as State trunkline highway the location described as follows:

Commencing at a point on Front Street, the present route of US-41 and M-28, south of Palms Street in the City of Marquette; thence westerly on a proposed new location along Whetstone Brook to Altamont Street; thence northwesterly approximately one-half mile; thence westerly parallel to the Duluth, South Shore and Atlantic Railroad to a point on the west city limits of Marquette. (+1.6 miles, approximately) Commencing again on the south city limits of Marquette; thence northwesterly on a proposed new location to a point on the present route of US-41 and M-28 near the west city limits of Marquette. (+0.2 mile, approximately)

A communication from Ralph W. Crego, Chairman, Mayor's Exchange Committee for Michigan Week, was read wherein he informs the Commission of the date and of the name of the City with which Marquette has been paired. Said proposition shall be spread on a separate ballot in substantially the form set forth in the preceeding sentence; the City Clerk shall cause notice of the said special proposition to be published and posted as part of the election notice of the Annual Spring Election in manner required by law.

A letter from Wayne Miriani of Detroit, Michigan, was read urging the City of Marquette to support legislation allocating additional funds from intangibles tax collections to local governments. Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, the City Manager was instructed to send telegrams to our State Representative and Senator urging their support of House Bill No. 519 and similar legislation to accomplish such additional allocation of funds.

A letter from the City Manager of Traverse City, Michigan, was read requesting the support of the City of Marquette for the establishment of a federal court in that City. Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Smith, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, the Congress of the United States is being urged to establish a division of the United States District Court at Traverse City, Michigan; and,

WHEREAS, such action would remove from the City of Marquette the location of the Northern Division of the Western District of Michigan of the United States District Court, thus creating a hardship to the residents of the Upper Peninsula of Michigan;

BE IT RESOLVED:

1. That the City of Marquette, Michigan go on record as opposing the removal of the United States District Court to Traverse City, Michigan; and

2. That copies of these resolu-

tions be forwarded to the members of Congress from the Upper Peninsula of Michigan and the United States Senators from Michigan.

A proposed agreement with Kenower, MacArthur and Company for services and fees in the handling of the proposed special assessment bond issue for \$200,000.00 was read. Moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, the proposed agreement was approved, and the Mayor and City Clerk were authorized to sign same in behalf of the City.

A communication from Sanford A. Brown, Michigan State Treasurer, was read wherein he informs the Commission of monies being paid the local government units from the intangibles tax money and from the liquor license money due from the State. This communication was ordered received and placed on file.

A communication from James W. Miller, Secretary, Michigan State Administrative Board, was read wherein he informs the City Commission that as fast as monies from the intangibles tax are available, local governing units can expect their fair share. This communication was ordered received and placed on file.

Mayor Rydholm announced that this was the date set for a public hearing on the vacation of a portion of Russell Street. The public hearing was then declared open and interested citizens addressed the Commission regarding this matter. Mayor Rydholm called a recess in order that the original plat plan of this area be studied by the Commission and interested citizens present. Interested citizens living in the area of Russell Street then addressed the Commission pointing out reasons that they wish this street to be cut through. After all interested citizens were heard by the Commission, it was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Hammerschmidt and unanimously adopted, that there be a ten (10) minute recess to allow the Commission an opportunity to discuss the legal questions that had come up during the public hearing. Following the recess period, Mayor Rydholm called the meeting to order and asked the City Attorney to clarify the statute governing the length of city blocks. Following the clarification of certain other legal questions, Mayor Rydholm declared the public hearing closed. It was then moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Bur, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, a motion has been filed requesting the vacating of Russell Street between Albert Street and Magnetic Street in the City of Marquette, Michigan; and

WHEREAS, it appears that that portion of Russell Street has not been used as a public street since its dedication and that it is unlikely that it ever will be so used, that same deadends at the south end and is not necessary as a connecting street with any other street to the south, and that the public benefit and general welfare will better be served if said portion of Russell Street is vacated;

RESOLVED, that Russell Street, between Albert Street and Magnetic Street be and the same is hereby vacated and discontinued, reserving and accepting, however, an easement therein for utilities

A communication from Everett H. Kent, City Clerk, was read wherein he informed the Commission of a certain temporary traffic control measure that has been in effect on a ninety (90) day trial basis. A report from City Manager George T. Meholick was read regarding the power requirements for the City of Marquette. In his report Mr. Meholick made a four (4) year comparison chart as well as a ten (10) year chart covering a period from 1946 through 1955. The Mayor and City Commission unanimously agreed that this was a fine report and shall be used in the Commission's study regarding the power situation, present and future, for the City of Marquette.

City Manager George T. Me-

holick recommended the appointment of Howard Coppens as Street Superintendent for the City of Marquette. It was then moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that the City Commission concur with the recommendations of the City Manager in this appointment.

City Manager George T. Meholick informed the City Commission that a request has been received from the Shiras Institute to expand the zoo at Presque Isle Park. A special meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held in the Commission Chambers at the City Hall, Monday, March 21, 1960 at 7:00 o'clock P. M.

Present: Mayor Rydholm, Commissioners Alholm, Bur, Hammerschmidt and Smith.

Absent: None.

A petition signed by four (4) property owners requesting the vacating of Russell Street between Kaye Avenue and College Avenue was read. It was moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that in view of the fact that potential building lots are located in this block, the petition to vacate the said street be denied.

A communication from Clarence Bridgeman, Bridgeman Trucking Company, was read wherein he requested the Commission to reconsider the proposed plan to have one way east bound traffic on East Main Street. It was moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Smith and unanimously adopted, that the letter be received and used for study at the time of the parking plan and movement of traffic in connection with the parking pattern when the automobile parking system is placed in effect.

A communication from Sister Adelgunda, Administrator, St. Mary's Hospital, was read wherein she thanked the Commission for their cooperation in behalf of the hospital in the matter of the realignment of US-41 in the City of Marquette. This communication was ordered received and placed on file.

A communication from John Dorais, President, St. Michael's Home and School Club, was read wherein traffic control measures on Presque Isle Avenue at the in-

tersection of Kaye and College Avenues were pointed out. The Commission unanimously agreed that at budget time consideration be given the installation of traffic control lights at these two intersections in order to safe guard the health and welfare of small children crossing at those intersections to attend school.

Mayor Rydholm informed the Commission of a letter sent to him by John Biekkala requesting

an opportunity to purchase a parcel of land now under option by the City. This communication was referred to the City Manager with the instructions to confer with the City Attorney to get his opinion regarding the handling of the matter.

At this point in the meeting Commissioner Bur read the following informative letter into the minutes of the meeting.

The following formula detailing the steps that are usually taken by a power company to secure the holdings of a municipally-owned electric utility recently appeared in the Newsletter of the Florida Municipal Utilities Association. It is apparent that the formula is not confined to operations in Florida but has had widespread acceptance throughout the entire country. The seven-point formula, and the summary comments are quoted from the Florida Newsletter:

Step One: A Power Company selects a victim. A city of medium size, with no public relation policy, where only stop-gap financing has been used, with no sound, long-range financing program to cover costs of expansions when needed. Where additional generating and distribution facilities have not been provided when needed, and where the electric system has been made a political "football."

Step Two: A quiet campaign to win over one or more city commissioners or councilmen who will side with the power company, or elect ones who will. This gives the power companies a source of inside information; if necessary a movement to change the city charter so that only a single majority of the free-holders voting, can approve leasing the electric system.

Step Three: Suddenly a carefully selected "Citizens Committee" is formed which given advice to one and all, how the municipal utility should be operated, with an "Expert Authorities" report that recommends the city should

let the power company take over the system on their own terms.

Step Four: The "Citizens Committee" circulates a petition and presents it to the city officials, demanding they "invite" the power company to submit an offer to lease the electric system.

Step Five: "The Citizens Committee" puts on a membership drive to get a large number of people to high pressure the city officials into "inviting" a buy-out proposal by a power company. A referendum election date is set.

Step Six: The power company comes out in the open with an offer to lease the system, promising lower rates, 30-year franchise, etc., but no mention is made as to where the city will get the additional money for the General Fund when they lose their electric system.

Power company employees and hired workers then descend like locusts on the city, urging all the free-holders to vote in favor of their proposal. Full-page ads appear in the newspapers, the air is filled with radio and TV commercials, the mails are full of letters, cocktail parties are given for the citizens. The people are dazzled by promises of some sort of electrical paradise. City operation is belittled and lied about.

Step Seven: The referendum election is held, more power company workers are in the city taking people to the polls, checking the polling list and calling on people who have not voted, spending money and doing all that is possible in their power to win the election.

Too many of our cities have not expanded the capacity of their power plants, in keeping with the population increase.

City Officials seem afraid to issue revenue certificates for plant expansion, without first submitting the question to the citizens. These revenue certificates are not a lien on city property or tax rolls, but only the revenue of the

municipal electric system is obligated.

Too late, these officials realize they have waited too long to install additional generation — the city needs more power, it is not available—the city is now “ripe” for a power company to “move in.”

Municipal utilities are not the only ones that have to keep expanding as the private power companies are doing it all the time—the electric business is BIG business, and there is no reason for the municipals not keeping up with the times.

Retain a reputable engineering firm to make your feasibility report and design your system—obtain the services of qualified municipal financial advisor—make your long range plans for future expansion, then “STICK TO YOUR GUNS.”

Commissioner Hammerschmidt then read certain sections of the Charter and commented that in accordance with these provisions it would be to a great disadvantage to the citizenry to part with any portion of the electric utility and also went on record as favoring keeping and expanding the city's electric utility. Commissioner Smith along with Commissioner Alholm and Mayor Ryd-

holm all went on record as favoring the keeping of its present utility. City Manager George T. Meholick also commented on the value of keeping our utility. Mayor Rydholm then asked various citizens present to comment on their view points regarding the electric utility. Mr. Robert Biolo, Reporter for The Mining Journal, assured the Commission that all letters received by the paper, pro and con, on this matter would be printed. Following a lengthy discussion of questions and answers, the City Commission went on record on tape recording as favoring the keeping of and improving the city's electric utility system.

City Manager George T. Meholick recommended to the Commission that Milbert J. Keranen, Civil Engineer, be employed by the City. Moved by Commissioner Hammerschmidt, supported by Commissioner Alholm and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, Civil Engineer Milbert J. Keranen be employed by the City in accordance with a resolution adopted January 11, 1960.

There being no further business, Mayor Rydholm declared the meeting adjourned.
