A special meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall Monday, May 2, 1960 at 7:00 o'clock P. M.

Present: Mayor Smith, Commissioners Bur, Carlson and Rydholm.

Absent: Commissioner Tuominen.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted, that the absence of Commissioner Tuominen be excused because of illness.

Moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Carlson, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

RESOLVED, That this Commission hereby make and adopt the following estimates of all expenditures which will be required to be made from the several funds of the city during the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1960, and for the payment of interest and indebtedness to fall due during the year for the following Departments and purposes respectively, viz:

AND RESOLVED, That this Commission has estimated the revenue which will be forthcoming during the current year and has determined the amount necessary to balance the budget to be the sum of Five Hundred Fifteen Thousand, One Hundred Fifty Five Dollars and Fifty Five Cents (\$515,155.55) of which Four Hundred Sixty Five Thousand, Two Hundred Sixty One Dollars and Fifty Five Cents (\$465,261.55) is hereby fixed as the amount to be raised for general city tax purposes, and Forty Nine Thousand, Eight Hundred Ninety Four Dollars (\$49,894.00) is hereby fixed as the tax to be raised for the Peter White Library.

AND RESOLVED, That this Commission do meet on Monday, May 16, 1960, at 7:00 o'clock P. M. Eastern Standard Time for a public hearing upon said estimates and for the passage of the Annual Appropriation Bill; and that the City Clerk publish said estimates and notices of said hearings as required by the City Charter.

Moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Carlson, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

RESOLVED, That on March 4, 1960, the City Commission received a Resolution adopted by vote of the Board of Education of the City of Marquette requesting a School Tax Levy of Five Hundred Fifty Nine Thousand, Nine Hundred Fifty Three Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$559,953.50);

AND RESOLVED, That the Board of Education has estimated all of the revenue which will be forthcoming during their 1960-61 budget year and has determined this amount necessary to balance the school budget of which Four Hundred Seventy One Thousand, Nine Hundred Forty One Dollars (\$471,941.00) was determined for current operation expenses, and Eighty Eight Thousand, Twelve Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$88,012.50) was determined for payment of bonded indebtedness of school construction;

AND RESOLVED, That this Commission do meet on Monday, May 16, 1960, at 7:00 o'clock P. M. Eastern Standard Time for a public hearing upon said School Tax Levy and for the passage of the Annual School Tax Appropriation Bill; and that the City Clerk publish same estimate and notices of said hearing as required by City Charter.

Mayor Smith appointed L. H. Halverson to a three year term on the Board of Review. The Commission unanimously confirmed this appointment.

Mayor Smith then appointed John Dorais to a five year term on the Library Board. The Commission unanimously confirmed this appointment.

Mayor Smith proclaimed the week of May 1st. to May 8th. as National Music Week and recommended that this week be recognized by the people of our community.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

May 9, 1960

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held in the Commission Chambers at the City Hall Monday, May 9, 1960 at 7:00 o'clock P. M.

Present: Mayor Smith, Commissioners Bur, Carlson, Rydholm.

Absent: Commissioner Tuominen.

It was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that the absence of Commissioner Tuominen be excused from this meeting because of illness.

It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Carlson and unanimously adopted, that the reading of the minutes of the previous meetings be waived.

A communication from Mrs. Phyllis Payne, Corresponding Secretary, Junior Woman's Service Club, was read wherein she requested permission for that Organization to sponsor a Theatre Party at Northern Michigan College and sell tickets on the downtown streets of the City of Marquette on Friday, May 13th and Saturday, May 14th. It was moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted, that permission as requested be granted.

A communication from John F. Lahaie, President, Upper Michigan Tourist Association, was read wherein he informs the Commission of the date and place of the first annual meeting of that Organization. Following a short discussion on this matter, Mayor Smith ordered this communication received and placed on file.

A communication from Francis Mathews, Quartermaster, Veterans of Foreign Wars, was read wherein a request was made to sell Buddy Poppies on the streets of Marquette on May 27th and 28th. Moved by Commissioner Bur,

holm and unanimously adopted, that permission as requested be supported by Commissioner Ryd-granted.

A communication from Bruce G. Freel, President, Superior Cable Television Company, was read wherein he proposed that his company be given a franchise to construct and maintain a co-axial cable television system within the City of Marquette. Following a lengthy discussion on this matter and the matter of the present franchise as held by the Marquette Service Corporation, the Commission unanimously agreed that a letter be written by Mr. Meholick inviting Mr. Freel to a meeting of the City Commission at his convenience in order that the City Commission may learn more of his company's activities. The Commission also agreed that the Marquette Service Corporation be invited to a meeting at their convenience to explain some of the activities that have been accomplished under their present franchise. Mayor Smith ordered the communication from Mr. Freel of the Superior Cable Television Company be placed on file pending the outcome of the fore-mentioned meeting.

A telegram from Philip A. Hart, United States Senator, was read wherein he informs the Commission of an appropriation of \$75,000 for the construction of a forest disease research center at Marquette. A letter from John B. Bennett, Congressman, was read wherein he also informs the Commission of monies appropriated by the Senate Conferee Committee earmarked the same, for a forest research laboratory at Marquette. Following considerable discussion, it was unanimously agreed by the Commission that Senator Hart and Congressman Bennett be sent a letter thanking them for their efforts in the city's

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behalf in this matter.

A communication from City Clerk Everett H. Kent was read wherein he notified the Commission that certain traffic control measures have now been in effect on a ninety (90) day trial basis. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager and the Chief of Police, the following traffic control measures be made permanent:

Yield right-of-way signs on Lee Street yielding to College Avenue;

Yield right-of-way signs on Hebard Court yielding to College Avenue;

Yield right-of-way signs on Eighth Street yielding to College Avenue;

Yield right-of-way signs on Norway yielding to College Avenue;

Yield right-of-way signs on Bluff Street yielding to Seventh Street;

Yield right-of-way signs on Ridge Street yielding to Seventh Street.

A communication from Steve Johnson, Chairman, Marquette City Planning Board, was read wherein he informs the Commission of a request for the rezoning of an area on West Washington Street as follows: the north half of block 4 and all of block 5 in Nester's Addition Number One in the City of Marquette from "Residential District" to "General Business District" and that the Planning Board unanimously recommends this rezoning and to include this area in fire zone number two. It was then moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that the Commission concur with the recommendation of the Marquette City Planning board and consider the rezoning of the above described parcel of land and that a public

hearing on this change be held before the City Commission on May 31st, 1960 at 7:00 o'clock P. M. and that notice be given by publication in The Mining Journal, a daily newspaper published in this City prior to said hearing, in accordance with Section 5.50 of the Marquette City Code.

Mayor Smith announced that this is the appropriate time to appoint a certified public accounting firm to audit the city accounts in accordance with Section 8.9 of the City Charter and in compliance with Ordinance Number 165 and Ordinance Number 186. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Carlson and unanimously adopted, that Lawrence Scudder and Company be authorized to prepare the 1959-60 Annual Audit.

Mayor Smith announced that the unofficial 1960 census now stands at 19,657 for the City of Marquette.

City Manager George T. Meholick gave an oral report on his recent trip to the City Managers' Seminar held in Chicago.

A special meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held in the Commission Chambers at the City Hall Monday, May 16, 1960 at 7:00 o'clock P. M.

Present: Mayor Smith, Commissioners Bur, Carlson, and Rydholm.

Absent: Commissioner Tuominen.

On motion of Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Carlson, the absence of Commissioner Tuominen be excused because of illness.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Carlson and unanimously adopted, that the reading of the minutes of the previous meetings be waived.

Mayor Smith read a resolution of sympathy on the passing of Commissioner Victor L. Tuominen. Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, Victor L. Tuominen exemplified the finest of the traditions of citizenship and public service, as a leader in municipal government, as an enthusiastic promoter and participant in community athletic and recreational programs, and as one who was always willing and eager to serve, without reward, in any capacity in which his talents were needed; and,

WHEREAS, He served his community with distinction as a City Commissioner from 1950 to 1955, and was recently recalled to serve in the same office, and had entered upon his new duties with the same earnestness and zeal as before when his sudden illness took him from those duties; and,

WHEREAS, His untimely passing at the outset of his new term of public service has resulted in a deep feeling of regret among all who knew him and served with him;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

1. That the Mayor and City Commission of the City of Marquette, Michigan, does hereby recognize the invaluable services which Commissioner Victor L. Tu-

ominen has performed for his community, and does hereby express their deep regret in his passing and their deep sympathy to the members of his family;

2. That a copy of these resolutions be spread upon the minutes of the City of Marquette, and copies thereof be forwarded to the members of his family.

A petition signed by 43 property owners in Shiras Hills was read wherein a request was made for the installation of boulevard lighting in that Subdivision. It was then moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that this petition be referred to the City Manager and the Superintendent of the Light and Power Department for a study and report.

A resolution adopted by the Marquette Chamber of Commerce was read wherein it is recommended that the City Commission rescind action taken by the City Commission on June 5, 1934, which action designates certain premises where establishments handling spirits might be located. It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted, that this resolution be accepted and referred to the Planning and Zoning Board for a study and recommendation.

A communication from William D. Bessex, Jr. was read wherein he applies for permission to establish a Class C liquor license in his present tavern located at 922 West Washington Street in the City of Marquette. Mayor Smith directed that this communication be placed on file until such time as a recommendation is received from the Planning and Zoning Board regarding the location of business establishments of his nature.

A communication from Frank L. L'Huillier, Sr. was read wherein he asks the Commission to consider his request for a Class C liquor license in his present tavern located at 201 South Front Street.

Mayor Smith directed that this communication be placed on file until such time as a recommendation is received from the Planning and Zoning Board regarding the location of business establishments of this nature.

A communication from Nicholas Cisek, Maintenance Contract Engineer, Michigan State Highway Department, was read wherein he includes two copies of an agreement amending the maintenance contract with that Department relative to the appointment of Howard Coppens as Maintenance Superintendent for the City of Marquette. It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Carlson and unanimously adopted, that this amendment to the State Highway Maintenance Contract be accepted and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign said amendment in behalf of the City of Marquette.

A report from City Manager George T. Meholick was read wherein he tabulated bids received for two patrol cars for the Police Department as follows:

A communication from George T. Bergren, Industrial and Real Estate Commissioner, Duluth, South Shore and Atlantic Railroad Company, was read wherein a request was made for an extension of time on an option previously granted. Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted, that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign an expression of intent for an extension to an option to purchase railroad property in the City of Marquette.

Mayor Smith announced that this was the date set for a public hearing on the rezoning of the north half of Block 4 and all of Block 5 in Nester's Addition No. 1 in the City of Marquette. The clerk then read the legal notice as was published. Mayor Smith then declared the public hearing open. Mr. Albert W. Tyrrell, spokesman for eleven property owners on Bluff Street, addressed the Commission and presented a petition disfavoring this rezoning procedure. John S. Peterson, spokesman for Spear and Sons, owners of a portion of the property involved in the rezoning addressed the Commission stating reasons why this request is

being made. There being no other discussion from interested persons, Mayor Smith declared the public hearing closed. It was then moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that in view of the petition filed by interested property owners this request for rezoning be referred along with the petition to the Planning Board for a study and report at the next meeting of the City Commission in June.

Mayor Smith then stated that this was the date set for a public hearing on the matter of vacating a portion of Fair Avenue between Seventh Street and Eighth Street in the City of Marquette. The public hearing was declared open. No one in attendance at this hearing objected to this vacating request. Mayor Smith then declared the public hearing closed. Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Carlson and unanimously adopted, that a portion of Fair Avenue between Seventh Street and Eighth Street in the City of Marquette be declared vacated.

A communication from Steve Johnson, Chairman, Marquette City Planning Board, was read wherein that Board recommends to the City Commission that a hearing be held regarding the installation of a miniature train for children, age five to eleven years, in an area lying north of the Island Beach Road, south of Shiras Pool and west of the small boat basin. Following considerable discussion regarding this type of an installation in a recreational area, it was moved by Commissioner Carlson that a public hearing be scheduled by the City Commission. There being no support to Commissioner Carlson's resolution, Mayor Smith declared the resolution lost for lack of support.

It was then moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Bur, that a lease agreement be drawn up indicating

definite bounds clarifying a question of parking and stating further rules and regulations governing the policing of an area of this nature and indicating the size and type of bond to be filed by the leasee and that this lease agreement be discussed openly at a special hearing.

Yeas: Mayor Smith, Commissioner Bur and Commissioner Rydholm.

Nays: Commissioner Carlson.

A communication from City Manager George T. Meholick was read wherein he points out that the distribution division of the Light and Power Department be qualified for a safety award having worked over one quarter million man hours without a lost time accident. A safety record of this nature set up by thirty-three men has caused a considerable saving in insurance cost. Mr. Meholick also pointed out that this group of employees are to be presented with a plaque and with individual cards showing this accomplishment. Mr. Martin Pearson of Mutual of Wausau complimented the distribution system employees on a fine record of safety and presented Mr. Henry Croisetiére, Safety Director of this Division, with a plaque as a safety award. Mr. Croisetiére addressed the Commission informing them that through cooperation of Mr. C. L. Mosher, Superintendent of the Light and Power Department, and the City of Marquette this accomplishment was gained. He also pointed out that through cooperation of the insurance company by their local representative they were also instrumental in this accomplishment, and third, that the men of this department were also a governing factor. Mayor Smith and Mr. Henry Croisetiére then proceeded to distribute the cards to the individual men of this department.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

June 27, 1960

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held in the Commission Chambers at the City Hall Monday, June 27, 1960 at 7:00 o'clock P. M.

Present: Mayor Smith, Commissioners Bur, Carlson and Rydholm.

Absent: None.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Carlson and unanimously adopted, that the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting be waived.

A communication from Walter J. Hackett, Grand Knight, Knights of Columbus, was read wherein he thanked the Commission for waiving the bond requirements for the holding of the Skerbeck Show in Marquette. This communication was ordered received and placed on file.

A communication from Max P. Allen, City Supervisor, was read wherein he tendered his resignation as a member of the Board of County Supervisors. Following a short discussion on this matter, it was moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that the resignation of Max P. Allen as a City Supervisor be accepted with regret and that the City Clerk be authorized to forward a letter of appreciation for the services rendered by Mr. Allen to this community.

It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted, that a transfer be made from the Water Supply and Sewage Disposal System Receiving Fund to the Operation and Maintenance, sufficient to cover the operating expenditures for the balance of the 1959-60 fiscal year, in accordance with Section A, Ordinance Number 165; and it is also unanimously adopted that a transfer be

made from the Electric Utility System Receiving Fund to the Operation and Maintenance Fund, sufficient to cover the operating expenditures for the balance of the 1959-60 fiscal year in accordance with Section A, Ordinance Number 186.

Mayor Smith directed the Clerk to read certain amendments to the Dog Control Ordinance. The Commission then proceeded to examine the various amendments and their wording. Following considerable discussion on each section of this Ordinance, it was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted, that the Dog Control Ordinance be adopted as amended, the full text of which is as follows:

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING AND LICENSING THE KEEPING AND MANAGING OF DOGS, PROVIDING FOR THE TAKING UP AND IMPOUNDMENT OF DOGS AND QUARANTINING AND DESTRUCTION OF DOGS IN CERTAIN CASES, MAKING VIOLATIONS THEREOF A MISDEMEANOR PUNISHABLE BY FINE AND/OR IMPRISONMENT, ESTABLISHING AN ANIMAL CONTROL AUTHORITY TO ENFORCE THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE, AND REPEALING SECTIONS 8.29 TO 8.36, INCLUSIVE, OF CHAPTER 45, OF TITLE VIII OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF MARQUETTE.

The City of Marquette Ordains:

Section 1. Chapter 45 of Title VIII of the Code of the City of Marquette is hereby amended to repeal Sections 8.29 to 8.36, inclusive, thereof, and by adding new sections thereto, which new sections shall be designated as Sections 8.29 to 8.38, inclusive, of said Code, to be known as "Dog Control Ordinance" as follows:

DOG CONTROL ORDINANCE

8.29 DEFINITIONS. As used in this Ordinance, the following words and phrases shall have the following meaning:

(a) "City" shall mean the City of Marquette.

(b) "City Commission" shall mean the governing body of the City of Marquette.

(c) "Animal Shelter" shall mean any premises designated by the City Commission for the purpose of impounding and caring for animals held under authority of this Ordinance.

(d) A dog shall be deemed to be under "Reasonable Control" when such dog is on the premises of its owner, or when such dog, not being on the premises of its owner, is controlled by a competent person and obedient to that person's commands, or on or within a vehicle being driven or parked on the streets.

(e) "Own" shall mean to have a right of property in a dog; to keep or harbor a dog or to have a dog in one's care or possession; or to permit a dog to remain in or about any premises of a person for a period of five (5) days or more.

(f) "Restraint" shall mean an animal shall be deemed to be under restraint if on the premises of its owner or if accepted by a responsible person and under that person's reasonable control.

(g) "Person" shall mean an individual, partnership, company or corporation.

(h) "Animal Control Authority" shall refer to the board duly appointed by the Mayor and City Commission relative to the animal control program in the City, whose duties shall be to serve in an advisory capacity to the City Commission and to assist the administrative officers of the City in the administration and enforcement of this Ordinance.

8.30 LICENSING OF DOGS. It shall be unlawful for any person to own, possess, harbor or have the care or charge of any dog,

male, female or unsexed, of the age of four months or over, within the City unless such dog shall wear a collar to which is attached the license tag provided for by the laws of the State of Michigan; Provided, however, that this Ordinance shall not apply to any person transporting a dog through the City, such dog being taxed at the residence of the owner. Every person in possession of any dog, or who shall permit any dog to remain on or about his premises for a period of five (5) days or more shall, for the purposes of this Ordinance, be deemed to be the owner of such dog.

8.31 DOG WARDEN AND HIS DUTIES. The City Commission shall designate a person to be known as Dog Warden of the City, at such salary or fees as may be fixed by the City Commission, who shall serve at the pleasure of the Animal Control Authority and the City Commission. Such Dog Warden shall have all the powers and authority of a police officer of the City Police Department in relation to his duties as herein prescribed. It shall be the duty of the Dog Warden to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance and to perform the following duties:

(a) To impound any dog he finds running at large and not under reasonable control.

(b) To impound any dog not duly licensed as provided by law.

(c) To impound any dog he finds to be violating the provisions of this Ordinance in any way.

(d) To serve notice in writing upon the owner of any dog impounded under the provisions of this Ordinance, if such owner is known and can be identified by the license on the collar of said dog; and to make a reasonable effort to identify the owner of a dog so impounded.

(e) To make a report to the City Clerk of any unlicensed dogs he finds in the City after March 1st of each year.

(f) To conduct an annual dog

census as provided by law.

(g) To keep a record of the breed, sex, age, color and markings of every dog impounded, together with the date and hour of impounding and the name of its owner if known.

(h) It shall be the duty of the Dog Warden to dispose of all dogs impounded at the animal control shelter which are not claimed or released within three (3) days after impoundment. If the owner or owners cannot be identified, the dogs shall be disposed of in the following manner:

(1) If the dog is diseased or badly injured in the opinion of the Dog Warden, it shall be immediately disposed of in a humane manner.

(2) Other dogs, if not adopted, will be forthwith disposed of, after such three (3) days, in a humane manner.

(i) Fees for the sale of dogs for adoption purposes shall be collected by the animal control authority and shall be in addition to the impounding fee and boarding fee as herein provided. All fees collected by the Dog Warden are to be placed by him into the hands of the City Treasurer who shall keep accurate records of same.

(j) It shall be the duty of the Dog Warden to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance.

8.32 MANAGEMENT AND RESTRAINT OF DOGS. It shall be unlawful for any person owning, possessing or having charge of any dog, four months of age or over, to violate any of the following restrictions:

(a) To allow such dog to stray beyond the premises of such owner unless it shall be under reasonable control.

(b) To permit any female dog to go beyond the premises of the owner when she is in heat unless such dog is held properly in leash and under the complete control of a responsible person.

(c) To permit any vicious dog to be unconfined unless securely muzzled and led securely by

leash. Any dog shall be deemed vicious which has bitten a person or domestic animal without molestation, or, which, by its actions gives indication that it is liable to bite any person or domestic animal without molestation.

(d) To own, harbor or keep any dog, either licensed or unlicensed, that, by the destruction of property or trespassing on the property of others, becomes a nuisance in the vicinity where kept;

(e) To fail or refuse to comply with the provisions of Section 8.34 of this Ordinance.

8.33 HEARING ON CAUSE FOR IMPOUNDMENT. On sworn complaint by either the Dog Warden or any other person to the Municipal Court of the City that any one or more of the following facts exist, such Court shall issue a summons to show cause why such dog should not be impounded if:

(a) Any dog eligible to be licensed is running at large and is unaccompanied by its owner without license attached to the collar of such dog;

(b) Any dog at any time, licensed or unlicensed, has destroyed property or habitually trespasses in a damaging way on the property of persons other than its owner;

(c) Any dog, licensed or unlicensed, which has attacked or bitten any person;

(d) Any dog showing vicious habits, or molesting passersby when lawfully on the public right-of-way, or when such dog, by loud and frequent or habitual barking, yelping or howling is causing or has caused a serious annoyance to any of the inhabitants of the City

(e) Any dog, licensed and wearing the license required, which is running at large contrary to the provisions of this Ordinance or the laws of the State of Michigan.

8.34 CONTROL OF RABIES. Any person who shall have in his possession any dog which has contracted rabies, or which has been exposed or subjected to the same,

or which is suspected of having rabies, or which has bitten any person, shall, upon demand of any member of the Police Department, Dog Warden or the Health Officer of the City, produce and surrender up such dog to the said officer, to be held for observation as herein-after provided, or confine the same to the owner's premises, at the discretion and direction of such officer. It shall be the duty of any person owning or harboring a dog which has been attacked or bitten by another dog or other animal showing the symptoms of rabies, to immediately notify the Police Department or Health Officer that such person has such dog in his possession. The failure so to do shall be cause for complaint to the Municipal Court as provided in Section 8.33 of this Ordinance.

8.35 IMPOUNDING FEES. Any dog seized or impounded by the Dog Warden shall be released to the owner thereof upon the following conditions:

(a) Payment of an impounding fee of \$2.00 for the first impoundment, \$3.00 for the second impoundment of the same dog, \$4.00 for the third impoundment of the same dog, and \$5.00 for each impoundment of the same dog thereafter;

(b) Payment of the boarding of such dog at a cost of Seventy-five Cents (\$.75) per day;

(c) Exhibiting a currently effective license, or in the case of an unlicensed dog, the owner shall purchase a license before the release of the dog;

(d) Exhibiting a proper certificate from a veterinarian that such dog is currently immunized for rabies during the period of the license period, or, in the case of an unimmunized dog, so impounded at the Animal Shelter, the owner shall forthwith have the dog so immunized before it is released.

8.36 PENALTIES. Any person or persons who shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance

shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished for the violation of the Code of the City of Marquette in the manner provided in Section 1.9 of Chapter 1, of Title I of said Code

8.37 SEVERABILITY. The several sections of this Ordinance shall be deemed severable, and should any section, clause or provision thereof be declared unconstitutional or contrary to the laws of the State of Michigan, and therefor voided by any Court of competent jurisdiction, same shall not affect the validity of the Ordinance as a whole or any part thereof other than the part or section so declared to be unconstitutional or invalid.

8.38 POLICE EFFECT. This Ordinance is declared to be necessary for the protection of the public health, safety, welfare and peace of the people of the City of Marquette, and is not to be construed as a substitute for the provisions of the State Dog Law, but shall be considered to be supplementary thereto.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall become effective ten days after its adoption and publication.

Following a short discussion on this matter, it was moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the low bid of Elder Agency Ins., Marquette, Michigan, for fleet insurance in the sum of \$1,946.68 for 50/100,000 P. L. and 20,000 P. D. be accepted.

A communication from City Manager George T. Meholick was read wherein he informs the Commission of bids received for workmen's compensation insurance for the 1960-61 fiscal period. In his communication Mr. Meholick outlined the proposals called for in the bid request. Following a lengthy discussion on the matter of Non-Stock Premium Discount or Guaranteed Cost Plan vs. a Retrospective Rating Plan, the Commission asked that a representative of the insurance men present explain the difference in the two plans of compensation insurance. Mr. Elliot of Michigan Mutual Liability Life Insurance Company of Marquette addressed the Commission regarding the question on this matter. It was then moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Carlson and unanimously adopted, that the City Commission award the workmen's compensation insurance bid to Michigan Mutual Life Insurance Company on Pro-

posal Number 2 (Retrospective Rating Plan).

Mayor Smith directed the Clerk to read a lease agreement between the City of Marquette and Rudolph K. Heikkala and C. Lorraine Heikkala, pertaining to the leasing of a certain parcel of land to be used for a trailer park. Mayor Smith declared a short recess in order to allow the Commission to study a map and diagram of the area described in this lease agreement. Following a question and answer period, Mayor Smith called the meeting to order. It was then moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Carlson and unanimously adopted, that the City Commission enter into a lease agreement with Rudolph K. Heikkala and C. Lorraine Heikkala for the leasing of certain described property on Pioneer Road and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign said agreement in behalf of the City of Marquette.

A petition signed by four (4) business people in the City of Marquette was read wherein they request that information be gotten by the City Commission from the Michigan Liquor Control Commission regarding the addition of a Class "C" spirits license for the City of Marquette. Moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that the City Clerk be directed to write Mr. E. F. Maloney, Licensing Director, Michigan Liquor Control Commission, regarding a ruling on whether or not that Commission will permit one or more Class "C" spirits license in the City of Marquette now that the 1960 decennial census is known and that information received in answer to this letter be brought before the Commission as soon as it is received.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

July 11, 1960

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held in the Commission Chambers at the City Hall Monday, July 11, 1960 at 7:00 o'clock P. M.

Present: Mayor Smith, Commissioners Bur, Carlson and Rydholm.

Absent: None.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Carlson and unanimously adopted, that the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting be waived.

A communication from George T. Meholick, City Manager, was read wherein he informs the Commission of a lease agreement between the United States of America and the City of Marquette for a parcel of land to be used for a U. S. Forest Research Laboratory. It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted, that the proposed lease as submitted and on file with the City Clerk between the City of Marquette and the United States of America for a parcel of land lying north of Wright Street and west of County Road 550 as described therein to be used for a Forest Research Laboratory is hereby approved and the Mayor and City Clerk are authorized to sign said lease in behalf of the City of Marquette.

A communication from George T. Meholick, City Manager, was read wherein he includes a proposed easement agreement between the City of Marquette and the State Board of Education (Northern Michigan College) for the right and privilege to install and maintain a twelve (12) inch water main across two parcels of land at Northern Michigan College. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted, that the proposed easement agreement be on file with the City Clerk from the State Board of

Education to the City of Marquette for the installation of water mains across two parcels of land at Northern Michigan College be approved and that the Mayor and City Clerk are hereby authorized to sign said agreement in behalf of the City of Marquette.

A communication from George T. Meholick, City Manager, was read wherein he includes a proposed gravel purchase agreement between the City of Marquette and Martha Bacon Clark Adriance and the Estate of Harlow A. Clark, deceased. Following a short discussion on this matter, it was moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that the Gravel Purchase Agreement on file with the City Clerk and setting forth the terms of the purchase of bank run gravel at a cost of ten cents (10c) per ton be approved and that the Mayor and City Clerk are hereby authorized to sign said agreement in behalf of the City of Marquette.

A report from City Manager George T. Meholick was read wherein he tabulated bids received for a quantity of fire hose. Moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of the City Manager and the Fire Chief, the bid of Burrige-Nyland Equipment Company of Ishpeming, Michigan at a unit cost of \$1.36 per foot for 2½ inch hose and 92.8c per foot for 1½ inch hose be accepted.

A communication from City Manager George T. Meholick was read wherein he tabulated bids received for comprehensive liability insurance for the City of Marquette. After considerable discussion on this type of insurance, the Commission unanimously agreed that there be a five minute recess to discuss the various types of insurance for which bids were received. Following the recess

Mayor Smith asked Mr. Stanley Elder of the Elder Insurance Company to address the Commission regarding their bid submitted on a three year basis. Mr. Elliott of the Michigan Mutual Liability Company was also asked to address the Commission regarding the bid submitted from his company. In view of the fact of the several bids received various insurance periods were bid on, therefore affecting the total overall bid price. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted, that the Commission reject any and all bids received on comprehensive general liability insurance and that the City Manager be instructed to prepare new specifications and submit same for competitive bidding.

A communication from Clyde Bucklin, Adjutant, Chapter 22, Disabled American Veterans, was read wherein he requested permission for that Organization to sell forget-me-nots on the streets of the City of Marquette Friday, and Saturday, August 5th and 6th. It was then moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, that permission as requested be granted.

A communication from Steve Johnson, Chairman, Marquette City Planning Board, was read wherein that Board informs the City Commission that they unanimously recommend the rezoning of an area north of West Washington Street, namely: the north half of Block 4 and all of Block 5 in Nester's Addition No. 1 to the City of Marquette. Mayor Smith directed that this communication be tabled until such time as proper notice can be given.

A communication from Steve Johnson, Chairman, Marquette City Planning Board, was read wherein he informs the Commission of action taken on the matter of a Go-Cart Concession as was

referred to that Board for a study and report. In his communication Mr. Johnson informs the Commission that letters were written to various communities in the Lower Peninsula that have concessions of this nature to inquire of their experiences regarding this type of a concession. This communication was ordered received and placed on file.

It was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Bur, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, a certain lease was entered into between the City of Marquette, Michigan and Rudolph K. Heikkala and C. Lorraine Heikkala, husband and wife, dated August 1, 1955, wherein an option to purchase the land described therein was contained, and no competitive bidding was had in relation thereto or action taken to waive such bidding; and,

WHEREAS, on June 27, 1960 an amendatory lease, with the same or similar option provisions contained therein was entered into by the same parties; for less acreage; and,

WHEREAS, the said lessees have now exercised such option and tendered the purchase price mentioned in the said option provisions, and have demanded a conveyance of the title to said lands accordingly; and,

WHEREAS, a question exists whether either of such leases-options are valid according to the provisions of law and the charter of the City of Marquette, and the City Manager has therefore withheld his recommendations that competitive bidding would not result in any advantage to the City, and the City Commission is now obligated to make a determination of an appropriate action in the premises;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

That the City Attorney be authorized to take such steps or ac-

tion in behalf of the City of Marquette, Michigan as may be necessary and advisable for the construction of the rights of the parties to the said leases and option by judicial judgement or decree in a Court of proper jurisdiction.

Mayor Smith then announced that this was the time set for the bid opening for the sale of \$200,000 Various Special Assessment and General Obligation Bonds. Mayor Smith then directed the Clerk to proceed with the opening of the bids. Following the opening and reading of the bids Mr. Julius Pochelon of Kenower, MacArthur and Company, Financial Advisors, was excused from the meeting to tabulate and examine the bids submitted. Mr. Pochelon then returned to the meeting and explained briefly the five (5) bids received on these bonds. The following preamble and resolutions were offered by Commissioner Bur and supported by Commissioner Rydholm:

WHEREAS, July 11, 1960, at 8:00 o'clock p.m., Eastern Standard Time, has been set as the date and time of opening bids for the purchases of the following issues of bonds:

July 14, 1960

A special meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held in the Commission Chambers at the City Hall Thursday, July 14, 1960 at 4:00 o'clock P. M.

Present: Mayor Smith, Commissioners Bur, Carlson and Rydholm.
Absent: None.

Mayor Smith directed the Clerk to read resolutions regarding the merger of the D.S.S.&A. Railroad, M. St. P. Railroad, S.S.M. Railroad and the Wisc. Central Railroad. Following the reading of the resolutions, Mayor Smith asked Mr. John Tobin, President, Railroad Employees Union, to address the Commission regarding the merger of these railroads. Following a short discussion, it was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Carlson that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

Whereas, a joint application and petition has been filed by the D.S.S.&A. and M.St.P. and S.S.M. and Wisc. Central Railroads with the Interstate Commerce Commission for the merger of these three railroads, for the abandonment of a segment of one of said railroads and for the combining of trackage rights thereof, which petition will be heard in open hearings at Minneapolis, Minnesota on August 2, 1960; and

Whereas, it has been publicly announced that, as a result of such merger, at least one hundred and ten (110) positions or jobs will be eliminated among the employees of the D.S.S.&A. Railroad in the City of Marquette, Michigan and the region served by this railroad, including a drastic reduction in the number of such employees engaged in heavy repairs to locomotives and freight cars as well as in other administrative and clerical departments and duties as such functions are now located and carried on in Marquette, Michigan; and

Whereas, it is believed that such reductions in employment, and, in all probability, a relocation or change in the freight service afforded this City and region, which City and area have been already declared to be economically depressed, will adversely effect the present critical economic situation in a severely detrimental manner.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

1. That the City Commission of the City of Marquette, Michigan does hereby protest and oppose the merger and plans resulting therefrom as being detrimental to the public interest thereof to the end that said merger and plans will discourage and retard economic recovery and growth.

2. That the City of Marquette lend its full and active support to petitioners and petitions filed and registered in opposition to said merger application and petition.

3. That the City of Marquette provide the necessary information and testimony in support of such opposition and protest as may be requested or required in the defense of the public interest.

4. That certified copies of this resolution be prepared by the City Clerk and made available for filing and use at the Interstate Commerce Commission hearings in this matter, and as may be required in the further active pursuit of same.

It was then moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Carlson and unanimously adopted, that the City Commission authorize a suitable person to represent the City of Marquette at the public hearing to be held in Minneapolis, Minnesota on August 2, 1960 to support the opposition to the merger of the forementioned railroads.

A communication from City Manager George T. Meholick was read wherein he tendered his resignation as Manager of the City of Marquette. Mr. Meholick outlined an eight (8) point plan in

progress for our community and assured the Commission that his intentions are to remain substantially long enough to see this program completed. Mayor Smith then read resolutions regarding the City Manager's resignation and following expressions by each commissioner and the Mayor of their regrets of having received this communication, it was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Bur that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

Whereas, on July 12, 1960, George T. Meholick tendered his resignation as City Manager of the City of Marquette to be effective September 1, 1960; and,

Whereas, George T. Meholick has served the City of Marquette over the past five (5) years in a most capable and effective manner and has consistently displayed the highest ideals of honor and integrity in all his public relationships which has merited the respect and confidence of the City Commission, the Administrative Organization which he directs and the public whom he served; and,

Whereas, He has demonstrated a deep sense of moral and social responsibility as a trusted public servant who dealt frankly and fairly with the City Commission, the City Employees and all Marquette Citizens on all matters confronting his high office.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

1. That the City Commission of the City of Marquette reluctantly accept with great regret the resignation of George T. Meholick and highly commend him for the efficient, cooperative, unselfish and consistent manner in which he has carried out the policies and mandates of the City Commission and

faithfully served the citizens of the City of Marquette by handling each administrative problem without discrimination on the basis of principle and justice for all.

2. That a copy of this resolution be spread upon the minutes of the City of Marquette and a copy be presented to Mr. Meholick.

A communication from Don M. Pearce, President, Marquette Real Estate Association, was read wherein he urges the Commission to consider rescinding resolutions adopted by the Marquette City Commission concerning the location of liquor licenses. Mayor Smith directed that this communication be received and paced on file until such time as information is received from the Michigan Liquor Control Commission regarding the number of liquor licenses permitted under the new census.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Carlson and unanimously adopted, that the Mayor and City Manager be authorized to exercise the Option Contract dated April 13, 1960 between the City of Marquette and the Duluth, South Shore and Atlantic Railroad Company concerning the purchase of two (2) parcels of land identified in the Option Contract as Parcel (1) and Parcel (2); and that the City Attorney be instructed to complete all legal matters pertaining to Parcel (2) before the purchase of same, and that the City Manager contact the Duluth, South Shore and Atlantic Railroad Company and arrange a later closing date, if needed, for this Option Contract.

The Commission unanimously agreed that the next regular meeting of July 25, 1960 be held at 4:00 o'clock P. M. instead of the usual time.

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held in the Commission Chambers at the City Hall Monday, July 25, 1960 at 4:00 o'clock p. m.

Mayor Smith called the meeting to order. Following the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag the Mayor directed the City Clerk to administer the oath of office to the newly appointed Commissioner. Following the oath of office, roll call indicated the following members present: Mayor Smith, Commissioners Bur, Carlson, Johnson and Rydholm.

It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Carlson and unanimously adopted, that the reading of the minutes of the previous meetings be waived.

The continuation of a public hearing regarding the rezoning of an area on West Washington Street in Nester's Addition Number One was tabled until the next regular meeting.

Communications from Everett D. Cattrell, City Clerk of Jackson, Michigan, and R. Option one being bodily injury — \$100/300,000 limits, property damage \$100,000 limits, on both an annual and three year basis. Option two — bodily injury \$250/500,000 limits, property damage \$250,000 limits, on both an annual and three year basis. Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Carlson, that the following resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, A petition has been received and filed dated June 9, 1958 requesting the following improvement:

The installation of the VanEvera Sanitary Sewer (Interceptor) — (Wright Street to Union Street) in the City of Marquette.

RESOLVED, That the City Manager is directed to prepare plans, specifications and estimate of costs of such improvement, and attach thereto his recommendation as to

the proportion of the costs to be paid by special assessment and of the proportion, if any, to be paid as the general obligation of the City; the number of installments for payment; the interest rate thereon; and the land to be included in the special assessment district;

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City Manager file same with the City Clerk who shall make same available for public examination;

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City Clerk shall fix a day for a public hearing on the determination of the necessity for such improvement by the City Commission, and shall cause notice of the time and place of same to be published once in the official newspaper of the City not less than 10 days prior to such date of hearing, such notice to state also that the report of the City Manager, and the plans, specifications and estimate of costs, are on file in his office for public examination, and that he shall also serve a like notice upon each owner of property subject to assessments for such improvement, by United States Mail, at least 10 days prior to such hearing; and that he shall further make proof of such publication and service by affidavit.

A special meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held in the Commission Chambers at the City Hall Monday, August 15, 1960, at 4:00 o'clock P. M.

Present: Mayor Smith, Commissioners Bur, Carlson and Johnson.

Absent: Commissioner Rydholm.

A report from City Manager, George T. Meholick was read wherein he estimated the cost of the paving of Northrup Street, College Avenue to Magnetic Street.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson that the following resolution be and the same is hereby unanimously adopted.

WHEREAS, A petition has been received and filed requesting the following improvement: Paving Northrup Street (College to Magnetic).

RESOLVED, That the City Manager is directed to prepare plans, specifications and estimate of costs of such improvements, and attach thereto his recommendation as to the proportion of the costs to be paid by special assessment and of the proportion, if any, to be paid as the general obligation of the City; the number of installments for payment; the interest rate thereon; and the land to be included in the special assessment district;

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City Manager file same with the City Clerk who shall make same available for public examination;

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City Clerk shall fix a day for a public hearing on the determination of the necessity for such improvement by the City Commission, and shall cause notice of the time and place of same to be published once in the official newspaper of the City not less than ten (10) days prior to such date

of hearing, such notice to state also that the report of the City Manager, and the plans, specifications and estimate of costs, are on file in his office for public examination, and that he shall also serve a like notice upon each owner of property subject to assessments for such improvement, by United States Mail, at least 10 days prior to such hearing; and that he shall further make proof of such publication and service by affidavit.

A communication from Frank J. Russell, President of the Marquette Service Corporation was read wherein he informs the Commission that that Corporation is withdrawing its interest in community television for the City of Marquette. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Carlson that the following resolution be and the same is hereby unanimously adopted.

WHEREAS, The Marquette Service Corporation has, in writing, and by a resolution of its Board of Directors, surrendered its right in a certain franchise and license granted to it on October 27, 1958, for the installation and maintenance of a T. V. community antenna system and cable in the City, and authorized and directed the City Commission to revoke such franchise and license for the notice of proceedings to revoke being expressly served;

RESOLVED, that said franchise and license be, and the same is hereby revoked accordingly.

A communication from Arthur T. Hammer, Coordinator, Morgan Heights Sanatorium, was read wherein he informs the Commission of the dates and places where the Michigan Department of Health Mobile X-Ray Units will be in Marquette County. In his communication, Mr. Hammer requests that a proclamation be declared dedicating the dates of

September 7th - 30th as "Health Clinic Days." This communication was ordered received and placed on file.

Mayor Smith then announced that this was the date and time set for the opening of bids received for bituminous aggregate. The bid of Thornton Construction Company under Proposal No. 2 of the specifications was well within the estimate as made by the Engineering Department. Proposal No. 2 called for a bid on a quantity of bituminous aggregate supplied and laid in place by the contractor. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the low bid of Thornton Construction Company in the sum of \$7.94 per ton for a quantity of bituminous aggregate paving laid in place be accepted and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign the agreement for this contract in behalf of the City of Marquette.

Mayor Smith then directed the City Clerk to read a proposed agreement between the Alger-Delta Cooperative Electric Association and the City of Marquette for the purchase of power by that organization from the City. It was then moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted that the City enter into an agreement to sell electric energy to the Alger-Delta Cooperative

Electric Association to be delivered to that organization at designated points in the Village of Harvey, Chocolay Township, and at a delivery point on County Road 550 in Marquette Township, and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign said agreement in behalf of the City of Marquette. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that the City of Marquette enter into an agreement with the Alger-Delta Cooperative Electric Association for advanced payment for the contract of delivery points and related appurtenances in accordance with a written agreement and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign said agreement in behalf of the City of Marquette.

Mayor Smith then entertained a motion that the matter of rezoning as before this Commission be deferred until such time as all Commissioners are present at a regularly scheduled Commission meeting.

August 18, 1960

A special meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held in the Commission Chambers at the City Hall August 18, 1960.

Present: Mayor Smith, Commissioners Bur, Carlson, Johnson and Rydholm.

Interested citizens: Engineers of the U. P. Power Company. Engineers of the Kaiser Company of Oakland, California.

Mayor Smith directed the Clerk to read a resolution concerning the judgments rendered in the suit of Eugene Swanson vs. the City of Marquette and Eugene Swanson, Guardian of Keith Swanson, minor, vs. the City of Marquette. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur and supported by Commissioner Carlson that the following resolution be and the same is hereby unanimously adopted.

WHEREAS, on February 26, 1960, judgments were rendered in the suit of Eugene Swanson vs. the City of Marquette, Michigan, in the respective sums of \$2,037.24 and \$26,962.76, and that costs were allowed on such judgments computed to August 18, 1960, amounts to the sums of \$48.61 and \$644.14, thereby resulting in a total collectible under the said two judgments of the sum of \$2,429.94 and \$27,950.99 respectively; and

WHEREAS, the City Accountant has reported that funds are available for the payment of said sums and that same have been appropriated in the budget for the present fiscal year;

RESOLVED, that the City Manager is hereby authorized and directed to pay said total amounts of judgments, costs and interest in the two suits described forthwith.

Mayor Smith stated that the purpose of this meeting was to hear the report by the U. P. Power Company and their reaction to the previous meeting between the U. P. Power Company and Kaiser Company.

Mr. John H. Warden of the U. P.

Power Company then addressed the Commission wherein he informed the Commission that the Stone Webster Service Corporation, which he stated was an unbiased firm, not standing to make any gain in its report, were the engineering concern who assisted the U. P. Power Company in establishing the rate for a purchase power agreement between the U. P. Power Company and the City of Marquette, and that his Company was standing firm on the conclusions and recommendations contained in its proposal of April 27, 1960. Following Mr. Warden's address to the City Commission, Mayor Smith declared a recess. Following a short recess, the Commission reconvened at which time Mayor Smith directed Mr. W. M. Sybert of the Kaiser Company to review findings by the Company. Three findings were pointed out, namely:

1. Over a ten year period 1960 - 1970, the steam program will realize a net profit to the city of \$3,543,000.00 as against \$2,533,000.00 under the purchase power program;

2. Substantial additional revenue could be realized from the sale of dump energy, an estimated additional \$536,000.00.

3. If rates under the purchase power program are increased, the difference in realization to the City would be even greater.

The purchase program, based largely upon the purchase of dump energy, adds an element of uncertainty as to the availability of purchase power.

A City-owned steam-electric station would add a valuable asset to the city, and the City would have full control over electric rates, permitting set rate structures for large potential users and to attract industry to the City.

Following a resume of the findings by Mr. Sybert, Mayor Smith pointed out that information obtained from the Federal Power

Commission showed that two of the present officers of Stone Webster Service Corporation are also officers of U. P. Power Company and that two other officers of U. P. Power Company are former officers of that Engineering firm.

Statements were made by various Commissioners that in view of the fact that certain statements

having been made and gone unrefuted definite opinions could be drawn regarding purchase power.

Mayor Smith stated that these two reports would be taken under advisement.

Meeting adjourned.

A communication from J. S. Peterson, Manager of Spear and Sons, Inc. was read wherein he requests that action be taken on the rezoning of an area on West Bluff Street. Mayor Smith announced that action on this matter would be deferred until the return of Commissioner Carlson at the next regular meeting or a special meeting called for that purpose.

A report from City Manager George T. Meholick was read regarding traffic control measures on Cedar Street and East Ohio Street. Moved by Commissioner Burr, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that the following traffic control measures be placed in effect on a 90 day trial basis. One way traffic on Cedar Street and Ohio Street from Hewitt Avenue to Lake Shore Boulevard. Parking on the East Side of Cedar Street only and on the north side of Ohio Street only.

A communication from Don M. Pearce, President of Marquette Real Estate Association was read wherein that organization requests that thought be given to a trailer subdivision for the City of Marquette and also pointed out the need of a plan to operate the City Touist Park as an overnite trailer site. Mayor Smith stated that there

would be a meeting devoted to this particular problem sometime in the near future.

A communication from Fred Lieberman, President, Telesystem Services Corporation was read wherein he requests that that organization be considered for a franchise and an agreement to install and maintain a multi-channel television service. It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted that that Company be notified that their representative could confer with the City Manager for the purpose of preparing a proposed franchise and agreement for the Commission's consideration.

A communication from H. J. Rothwell, Superintendent of Schools was read wherein he requests that Sixth Street in front of Sandy Knoll Elementary School be considered for paving this season. It was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted that this request be referred to the City Manager for study and report.

Mayor Smith announced that this would be the last official meeting at which City Manager George T. Meholick would be present. It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted, that in accordance with the Charter two acting City Managers would be appointed to serve from the time that City Manager George T. Meholick leaves, until a newly appointed City Manager takes office, as follows: City Clerk Everett H. Kent shall assume and perform the administrative duties of the City Manager which are usually performed at the City Hall, and City Engineer Milbert Keranen shall assume and perform all other duties of the City Manager.

State Representative Dominic Jacobetti was given permission to read a letter of commendation to

City Manager George T. Meholick.

It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted that the removal of two parking meters on the East side of Front Street immediately north of the intersection of Washington Street, together with the entire traffic problem in that intersection, be made a subject of immediate study with State Highway Officials, and a report be prepared by the next regular meeting.

City Manager George T. Meholick gave his current budget report.

It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that the reading of the communication from the American Public Power Association be waived but that that communication be spread on the minutes of this meeting as follows:

American Public Power Association to the City of Marquette.

This is in reply to your letter of August 18, in which you requested that our staff analyze and comment on proposals for meeting the City of Marquette's growing power needs. One of these proposals was submitted to the City by Stone & Webster Service Corporation, in behalf of the Upper Peninsula Power Company of Houghton, Michigan; the other by the City's consulting engineers, Kaiser Engineers of Oakland, California, in behalf of the City.

We have made a study of these two proposals. Without an on-the-spot analysis, of course, it is possible we have not fully interpreted the facts and statements presented in the reports of these engineering firms. However, we have generally accepted the statistics presented, and have not attempted to change the assumptions used in the engineering data.

Following is a discussion of what seem to be the most significant factors in determining the City's course of action.

1. The decision

The basic decision to be made, it seems to us, is whether the City is to become dependent on an outside source of power (the availability and supply of which would be determined by (UPPC) or whether the City prefers to meet its own needs, and thus maintain control over its power rates and its ability to provide an essential service to its citizens.

UPPC, in its letter of April 27, 1960 to the Mayor and City Commissioners, stated: "It shall be at the discretion of the Company to determine when surplus energy is available." This is a sound policy so far as the Company is concerned; indeed, it is the only policy the Company can reasonably follow, since "surplus off-peak" power is "surplus" only when other system requirements permit, and is "offpeak" only when total system loads make it so. However, from the City's standpoint, it would seem highly questionable to depend on surplus offpeak or dump power to meet the City's power needs. The question of surplus power is a key one, since the financial feasibility of the Company's offer hinges, to a great degree, on the City's purchases of large amounts of surplus power, rather than firm power.

The UPPC letter of April 27, 1960 states: "The system dispatcher of the Upper Peninsula Power Company would notify the City from day to day how much surplus energy would be available. The City could then adjust its operating schedules to fit this program. In event of emergencies on the Company's system, this pattern would have to be changed to take care of the existing conditions, but it is believed that these conditions would be an exception and there would be no difficulty from this end." In an emergency, the City would have only one purpose; to keep electric service available to its citizens. The Company, however, would

have many demands and priorities in its service area, and could not necessarily focus its attention on Marquette's problems.

Because electric energy is vital in the daily lives of the people of Marquette, and is essential to public health, life and economic survival, it would seem highly advantageous for the City to maintain in its own hands the control over its ability to provide this essential service to its citizens.

2. Long-range implications:

In its statement to the Marquette City Commission on August 18, 1960, UPPC suggested that the City enter into the purchased power agreement for the next three years ("since both reports show that there is a saving to be made during the first three years of operation"), and at a later date reexamine the question of whether the City should build and operate a steam electric generating plant.

The Kaiser Company report of June, 1960 deals with a related question, whether, if the City decides to build its own steam-electric station, the City should (a) purchase dump power from UPPC until the City's steam plant goes on the line, or (b) continue to use the City's diesel station until the City steam plant is completed. The Kaiser report concludes that it would be more economical to continue operation of the diesel station during this interim period.

An important factor in the Kaiser recommendation for continued interim of the diesel plant while the City steam plant is being built was UPPC's proposal that the City pay the Company a monthly charge of \$1,250 to cover fixed charges on the Company's investment in a step-down substation and tie lines. Kaiser says that this \$15,000 annual charge "implies an investment of \$1,000,000", and that the City would have to either make this investment itself, or pay the Company this amount.

Thus, an interim purchase arrangement with the Company —

while the City's steam plant is being built — would mean a sizeable investment in substation and tie lines for use for only a relatively short period of time, perhaps one and one-half to five years. If the City, after delaying its decision and using surplus UPPC power in the interim, then decided to build a steam plant, it would presumably have to absorb the cost of this investment in substation and tie lines, since the Company apparently would not be willing to absorb the cost.

There is a more important question involved here than the short-range economics of the situation. Once the tie lines and substation were built, the City would likely be faced with additional offers from the Company to provide power to the City. That is why we believe that the essential decision to be made at this time is whether the City wants to maintain in its own hands the means of providing essential electric service to its citizens, or whether it prefers to become dependent on an outside source of power. Any tie lines with UPPC, even on an interim basis, will evade this question.

We would not fulfill our obligation to fully answer your request if we did not point out that private power companies often use the providing of wholesale power supply to a municipality as a step toward eventual purchase of the municipal electric distribution system. According to the Kaiser report, by 1965 the City would be buying 68% of its total power requirements from UPPC under the power purchase plan. In later years the City would become even more heavily dependent on the Company for its power supply.

While we do not know why UPPC would be interested in a short-term power purchase contract, or why the Company would itself suggest that the City might want to cancel such a contract and build a City steam plant in

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three years, it is clear that construction of a substation and tie lines with the City system would put the Company in a much better position to negotiate with the City on future power supply. In other areas, municipal electric systems have found that dependence on a private power company for power supply has weakened the City's bargaining position on wholesale power rates, and has in some cases led to extensive pressure for purchase of the municipal electric distribution system by the power company.

3. Surplus power and firm power:

The key to the Company's power purchase proposal is the availability of surplus offpeak power. This so-called "dump" power is available at 8.8 mills per kilowatt-hour basic rate, plus fuel clause adjustment. In the first four months of 1960, this fuel adjustment has averaged 0.87 mills, however, in 1959 it averaged 0.97 mills, and in 1958, 1.3 mills. For purposes of this analysis, however, we have accepted the Stone and Webster fuel adjustment figure of 0.86 mills, making a total present cost for surplus offpeak power of 9.66 mills per kwh.

The cost of firm power from UPPC is of course, much higher than that of surplus offpeak power. In fact, figures in the Kaiser report indicate that in the late 1960's, when the City would be buying sizeable amounts of firm power, the average wholesale cost of firm power would be in excess of 25.0 mills per kwh (including \$2.26 per kw demand and 10.4 mills per kwh for energy). This is nearly three times the cost per kwh for dump power.

Because the City is seeking a long-range answer to its power supply problem, we believe that a long-range comparison of the two proposals is essential. The second Kaiser report, which looks ahead to 1971, offers a more realistic appraisal of the problem than

do the reports which make projections only to 1965. These factors are of importance:

(a) It is highly misleading, from the long-range view, to take into consideration the period when the City would be purchasing only surplus offpeak energy from UPPC. For example, in the four-year period, 1961-64, the City would purchase only 3.18 million kwh of firm power, just 2% of its total purchases. The average cost per kwh of all purchased power during this four-year period, according to Stone and Webster, would be 0.998c — just slightly above the cost per kwh (0.966c) for surplus offpeak power — indicating the predominant effect of dump power costs.

But in the one year of 1965 alone, firm power purchases are estimated at 5.5 million kwh — almost twice the amount of firm energy purchased in the preceding four years — and the average cost per kwh for purchased power (firm and dump) would increase to 1.08c per kwh, even though firm power was still a small percentage of total purchases.

In the five-year 1961-65 period, estimated firm power purchases would be 4% of total purchases; in the following five years, 1966-70, firm power purchases would be 13.7% to total purchases. And in 1971, according to estimates, firm power purchases would be 18.4% of total purchases.

After 1971 it would be necessary for the City to purchase even greater amounts of firm power, indicating that this high-cost power would have an increasingly significant effect on the total cost of purchased power. The Kaiser report emphasizes this point by stating that the average cost of purchased power would increase by about 2½ mills per kwh (nearly 25%) during the 7-year period from 1963 to 1970. This reflects the fact that firm power

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may cost nearly three times as much as dump power.

The realistic comparison, from the City's standpoint, is between the costs of operating and maintaining a City steam plant and the costs of purchasing both dump power and a meaningful amount of firm power. Any other comparison is misleading. It seems, therefore, that the 1966-70 period is much more indicative of the long-range implications of the two proposals than the 1961-65 period. The 1966-70 period takes into account two important long-range factors: (1) Under the "steam program", the City steam plant would be in full-scale operation during the entire period, not just part of the time; and (2) under the alternative "purchase program", the City would be purchasing both surplus power and meaningful amount's of firm power, not just surplus power alone.

The Kaiser report finds that: "For the five-year period July, 1965 to June, 1970, the steam program will show a net income higher by \$726,000 and a cash realization higher by \$795,000 than that for the purchase program." Taking the 10-year period 1960-70, Kaiser finds that the City's cash realization is higher by more than \$1 million than under the purchase program. In addition, Kaiser says that if the City could sell one-half of the available dump energy to other sources during 1962-70, it could earn an additional \$536,000 above costs. (These additional earnings for the City from the sale of available dump energy are based on sales at 8 mills per kwh; it appears that the City would be able to sell its own dump energy at a lower rate—and make a sizeable profit—than it would be able to buy dump power from UPPC. However, there must be other factors with which we are not familiar, which would explain the wide gap between the City's incremental steam generation costs of 4.6 to 5.9 mills

per kwh and UPPC's wholesale dump power rate to the City of 9.6 mills per kwh).

The UPPC Statement of August 18

There are some differences of opinion between Stone and Webster and the Kaiser Company concerning the figures used in the report. These differences will be discussed. We are assuming these differences represent the divergent judgments of engineering experts.

On the non-engineering side, however, the statement submitted to the Marquette City Commission by UPPC on Aug. 18, 1960, is, in some sections, very misleading. For example, UPPC says its proposal will meet the City's power needs "without embarking upon an expansion program costly to the taxpayers." In the preceding paragraph, UPPC talks about "a project which would cost the taxpayers of Marquette five or six million dollars." (Underlining supplied).

Yet the Stone and Webster report shows these estimates:

Before City Steam plant in operation:

City Electric Department net income — 1960: \$66,400

City Electric Department net income — 1961: \$82,400

After City Steam plant in operation:

City Electric Department net income — 1962: \$94,900

City Electric Department net income — 1963: \$92,000

City Electric Department net income — 1964: \$137,800

The Stone and Webster report shows that with a City steam plant in operation on January 1, 1962, the City Electric Department's net income for the 5-year period 1960-64 would be \$473,500, and that the cash realization to the City during this five-year period would be \$1,494,600.

The Stone and Webster report does say that the City would be better off to buy power from UPPC than to build its own steam plant. The Stone and Webster report does not say that construction of a City steam plant would be "costly to

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the taxpayers"; nor does it suggest that the plant "would cost the taxpayers of Marquette five or six million dollars." Instead, the Stone and Webster report shows sizeable financial benefits to the City from construction of its own steam plant. The plain fact is that the City would greatly benefit by building a City steam plant, and it is not to the Credit of UPPC that it presented such misleading statements to the City of Marquette Commission on August 18.

Surely UPPC officials are aware that the City Electric Department ratepayers will, through their monthly electric bills, pay off the steam plant bonds, principal and interest, and can do so without any increase in current rates; that the taxpayers of Marquette do not pay a cent in taxes to support the Electric Department; that the Electric Department pays to the City vast sums of money each year in taxes and as contributions; and that if the City did not receive this income from the Electric Department, the City would have to raise taxes. To call the proposed City steam plant "costly to the taxpayers" of Marquette is to completely disregard the facts.

The final paragraph of the UPPC statement of August 18 contains these reasons why the City should agree to the UPPC proposal: (1) ". . . to assure a cash saving over the next several years". It seems to us that the second Kaiser report offers convincing evidence that while the UPPC proposal might offer savings for the brief period when only dump power was being purchased, the City would, in the long run, be far ahead financially with its own steam plant. (2) ". . . to avoid calling on the taxpayer for extensive financing until such can be firmly justified." This is a repetition of the misleading idea that the "taxpayer" will pay taxes to pay for the City steam plant. It is surprising that UPPC should have included this as one of three key reasons for agreeing to the UPPC proposal. (3) ". . . to pro-

vide time for further developments in the natural gas picture." Actually, the City needs to decide now about its future power supply, before the City is forced to buy interim power from UPPC to meet the City's growing needs.

Differences in engineering studies

Among the differences between the Stone and Webster report and the Kaiser report are these factors:

1. The proposed UPPC monthly charge of \$1,250 to cover fixed charges for the step-down substation and lines interconnecting the City's and the Company's systems was not included in the Stone and Webster comparison. However, it was made clear by the Company in its letter of April 27, 1960 that this charge had not been included in the Stone and Webster study. It appears that this cost would be about \$36,300.

2. Under the proposed purchase program, Kaiser says that Stone and Webster has underestimated by some \$22,000 to \$25,000 a year the direct labor costs of diesel production. Stone and Webster bases its labor cost figures on a one-third reduction in the diesel plant force; Kaiser views this an excessive reduction. Over the 1961-65 period, Stone and Webster's estimates are \$115,000 lower than Kaiser's.

3. Under the steam plant proposal, Kaiser believes that Stone and Webster overestimated the labor costs of diesel and steam power production, ranging from \$6,200 in fiscal 1961 to \$39,000 in fiscal 1964.

Kaiser states that the City, by using the same crews to operate the steam and diesel stations, can achieve a saving over the Stone and Webster report. Kaiser's reasoning is that the diesel and steam stations will be contiguous, and that "the exclusive assignment of four people to the diesel plant is not necessary," especially in view of the small energy output of the diesel plant. During the 1961-1965

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period, Stone and Webster's estimates are \$137,500 higher than Kaiser's.

The total difference between the two reports on these three factors is \$288,800, of which \$36,300 is for the monthly UPPC charge to cover fixed charges on the step-down substation and tie lines. The other \$252,500 involves differing views on labor costs at City diesel plant — with Stone and Webster's figures favoring power purchase, and with Kaiser's favoring a City steam plant.

We have two general comments to make on these differences between the two engineering reports:

a. The first Kaiser report shows that, in the 1961-64 period, the steam plan is superior to the purchase plan. Stone and Webster, taking the 1960-64 period, shows the purchase plan to be superior. In our view, no matter what the conclusions reached in these two reports, the really important report is the second Kaiser report, covering 1966-71. The first Kaiser report and the Stone and Webster report cover different periods of time, in addition to their differing estimates on labor costs, etc.

b. The second Kaiser report (August, 1960) shows clearly that the steam plan is superior. It indicates that both net income and cash realization for the City will be more than three times as great during the 1965-70 period as during the 1960-65 period, even without taking into account the City's ability to sell dump power. From the City's long-range standpoint, another crucial factor must be weighed. Dependence on an outside source of power supply would greatly lessen the City's control over its cost of power, and thus lessen the City's control over the electric rates it charges. Private power company rates have generally risen in recent years, and the Nation's private power customers today are paying more than \$1 billion more per year for electricity than in 1952, not taking into account increased use of electricity

of 578 rate increase applications made by the Nation's power companies from 1946 to the end of 1959, only 22 were denied, according to a recent report by Francis I. DuPont & Co. While we have no knowledge of UPPC's past record or future prospects on rate increases, we mention these national figures as indications of trends over the country among private power companies. By contrast, there have been numerous rate reductions by municipal electric systems (see enclosed Newsletter for wto recent examples).

Conclusion

Our recommendations are as follows:

1. The City should construct and operate the proposed 9.375 mw steam-electric generating plant, in order to meet growing power needs, to achieve the financial savings which will accrue in comparison with a power purchase plan, and to maintain in the city's hands the local control over providing essential electric service to the citizens and over the City's electric rates which are important to all users — residential, business and industrial.

2. The City should not purchase power — on either an interim or a long - term basis — from UPPC, since such power purchase arrangement would be less financially desirable than the City steam generation plan; since continuity of power supply to the City would be "at the discretion of the Company," removing local control; and since the City's dependence on UPPC for power supply could open the way for UPPC increases in wholesale power rates, and eventually for UPPC to work toward buying out the municipal electric system.

3. During the period when the City is building its steam plant, it should continue to operate the diesel station to take care of loads.
