

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

September 6, 1960

A special meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held in the Commission Chambers at the City Hall Tuesday, September 6, 1960, at 7 p. m.

Present: Mayor Smith, Commissioners Bur, Johnson, Rydholm, and Carlson.

A communication from John P. Miller, Fund Raising Chairman, Kiwanis Club of Marquette, was read wherein he requests permission for that organization to sell peanuts on the Streets of Marquette on September 23 and 24, 1960. It was moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Bur, and unanimously adopted that permission as requested be granted.

A communication from John H. Huss, Director, Michigan Municipal League was read, wherein he informs the Mayor and City Commission that the City of Marquette is to receive an award for the annual Report of the City covering the past year's municipal accomplishments. Mayor Smith directed this communication be received and placed on file.

A communication from R. F. Rosatti, District Maintenance Engineer, Michigan State Highway Department, was read wherein he incloses the Annual maintenance contract for Highway U. S. 41 and M-28 in the City of Marquette. Following a short discussion on this maintenance contract it was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson, and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the City enter into an agreement with the State of Michigan for the maintenance of Highway U. S. 41 and M-28 in the limits of the City of Marquette, naming Mr. Howard Coppens, Superintendent of Public Works Department, as maintenance superintendent and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign

said agreement in behalf of the City of Marquette.

A communication from Howard J. Larson was read wherein he suggests various traffic measures for the intersection of Front and Washington Streets and for the portion of Front Street between Washington Street and Bluff Street. Following a short discussion on this matter it was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm, and unanimously adopted that this communication be received for study along with recommendations from the State Highway Department.

A communication from John N. McNeil, Chairman of Community Action Committee on Natural Gas was read wherein he informs the governing body of a meeting to be held in Escanaba, Michigan sometime during the month of September. Mayor Smith then pointed out that former Manager George T. Meholick was a member of this committee representing the City of Marquette. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted, that City Attorney Waldo McCrea be appointed to replace Mr. Meholick on this committee until such time as the new City Manager takes office, who will then replace Mr. McCrea.

On a motion of Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Carlson and unanimously adopted, the annual report of the Peter White Public Library be accepted and placed on file.

Mayor Smith then announced that an applicant for the position of City Manager has been chosen to fill that position. It was moved to fill that position. It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted, that Mr. Ernest L. Neumann be appointed to the position of City Manager for the City of Marquette and that he assume the duties of that office on October 1, 1960.

The City Commission directed acting City Manager Everett H. Kent to examine the files to determine which Streets were listed with the Michigan Gas and Electric Company as potential repair areas for the construction season of 1960.

Following a lengthy discussion on the matter of the Van Evera Sanitary (Interceptor) sewer, it was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson, that the following resolution be and the same is hereby unanimously adopted.

WHEREAS, It appears by the affidavit of the City Clerk that due publication has been made of notice, as required by the City Charter, that it is the intention of the City Commission to make certain improvements, and to determine the necessity of such improvements as follows:

The installation of the Van Evera Sanitary Sewer (Interceptor) (Wright to Union Streets) in the City of Marquette; and appointing this day and time when the City Commission would meet to determine the necessity of such improvement; and

WHEREAS, It appears further by said affidavit that a like notice has been sent by mail to each

owner of property subject to assessment therefore; and

WHEREAS, All suggestions and objections made to said improvements have been heard and considered;

RESOLVED, That the City Commission determines that such project and improvements are necessary and proper, but that same will not especially benefit the several properties mentioned but are of general benefit to the City of Marquette, Michigan as necessary to the public health and welfare of the City as a whole;

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the costs of such improvements shall be defrayed entirely as the general obligation of the City, and that the report of the City Manager, the plans and specifications, and the estimated costs of such improvements, are hereby approved and determined accordingly, and that the said project be commenced and prosecuted forthwith to its completion;

Mayor Smith announced that there will be a special meeting of the City Commission at 4:30 p. m. Friday, September 9, 1960.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

September 12, 1960

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held in the Commission Chambers at the City Hall Monday, Sept. 12, 1960 at 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present: Mayor Smith, Commissioners Bur, Carlson, Johnson and Rydholm.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted, that the reading of the minutes of the previous meetings be waived.

A petition signed by eighteen residents in Kildahl Subdivision No. 2 was read wherein they asked that the streets in that subdivision be brought to grade and graveled as soon as possible. It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted, that this petition be referred to the City Manager for a study and report.

A communication from Milton P. Adams, Executive Secretary Water Resources Commission was read wherein he thanked the City Commission for the use of the Commission Chambers in holding the August meeting of that organization. Attached to this communication was an excerpt from the minutes of the Water Resources Commission meeting setting forth the progress that has been made in eliminating phenol from the drinking water source. This communication was ordered received and placed on file.

A report from Acting City Manager Everett H. Kent was read wherein certain traffic control measures were recommended for the Front and Washington St. intersections and the Chief of Police's recommendations regarding Front St., Bluff St., and Ridge St. This report was ordered received and to be used with the study of Washington and Front Street intersection. Mr. Ben Knauss, Sec'y Manager, Chamber of Commerce,

was present and was asked to comment on his study of traffic flow on Front Street. The Commission unanimously agreed that these suggestions and study be taken into consideration when action is taken on the traffic control measures for this area.

A report from Acting City Manager, Everett H. Kent was read wherein he reports on an engineering study on the paving of Sixth Street in front of Sandy Knoll School. Following a short discussion on the matter it was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Carlson that the paving of Sixth Street be delayed until the 1961 construction season, but that the preliminary work be continued this year on the engineering portion of this particular work with the thought in mind that paving be done from Ridge Street to Harrison Street.

Yeas: Mayor Smith, Commissioners Carlson, Johnson and Rydholm. Commissioner Bur abstained voting under section 5.10 of the City Charter.

A report from Acting City Manager Everett H. Kent was read wherein he tabulated bids received for a water pump and motor to be used in the Parks Department. Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager the low bid of Lake Shore, Inc. in the sum of \$1,979.85 for a water pump and motor, FOB, point of shipment, be accepted.

A report from Acting City Manager Everett H. Kent was read for a car to be used in the Fire Department. Following a short discussion on this matter and a check of the budget it was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Carlson, and unanimously adopted that the City Commission reject any and all bids received for this car.

An opinion from City Attorney Waldo A. McCrea was read regarding the Van Evera Sewer Special Assessment problem. Following a short discussion on the matter this opinion was ordered received and placed on file.

A legal opinion by City Attorney Waldo A. McCrea regarding the refund of payments on special assessments was read wherein he recommends that certain measures be taken by the City Commission regarding these assessments. It was then moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Johnson, that the following resolution be and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

"WHEREAS, This Commission hereto confirmed Special Assessment Roll No. 314 for the assessment of certain properties especially benefited by a certain improvement, namely: The installation of Sanitary Sewers to serve the property owners in Kildahl Subdivision No. 4 to the City of Marquette; and,

WHEREAS, during the installation of such improvement, it was discovered that because of the presence of rock and other physical conditions, such improvement could not extend to benefit such properties, namely: Lots 70, 87, 88, 89, and 99 in Kildahl Subdivision No. 4, and,

WHEREAS, Certain payments have been made by the owners of such properties not so benefited by such improvement on the first installment of said special assessment roll;

RESOLVED, That in accordance with Section 1.202 of the Marquette City Code, the amounts of the payments made by said owners of said property not so improved or benefited by said improvement be refunded in cash to the respective owners thereof, and that such properties be removed from said Special Assessment Roll, No. 314."

A communication from Lincoln J. Lindstrom, City Assessor was read wherein he requested sick

leave beginning Monday, Sept. 12, 1960. Moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Carlson and unanimously adopted that this request for sick leave be referred to the City Manager for proper handling.

A communication from Fred W. Garceau, District Manager, Michigan Gas and Electric Company was read wherein he calls the attention of the City Commission to an agreement between the City and that Company for the maintenance of the gas mains in the City of Marquette. Following a short discussion on the matter it was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, Supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted, that the Michigan Gas and Electric Company receive permission to proceed with their work on their mains throughout the City of Marquette in accordance with the forementioned agreement.

A communication from C. L. Mosher, Superintendent Light and Power Department, was read wherein he tabulated bids received for the painting of the steel street light poles in the business area. It was moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted that the bid of Balmes Decorating Shop, Marquette, Mich., in the sum of \$1,540.00 for the painting of 110 steel street lighting poles be accepted.

Acting City Manager Everett H. Kent informed the Commission that several phone calls had been received regarding the traffic control measures in the E. Ohio Street area.

It was then moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted that the City Manager be authorized to place the proper traffic signs in each end of the alley in question on a 90 day trial basis.

Mayor Smith then called the Commission's attention to the editorial appearing in the Mining

Journal September 10, 1960 concerning the electric power problem. The Mayor and Commissioners discussed the editorial extensively, pointing out the numerous errors and misstatements therein. On motion of Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted, the City Attorney was instructed to study the editorial and report back to the commission whether the City or the Commissioners have a cause of action for libel.

Moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted that the Mayor send a request in writing to the U. P. Power Company asking it's participation in the cost of a third neutral study of electrical power problems of the City based on the reports of the consultants for that Company and the City.

September 19, 1960

A special meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held in the Commission Chambers at the City Hall Monday, September 19, 1960 at 4:30 p. m.

Present: Mayor Smith, Commissioners Burr, Johnson and Rydholm.

Absent: Commissioner Carlson.

It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that the absence of Commissioner Carlson be excused, he being away from the City.

Mayor Smith stated that the purpose of this meeting was to introduce a franchise to the Iron Range Cable Corporation for the purpose of constructing, operating and maintaining lines of Television co-axial cable.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted that a franchise ordinance to the

Iron Range Cable Corporation be approved as to form and substance and that October 3, 1960 be fixed as the date for a public hearing thereon and the consideration for adoption, and that the Clerk publish this ordinance in full in a notice of the public hearing thereon, such notice to contain information that the ordinance is on file in his office for public examination and inspection until the date of the public hearing, and that reference to the ordinance in the minutes of that meeting may be by title only.

Moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that the Commission authorize the City Attorney to appear in behalf of the City in the matter of Rudolph J. Blazina vs. City of Marquette in the hearing set before the Hearing Referee on October 13, 1960 at the City's expense.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

September 26, 1960

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall Monday, September 26, 1960 at 7:00 P. M.

Present: Mayor Smith, Commissioners Bur, Carlson, Johnson and Rydholm.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted, that the reading of the minutes of the previous meetings be waived.

A communication from George D Tramp, Vice President, First Presbyterian Church was read wherein he thanked the City Officials for the prompt action taken in correcting a hazard on Blaker Street near that church. Mayor Smith ordered this communication received and placed on file.

A report from Acting City Manager M. J. Keranen was read regarding the graveling of the streets in Kildahl subdivisions No. 2 and 4.

In his report Mr. Keranen recommends that the City assume the responsibility of the graveling and grading of all streets in these two subdivisions and in turn billing the subdivider for all work accomplished less any amount the subdivider has previously spent for this type of work. Following a short discussion on this matter it was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted, that upon recommendation of Acting City Manager Keranen the City enter into an agreement with the subdivider to accomplish this work in the forementioned subdivisions and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign said agreement in behalf of the City of Marquette.

A report from Acting City Manager M. J. Keranen was read regarding a sewer in Sixth Street, South of Harrison Street. Following a discussion on this matter it

was moved by Commission Carlson, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted that the matter of this sewer in question be referred to the City Manager and the City Attorney for a study and report and that the Engineer determine if the present sewer is sufficiently large enough to handle the number of connections that will be made when all properties along this line are occupied. Commissioner Bur abstained voting under section 5.10 of the City Charter.

Acting City Manager Everett H. Kent gave a progress report regarding the Animal Control Shelter. Mayor Smith directed that this report be received and placed on file.

A report from Acting City Manager Everett H. Kent was read wherein he included a report from Leonard McKie, Superintendent of Parks and Recreation regarding the disposition of Central Playground equipment. Following a short discussion on this matter it was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted that the City maintain the ice rink during the coming winter and that the City Attorney be directed to draw up an agreement between the City of Marquette and the Diocese to maintain the playground in that area as soon as the construction of the new building there is completed.

A report from Acting City Manager Everett H. Kent was read wherein he recommends that a Good Roads Scavenger unit be purchased for use in the Public Works Department. In his report it is recommended that competitive bidding be waived it being of no advantage to the City under the circumstances, and for the reason that to require such bidding would place the purchase of this unit beyond the period for which it is so urgently needed. It was then

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moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Carlson and unanimously adopted that the Commission concur with the recommendations of the Acting City Manager and the City Attorney, and that the Mayor and the City Clerk be authorized to enter into and sign an agreement between the City and the Paynter Equipment Corporation of Green Bay, Wisconsin for the purchase of this piece of equipment.

Acting City Manager Everett H. Kent orally reminded the Commission of the matter of a request for re-zoning upon which the Commission has already held a public hearing. Following considerable discussion on this matter it was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted that the matter of re-zoning of all of Block 5 and the North half of Block 4, in Nestor Addition No. 1 to the City of Marquette, be deferred until the special meeting to be held Thursday, September 29 at 7:00 P. M.

The City Commission directed the City Manager to forward pertinent financial information to Mr Julius Pochelon, of Kenower, MacArthur & Co. in order that preliminary work may be commenced regarding certain financial matters.

Mayor Smith announced the appointment of William A. Todd to fill the vacancy on the Marquette City Planning Board created by the resignation of Steve Johnson.

A special meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held October 3, 1960 at 7:30 o'clock p. m.

Present: Mayor Smith, Commissioners Bur, Carlson, Johnson, Rydholm.

Mayor Smith announced that the purpose of this meeting was to hold a public hearing to discuss the granting of a franchise to the Iron Range Cable Corporation.

The Mayor then directed the Clerk to read the franchise.

Following a short discussion Mayor Smith declared the public hearing open.

There being no one present suggesting changes or objecting to the franchise as read the Mayor declared the public hearing closed.

It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Carlson that the following franchise be and the same is hereby unanimously adopted.

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING A FRANCHISE TO IRON RANGE CABLE CORPORATION

The City of Marquette Ordains:

1. That the City of Marquette does hereby grant to Iron Range Cable Corporation, a Michigan Corporation, the right, privilege and franchise to construct, operate and maintain lines of television co-axial cable, including poles, wires, and fixtures where necessary, upon, along, over and under the public streets and alleys of the City of Marquette, but subject to the terms on conditions herein set out, and provided that such locations as may be approved in writing by The City Manager and Superintendent of light and power of the City of Marquette, or by the City Commission of said city, and the corporation shall file with the City Manager an application in writing for each line, showing in detail the location of same, and shall furnish with the application all such information as may be required by the City Manager.

2. So far as practical the corporation shall use existing poles such as those erected and maintained by the Michigan Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company and the City of Marquette where satisfactory rental and construction agreements can be reached with the telephone company and the City. New poles will be placed only at locations approved by the City Manager.

3. All streets and sidewalks disturbed or damaged in the construction or maintenance of said cable lines shall be promptly repaired by the corporation, at its expense, and to the satisfaction of the City Engineer.

4. All co-axial cables erected in the City of Marquette by the corporation shall at all times meet with the minimum standards of the city as provided by ordinance or code, and shall be located on the city's poles as directed by the Superintendent of Light and Power.

5. The corporation shall be subject to all ordinances now in force or that may be hereafter enacted relative to the use of the streets and alleys of the City of Marquette.

6. The corporation shall, at all times, establish and maintain reasonable standards of service and quality of products consistent with those established and maintained generally in the field of providing television transmissions to viewers by co-axial cable, and shall not unjustly discriminate in its service or rates among its subscribing viewers.

7. The corporation shall indemnify and hold the City of Marquette harmless from all claims for damages arising out of the construction, maintenance, or operation of said cable lines.

8. The franchise hereby granted is granted for the term of thirty years from the date of this ordinance, but upon the failure of

the corporation to start operations in a substantial manner satisfactory to the City of Marquette within one year from the date of this ordinance, for misuse or failure to comply otherwise with the provisions of this franchise, the City may terminate the franchise here granted upon giving to the corporation thirty days notice of its intention to terminate same.

9. This ordinance shall become effective ten (10) days after the adoption thereof, but not before publication of its adoption and the full text thereof.

10. This ordinance shall be published at the expense of the Cor-

poration.

October 10, 1960

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held October 10, 1960 at 7:00 o'clock p.m.

Present: Mayor Smith, Commissioners Bur, Carlson, Johnson and Rydholm.

A report and recommendation from the City Manager was read wherein he determined from his investigation and study that lease-agreements made on August 1, 1955, amended on June 27, 1960, between the City of Marquette and Rudolph K. Heikkala and Lorraine Heikkala for the leasing of certain city-owned property for use as a trailer court, with option to purchase same, were authorized by the then City Commissions because of a pressing demand for such trailer court, that competitive bidding would not have resulted in any advantage to the City for the sale of the land, and that such bidding would not have permitted the building of the trailer court on the land before winter conditions began; and further that he recommended, under the circumstances, that the exercise of the option to purchase be recognized and that a deed be given accordingly.

The following resolution was thereupon introduced by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Carlson:

RESOLVED: That, pursuant to the provisions of Section 12.1 (b) of the City Charter and based upon the written recommendation of the City Manager which has been considered by this Commission at this meeting, it be and is hereby determined that no advantage to the City of Marquette would have resulted from competitive bidding in connection with the sale of the land hereinafter described to Rudolph K. Heikkala and C. Lorraine Heikkala, his wife, for the sum of \$5,000.00 as set forth in the lease, with option to buy, dated August

1, 1955 given by this City to the Said Rudolph K. Heikkala and C. Lorraine Heikkala, his wife on September 2, 1955, the said lease, with option to buy, having been amended by action of this Commission on June 27, 1960 and that the said lease dated August 1, 1955 with option to buy as modified in said amendatory lease be adopted, ratified and confirmed and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized and directed to accept the sum of \$3,062.50 and execute and deliver to the said Mr. and Mrs. Heikkala a good and sufficient warranty deed transferring to them the following described property:

Land situated and being in the City of Marquette, County of Marquette and State of Michigan, to-wit:

That part of the Southwest quarter of the Northwest quarter (SW $\frac{1}{4}$ of NW $\frac{1}{4}$) and that part of the Northwest quarter of the Southwest quarter (NW $\frac{1}{4}$ of SW $\frac{1}{4}$) that lies North of Pioneer Road, all in Section 26, Township 48 North, Range 25 West, which lies South of a line described as follows: Beginning at a point on the East boundary line of said parcel of land where the center of the alley between Sandstone Street and Furnace Street intersects said East Boundary line; thence west to the center of Altamont Street extended southerly; thence west 45° south to the west boundary line of said parcel of land; thence south along the West boundary line of said parcel of land to the North boundary line of Pioneer Road; thence easterly along the north boundary of Pioneer Road to the east boundary line of said parcel of land; thence north on the east boundary line of said parcel of land to the poing of beginning.

Yeas: Rydholm, Carlson and Johnson.

Nays: Bur and Smith.

The charter requirements for a unanimous vote of those present in favor of the resolution not having been met, the resolution failed of adoption.

A report of the City Manager was read proposing a lease agreement between the City and the Public Schools of Marquette for a term of three years, for property situated on the north side of Wright Street adjacent to the D.S.S. & A. Railroad, for use for school bus storage.

It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm, and unanimously adopted that the proposed lease between the City and The Public Schools of Marquette, of property on the north side of Wright Street for three years at \$1.00 per year, subject to termination upon thirty days written notice, and subject to a hold harmless condition, be approved and authorized, and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to execute same in behalf of the City.

A report of the City Manager was read recommending the scarifying and removal of the excess crown of the pavement on Front Street before new pavement is laid. It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson, and unanimously adopted, that the City Manager and City Engineer make further studies and obtain cost estimates for such work, and if reasonable to proceed with the recommended project.

A report of the City Attorney, as requested, was read outlining the law and procedure to provide for compulsory retirement of all City employees at the age of 65 years. It was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Bur, and unanimously adopted, that action be deferred for further study by the City Manager and City Attorney, with particular reference to possible amendments to the Employment Code.

A report and recommendation of the City Manager was read that one parking meter and stall, the most southerly on the east side of the post office on Third Street, be removed, and Third Street be marked at that point for through and right turn lanes; and that the two remaining parking meters on the east side of the post office, as well as the parking meters between Third Street and the City Hall driveway on the north side of West Washington Street be changed to 12-minute express meters. On motion of Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson, and unanimously adopted, the Commission concurred in the recommendations of the City Manager and ordered the recommended changes.

A recommendation of the City Manager was read that the request of George R. Weilder to purchase, lease or rent a city-owned dwelling on Wright Street, be considered with the recommendation that the sale of the property be considered as first preference. A discussion was had concerning the several city-owned properties in the same area. It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Carlson, and unanimously adopted, that the matter be referred back to the City Manager for further study and report at the next regular meeting or the regular meeting thereafter, for an over-all report and recommendation as to the disposition of all city-owned properties in the same area, and that action on the request be deferred until receipt of such further report.

A report of the City Manager was read wherein he recommended that no additional street lights were necessary in the Norwood-Tracy Streets area. There being no objection, the Mayor ordered the report to be placed on file.

A communication from the Loyal Order of Moose was read, commending the City for its hos-

pitality, and the Mayor for his address, at the recent convention of that Order. There being no objection the Mayor ordered the communication placed on file.

A communication from the Executive Secretary of the Great Lakes Harbor Association inviting representation from the City at a meeting in Bay City, Michigan, was read. There being no objection, the Mayor ordered the communication placed on file.

A general discussion was had concerning the status of studies of traffic regulations at the intersection of Front and Washington Streets and of paving on Fourth Street.

The recommendation of the City Manager for the purchase of 70 each of 40' and 45' poles from Champion, Inc. that competitive bidding would not result in any advantage to the City and that such supplies were immediately necessary, was read. On motion of Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted, the Commission determined that under the circumstances competitive bidding be waived as resulting in no advantage to the City, and the City Manager be directed to complete the immediate purchase of such supplies.

A Special meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall Monday, October 24, 1960 at 7:00 p.m.

Present: Mayor Smith, Commissioners Bur, Carlson, Johnson and Rydholm.

Mayor Smith announced that the purpose of this meeting was to complete unfinished business, he then directed the Clerk to read a resolution pertaining to compulsory retirement at age 65.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm that the following measures be and that the same is hereby unanimously adopted.

RESOLVED, That all employees of the City of Marquette who may hereafter be employed, or who may now be employed but not having elected to come under the retirement program, or who may now be employed and, having heretofore elected to come under the retirement program, have ten or more years of credited service for benefits under the Michigan Employees' Retirement Act, and who have, or hereafter shall have, attained the age of sixty-five years, shall be separated from the service of the City of Marquette and be retired by the retirement board, if entitled to benefits, forthwith on the first day of the calendar month next succeeding that in which such employees shall have attained the age of sixty-five years; PROVIDED, that upon the written request of any of such employees now employed and qualified, the retirement board may defer his retirement to the end of the City's fiscal year.

A report from City Manager Ernest L. Neumann was read wherein he tabulated bids received for rock salt to be used in the Public Works Department. Moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Bur and

unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager the purchase of 120 tons of rock salt be divided among the Morton Salt Company, Chicago, Illinois, International Salt Company, Chicago, Illinois, Diamond Crystal Company, St. Claire, Michigan, these Companies having submitted identical bids, the sum of \$17.00 per ton.

A report from City Manager Ernest L. Neumann was read wherein he tabulated bids received for 50 tons of Flake Calcium Chloride in eighty or one hundred pound paper bags to be used in the Public Works Department.

Moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the low bid of Solvay Process Division, Detroit, Michigan, in the sum of \$44.40 per ton for fifty tons of Flake Calcium Chloride be accepted.

A communication from Everett H. Kent, Acting Chairman, Marquette City Planning Board was read wherein that board recommends the vacation of High Street in Burt and Ely Addition to the City of Marquette. Moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that the City Commission go on record as favoring the vacation of High Street from the South Edge of Lakeview Heights subdivision South to the right of Highway U. S. 41 and M-28 in the City of Marquette and that the Clerk be directed to give notice of a public hearing on this matter.

City Manager Ernest L. Neumann called the attention of the Commission to the matter of a boiler at the Veterans Center explaining that a portion of this equipment has burned out and that it is impossible to be used in its present condition.

Following a lengthy discussion on the matter of whose responsibility it is to keep this equipment in operational order it was moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted that this matter be referred to the City Manager authorizing him to see that the necessary repairs are made to this heating plant.

City Manager Ernest L. Neumann then drew the Commission's attention to the matter of water mains and water service on Sherman, Jefferson, and Cleveland Streets. Following a discussion on the matter of a previously installed sewer and water service in this area it was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted that, pursuant to section 1.189 of the Marquette City Code, the City Manager caused to be prepared a prorata assessment of special benefits resulting from the sewer and water installations in Sherman, Jefferson and Cleveland streets; that the fair portion of the costs of such installation as may specially benefit any of the lots or parcels of land thereby be determined and reported to the City Treasurer, who shall immediately charge and bill the owner of such lots; that such bill be sent by first class mail to such

owners together with a notice of the time of the meeting of this Commission not sooner than thirty days thereafter for the purpose of adopting a resolution placing a special assessment upon said lots or parcels for such charges unless the same are paid prior to the date of such meeting.

City Manager Ernest L. Neumann informed the Commission of a matter of water pressure at the Our Own Bakery. Following considerable discussion on this matter it was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted that the matter be referred to the City Manager for a further study and report suggesting that he contact the Our Own Bakery to see if they would help defray some of the costs of this project.

The matter of the forthcoming election was brought to the floor for discussion. It was then moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted that the City make available one of its voting machines for public demonstration on Television.

and unanimously adopted that the Commission concur with the recommendation of the City Manager and order the installation of Irving type bridge decking at a cost of \$3,200.00 for repair of the bridge across Dead River to No. 2 Hydro electric plant.

A communication from City Manager Ernest L. Neumann was read wherein he recommends the purchase of three ½ ton pickup trucks for the Light and Power Department. Following considerable discussion on this matter it was the consensus of the Commission that more details on cost of interchanging of certain equipment from vehicles now on hand to the new pickup trucks to be purchased. A representative of one of the bidders addressed the Commission regarding the work involved in this transfer of equipment. Following a discussion it was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that all bids received for the three ½ ton pickup trucks be rejected until such time as more information can be secured on the cost of the interchanging of accessory equipment.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Carlson that the following resolution be and the same is hereby unanimously adopted.

WHEREAS, A petition has been received and filed requesting the following improvement:

Installation of a water main in the 1800 block of Longyear Avenue.

RESOLVED, That the City Manager is directed to prepare plans, specifications and estimate of costs of such improvement, and attach thereto his recommendation as to the proportion of the costs to be paid by special assessment and of the proportion, if any, to be aid as the general obligation of the City; the number of installations for payment; the interest rate thereon; and the land to be

included in the special assessment district;

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City Manager file same with the City Clerk who shall make same available for public examination:

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City Clerk shall fix a day for a public hearing on the determination of the necessity for such improvement by the City Commission, and shall cause notice of the time and place of same to be published once in the official newspaper of the City not less than 10 days prior to such date of hearing, such notice to state also that the report of the City Manager, and the plans, specifications and estimate of costs, are on file in his office for public examination, and that he shall also serve a like notice upon each owner of property subject to assessments for such improvement; and that he shall further make proof of such publication and service by affidavit.

McCrea and City Manager Ernest L. Neu-

mann be granted permission to attend this hearing at City expense.

Following a short discussion on the matter of traffic control it was moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted that the two parking meters on the west side of Front street immediately north of the intersection of Washington street be removed.

Following a round table discussion where various Commissioners and citizens in attendance expressed their opinion on this matter, The Citizens Committee requested that the City Commission study the suggestion of using part of the cemetery for this purpose. Mayor Smith then informed the Committee that it is the wish of the Commission that this Committee meet with the City Manager in formulating tentative sketches of the area to show proposed streets for this school site.

November 10, 1960

A special meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall Thursday, November 10, 1960 at 7:00 p. m.

Present: Mayor Smith, Commissioners Bur, Carlson, Johnson and Rydholm.

On motion by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted, the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting was omitted.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson, and unanimously adopted that the following ordinance be accepted as to form and substance and that a hearing date be set for the next regular meeting of the commission for consideration of its adoption.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 6.16 OF CHAPTER 27, OF TITLE VI, OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF MARQUETTE, AND BY ADDING NEW SECTIONS, WHICH NEW SECTIONS SHALL BE DESIGNATED AS SECTIONS 6.17 TO 6.21, INCLUSIVE, OF CHAPTER 27, TITLE VI, PROTECTING THE HEALTH AND SAFETY OF PERSONS USING PUBLIC BATHING BEACHES AND WATERS, AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF.

The City of Marquette Ordains:

Section 1. Section 6.16 of Chapter 27, of Title VI is hereby amended to read as follows:

6.16. Additional Rules. The Health Officer may, with the approval of the Commission make other rules and regulations respecting the use of public swimming pools, beaches and waters. No persons shall fail to obey any such rule or regulation. Such rules and regulations shall become effective 24 hours after posting at such beaches and waters.

Section 2. Chapter 27, of Title VI of the Code of the City of Marquette is hereby further amended by adding the following Sections:

6.17 — No person shall throw,

cast, deposit, damage, lay, place or scatter in the water or upon any bathing beach any lighted cigars or cigarettes, or any glass, bottles, nails, tacks, wire, crockery, cans or other sharp or cutting substance, or any refuse matter of any kind.

6.18 — No person shall bring, drive, lead, carry or permit any dog or other animal, whether leashed or unleashed, muzzled, or unmuzzled, onto the premises of any bathing beach.

6.19 — No person shall conduct herself upon any bathing beach, or in the water, or in the air over or adjacent to the public beaches or waters in such a manner as to jeopardize the safety and health of himself and/or others.

6.20 — No person shall, except in case of emergency, sail, propel or drive any motor boat, row boat, sail boat, launch, aeroplane, hydroplane, vessel or boat of any description in the waters of Lake Superior within three hundred yards of the shore line of any bathing beach in the City of Marquette, or beaches and waters under the supervision and control of the City of Marquette.

6.21 — Every person convicted of a violation of any provision of this ordinance, or any rule or regulation adopted or issued in pursuance thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$100.00 and costs of prosecution, or by imprisonment of not more than ninety (90) days, or both such fine and imprisonment; and each act of violation shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall become effective ten days after its adoption and publication.

The City of Marquette Ordains:

Section 1. Section 6.99 of Chapter 31, of Title VI of the Code of the City of Marquette is hereby repealed.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall become effective ten days after its adoption and publication.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted that the following ordinance be accepted as to form and substance and that a hearing date be set for the next regular meeting of the commission for consideration of its adoption.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 2.1 OF CHAPTER 13 OF TITLE II OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF MARQUETTE, BY DELETING THE WORDS, "CANS, BOTTLES," IN PARAGRAPH (a) THEREOF.

The City of Marquette Ordains:

Section 1. Section 2.1 of Chapter 13, of Title II, of the Code of the City of Marquette is hereby amended to read as follows:

2.1 Definitions.

(a) The word "rubbish" as used in this chapter shall mean any paper, wood, glass, cloth, leather, metal or mineral trash, including ashes, soot, discarded building material, discarded auto parts or other machinery, or any other refuse or discarded material.

(b) The word "garbage" as used in this chapter, shall mean all refuse of animal, fruit or vegetable matter that attends that preparation, use, cooking, dealing in, transportation or storing of meat, fish, fowl, fruit or vegetables, also dead animals under six pounds in weight not killed for food or in which the process of decay has commenced or is about to commence; also discarded bottles, jugs, cans, or other containers of moist or liquid food.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall become effective ten days after its adoption and publication.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Ryd-

holm and unanimously adopted that the following ordinance be accepted as to form and substance and that a hearing date be set for the next regular meeting of the commission for consideration of its adoption.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CODE OF THE CITY OF MARQUETTE BY ADDING A NEW SECTION, WHICH NEW SECTION SHALL BE DESIGNATED AS SECTION 8.16 OF CHAPTER 44, TITLE VIII, OF SAID CODE, PROHIBITING THE BREEDING PLACES OF RATS AND VECTORS.

The City of Marquette Ordains:

Section 1. Chapter 44, of Title VIII, of the Code of the City of Marquette, is hereby amended by adding the following Section, which Section shall be designated as Section 8.16:

8.16. Prohibited breeding places. It shall be unlawful for any person to accumulate or permit the accumulation on any open lot, whether residential or industrial, or on any premises, any lumber, boxes, barrels, stones, bricks, scrap metal, motor vehicle parts or bodies, or similar materials, rubbish, or any material or junk, which provides or invites rat breeding, or rat harborage, mosquito, fly, or gnat breeding, and any other vector breeding.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall become effective ten days after its adoption and publication.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm that the following Ordinance Amendment be adopted as to form and substance and that a date be set for a public hearing on this amendment and that the full text of this amendment be published in the proceedings of this meeting and that Monday, November 28, 1960, at 7:00 P.M. be fixed as the date and time for a public hearing thereon and the consideration of the adoption of the Ordinance. AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 1.50 of CHAPTER 4, TITLE I, to repeal SECTIONS 1.70 to 1.74 INCLUSIVE, and SECTIONS 1.80 to 1.83 INCLUSIVE of CHAPTER 5,

TITLE I, of the CODE OF THE CITY OF MARQUETTE, AND TO ADD NEW SECTIONS, WHICH NEW SECTIONS SHALL BE DESIGNATED AS SECTIONS 1.70 to 1.83 INCLUSIVE, OF CHAPTER 5, TITLE I, OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF MARQUETTE, CREATING A PUBLIC SAFETY DEPARTMENT TO COMBINE THE FUNCTIONS OF THE POLICE AND FIRE DEPTS. AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE DUTIES, FUNCTIONS AND PERSONNEL THEREOF.

The City of Marquette Ordains:

Section 1. Section 1.50 of Chapter 4, Title I, of the Code of the City of Marquette, is hereby amended to read as follows:

1.50 Division of Administrative Service. The Administrative service of the City shall be under the supervision and direction of the City Manager and shall be divided into the following departments, each of which shall be the responsibility of and under the control of a department head as listed opposite such department:

Department — Public Affairs Department, Official Head — City Clerk.

Department — Department of Finance, Official Head — City Accountant.

Department — Health Department, Official Head — Health Officer.

Department — Public Safety Department, Official Head — Director of Public Safety.

Department — Public Works Department, Official Head — Superintendent of Public Works.

Department — Parks Department, Official Head — Superintendent of Parks.

Department — Light and Power Department, Official Head — Superintendent of Light and Power.

Department — Water Supply and Sewage Disposal Department, Official Head, Superintendent of Water Supply and Sewage Disposal.

Department — Recreation Department, Official Head — Recrea-

tion Director.

Section 2. Sections 1.70 to 1.74 inclusive, and Sections 1.80 to 1.83 inc., of Chapter 5, Title I, of the Code of the City of Marquette, are hereby repealed, and new sections added as follows:

PUBLIC SAFETY DEPARTMENT

1.70 Public Safety Department. The Public Safety Department is hereby created to combine the administrative duties and functions heretofore performed by the Department of Police and Fire Department. The Public Safety Department shall be headed by the Director of Public Safety, who shall direct the police and fire work of the City, be responsible for the enforcement of law and order, the protection of life and property against fire, and be responsible for the maintenance and care of all property and equipment used by the Public Safety Department. He shall also be Harbor Master of the City and shall be responsible for the enforcement of the provisions of Chapter 20 of this Code pertaining to the Marquette Harbor.

1.71 Functions of Public Safety Department. The public safety work of the City shall consist of the following functions:

(a) The operation of motor and foot patrol units for routine investigations and the general maintenance of law and order.

(b) The maintenance of the central complaint desk at Central Police Headquarters in the City Hall, the maintaining and supervising of police records, criminal and non - criminal identification, property identification, custody of property and the operation of detention quarters.

(c) The investigation of crimes, elimination of illegal liquor traffic and vice, and the preparation of evidence for the prosecution of criminal cases and offenses in violation of this Code.

(d) The prevention and control of juvenile delinquency, the handling of cases in which women are involved, the removal of crime hazards and the co-ordination of

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community agencies interested in crime prevention.

(e) The control of traffic, traffic educational programs, school patrols, co-ordination of traffic violation prosecutions, issuance of operators licenses, and the maintenance and erection of traffic signs and the painting of street and crosswalk lanes.

(f) The efficient and prompt extinguishment of fires which endanger or are likely to endanger life or property; the maintenance and operation of fire fighting equipment as may be assigned to it.

(g) The investigation and inspection of potential fire hazards and the abatement of existing fire hazards in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 49 of this Code.

1.72. Deputies and Assistants. The Director of Public Safety is authorized to appoint such deputies and administrative assistants as he shall deem necessary, subject to the approval of the City Manager, for the proper and efficient operation of the department, subject to the provisions of the Charter and this Code applicable to employment and employees.

1.73. Divisions and Division Deputies. For the proper and efficient operation of the Public Safety Department, the administrative duties and functions described in Section 1.71 hereof shall be divided between a Police Division and a Fire Division. The Police Division shall be in charge of a Deputy Director of Public Safety to be known as the police Chief, who shall be the commanding officer of the police force and be responsible for the functions of the Public Safety Department as described in Section 1.71, paragraphs (a) to (e), inclusive. The Fire Division shall be in charge of a Deputy Director of Public Safety to be known as the Fire Chief, who shall be the commanding officer of the fire division personnel and be responsible for the functions of the Public Safety Department as described in Section 1.71, paragraphs (f) and (g).

1.74. Department Rules. The

Director of Public Safety, with the approval of the City Manager, and subject to the provisions of the Charter of the City, shall, from time to time, adopt such rules and regulations as he may deem expedient for the proper administration of the department and for the government of public safety officers and personnel in his department. Such rules and regulations shall become effective twenty-four (24) hours after posting in the office of the Director of Public Safety.

1.75. Acting Director. In case of the absence from the City of the Director of Public Safety, or his disability, or inability from any cause to act as Director, the City Manager shall designate and appoint some other member of the Public Safety Department to act as Director during such absence or disability.

1.76. Acting Police and Fire Chiefs. In case of the absence from the City of the Police Chief, or his disability, or inability from any cause, to act as such, the Director of Public Safety shall designate and appoint some other member of the Police Division to act as Chief during such absence or disability. The Director of Public Safety shall designate the chain of command for the Fire Division, so that in the absence or disability of the Fire Chief or any officer of the division, the responsibility for the operation of the division shall immediately and automatically be vested in the next ranking officer or member of the division.

1.77. Retirement Rights Continued. Nothing herein contained shall affect any right, privilege or benefit earned by any public safety officer for service as a policeman or fireman under the retirement system established by the Charter of the City. Public safety officers appointed subsequent to the effective date of this ordinance shall be entitled to all the rights and privileges established for policeman and firemen under the retirement system of the City established for its employees.

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1.78. Violation Bureau. The Director of Public Safety is hereby authorized to create a Violation Bureau to be maintained and operated within the Department of Public Safety. The object of such bureau shall be to relieve congestion in the court and to save the time of both the violator and the public safety officer making the complaint. Nothing herein contained shall be construed so as to deprive any person of a full and impartial hearing in Court should such person so choose.

1.79. Violation Schedule. The Director of Public Safety is hereby authorized to prepare a list of such violation of this Code which may be disposed of at the Violation Bureau and the respective penalties that shall be effective; provided, the same shall first be approved by the City Commission. No person shall have a right to dispose of any offense at the Violation Board and, in the discretion of the Public Safety Director, any violator may be complained against in the usual manner even though the offense is listed on the Violation Schedule.

1.80. Violation Notice: Complaint. Any person violating any provisions of this Code so listed, may be given a violation notice in such form as the Public Safety Director shall prescribe. All such notices shall state briefly the offense, the time and date thereof, and the name of the complaining officer. Where any such offense involves a motor vehicle, such notice shall also show the car make and license number, and notices for such offenses may be placed in a conspicuous place on the vehicle. The violation notice shall direct the violator to report at the Violation Bureau on or before a day certain, where he shall have the option of paying the fine prescribed or having the case tried in Court. If the violator fails to appear in accordance with the notice given, or appears and declines or fails to pay the prescribed fine, any officer having knowledge of, or information concerning the offense, may make

a complaint in the Municipal Court and the case shall be tried in the usual way.

1.81. Bureau Procedure. Any person who has received any notice to appear in answer to a charge violating any provision of this Code, listed on the violation schedule, may, within the time specified in the notice, answer at the Violation Bureau to the charges set forth in such notice by paying a prescribed fine and, in writing, pleading guilty to the charge, waiving a hearing in Court and giving power of attorney to the person in charge of the Bureau to make such a plea and pay such fine to the City Treasurer. If the fine and the power of attorney is accepted by the Bureau, such payment shall be deemed complete satisfaction for the violation and the violator shall be given a receipt which so states.

1.82. Handling Receipts. Officers on duty in the Violation Bureau will receive all money and property deposit the preceding day's receipts with the City Treasurer daily.

1.83. Confiscated Property. When the Department of Public Safety shall seize from any person, any weapon, article or thing, which, in the opinion of the Director of Public Safety, would be dangerous to return to the person from whom it was seized or to the owner thereof, it shall be the Director's duty to order such weapon, article or thing confiscated. If such weapon, article or thing is inherently dangerous, it shall be destroyed under the direction of the Director, unless of value to any agency of government, in which case the Director may dispose of it to such proper governmental agency as he shall select. If such weapon, article or thing is not inherently dangerous, it may be sold at public auction upon posting notice of such sale at least fifteen (15) days prior thereto subject to the restriction that no such weapon, article or thing shall be sold to any person who fails to offer satisfactory evidence of responsibility. The proceeds of every such sale, less neces-

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sary expenses incident thereto, shall be deposited with the City Treasurer.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect ten (10) days after its adoption and publication.

A communication from Ernest L. Neumann, City Manager, was read wherein he recommended a proposed pole contract with the Iron Range Cable Corporation for the use of City owned power poles for the purpose of attaching a Television co-axial cable thereto. It was moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted that the City enter into the contract as proposed and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign said contract in behalf of the City of Marquette.

A communication from Ernest L. Neumann, City Manager, was read wherein he tabulated bids received for four 100 KVA transformers to be used in the Light and Power Department. Following a short discussion it was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager the low bid of Edward Ward and Company, Green Bay, Wisconsin, in the sum of \$3,316.00 be accepted.

A communication from Ernest L. Neumann, City Manager, was read wherein he tabulated bids received on 1 - 45,000' and 1 - 15,000' aluminum conductors to be used in the Light and Power Department. Following a short discussion on the matter of the use of these conductors it was moved by Commissioner Johnson, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager the low bid of Lake Shore, Inc. of Iron Mountain, Michigan, in the sum of \$37.00 per CWT and \$30.92 per CWT respectively, F.O.B., Marquette, Michigan be accepted.

A communication from Ernest L. Neumann, City Manager, was read wherein he tabulated bids received for 3 1/2 ton pick up trucks to be

used in the Light and Power Department. Moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager the low bid of Specker Motor Sales, Marquette, Michigan in the sum of \$4,502.05 including trade in for 3 1/2 ton pick up trucks be accepted.

A communication from Robert H. Clark, President, Board of Trustees of Peter White Public Library was read wherein he informs the Commission of the status of Miss Phyllis S. Rankin, Librarian, regarding her age in connection with a resolution adopted by the City Commission "Compulsory Retirement at age 65". Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that a letter be written the board of trustees of the Peter White Library acknowledging receipt of the November 7 communication, and advising them that Miss Rankin would not be affected by such resolution since she is not an employee of the City of Marquette.

A communication from E. A. Mattson, Chairman of Support of Churches Committee, Marquette Kiwanis Club was read wherein he requests the participation of the City in the Christmas holiday decorating of homes in the City of Marquette. Moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted that the City participate with the Kiwanis Club in the Christmas Light Contest to be sponsored jointly by the City and the Kiwanis Club.

A communication from C. Vern Jewett, Captain, Salvation Army was read wherein he requests permission for that organization to place Christmas kettles on the streets of Marquette starting Monday, November 28. Moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that the request of the Salvation Army be granted.

A communication from Frank N. Buttomer, Vice President, Traffic and Sales, North Central Airlines,

Inc., was read wherein he asks the support of the City of Marquette in the request for exemption to continue flying the route after the termination date to insure continuation of service during the hearings regarding the routes flown by this airline.

It was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Carlson and unanimously adopted that the City of Marquette, Michigan, support North Central Airlines, Inc. in its request for exemption to continue flying service between Duluth, Minnesota, and Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan, after the present expiration date of its authority on November 26, 1960,

and that a hearing be held at an early date for authorization to continue such service during a further experimental period or for a permanent certificate of authorization to continue such service.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that the following traffic control measure be placed in effect on a 90 day trial basis: Remove three parking meters on the south side of west Washington Street immediately west of the intersection of Front and Washington Streets.

November 14, 1960

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held Monday, November 14, 1960 at 7:00 p.m.

Present: Mayor Smith, Commissioners Carlson, Johnson and Rydholm.

Absent: Commissioner Bur.

Moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that the absence of Commissioner Bur be excused, he being away from the city.

Moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted that the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting be waived.

Mayor Smith directed the Clerk to read a deed from the City of Marquette to the United States of America regarding a site for a United States Forestry Department Laboratory. Following a discussion on this matter wherein City Attorney Waldo A. McCrea was called on for an interpretation of certain terms of the deed, it was unanimously agreed that this matter be held over until such time as all Commissioners are present.

The Commission discussed at some length a proposed site for a school building. The site as proposed by the citizens committee being the Northwest portion of the Park Cemetery grounds. Various Commissioners expressed their viewpoints on this proposed area. Mayor Smith stated that he would like to have the viewpoint of the Cemetery Board. The question was asked if test borings had been studied to determine the feasibility of utilizing this site.

Moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Johnson that the following resolution be and the same is hereby unanimously adopted,

WHEREAS, This Commission heretofore confirmed Special Assessment Roll No. 302 for the assessment of certain properties

especially benefitted by a certain improvement, namely: Paving and curbing on West College Avenue between Northrop and Norway Streets; and,

WHEREAS, Owners of certain of such properties installed curbing at their properties at their own cost and expense, and were not specially benefitted by that portion of such special assessment against their properties to the extent of the costs and expenses for such curbing, and the City of Marquette was not required to expend its funds for that purpose; and,

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

November 28, 1960

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall Monday, November 28, 1960 at 7:00 o'clock p. m.

Present: Mayor Smith, Commissioners Bur, Carlson, Johnson and Rydholm.

It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Carlson and unanimously adopted that the reading of the minutes of the previous meetings be waived.

Mayor Smith then declared the public meeting open on Special Assessment Roll No. 323 for the installation of curbing and paving of Northrup Street between Magnetic Street and College Avenue in the City of Marquette. Upon the close of the public hearing it was moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Rydholm that the following resolution be, and the same is unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, It appears by the affidavit of the City Clerk that due publication has been made of notice as required by the City Charter, of the filing with the City Clerk of the Special assessment roll for the following improvement:

The installation of curbing and paving on Northrup Street between Magnetic Street and College Avenue in the City of Marquette.

and appointing this day and time when the City Commission and Assessor would meet to review said assessments and special assessment roll therein; and

WHEREAS, It appears further by said affidavit that a like notice has been sent by mail to each owner of property subject to such assessment; and

WHEREAS, All suggestions and objections made to said assessment roll therein, have been heard and considered; and

WHEREAS, Said assessment roll and the assessments therein having been reviewed by the Commission and the Assessor and all needful

corrections of the same having been made;

RESOLVED, That said assessment roll, to-wit: Special Assessment Roll No. 323, and the respective assessment therein, are hereby confirmed;

FURTHER RESOLVED, That such assessments may be paid in 5 equal annual installments at the time fixed for the payment of regular city taxes, together with interest on such installments at the rate of 4% per annum from the date of the confirmation of said special assessment roll.

Mayor Smith declared a public hearing open on an ordinance to amend section 6.16 of chapter 27, of title VI, of the code of the City of Marquette, and by adding new sections, which new sections shall be designated as 6.17 to 6.21, inclusive, of chapter 27, title VI, protecting the health and safety of persons using public bathing beaches and waters, and providing penalties for the violation thereof. Following a discussion on various sections of this ordinance amendment some of the sections being revised Mayor Smith then declared the public hearing closed.

It was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that amendments be made to section 6.18 by adding the word "designated" before the words "bathing beach" and that section 6.20 be amended by eliminating the word "rowboat" and adding the words "motor propelled vessel" and changing from "three to two hundred yards," and adding the word "designated" before the words "bathing beach."

Following a short discussion on this matter it was moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted that the said ordinance as amended be adopted.

Mayor Smith then declared a public hearing open on an ordinance to repeal section 6.99 of

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Chapter 31, Title VI, of the code of the City of Marquette. Following a short discussion Mayor Smith declared the public hearing closed. Moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Bur that the ordinance repealing section 6.99 of Chapter 31, Title VI, of the code of the City of Marquette be unanimously adopted.

Mayor Smith then declared a public hearing on an ordinance to amend section 2.1 of Chapter 13, of Title II of the code of the City of Marquette by deleting the words, "cans, bottles" in paragraph (a) therein. Following a short discussion on this amending ordinance Mayor Smith declared the public hearing closed. On motion by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Johnson the ordinance was unanimously adopted.

Mayor Smith declared a public hearing open on an ordinance to amend the code of the City of Marquette by adding a new section, which new section shall be designated as section 8.16 of Chapter 44, Title VIII, of said code, prohibiting the breeding place of rats and vectors. Following considerable discussion on this amendment it was moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted that the hearing on this ordinance amendment be adjourned until the next regular Commission meeting thus allowing time for study and revision.

Mayor Smith then declared a public hearing open on an ordinance to amend section 1.50 of Chapter 4, Title I, to repeal sections 1.70 to 1.74, inclusive, and sections 1.80 to 1.83 inclusive, of Chapter 5, Title I, of the Code of the City of Marquette, and to add new sections, which new sections shall be designated as sections 1.70 to 1.83 inclusive, of Chapter 5, Title I, of the code of the City of Marquette, creating a public safety Department to combine the functions of the Police and Fire Departments and to provide for the duties, functions and personnel thereof. Inter-

ested citizens present at the meeting were heard. Mr. Alan Tappen and Mr. Slocum of the Fire Fighters Association addressed the commission, opposing this ordinance. Chief of Police Donald McCormick also addressed the Commission in opposition to the adoption of this ordinance. Municipal Judge Edward H. Dembowski addressed the Commission pointing out that section 1.78 through section 1.83 were in direct violation of the Charter of the City of Marquette and state laws. Mayor Smith then declared the public hearing closed. It was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted that section 1.78 through section 1.82 be deleted and that section 1.83 be made section 1.78 with proper changes in the title. Following a short discussion by the various commissioners it was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted that said ordinance, be rejected in its entirety.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson that the following resolution be and the same is hereby unanimously adopted

WHEREAS, The United States of America, through its Department of Agriculture, has requested the grant to it of certain City-owned lands for the purpose of establishing thereon a forestry research laboratory and library, to be available to industries and the public of this City and the area adjacent to it; and

WHEREAS, the principal industries and economy of the City of Marquette, Michigan are dependent, directly or indirectly upon the preservation and insuring of the continued supply of reserves of forest products, and the improvement in their quality as well as quantity; and,

WHEREAS, the land so requested to be granted is not now used for any public purpose, and will not be so used in the foreseeable future,

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and was not purchased or dedicated for park or cemetery purposes, or any other purposes inconsistent with such granted purposes;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

1. The City Commission of the City of Marquette, Michigan, upon due consideration and study, determines that the proposed use of such requested lands would be for the public use and benefit of the City and its inhabitants and industries, as well as its schools, and that the City of Marquette and its inhabitants would derive such benefit from such projected use as to constitute a public purpose;

2. That a grant be made to the United States of America, subject to the condition that the lands be solely for the public purpose of forest research and that construction of a research laboratory thereon be commenced not later than July 1, 1962, and that if such lands cease to be used for said purposes for a period of five years, same shall forfeit and revert to the City, provided, that the grantee may, within two years following such five year period, remove all structures, buildings, improvements and installations placed thereon, such lands being described as follows: A parcel of land lying within the South Half of the Southeast Quarter of Section 10, Township forty-eight North, Range Twenty-Five West, or more particularly described as follows: Commencing at the Southeast corner of said Section 10, which is located at the intersection of County Road 550 and Wright Street in the City of Marquette; thence Westerly along Wright Street 993 feet; thence Northerly 33 feet to point of beginning at edge of right-of-way. From point of beginning, being the Southwest corner of said parcel, proceed 450 feet East to Southeast corner; thence North 723.4 feet to a point along a reserved 70 foot roadway which parallels and is adjacent to the Duluth, South Shore and Atlantic Railway - Dead River Branch; thence Southwesterly along re-

served roadway to a point where a line extended due North from the point of beginning intersects this roadway; thence due South 548.5 feet — to the point of beginning.

3. That the consideration for such grant be nominal with other valuable considerations, including the continuing public use for forestry research and laboratory and accessory buildings incidental and necessary thereto.

A report from City Manager Ernest L. Neumann was read wherein he tabulated bids received for 2-2000 KVA transformers to be used in the Light and Power Department. Following a short discussion on this matter it was moved by Commission Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager the bid of General Electric Supply Company, 510 W. College Avenue, Appleton, Wisconsin, in the sum of \$16,676.00 be accepted.

A report from City Manager Ernest L. Neumann was read wherein he recommends certain traffic control measures for Arch and Ridge Streets in the City of Marquette. Following a short discussion it was moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager the following traffic control measures be placed in effect on a 90 day trial basis.

Ridge Street — 1 way traffic
Front to Third — Parking on both sides

Arch Street — 1 way traffic
Third Street East to Front Street, parking on South side.

A communication from W. C. Evert, President Marquette Community Association for Retarded Children, was read wherein he requests permission for that organization to conduct a fund raising drive in the City of Marquette on December 21, 1960. It was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Carlson and unanimously adopted that this request be

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granted.

The City Commission received a report from City Manager, Ernest L. Neumann wherein he recommends that the City-owned dwellings on Wright Street known as the Swan residence and the Weymouth residence be repaired and placed in livable condition and put up for bids for renting or lease. After a short discussion on the matter of these residences it was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that the Commission concur with the recommendation of the City Manager in that these properties not be sold but be repaired to a livable condition and that City Employees get first priority on the leasing or renting of these properties.

A communication from Mrs. Frank Karabetsos, Manager of the Adams Hotel was read wherein she requests consideration if the City of Marquette obtains permission for another liquor license. This request was ordered received and placed on file.

A communication from A. L. Heibel, Director Olympic Lanes, Inc. was read wherein he requests consideration if a new liquor license is allowed the City of Marquette. This communication was ordered received and placed on file.

It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Carlson and unanimously adopted that the report of the City Health Department concerning recommended action for the condemnation of premises described as Lot No. 4, of the Champion Addition, and a strip of land 25' wide E. & W. adjoining lot produced Easterly, also known as 137 Champion Street, Marquette, Michigan, be received; that the City Manager fix a date for a public hearing thereon and serve notice upon the owners and occupants of said premises at least 10 days prior to such date of public hearing, such notice to conform to the requirements of the ordinance of the City in such cases.

Moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted that the report of the City Health Department concerning recommended action for the condemnation of premises described as "Lots 7 & 8, of the Caroline Burt's Addition, known as 349 Jackson Street, in the City of Marquette, be received; that the City Manager fix a date for a public hearing thereon and serve notice thereof upon the owners and occupants of said premises at least 10 days prior to such date of public hearing, such notice to conform to the requirements of ordinance of the City in such cases.

December 5, 1960

A special meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held Monday, December 5, 1960 at 7:00 p. m.

Present: Mayor Smith, Commissioners Bur, Carlson, Johnson and Rydholm.

Mayor Smith announced the purpose of this meeting was to study the cash needs of the City for the remainder of the fiscal period and to consider other unfinished business.

A report from City Manager Ernest L. Neumann was read wherein he informed the Commission of the total budgeted funds for the 1960 - 1961 fiscal period and the anticipated financial needs for the remaining seven months of this fiscal period, the need to borrow money and issue City notes in anticipation of the collection of taxes was recommended by him as the solution. The Commission unanimously agreed that this was a fine report on the financial position of the City and that the City Manager proceed with the preparation of the necessary steps for the solution of the financial problems and present same to the Commission for its official action.

A communication from George C. Quinnell, Attorney for Helmi Biekkola was read requesting permission to install an underground fuel oil tank on the former D.S.S.&A. right-of-way close to the Biekkola property. Moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted both parties will reserve its claim to that part of the property, temporarily the City will grant permission to install a fuel oil tank. That such permission be granted temporarily until the title to the former D.S.S.&A. property can be clarified, both the City and Mrs. Biekkola reserving their respective rights and claims thereon,

such installation to be at no cost to the City and Mrs. Biekkola to save the City harmless from all claims for damages arising therefrom. A written agreement containing such permission, terms and conditions was authorized to be executed in behalf of the City of Marquette by the Mayor and City Clerk.

A communication from Pastor Gordan A. Frase, Pastor Seventh Day Adventist Church was read wherein a request was made to conduct a door to door campaign to solicit funds for the missionary welfare fund of his church. Following a discussion on door to door canvassing the Commission asked Pastor Frase to clarify several questions on this matter. Pastor G. A. Frase then addressed the Commission explaining the reason for his request. It was then moved by Commissioner Johnson, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and adopted that permission be granted if proper advertising be had requesting the prospective donors express their willingness to give by indicating so with a porch light or some similar invitation.

Yeas — Mayor Smith, Commissioners Johnson, Rydholm, Carlson.
Nay — Commissioner Bur.

It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson that the following resolution be and the same is hereby unanimously adopted.

December 13, 1960

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held at the City Hall Tuesday, December 13, 1960 at 7:00 o'clock P. M.

Present: Mayor Smith, Commissioners Bur, Carlson, Johnson and Rydholm.

It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that the reading of the minutes of the previous meetings be waived.

Mayor Smith announced that a public hearing had been adjourned from the November 28th meeting and that at this time the Commission would continue with that hearing. Following a short discussion on the proposed ordinance amending the Code of the City of Marquette it was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted that the proposed ordinance to amend the Code of the City of Marquette by adding a new section, which new section shall be designated as section 8.16 of Chapter 44, Title VIII of said Code prohibiting the accumulation on open spaces, unused materials, rubbish and junk be amended to read as follows:

"8.16 PROHIBITED ACCUMULATIONS. It shall be unlawful for any person to accumulate or permit the accumulation on any yard, alley, vacant lot or other spaces in the City of any lumber, boxes, barrels, bricks, stones, scrap metal, motor vehicle bodies or parts, or similar materials, or rubbish or any articles of junk, except as may be necessary and incidental to construction work or the normal course of a business or trade." It was moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted that said ordinance be adopted as amended.

Commissioner Bur introduced the following ordinance:

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 6.94 (6), 6.94 (7) AND 6.94 (8) OF CHAPTER 31 OF

TITLE VI, OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF MARQUETTE, PRESCRIBING TOILET FACILITIES AND LAVATORIES IN RESTAURANTS AND EATING PLACES, PROTECTING THE HEALTH AND SAFETY OF PERSONS USING THE FACILITIES THEREOF.

The City of Marquette Ordains: Section 1. Sections 6.94 (6), 6.94 (7), and 6.94 (8), of Chapter 31, of Title VI, are hereby amended to read as follows:

6.94 (6) — Toilet Facilities. Every restaurant shall be provided with adequate and conveniently located toilet facilities, properly designated, for both sexes, and conforming with the regulations of the Michigan Department of Health. In every restaurant hereafter established, toilet rooms shall not open directly into any room in which food, drink, or utensils are handled or stored. The doors of all toilet rooms shall be self-closing. Toilet rooms shall be kept in a clean condition, in good repair, and well lighted and ventilated. Hand-washing signs shall be posted in each toilet room, and no employee shall resume work after using the toilet room without first washing his hands.

6.94 (7) The minimum floor space of each toilet room shall be approximately five feet by seven feet in dimensions, or approximately 35 square feet. The floor of each toilet room shall be constructed of impervious material which shall extend eight inches up on the walls above the floor level, and equipped with an effective drain.

6.94 (8) Toilets for men shall have the following minimum equipment:

One wash bowl with running water; one intermittent or flush type wall urinal; one flush stool, separated from the urinal by a partition, for each 100 patrons based on the seating capacity of

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the establishment; individual sanitary towels; an adequate supply of soap; sanitary toilet paper, and metal receptacle for waste. Toilets for women shall have the same equipment and amount thereof, as for men, except for the urinal. All toilet and wash rooms, including walls, floors, ceiling and fixtures shall be kept in a clean and sanitary condition at all times.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall become effective ten days after its adoption and publication.

It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Carlson and unanimously adopted that the foregoing proposed ordinance amendment be accepted as to form and substance and the City Clerk be authorized to set a date for a public hearing thereon.

Commissioner Carlson introduced the following ordinance:

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 2.6, OF CHAPTER 13, OF TITLE II, OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF MARQUETTE, REGULATING THE DISPOSAL OF RUBBISH AND GARBAGE AND THE SIZE OF THE CONTAINERS THEREFOR.

The City of Marquette Ordains:

Section 1. Section 2.6 of Chapter 13, of Title II, of the Code of the City of Marquette is hereby amended to read as follows:

2.6 Garbage and Rubbish Containers. All yards, alleys, streets, vacant lots or other spaces in the City shall be kept free from rubbish and garbage, unless the same is contained in covered, watertight, metal cans, not less than twenty (20) gallons nor more than thirty (30) gallons in size, with handles, or in the case of rubbish, in other tight containers; except that ordinary winter accumulation of ashes may be kept until June 1st, following said winter accumulation without being kept in a container.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall become effective ten days after its adoption and publication.

It was moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commission-

er Bur and unanimously adopted that the foregoing proposed ordinance amendment be accepted as to form and substance and the City Clerk be authorized to set a date for a public hearing thereon.

A report from City Manager Ernest L. Neumann was read wherein he informs the Commission of a former agreement between the City and the owner of the National Guard Building on Presque Isle Avenue for the acquisition of that building as a storage place. Attached to the City Managers report was a letter from the owner of the building stating the terms of an agreement made with the former City Manager, George T. Meholick. Following a short discussion on this matter it was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that the matter of the former National Guard Building be referred to the City Manager and the City Attorney with the request that a report on the validity of the proposed agreement be had and that a lease option be presented to the Commission for their consideration.

A report from City Manager Ernest L. Neumann was read wherein he informs the Commission of the regulations governing off-street parking in the City of Marquette. This report was ordered received and placed on file.

A communication from City Manager Ernest L. Neumann was read wherein he requests permission to advertise for bids on two garbage trucks, 1-1½ cubic yard front end loader and three dump trucks. Following considerable discussion on this matter it was moved by Commissioner Johnson, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted that the City Manager be authorized to request bids on the necessary equipment for the Public Works Department, and that the specifications of the bids contain a requirement of the bidder to maintain an inventory sufficient to meet all repair requirements of this equipment.

A communication from Lee McGinley of Lawrence Scudder and Company, City Public Accountants, was read wherein he informs the City of certain amounts of money which are available for transfer from segregated assets of the municipal utilities to the general fund of the City, toward payment of tax equivalent or otherwise.

A report from Sarah Van Cleve, City Accountant, also accompanied the report from the Auditors. In her report she recommends that certain transfers be made in accordance with the ordinances governing the various utilities.

It was then moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted that a transfer of \$52,468.26 in the receiving fund, according to an audit of June 30, 1960, of the Water and Sewage Disposal Utility be transferred in accordance with Ordinance No. 165 to the Water Supply and Sewage Disposal "Suspense Fund."

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that an amount of \$20,987.30 in the Suspense Fund of the Water and Sewage Disposal Utility and in accordance with ordinance No. 165 be transferred to the General Fund to be specifically used for payment of equivalent Water and Sewage Disposal corporate taxes.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that \$31,480.96 now in the Suspense Fund of the Water and Sewage Disposal Utility be transferred to the Improvement Fund of the Water and Sewage Disposal Utility all in accordance with Ordinance No. 165.

Moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted that a transfer of \$174,544.85 representing money in the Electric Utility Surplus Fund according to an audit as of June 30, 1960 and in accordance with Ordinance No. 186 be and is hereby transferred to the

General Fund to be specifically used for payment for equivalent Electric Utility Corporate Taxes.

A communication from City Manager Ernest L. Neumann wherein he tabulated bids received for the leasing of city-owned dwellings on Wright Street. Following a short discussion on this matter it was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager the City - owned property known as the Weymouth house on Wright Street be leased to William J. Perry, Jr. for \$55.50 per month, he being the high bidder on this house, and that James Alexander be leased the Swan house for \$35.00 per month, he being the high bidder on that house, and that a proper lease agreement be entered into on an annual basis.

A report from City Manager Ernest L. Neumann was read wherein he informs the Commission of a scale of fair charges to be made for the recharging of soda acid extinguishers and foam extinguishers. Mr. Neumann also informed the Commission of the need for an attachment for the hose tester to test extinguisher pressures. Following a short discussion on this matter it was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager the Fire Department personnel be instructed to recharge soda acid extinguishers at a cost of \$1.00 and that foam extinguishers be recharged at a cost of \$1.50 per extinguisher.

Mayor Smith announced his appointment of Kenneth Lowe to serve the unexpired term of Mrs. Carroll Paul on the Library Board. The Commission unanimously confirmed this appointment.

Mayor Smith extended a vote of thanks to the various boards and committees who have worked with the City Commission during this past year and expressed his appre-

ciation to them for their continued willingness to serve the City.

It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Carlson and unanimously adopted that the City Commission go on record as opposing the discontinuance of the Chicago, Northwestern "400" line effecting the Upper Peninsula and that the City Manager and City Attorney prepare a resolution opposing the discontinuance of Chicago, Northwesterns Railway passenger service as effecting the Upper Peninsula of Michigan and to investigate and report the status of the petition for such discontinuance.

City Manager Ernest L. Neumann orally requested that the City Commission give consideration to the adjusting of the cost of water tapping permits. It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted that the City Manager have a proper resolution drawn up increasing the water tapping permit charges in accordance with his recommendations and that these resolutions be presented for Commission action.

City Attorney Waldo A. McCrea orally reported the status of his findings pertaining to uncollected personal property taxes now on file in the County Treasurer's Office, and stated that notices would go forward to each delinquent tax payer notifying them of the city lien on their taxable property and of the procedure to be taken in the event such taxes are not paid.

Mayor Smith in behalf of the City Commission wished all City Employees a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted the following bills duly approved by the signatures of the respective Commissioners in charge and the respective officials under whom the work was actually performed or material furnished, were presented and read, viz:

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held Tuesday, December 27, 1960 at 4:00 o'clock, p. m.

Present: Mayor Smith, Commissioners Bur, Carlson, Johnson and Rydholm.

It was moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that the reading of the minutes of the previous meetings be waived.

A communication from George C. Quinnell, Attorney at Law, was read wherein he informs the Commission that he represents Helmi Biekkola and Olympic Lanes, Inc. Mr. Quinnell also calls the attention of the Commission to a resolution adopted by the Marquette City Commission on June 5, 1934 wherein that Commission designated certain Streets in the City of Marquette where spirits may be sold. Mr. Quinnell also points out to the Commission that the Street where his clients have established a business is not included in the resolution adopted in 1934. He requested that the Street be included in the fore-mentioned designated areas. Following a short discussion on this matter it was moved by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted that the resolution as adopted June 5, 1934 regulating the areas for the approval of the locations of licensees for the sale of spirits be amended to include the following area:

**"MAIN STREET FROM
FRONT STREET TO
THIRD STREET"**.

A communication from Leo F. Carlson, Manager, Closser Realty Company was read wherein he informs the Commission that his Company represents a National Grocery Chain which proposes to construct a supermarket in the down town area of Marquette. Mr. Carlson pointed out that City-owned property is involved in this proposed construction program,

and that a long term lease is desired to complete this development project. Following a discussion on this matter Mr. Carlson was asked to clarify one or two questions by the Commission. Mr. Carlson then orally addressed the Commission in conjunction with his communication. It was then moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted that this matter be referred to the City Manager and the City Attorney for the negotiation and preparation of the requested lease, and the examination of the title of the property affected and to report back to the Commission for its study and action.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson that the following resolution be and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, The Chicago and North Western Railway Company has filed its petition with the Interstate Commerce Commission for authority to discontinue its night trains Nos. 161 and 162 between Green Bay, Wisconsin and Ishpeming, Michigan: and,

WHEREAS, Such two trains are an essential and vital service to the people of our City and County who must travel from Marquette County to points south to Chicago, and connecting lines to the lower peninsula of Michigan, there being no passenger service by train available directly in any other manner; and,

WHEREAS, Said trains carry baggage, express and mail to this City and County, and same are an important service required for the development and progress, if not the survival of our area; and the proposed substituted service would not be adequate for that purpose; and,

WHEREAS, It is believed by this Commission that the petition for discontinuance does not proper-

ly reflect the revenue-cost analysis of the operation of said two trains, and does not include revenue from "through" fares to Chicago, Illinois and other connecting lines, and does not fairly reflect the proper proportion of the costs chargeable solely to the operation of said trains on that portion of the entire line sought to be abandoned; and,

WHEREAS, This Commission is of the further opinion that the operation of the said two trains is a required and vital public necessity and convenience, and that to abandon their operation would result in great loss to the public interests and the economy of the Upper Peninsula of Michigan;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That this Commission go on record as opposing the granting of the petition of the Chicago and North Western Railway Company by the Interstate Commerce Commission to discontinue the operation of its Trains Nos. 161 and 162 between Green Bay, Wisconsin and Ishpeming, Michigan;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a hearing be requested on said petition within the Area of the Upper Peninsula affected thereby, and that the City of Marquette, Michigan be represented at the hearing and enter its objections and protests thereto in behalf of this City.

A communication from Lawrence Scudder and Co., Certified Public Accountants, was read wherein they informed the Commission of examination of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary to produce the annual audit of the City of Marquette for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1960.

It was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Bur and unanimously adopted that the Annual audit for the fiscal period, July 1, 1959, June 30, 1960 as presented by Lawrence Scudder and Co., be accepted.

Moved by Commissioner Carlson,

supported by Commissioner Rydholm that the following resolution be and the same is hereby unanimously adopted.

RESOLUTION FOR OPERATING — NEXT SUCCEEDING FISCAL YEAR

At a meeting of the City Commission of the City of Marquette, County of Marquette, Michigan, held on December 27, 1960 at 4:00 o'clock P. M. the following resolution was offered by Commissioner Carlson, supported by Commissioner Rydholm:

WHEREAS, it is hereby determined that it is necessary to borrow \$210,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of the OPERATING TAXES for the NEXT SUCCEEDING FISCAL YEAR ending June 30, 1962, which taxes are due on July 1, 1961, for the purpose of financing remaining 7 months of current year; and,

WHEREAS, Act No. 202 of the Public Acts of 1943 authorizes borrowing of money in anticipation of the collection of the unpaid tax for the next succeeding fiscal year for such operating expenses as could not reasonably have been foreseen and adequately provided for in the tax levy for the current fiscal years tax; and,

WHEREAS, Said expenses were not foreseen and adequately provided for in the tax levy for the current fiscal year, but is a necessary operating expense; and,

WHEREAS, outstanding loans against the operating taxes for the next succeeding fiscal year are \$ -0- ; and,

WHEREAS, THE OPERATING TAX LEVY FOR THE NEXT SUCCEEDING fiscal year has not been determined;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That the City of Marquette borrow for the above purpose \$210,000.00 or such part thereof as the Municipal Finance Commission may authorize, and issue the notes of the City therefor in anticipation of the collection of the operating taxes for the next succeeding fiscal year ending June

30, 1962; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City Clerk be and he is hereby authorized to make application to the Municipal Finance Commission for and on behalf of the City of Marquette for an order permitting this City to borrow \$210,000.00 and issue its notes therefor as aforesaid; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that said notes bear interest at not to exceed 4% per annum, be dated January 1, 1961 and be due and payable September 1, 1961 which is the estimated time of collection of a sufficient amount of the operating taxes for the next succeeding fiscal year to pay the notes in full; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that said note or notes shall be subject to redemption prior to maturity in inverse numerical order at par and accrued interest on the first day of any month prior to maturity thereof upon fifteen (15) days notice served upon the holder or holders thereof, or published in a newspaper or publication circulated in the State of Michigan which carries as a part of its regular service notices of the sale of municipal bonds.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that irrevocably a tax be and hereby is levied for the fiscal year July 1, 1961 for the payment of operating expenses for such year, sufficient for the repayment of such loan from the receipts of such taxes, and such receipts are irrevocably pledged for the repayment of such loan.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that hereafter from the collections of taxes for the next succeeding fiscal year there be set aside in a special fund that percentage of such collections which the tax levied for operating bears to the total tax levy, said fund to be used for the payment of the principal of and interest on said notes, and until the amount so set aside shall be sufficient for such payments, collections of such taxes shall be used

for no other purposes.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the said notes shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America as such bank or trust company in the State of Michigan as shall be designated by the original purchaser.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Mayor and City Clerk of the City be and they are hereby authorized and directed to execute said notes for and on behalf of the city and that upon the execution of said notes the same shall be delivered to the Treasurer of the City who is hereby authorized and directed to deliver said notes to the purchaser thereof, upon the receipt of the purchase price therefor.

Moved by Commissioner Bur, supported by Commissioner Johnson that the following resolution be and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

RESOLVED, That the Citizens Commercial and Savings Bank, Flint, Michigan is hereby appointed as paying agent for the principal and interest on \$145,000.00 issue of bonds of this City.

BE IS FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Citizens Commercial and Savings Bank be designated as the depository and custodian of the debt retirement and reserve funds accumulated by this City for this bond issue.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Bank, as paying agent, receive for its services, fees on the following basis:

For services in paying coupons: Five cents for each coupon paid with a minimum of \$5.00 on any one interest date.

For services in paying bonds: \$1.00 for each bond paid.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That all cancelled bonds, coupons and statements for this account be forwarded to:
