AND RESOLVED, That this Commission has estimated the revenue which will be forthcoming during the current year and has determined the amount necessary to balance the budget to be the sum of Five Hundred Twenty Three Thousand, Nine Hundred Ninety Three Dollars and Seventy-Five Cents (\$523,993.75) of which Four Hundred Seventy Three Thousand, Two Hundred Forty Three Dollars and Seventy Five Cents (\$473,243.75) is hereby fixed as the amount to be raised for general city tax purposes, and Fifty Thousand, Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$50,750.00) is hereby fixed as the tax to be raised for the Peter White Library.

AND RESOLVED, That this Commission do meet on Monday, May 15, 1961, at 7:00 o'clock P. M. Eastern Standard Time for public hearing upon said estimates and for the passage of the Annual Appropriation Bill; and that the City Clerk publish said estimates and

notices of said hearings as required by the City Charter.

That the following Resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimsously adopted:

RESOLVED, that on March 8, 1961, the City Commission received a Resolution adopted by vote of the Board of Education of the City of Marquette requesting a School Tax Levy of Five Hundred Ninety Six Thousand, Six Hundred Twenty Three Dollars and Seventy Five Cents (\$596,623.75);

AND RESOLVED, that the Board of Education has estimated all of the revenue which will be forthcoming during their 1961-62 budget year and has determined this amount necessary to balance the school budget of which Five Hundred Five Thousand Dollars (\$505,000.000) was determined for current operation expenses and Ninety One Thousand, Six Hundred Twenty Three Dollars and Seventy Five Cents (\$91,623.75) was determined for payment of bonded indebtedness of school construction,

AND RESOLVED, that this Commission do meet on Monday, May 15, 1961, at 7:00 o'clock P. M. Eastern Standard Time for a public hearing upon said School Tax Levy and for the passage of the Annual School Tax Appropriation Bill; and that the City Clerk publish same estimate and notices of said hearing as required by City Charter.

A recommendation from City Manager Ernest L. Neumann was read regarding bids received on two 16 yard refuse units to be used in the Public Works Department. Following a short discussion on this matter it was moved by Commissioner Johnson, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimsously adopted that the City Commission concur with the rec-

ommendation of the City Manager and the Superintendent of Public Works Department in that the City purchase two 16 yard refuse units from the Paynter Equipment Company of Houghton, Michigan for the sur of \$9,300.00 which will include the factory training of one operator and one mechanic to service these units.

A recommendation from City Manager Ernest L. Neumann was read incorporating a recommendation of the Superintendent of Public Works Department regarding the purchase of five chassis and cabs to be used in the Public Works Department. Following a discussion on this matter it was moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimsously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager and the Superintendent of Public Works Department the City accept the bid of Ted Fulsher Motor Sales for five Reo units in the sum of \$23,748.50.

A report from City Manager Ernest L. Neumann was read wherein he recommends that bidders on the front end loader to be used in the Public Works Department be invited to demonstrate their particular equipment to prove its usefulness to the City. It was then moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimsously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager the Brebner Machine Company, Lake Shore, Inc. Company and the Malette Construction Equipment Company be invited to bring their representative equipment to the City of Marquette where arrangements will be made by the City Manager for each Company to demonstrate the ability of their machine under like circumstances, these demonstrations to be witnessed by all concerned in order that a new loader for the Public Works Department can be selected.

Ernest L. Neumann was read regarding sewer cleaning equipment. Mr. Neumann pointed out in his report the lack of advantage to the City in placing this equipment up for competitive bidding. Following a short discussion on the equipment and accessories for this sewer cleaning equipment it was moved by Commissioner Johnson, supported by Commissioner Fine and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager the City purchase a pair of Bucket sewer cleaning machines from the O'Brien Manufacturing Corporation of Chicago, Illinois with accessories at a total cost of \$5,047.00, there being no advantage that could result in competitive bidding.

A report from City Attorney, Waldo A. McCrea was read wherein he informs the Commission that the Circuit Court of Marquette County has granted a motion to dismiss, in the matter of the case of Kawbawgam Hotel Company and Insurance Company of North America vs. Michigan Gas and Electric Company and the City of Marquette.

This case will now continue with the Michigan Gas and Electric Company as the remaining defendant, and this disposition of the motion to dismiss now resolves the case as far as the City is concerned.

Mayor Carlson commended City Attorney Waldo A. McCrea for his diligence in caring for the legal problems of the City of Marquette.

City Manager Ernest L. Neumann orally reported on the pos-

sibility of no grade crossing at Grove Street and the proposed US41-M28 relocation. Following a discussion on this matter it was moved by Commissioner Johnson, supported by Commissioner Fine and unanimously adopted that this Commission go on record as favoring no crossing at grade on the proposed relocation of US41-M-28 and Grove Street.

On motion of Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted the following traffic control measure be placed in effect on a 90 day trial basis:

No Parking on the south side of Waldo Street from Fitch Avenue to the dead end.

Mayor Carlson announced that there being no further business before the Commission meeting adjourned.

The Commission reconvened to meet informally with Mr. Walfred Nystrom regarding the installation of an oil terminal on property bordering on Island Beach road. During the course of this meeting it was pointed out the amount of heavy traffic that could be expected on Lake Shore Boulevard and the hazard to the public using that thoroughfare to Presque Isle. Several solutions were discussed and it was decided that City Manager Ernest L. Neumann cause a meeting to be had with officials of the Oil Company that this problem might be aired and a possible solution be had.

Meeting adjourned.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

May 8, 1961

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held Monday, May 8, 1961 at 7:00 o'clock, p.m.

Present: Mayor Carlson. Commissioners Fine, Johnson, Rydholm and Smith.

Mayor Carlson welcomed Mr. Milton Johnson and his adult Government Class present at this meeting and invited all to return often to see Municipal Government in operation.

Mayor Carlson asked Chief of Police Don McCormick to accept the Walker Safety award for 1960 as presented to the Marquette Police Force by the National Police Officials Association of America. Mayor Carlson commended Chief McCormick for a good job well done.

On motion of Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Fine and unanimously adopted the reading of the minutes of the previous meetings be waived.

The Clerk informed the Commission that the last regular meeting of May falls on the eve of a holiday. Following a short discussion it was moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that the last meeting of May be held Wednesday, May 31, 1961 at 7:00 o'clock, p.m.

A petition signed by nineteen property owners on Lake Shore Boulevard was read wherein a request for sewer service in that Boulevard is made. Following a short discussion on this matter it was moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted that this petition be referred to the City Manager for a study and report.

A communication from Raymond H. Miller and Mrs. Roy E. Heath was read wherein a petition was incorporated requesting the Commission to deny a previous request

for rezoning in the Shiras Hills area. Mayor Carlson then announced that in view of the fact that this matter was referred to the home owners in that area to meet with the previous petitioner, and now that this petition is received from the home owners, action be deferred until such time as word can be received from the petitioners requesting rezoning.

A communication from George T. Kendricks, co-ordinator of the Various Service Clubs of the City of Marquette was read wherein a request was made to sponsor a public pancake sale on Saturday, July 1, 1961 at the Armory. This request also seeks permission to use a sound truck to advertise this forthcoming sale. Following a discussion on this matter it was moved by Commissioner Johnson, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted that the request be granted and that the City Manager be authorized to take the necessary action on behalf of the City of Marquette.

A communication from Merton D. Lambert, Grand Knight, Knights of Columbus was read wherein that organization requests permission to sponsor a carnival in the City of Marquette June 12 through June 17. Moved by Commissioner Fine, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that the request of the Knights of Columbus to sponsor a carnival in the City of Marquette on the formentioned dates be granted and that the City waive the \$500.00 license fee as required by the ordinance of the City.

A communication from Thomas Smith, President, and Ken Dorman, Manager, Upper Peninsula Tourist Association was read wherein a request is made for a budgeted sum for the fiscal year 1961-62. The Commission unanimously agreed that this matter be deferred until the budget hearing

to be held May 15, 1961.

A report from City Manager Ernest L. Neumann was read regarding a request for an exemption of a special assessment on Lot 12 in Kildahl subdivision No. 2, on account of a rock outcropping. A part of this report is a report of the City Engineer recommending consideration be given to this Sanitary Sewer Assessment to Lot 12 in Kildahl subdivision No. 2. Also attached to these reports is an opinion of City Attorney Waldo A. McCrea explaining Section 1.202 of the Marquette City Code as it pertains to this particular request. Following a short discussion on this matter it was moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that in accordance with Section 1.202 of the Marquette City Code, said Lot No. 12 of Kildahl subdivision No. 2 be removed from said special assessment roll No. 314 and that the amount of such special assessment against said lot be forgiven and refunded provided that if such lot be improved it then becomes assessable for the utility provided by the sanitary sewer service.

A report from City Manager Ernest L. Neumann and Waldo A. McCrea, City Attorney, was read regarding a request for information and an opinion on the leasing of part of the Tourist Park for a trailer court. The Commission unanimously agreed that this report be placed on file to be used by the Planning Board while making a study of this area.

Mayor Carlson announced that this was the date and time set for a public hearing to determine the necessity of the installation of curbing and paving of West Hewitt Avenue from Oak to Sixth Street. Mayor Carlson declared the public hearing open. City Clerk Everett H. Kent addressed the Commission in behalf of Arthur H. Feldhauser, owner of Lot No. 149 — Harlow subdivision No. 7 who

was unable to attend this hearing and requests that the Commission consider the installation of paving and curbing to the west lot line of lot No. 149 instead of just to the east property line. There being no other persons present wishing to address the Commission, Mayor Carlson declared the public hearing closed. It was then moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted to amend the plans and specifications for the proposed paving and curbing of Hewitt Avenue from Oak to Sixth Street, to show the extension of 32 foot pavement and curbing to the west boundary of lot No. 149 of Harlow subdivision No. 7.

Moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Johnson that the following resolutions be unanimously adopted.

WHEREAS, It appears by the affidavit of the City Clerk that due publication has been made of notice, as required by the City Charter, that it is the intention of the City Commission to make certain improvements, and to determine the necessity of such improvements as follows:

Paving and Curbing of Hewitt Avenue (Oak to Sixth Street)

and appointing this day and time when the City Commission would meet to determine the necessity of such improvement; and

WHEREAS, It appears further by said affidavit that a like notice has been sent by mail to each owner of property subject to assessment therefore; and

WHEREAS, All suggestions and objections made to said improvements have been heard and considered;

RESOLVED, That the City Commission determines that such project and improvements are necessary and proper;

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the proportion of the costs of such improvements which shall be defrayed by special assessment upon the property especially benefitted

thereby and the proportion to be defrayed as the general obligation of the City, if any, shall be as follows:

100% property owners
FURTHER RESOLVED, That the report of the City Manager, the plans and specifications as amended, and the estimated costs of such improvements, are hereby approved and determined accordingly; that said special assessments may be paid in five installments, at the rate of 4 per cent per annum thereon; and that a special assessment district to be assessed therefor is hereby designated as follows:

Hewitt Avenue
(Oak to Sixth Street)

FURTHER RESOLVED, That if any curbing, water taps, and/or sewer taps shall be required to effect the above paving, such curbing, or portions of curbing, water taps, and/or sewer taps, shall also be installed, and the cost thereof assessed to the property specially benefitted thereby, and added to the assessment upon such property for paving, to be pavable in the same manner.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City Assessor shall forthwith prepare an assesment roll in accordance with this Resolution.

City Attorney Waldo A. McCrea orally reported on a request for rezoning of an area known as Pine Village Motor Court. City Attorney McCrea pointed out that the request was to rezone the area from residential to a type of zoning that would allow the installation there to be a conforming use. After considerable discussion by the City Commission it was pointed out that this would be spot zoning in that it would be necessary to go from residential to Green Belt in order that this business established there would be a conforming use. It was then moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Johnson that the request for rezoning the Pine Village area from General Residence to a form of

zoning that would allow the installation to be a conforming use be denied.

Yays: Mayor Carlson. Commissioners Fine, Johnson, Smith.

Nays: Commissioner Rydholm.
City Manager Ernest L. Neumann orally reported on a request by Marquette Township for water service. Following considerable discussion on this matter and a discussion of the ordinance governing the sale of water outside of the City of Marquette the Commission unanimously agreed that more consideration be given this problem now that the City has placed in operation the expanded water supply system. Mayor Carlson also pointed out that he felt there should be open meetings held regarding this problem of water supply to the township.

A communication from Francis Matthews, Quartermaster, Veterans of Foreign Wars, was read wherein the Marquette Post No. 2439, VFW, requests permission to sell Buddy poppies in the City of Marquette on May 26 and 27, 1961. Moved by Commissioner Johnson, supported by Commissioner Fine and unanimously adopted that this request be granted.

Mayor Carlson informed the Commission of information gained while at Washington, D.C. regarding legislation of the Federal Government designed to relieve distressed areas throughout the United States. Mayor Carlson asked the Commission to set aside time when a more thorough discussion can be had regarding this matter.

Commissioner Rydholm reported on a meeting that he attended in behalf of the City of Marquette in Ishpeming.

It was then moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Fine and unanimously adopted that the following bills duly approved by the signatures of the respective Commissioners in charge and the respective officials under whom the work was actually performed or mater-

A Special meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held Monday, May 15, 1961 at 7:00 o'clock, p.m.

Present: Mayor Carlson, Commissioners Fine, Johnson, Rydholm, Smith.

Mayor Carlson stated that the purpose of this meeting was to receive and adopt the annual City appropriation bill and tax levy for the fiscal period 1961-62 and to hold a public hearing on the accepted proposed budget. Mayor Carlson then declared the public hearing open. During the course of the public hearing questions by several Commissioners were asked regarding the budget. Mayor Carlson commented on the balanced budget as presented by City Manager, Ernest L. Neumann. There being no other comments regarding this matter Mayor Carlson declared the public hearing closed. WHEREAS, on May 1, 1961, this Commission made and adopted estimates of all expenditures which will be required to be made from the several funds of the city during the current year, and for the payment of interest and indebtedness to fall due during the year for departments, objects and purposes therein specified, and also fixed the date of May 15, 1961, for public hearing upon said estimates, and

WHEREAS, said estimates and notices of said meetings and the purpose thereof have been published in the Mining Journal, a daily newspaper published in the city for at least one week before said meeting of May 15, 1961.

RESOLVED, that the several sums and amounts of money estimated and determined upon in the said estimates are hereby deter-

mined to be required for the respective objects and purposes specified in said estimates to defray the expenditures and liabilities of the city corporation for the current fiscal year; and

RESOLVED, that there is hereby appropriated for the present fiscal year out of the money in, and to come into the City Treasury, not otherwise appropriated or belonging to any other general or special fund, the following sums and amounts for the several departments and particular objects and purposes respectively specified in said estimates and the above determination, viz:

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the sum of Four Hundred Seventy-three Thousand Two Hundred Forty-three Dollars and Seventy Five Cents (\$473,243.75) be, and the same is hereby ordered to be raised by tax upon the general tax roll of this city for the fiscal year 1961-62.

Mayor Carlson then directed the Clerk to read the annual school appropriation tax levy. Moved by Commissioner Rydholm supported by Commissioner Fine that the following resolution was unanimously adopted.

WHEREAS, on May 1, 1961, the City Commission received a Resolution adopted by the Board of Education of the City of Marquette requesting a SCHOOL TAX LEVY of Five Hundred Ninety - six Thousand, Six Hundred Twenty-three Dollars and Seventy - five Cents (\$596,623.75); and also fixed the date of May 15, 1961, for public hearing on said request, and

WHEREAS, the Marquette City Board of Education has estimated all of the revenue which will be forthcoming during their 1961-62 budget year and has determined this amount necessary to balance the school budget of which Five Hundred Five Thousand Dollars (\$505,000.00) was determined for current operational expenses, and Ninety-one Thousand, Six Hundred Twenty-three Dollars and Seventy-Five Cents (\$91,623.75) was determined for payment of bonded indebtedness of school construction: and

WHEREAS, said request and notice of said meeting and the purpose thereof have been published in the Mining Journal, a daily newspaper published in the City of Marquette, for at least one week before said meeting of May 15, 1961;

On motion of Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted, permission as requested was granted and that the ordinance fees be waived in this instance.

A communication from John F. Martin, Potentate, Ahmed Temple, A.A.O.N.M.S., Marquette, Michigan was read wherein a request is made for that organization to conduct a demonstration and parade on Friday, June 16, 1961. On motion of Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted, permission to conduct a parade be granted and that the details be referred to the City Manager and the Chief of Police with power to act.

Mayor Carlson announced that this was the date and time set for a public hearing on a special assessment roll for the installation

of paving and curbing on West Hewitt Avenue between Oak and Sixth Street. Following the reading of the roll Mayor Carlson declared the public hearing open. There being no one in attendance wishing to address the Commission, Mayor Carlson declared the public hearing closed.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That such assessments may be paid in five equal annual installments at the time fixed for the payment of regular city taxes, together with

interest on such installments at the rate of 4% per annum from the date of the confirmation of said special assessment roll.

A communication from Edward F. Maloney, Director, License Division, Liquor Control Commission was read wherein he informs the governing body of the City of Marquette that one of the present tavern or Class A. Hotel Licenses may be re-classified to a Class C. License in accordance with the Attorney General's opinion. A list of applications for re-classification made by present license holders in the City of Marquette was read. Following a discussion on this matter it was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Smith and unanimously adopted that in view of the fact that this matter has become a considerable issue, it be handled at a special meeting where time can be devoted to screening all applications.

A communication from Roland Schwitzgoebel, President, Upper Peninsula Adult Mental Health Clinic, Inc. was read wherein he acknowledged receipt of a contribution by the City of Marquette to that organization. This communication was ordered received and placed on file.

A communication from C. T. DeHaas was read wherein a request is made for the rezoning of Lots 10 and 11 in John and William Burt's Addition. Following a short discussion on this matter it was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Fine and unanimously adopted that this matter be referred to the Marquette City Planning Board for study and report.

A communication from Lucille Treado, Chairman, Marquette City Planning Board was read wherein that Board recommends that the City Commission accept the preliminary plat plans as submitted by T. Henry Korhonen, Mr. Wilbert J. Keskey and Robert J. Haley. Following considerable dis-

ussion regarding this matter and the examination of a location map, it was moved by Commissioner Johnson, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the Marquette City Planning Board, these preliminary plat plans be accepted as presented.

Mayor Carlson announced that the communications received from the various planning consultants be taken up at a special meeting to be called for that purpose.

A communication from Richard E. McArdle, Chief, United States Department of Agriculture, Forest Service, was read wherein he acknowledged title to a portion of land donated by the City of Marquette to the United States Government. This communication was ordered received and placed on file.

A communication from City Manager Ernest L. Neumann was read wherein certain recommendations are made pertaining to the monthly water and sewer charges now levied on certain sized meters. Following considerable discussion on the ordinances governing these charges, it was moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Fine and unanimously adopted that this matter be referred to the City Manager and the City Attorney for preparation and formal action by the City Commission.

A communication from City Manager Ernest L. Neumann was read wherein a revised estimate was submitted regarding the installation of a drainage system to alleviate the matter of ground water on West Nicolet Boulevard. In his communication Mr. Neumann refers to petition No. 361 submitted by the property owners in the area of West Nicolet Boulevard for the paving of that Boulevard. Attached to and made a part of his communication is a revised estimate as made by M. J. Keranen, City Engineer. Following considerable discussion on this

matter it was moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Johnson that the following resolutions be unanimously adopted.

WHEREAS, A petition has been received and filed requesting the following improvement:

Paving of West Nicolet Boulevard in Shiras Hills Subdivision No. 1.

RESOLVED, That the City Manager is directed to prepare plans, specifications and estimate of costs of such improvement, and attach thereto his recommendation as to the proportion of the costs to be paid by special assessment and of the proportion, if any, to be paid as the general obligation of the City; the number of installments for payment; the interest rate thereon; and the land to be included in the special assessment district;

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City Manager file same with the City Clerk who shall make same available for public examination;

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City Clerk shall fix a day for a public hearing on the determination of the necessity for such improvement by the City Commission, and shall cause notice of the time and place of same to be published once in the official newspaper of the City not less than 10 days prior to such date of hearing, such notice to state also that the report of the City Manager, and the plans, specifications and estimate of costs, are on file in his office for public examination, and that he shall also serve a like notice upon each owner of property subject to assessments for such improvement, by United States Mail, at least 10 days prior to such hearing; and that he shall further make proof of such publication and service by affidavit.

Following considerable discussion on this matter and Mrs. Hlinak's oral address to the Commission, it was moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Fine and unanimously adopted that the City Clerk be authorized to set a date to conduct a public hearing on the matter of rezoning of this area.

A resolution as adopted by the Board of County Road Commissioners was read, wherein a portion of Wright Street known as a County Local Road be relinquished as such to become a part of the street system of the City of Marquette, Michigan. A communication from Ben Knauss, Secretary, Retail Division Marquette Chamber of Commerce was read wherein he informs the Commission of the date, July 26, 1961, set for the annual Sidewalk Sale Day to be held in the City of Marquette and requesting permission from the City Commission to prohibit the curb parking of cars between Fourth Street and Baraga Avenue between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. Following a short discussion on this matter it was moved by Commissioner Fine, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that this request be granted subject to the approval of the City Manager and Chief of Police.

A recommendation from City Manager Ernest L. Neumann was read wherein he tabulated bids received for a truck to be used in the Parks Department. It was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that the City Commission concur with the recommendation of the City Manager in that the bid of Specker Motor Sales be accepted for a Model D-300 Dodge truck in the sum of \$1,987.00, they being low bidder meeting all specifications.

Ernest L. Neumann was read regarding traffic control measures on Mather Street in the City of Marquette. June 26, 1961

A Regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held Monday, June 26, 1961 at 7:00 o'clock, p.m.

Present: Mayor Carlson. Commissioners Fine, Johnson, Smith.

Absent: Commissioner Rydholm.

It was moved by Commissioner Fine, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that the absence of Commissioner Rydholm be excused, he being away from the City.

Moved by Commissioner Fine, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting be waived.

Mayor Carlson announced that this was the date and time set for a public hearing on an ordinance to amend Section 2.100 and 2.101 of Chapter 17 of Title II of the Code of the City of Marquette by adding a new paragraph creating a class of customers using Fire Extinguisher Systems on a metered service rate and providing rates therefor. Mayor Carlson then declared the public hearing open. Following several comments by various Commissioners, Mayor Carlson declared the public hearing closed. It was moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that the adoption of this ordinance amendment be postponed until the next regular meeting to be held July 10, 1961.

Mayor Carlson then declared the public hearing open. Mr. Donald Small representing the property owners read a counter petition and presented a map of the location of the property of those who signed the petition in opposition to this rezoning. Mrs. Hlinak then addressed the Commission in behalf of her request for rezoning. Other interested citizens were heard by the Commission. Mayor Carlson then declared the public hearing closed. RESOLVED, That a transfer be made from the Electric Utility System Receiving Fund to the Operation and Maintenance Fund, sufficient to cover the operating expenditures for the balance of the 1960-61 fiscal year, in accordance with Section A, Ordinance No. 186.

A report from City Manager Ernest L. Neumann was read regarding Workmens Compensation Insurance for the entire City operation for the fiscal year 1961-62. In his report Mr. Neumann listed the Companies bidding and the proposals that were bid on. Mayor Carlson asked the various Company representatives present if they would in turn explain the type of compensation insurance that they were selling. A representative of Michigan Mutual Liability Company addressed the Commission on this subject. A representative of Employers Mutual of Wausau also addressed the Commission, and a representative of the Elder Insurance Agency then addressed the Commission. Mayor Carlson declared a five minute recess in order to give the Commission an opportunity to weigh statements made by various men present representing the bidders on the proposed Workmens Compensation Insurance. Following the recess it was moved by Commissioner Fine, supported by Commissioner Smith and unanimously adopted that the bid of Michigan Mutual Liability Company on Proposal No. 2 be accepted for Workmens Compensation Insurance for the entire City operation for the fiscal year 1961-62.

officer and employee of the city shall receive, in addition to his salary or wages a payment of \$8.61 per month, payable to the Michigan Hospital Service (Blue Cross-Blue Shield), if such officer or employee has such effective coverage.

Moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Fine that the following resolution be unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, a petition has been received and filed requesting the following improvement:

Grading and Paving of Island Beach Road from Presque Isle Drive to dead end.

RESOLVED, That the City Manager is directed to prepare plans, specifications and estimate of costs of such improvement, and attach thereto his recommendation as to the proportion of the costs to be paid by special assessment and of the proportion, if any, to be paid as the general obligation of the City; the number of installments for payment; the interest rate thereon; and the land to be included in the special assessment district;

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City Manager file same with the City Clerk who shall make same available for public examination;

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTIONS 2.100 (1) AND 2.101 (1) OF CHAPTER 17 OF TITLE II OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF MARQUETTE BY ADDING A NEW PARAGRAPH CREATING A CLASS OF CUSTOMERS USING FIRE SPRINKLER SYSTEMS ON A METERED SERVICE RATE AND PROVIDING RATES THEREFOR.

Mayor Carlson announced that at the June 26, 1961 meeting a public hearing was held regarding a petition for rezoning of an area at the Northeast intersection of Wright Street and County Road 550. Following a short discussion of this matter and in view of the petition in opposition to this rezoning, it was moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that the petition to rezone this area be denied.

A communication from Vernon Kellner, Chapter Adjutant, D.A.V. was read wherein a request was made for that organization to sell Forget Me Nots on the Streets of Marquette August 4th and 5th, 1961. Following a short discussion on this matter it was moved by

Commissioner Fine, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that permission as requested be granted.

A report from City Manager Ernest L. Neumann was read regarding the 1961 paving program, wherein he listed the various streets that are planned for paving and repair. OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

July 24, 1961

A special meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held July 24, 1961 at 7:00 P.M.

Present: Mayor Carlson. Commissioners Fine, Johnson, Smith.

Absent: Commissioner Rydholm.

Commissioner Rydholm filed his waiver of notice and consent to the consideration of a resolution supporting Michigan Gas and Electric Company in its petition before the United States Supreme Court.

Mayor Carlson announced that the noticed purpose of this meeting was to hold public hearings on the abatement of nuisances at 137 Champion Street and 349 Jackson Street.

Mayor Carlson then opened the public hearing on the complaint to abate the nuisance at 137 Champion Street owned by Mrs. James McLaughlin. Attorney Robert Clark was present representing Mrs. McLaughlin and addressed the Commission, acknowledging that the allegations in the complaint as to the condition of the house and offering to re-condition and remodel same through a prospective purchaser Roy E. Falk.

Evidence was presented by Frank E. Sciotto, representing the City Health Department in support of his complaint and the owner presented evidence by herself, Roy E. Falk and Horace Holman in defense thereto. Mayor Carlson then closed the public hearing. Upon motion of Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted, decision on the complaint was postponed until after the Commission has an opportunity to inspect the premises and to obtain a report from the electrical and building inspectors.

Mayor Carlson then announced the public hearing on the complaint for the abatement of a

nuisance at 349 Jackson Street. The Clerk read a copy of a letter from the owners designating Closser Realty Company as their representatives. The Clerk then read a letter from Closser Realty Company acknowledging the allegations in the complaint and agreeing to abate the nuisance within a 60 day period commencing July 25, 1961. Upon motion of Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Fine the following resolution was unanimously adopted.

WHEREAS, a complaint has been made of the existence of a nuisance affecting the public health and welfare within the meaning of Section 8.1 of Chapter 44, Title VIII, Police Regulations, of the Marquette City Code at the following described premises:

349 Jackson Street. Lots No. 7 and 8, of the Caroline Burt's Addition No. 1, owned by Martin Behan, Peter Behan, Agnes Behan.

AND WHEREAS, after the service of due notice of a public hearing thereon upon the owner and all persons affected thereby has been had fixing this as the date of such public hearing, and a public hearing has been had thereon, and the complaining parties and the owner given an opportunity to be heard.

AND WHEREAS, The City Commission of the City of Marquette, Michigan, has heard the proofs in support of such complaint and in answer thereto and the argument of the parties thereto, and being fully advised in the premises;

IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED:

1. That it is the finding of this city commission that a nuisance exists at said premises within the meaning of the said ordinance, which affects the public health and welfare, for the following reasons:

a. The building thereon being

used for dwelling purposes is sub-standard, and not fit and proper for occupancy as a dwelling in that said building is no longer adequately constructed to properly withstand weather conditions with respect to doors, windows, roof materials and outside covering:

b. The walls and ceilings on the inside of the said structure are in very poor state of repair in that much of the wall-board and plaster is cracked and broken and that the part which remains intact is unclean and unsanitary;

c. The floors throughout the entire building are constructed of a soft wood type of material and are in very poor condition and dangerous and most of the floor area is uncovered;

d. The plumbing, sewerage and drainage facilities used therein, are inadequate, broken and improper, which in effect is detrimental to life and health.

e. The condition of the yard is deplorable; in that, there are large amounts of refuse, junk and debris which has been permitted to be strewn about the entire premises in a very unsanitary manner.

2. It is the Order of this City Commission that the owner shall, (within 60 days from the date of this resolution) abate such nuisance by performing the following corrective action:

The razing and removing of the building on said premises and the clearing of all debris in a workmanlike manner, including the cleaning up of the yard around the building.

3. It is the further Order of this City Commission that such corrective action shall be begun not later than August 1, 1961.

4. It is the further Order of this City Commission that if, at the expiration of the time limits provided in this Resolution, the owner of said premises shall fail or neglect to perform the corrective action provided herein; the City

Manager shall carry out the requirements of same; and the cost of such action shall be charged against the premises and the owner thereof in accordance with the provisions of Section 1.189 of the Marquette City Code.

Mayor Carlson then recognized Mr. Fred Garceau, Manager of Michigan Gas and Electric Company who introduced Mr. James E. Profit, Sales Manager for that Company who spoke briefly in support of a proposed resolution to assist Michigan Gas and Electric Company in its appeal to the United States Supreme Court.

Upon motion of Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Johnson the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, The matter of the furnishing of natural gas service to the Upper Peninsula of Michigan at the earliest possible date and at fair and reasonable rates has been a matter of grave and continuing concern to our City of Marquette, to all other communities and to the general citizenry of the Upper Peninsula; and

WHEREAS, Michigan Gas and Electric Company, a Michigan public utility, has for many years past been furnishing manufactured gas to certain communities of the U. P.; has franchises to distribute natural gas to this and other U. P. communities; and has by Order of the Federal Power Commission, an allocation of natural gas from Michigan-Wisconsin Pipe Line Company, an interstate transporter and seller of natural gas, assigned for distribution and use in the U. P.; and

WHEREAS, MG&E contends that the conditions of service and price to be charged it by Michigan-Wisconsin for such allocated gas is unduly discriminatory to the natural gas users in the U.P., requiring them to pay prices for gas which would work a hardship on them, and would result in gas for industrial uses being priced too high to attract new industry

to the area, even jeopardizing the entire U. P. Natural gas project; and

WHEREAS, MG&E took an Appeal to the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit from the Order of the F.P.C., seeking the aid of that Court to remove those portions of the F.P.C. Order charged by MG&E to be discriminatory, and that Court did on April 20, 1961, affirm the F.P.C. Order, and MG&E has since then applied to that Court for rehearing and to the F.P.C. for relief from the charged discriminatory provisions of the F.P.C. Order, and such relief not having been granted; and

WHEREAS, At a public hearing held by the Michigan Public Service Commission on the natural gas supply problem in the U. P. at Escanaba on June 29 and 30, MG&E told of its unceasing efforts to secure natural gas for the U. P. at reasonable and non-discriminatory prices and advised the MPSC that it would carry the fight to the United States Supreme Court if it were supported in the effort by the communities of the U. P. seeking natural gas, and by the MPSC;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

That the City of Marquette being fully aware of the continuing efforts of MG&E to bring natural gas to the U. P., at the earliest

possible moment, at fair, reasonable and non-discriminatory prices, commends it for its actions and assures MG&E of its cooperation and support in any action MG&E may hereafter invoke and undertake by Petition for a Writ of Certiorari to secure a review by the United States Court of the F.P.C., imposing what MG&E contends are unduly discriminatory conditions of service and rates to the U. P.; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,

That the City Attorney be directed to prepare and file with the United States Supreme Court, on behalf of this City alone, or in conjunction with other U. P. communities taking similar action, a Brief Amicus Curiae, supporting the position of MG&E in said cause in its request for a Writ of Certiorari, should the same be filed by MG&E; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,

That the Michigan Public Service Commission is hereby urged to join in said application and likewise file a Brief Amicus Curiae in support thereof and that the City Clerk be directed to send a copy of this Resolution to the Michigan Public Service Commission and to MG&E respectively, advising them of this action hereby taken.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the proportion of the costs of such improvements which shall be defrayed by special assessment upon the property especially benefited thereby and the proportion to be defrayed as the general obligation of the City, if any, shall be as follows: Island Beach Road from Presque Isle to dead end.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the report of the City Manager, the plans and specifications, and the estimated costs of such improvements, are hereby approved and determined accordingly; that said special assessments may be paid in 5 installments, at the rate of 4 per cent per annum thereon; and that a special assessment district to be assessed therefor is hereby designated as follows: Island Beach Road from Presque Isle to dead end.

Following a lengthy discussion on this matter it was moved by Commissioner Johnson, supported by Commissioner Fine and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager the City enter into an agreement to purchase a parcel of land containing approximately 37 acres from Mr. and Mrs. Carl J. Flink to be used for refuse grounds, the terms of the purchase to be spelled out in detail in the agreement.

- c. The front and rear porches completely removed.
- d. All windows refitted with proper sashes and sills, and new glass where necessary.
- e. A complete inspection of the covering of the roof.
- f. The complete building rid of vermin, odor, unnecessary debris and the like.
- g. A good cleaning of the grounds.

3. It is the further order of this City Commission that the owner shall, before permitting the occupancy of any portion of the premises, shall further abate such nuisances by performing the following action as to the portion of the premises to be occupied:

It is the further Order of this City Commission that if, at the expiration of the time limits provided in this Resolution, the Owner of said premises shall fail or neglect to perform the corrective action provided herein; the City Manager shall carry out the requirements of same, and the cost of such action shall be charged against the premises and the owner thereof in accordance with the provision of Section 1.189 of the Marquette City Code.

A communication from Lucille Treado, Chairman, Marquette City Planning Board was read wherein that Board recommends that a petition for rezoning of an area in Homestead Addition be denied until such time as the City has an overall plan of the City of Marquette. It was moved by Commissioner Johnson, supported by Commissioner Fine and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the Planning Board the request of Wright Electrical and Heating Company for rezoning of certain property located in Homestead Addition be denied until the overall plan of the City of Marquette is completed.

At this point in the meeting Senator Tom Sweigert was introduced and addressed the Commission complimenting them on the workman-like manner that business is conducted at their meetings.

Mayor Carlson announced that the matter of upgrading a spirits license for the City of Marquette be handled at the first meeting in the month of August.

Mr. Reinhart of Munising Wood Products Company addressed the Commission regarding an auction sale of personal property of that Company, asking that a license be

August 14, 1961

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held Monday, August 14, 1961 at 7:00 o'clock, P. M.

Present: Mayor Carlson. Commissioners Fine, Johnson, Rydholm, Smith.

On motion of Commissioner Fine, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting was waived.

A petition signed by three property owners on East Avenue was read wherein a request was made for the improvement of that street. Following a short discussion on this matter it was moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Fine and unanimously adopted that this petition be referred to the City Manager for a study and report.

A communication from Ken Dorman, Secretary, Manager, Upper Michigan Tourist Association was read wherein he requested permission to address the Commission regarding the City of Marquette's participation in the Upper Michigan Advertising Council. Mayor Carlson asked that this address be held to a minimum in view of the long agenda ahead.

A communication from Philip L. Reno, President, Michigan Municipal League was read wherein he informs the Commission of the Annual meeting of that organization designating the place, time and dates thereof. The Commission unanimously agreed that the matter of appointing a representative to attend this meeting should be handled at the August 28, 1961 meeting of the City Commission.

A communication from George T. Kendricks, Co-ordinator, Benefit Sale, Bay Cliff Health Camp, was read where he informs the Commission of the results of the pancake sale held to raise funds for the Bay Cliff Health Camp. The Mayor and City Commission

unanimously agreed that this was certainly a worthwhile cause and go on record as highly approving of this activity.

A communication from Claude VerDuin, Executive Secretary, Michigan Municipal Utilities Association was read wherein he informs the Commission of the place, time and dates of the 1961 Fall Conference of that organization. Following a short discussion the Mayor and City Commission unanimously agreed that as many City Officials as possible should attend this all important conference and that the matter of designating representatives to attend be handled at the August 28th meeting.

A communication from H. W. Matzinger, Assistant Director, Route Location Division, Michigan State Highway Department, was read regarding the treatment of the intersection of the relocated US41 and Grove Street. Following considerable discussion on the matter of this intersection and on the matter of the lighting of this relocated highway it was moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Fine and unanimously adopted that this matter be referred to the City Manager for a study and report.

A communication from Steve Petros, Manager, Clifton Hotel was read wherein he requests permission for the spirits concession of that organization to remain open until 2:00 A. M. the week of August 28, 1961. Following considerable discussion regarding this request it was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Johnson that the following resolution be unanimously adopted.

RESOLVED, that the resolution heretofore adopted regulating the closing hour for liquor license establishments be modified in effect to permit a closing hour of 2:00 o'clock A. M. in Class B. Hotels

where dancing is permitted during the week from August 28, 1961 to September 2, 1961 inclusive.

A communication from Vogt, Ivers and Associates along with a recommendation from the City Manager, Ernest L. Neumann was read wherein that Company indicates its willingness to terminate an agreement entered into for engineering services in the Light and Power expansion program. Following a short discussion on this matter it was moved by Commissioner Johnson, supported by Commissioner Fine and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager, final settlement be made with Vogt, Ivers and Associates for engineering services rendered the City during the Light and Power Expansion Program.

A communication from Howard J. Norton, Secretary, Shiras Hills Development Company was read wherein that organization requests the rezoning of a parcel of land lying south of Lakeview Heights subdivision and east of US41 in Burt and Ely's Addition to the City of Marquette. Following a short discussion on this matter wherein it was pointed out that the City of Marquette is in the process of revising the master plan for the entire City and that the present zoning will receive an intensive study and revision, it was moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that there be no spot zoning undertaken at this time, and that this request for rezoning be denied.

At this point in the meeting Commissioner Smith asked to be excused. Permission was unanimously granted.

The City Clerk announced that this was the date and time set for a public hearing and the reading of Assessment Roll No. 330 for the paving of Lake Shore Boulevard from the Island Road to the dead end. Following the reading of the Assessment Roll Mayor Carlson

declared the public hearing open. Interested citizens present were heard regarding this assessment, considerable discussion was had regarding the right of way and the intended location of the paving on the right of way. The question was asked when the installation of the sewer in that street was planned. City Manager Ernest L. Neumann informed those present that this project is now on the drawing board and preliminary engineering has commenced. Various comments were heard regarding street right of way and deeds that must be acquired before progress can continue. At this point in the hearing Mayor Carlson declared a recess in order that diagrams of this street lay out could be examined and discussed. Following the recess Mayor Carlson called the meeting to order and stated that if this right of way cannot be acquired the project would then be held up. City Manager Ernest L. Neumann informed those present at the meeting that plans have been made to pave this street during this week and that if there is a delay in acquiring the right of way necessary for this work it is possible that this paving project would not be done this construction season. WHEREAS, Said assessment roll and the assessments therein having been reviewed by the Commission and the Assessor and all needful corrections of the same having been made;

RESOLVED, That said assessment roll, to-wit: Special Assessment Roll No. 330, and the respective assessment therein, are hereby confirmed;

FURTHER RESOLVED, That such assessments may be paid in equal annual installments at the time fixed for the payment of regular city taxes, together with interest on such installments at the rate of 4% per annum from the date of the confirmation of said special assessment roll.

A communication from R. H. Morrison, President, Peter White Library Board was read wherein he incorporates the annual report of the activities of the Library for the year ending June 30, 1961. The Commission unanimously agreed that this was a full and complete report and ordered the same placed on file for public inspection.

Mayor Carlson announced that the matter of upgrading a spirits license for the City of Marquette that has been postponed from a previous meeting now be brought on for discussion. Following comments by several Commissioners it was moved by Commissioner Johnson, supported by Commissioner Rydholm and unanimously adopted that the license of the Adams Hotel be upgraded from a Class A Hotel and SDM License with food permit to a Class B Hotel and SDM License with food permit.

A communication from R. L.

Stipe, Manager, Land and Forest Department, Upper Peninsula Power Company was read wherein a request was made for an easement along that Company's present power line over City owned property in Sections 8, 9 and 10 all in township 48 north, Range 25 west. Following a short discussion on this matter it was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Johnson and unanimously adopted that the requested easement be granted and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to execute a form of such easement approved as to substance by the City Manager and as to form by the City Attorney.

A communication from Richard L. Rosenthal, Chairman of the Board of Michigan Gas and Electric Company was read wherein he advises the Commission of certain action to be taken by that Company to provide Natural Gas Service to the Upper Peninsula. August 28, 1961

A regular meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held in the Commission Chambers at the City Hall, Monday, August 28, 1961, at 7:00 o'clock P.M.

Present: Mayor Carlson; Commissioners Fine, Johnson, Rydholm and Smith.

Absent: None.

Moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Johnson, and unanimously adopted that the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting be waived.

A communication from Walter M. Noack, Director of Enforcement, Liquor Control Commission, was read wherein he informs the Commission of a request received for a transfer of a 1961 Tavern and SDM license from William Dale Bessex Jr. to Laurence Pleaugh. Following a short discussion on this matter, it was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Smith, and unanimously adopted that due to various circumstances surrounding this particular case, this request be denied.

A communication from Msgr. Arnold L. Casanova, Pastor, St. Christopher's Church, was read wherein he requests permission for that Parish to sponsor the Skerbeck Shows in the City of Marquette. Moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Fine, and unanimously adopted that the request of the St. Christophers Parish to sponsor the Skerbeck Shows at the North Marquette Athletic Field on September 7, 8, 9, and 10th, 1961, be granted, with the understanding the area is to be properly cleaned when the show has closed.

A resolution forwarded to the City Commission by the Pennsylvania Home Rule Association was read wherein they advocated the adoption of a Resolution to support the House of Representative's

Bill No. 8612 pertaining to highway funds. Following a short discussion on this matter, it was the unanimous decision of the City Commission to table action on this matter until H. R. No. 8612 can be studied more thoroughly.

The Commission then discussed the matter of the 1961 Michigan Municipal League's annual meeting to be held at Mackinac Island on September 14th to 16th. On motion of Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Johnson, and unanimously adopted the Mayor, City Manager, and any other city officials whom the Manager sees fit be authorized to attend this meeting.

It was moved by Commissioner Rydholm, supported by Commissioner Johnson, and unanimously adopted the City Manager, Superintendent of the Light and Power Department, and as many of the Commissioners as possible be authorized to attend the 1961 Fall Conference of the Michigan Municipal Utilities Association, to be held at Grand Haven, Michigan, September 6, 7, and 8, 1961.

A communication from George T. Kendricks, Committee Chairman, Kiwanis Club "Kids Day", was read wherein a request was made to sell peanuts throughout the city September 22, 1961. Moved by Commissioner Johnson, supported by Commissioner Fine, and unanimously adopted, that permission as requested, be granted.

A communication from Dr. Harold E. Wright, City Band Director, was read wherein he thanked the city for its support of the Municipal Band during the 1961 concert season. Dr. Wright also suggested several improvements to the equipment, as well as the band concert area at Presque Isle. Mayor Carlson and Commissioners unanimously agreed that these were worthwhile improvements, and referred them to the City Manager to be used for further

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study at budget time.

A communication from Gordan A. Lawry, Secretary-Manager of the Marquette Municipal Band was read wherein he thanked all those who contributed to the success of the 1961 concert season. Mayor Carlson ordered this communication and report received and placed on file.

A recommendation from City Manager, Ernest L. Neumann, was read wherein he included a tabulation of bids received for the painting of the outside trim of No. 2 Fire Station. Moved by Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Johnson, and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the low bid of Alvin P. Tuch in the sum of \$1,475.00 for the painting of the outside trim of the No. 2 Fire Station, be accepted.

A report from City Manager, Ernest L. Neumann, was read wherein he recommends the city revert back to the original design of a crossing at grade for the proposed intersection of US 41 and Grove Street. Following a discussion on this matter, it was moved by Commissioner Fine, supported by Commissioner Rydholm, and unanimously adopted that upon recommendation of the City Manager, the city approve the State Highway Department's plan for the treatment of the intersection of Grove Street and the proposed US 41.
