During the discussion of the matter President Pearl called Alderman Brown to take the chair and gave notice to the council that at its next meeting he would move to reconsider the action of the council in appointing Lovejoy & Demar to superintend the building of the city hall and addressed the meeting in regard to the said resolution.

The president again took the chair and on motion of Alderman Williams said resolution was laid on the table.

City Council Decides to Carry

### COSTS MONEY TO MOVE SNOW.

The first regular meeting of the city council for 1894 was held last evening, Mayor Kaufman presiding. The amount of business to do was not great and was disposed of with dispatch. After reading and approving last meeting's minutes Alderman Brown, chairman of a special committee appointed to confer with the street railway officials regarding the removal of snow from streets traversed by their tracks, reported asking further time. The committee had not been able to see the principal officials owing to absence from town. Alderman Moore objected to their being any more delay in this matter. He said some of the streets were impassable and that while the railway company should have due consideration the rights of citizens in general should not be lost sight of. The committee was thereupon empowered to act for the council and instructed to use all possible dispatch in making some satisfactory arrangement whereby not only the railway tracks but the rest of the streets as well should be kept free from banks of snow that make travel unsatisfactory if not impracticable. The committee will probably report an arrangement Saturday evening next.

The controller presented audited claims to the amount of about \$2,060 which were allowed. The street commissioner's report for December was also presented and adopted. The chief item was \$394 for snow plowing streets and clearing sidewalks. This shows somewhat of the expense that this section's allotment of "the beautiful" costs our taxpayers in order to get through the streets without snow shoes. The controller also stated the new snow plow had been shipped and might be expected here in a few days.

City Attorney Sherwood made a verbal and comprehensive report regarding the recent decision of Judge Stone against the city in the tax case against the Marquette Building & Loan association. After briefly reviewing the history of the case Mr. Sherwood said he could not bring himself to conclude that the decision of the court was right and in this opinion he was supported by several well-known tax attorneys. He was strongly of opinion that the city had still a good fighting case before the supreme court and would advise the council, while admitting the possibility of losing and the consequent expense, that the matter be carried up. Upon motion of Alderman Brown and a few remarks from Alderman Moore, not specially complimentary to building and loan societies in general, it was unanimously voted that the case be taken to the supreme court and the city attorney was instructed accordingly.

COMMON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Alderman Brown, chairman of the special committee appointed to confer with the street railway officials regarding the removal of snow from streets traversed by said railway, asked till Saturday evening, the 6th to make their report, in consequence of the absence of officials from the city. The same was granted.

The controller reported and stated that the new snow plow had been shipped, cost was \$175, and presented the street commissioner's report which was on motion accepted.

Peterson and Aaron Carlson; and another to the city of Marquette for two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) secured by cash deposit in Wilkinson's bank and signed by Ferdinand Bending.

Samuel E. Byrne was thereupon declared duly elected supervisor of the Fourth ward of the city of Marquette during the unexpired term.

## SPECIAL COUNCIL MEETING. OFFICIAL.

An adjourned regular and annual regular meeting of the common council of the city of Marquette was held in the council room on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, A.D., 1894, President Pearl, presiding. There were present Aldermen Brown, Gilmore, Hennessy, Hurlow, Johnson, Moen, Mullally, Pearl, Putnam, Rygaard, Schuch, Vandenberg and Zerbel. The reading of the minutes was on motion dispensed with.

The president stated the object of the meeting, whereupon the controller presented and read to the council his annual report.

The annual report of the receiver, city treasurer, president of the water commissioners and members of the Peter White public library were next presented, and on motion, all of the aforesaid reports were referred to the finance committee to be examined by said committee and reported upon after the recess agreed to be taken by the controller.

The president stated that the water power and electric lighting company had an option to sell some second-hand pulleys and Superintendent Wilson being present was requested to explain, and having done so, it was voted that a committee be appointed to sell pulleys at not less than 50 per cent of the original cost.

Petition of M. E. Aire and vicinity objecting to the paving of Prairie Isle avenue, asking that said avenue might be graded and macadamized from where the grade stops, going north, to Hawley street, in said Marquette addition, was presented.

Moved and carried that the matter be referred to the street committee to report on same at the recess meeting of the council.

Petition of F. T. Henry for the removal of trees growing on Jackson street, Adams street and Blenheim avenue, asking that an electric arc light be placed at the corner of Jackson and Adams streets, was referred to the water power and electricity committee.

On motion Francis M. Moore, Samuel M. Billings and James Brashay were re-elected elected commissioners of the city of Marquette.

The council then on motion took a recess.

The committee on finance and taxation, to which was referred the various reports, reported as follows:

We have also examined and compared the books of the city treasurer and controller for the balance of the year and we find that the same agree with the controller's books and that the amounts agree with those given in the controller's report and this amount should be deducted from the cash balance shown in the city treasurer's report in accordance with the controller's report. Each of these orders were issued on account of the controller's funds.

We have also examined the report of the board of trustees of the Peter White Public Library and found the same correct and we also examined the report of the recorder and find that the summary agrees with the controller's report and the treasurer's statement.

We also recommend that the reports of the city treasurer, controller and local trustee of the Peter White Public Library, be published in full, and that the report of the board of trustees of the Peter White Public Library, with the exception of a portion of the details of the secretary's report, as far as it does not duplicate the work contained in the reports of the city treasurer and controller, be published in full, and that it be accepted and placed on file without publication.

We also recommend that the council after organizing for work during the coming fiscal year, make a resolution that prior to the controller's report relating to the creation of a sinking fund, the same may be received in monthly installments, or that the same may be received on monthly balances. All of which is approved.

Your Committee to whom was referred the reports of the various City Officers would respectfully report as follows:

We have checked over the books of the City Treasurer for the interval between the last annual settlement, March 14th, '93, and the date of City Treasurer's balance sheet on which the Controller's books were opened and we find the receipts and expenditures during such period to be as follows;--

We have also examined and compared the reports of the City Treasurer and Controller for the balance of the year and we find that the same agree.

We find that Common Council orders numbered 660, 661, 663 and 665 amounting to \$147.22 are outstanding and unpaid and this amount should be deducted from the cash balance shown in the City Treasurer's report to make the same agree with the Controller's report. Each of these orders were issued on account of Water Power & Electric Fund.

We have also examined the report of the Board of Fire and Water Commissioners and find that the same agrees with the Controller's books. As this report covers a different period of time from that covered by the Controller's report, the balances do not agree, but the balance in the fire and water fund at this date, as shown by the books of Secretary John P Kern, agrees with the balance as shown in the Controller's report.

We have also examined the report of the Board of Trustees of the Peter White Public Library and find the same to be correct.

We have also examined the report of the Recorder and find that the summary agrees with the total mentioned in the City Treasurer's statement.

We therefore recommend that the several accounts as set forth in the various statements be declared correct and finally audited by the Common Council.

We also recommend that the reports of the City Treasurer, Controller, and Board of Trustees of the Peter White Public Library be published in full, and that the report of the Board of Fire and Water Commissioners be published with the exception of a portion of the details of the Secretary's statement; as the report of the Recorder duplicates the work contained in the reports of the City treasurer and Controller, we would recommend that it be accepted and placed on file without publication.

We would also recommend that the Council after organizing for work during the coming fiscal year, take prompt action on that portion of the Controller's report relating to the creation of a sinking fund and the placing of the City funds so that interest may be received on monthly balances.
