Sir:-- A special meeting of the Common Council of the City of Marquette is hereby called, to be held in the Common Council room of said city on Saturday evening, the 28th day of April, A.D. 1894, at eight o'clock P.M. The objects of said meeting are as follows:

- 1: To consider and pass upon the liquor bonds of the saloon keepers of the City of Marquette, which may be submitted to the Council for approval.
- 2: To appoint a census enumerator, and such assistants as may be necessary for taking the census of the City of Marquette, as required by the statutes of Mich.

The State census is to be taken in June of this year. The law seems to be very explicit, but as it is not in the hands of every one, there is much inquiry as to its provisions. The inquiries relate mainly to the appointment of enumerators, and are all answered by the first section of the census law, which is act 178 of 1893. It provides:

- 1st. That enumerators and assistants shall be appointed after the annual township meeting, and on or before the first Monday in May.
- 2d. That they are to be appointed by township boards in townships and common councils in cities.
- 3d. That if not appointed before the first Monday in May, the appointment is to be made by the Governor. And
- 4th. That enumerators are to be appointed for each assessment district.

It is clear from the above,

- 1st. That appointments made before the annual township meeting are illegal.
- 2d. Appointments by any other than township boards in townships and common councils in cities are illegal.
- 3d. Appointments after the first Monday in May can be made by the Governor only. Enumerators and *assistants* are to be appointed before the first Monday in May. In case a sufficient number of assistants are not appointed before that date, the additional number required must be appointed by the Governor.
- 4th. Enumerators and assistants are to be appointed for each assessment district. If a township, a city, or a ward is divided into more than one assessment district, each district is to have one chief enumerator, and such number of assistants as may be necessary to complete the census within the time prescribed by law. Neither an incorporated, nor an unincorporated village, can have an enumerator unless it constitutes a distinct and entire assessment district. In other words, where the township forms one assessment district, there will be one chief enumerator for the entire township, including the villages within such township. An assistant may be appointed to take the census of the village or villages under the supervision of the chief enumerator, or the chief enumerator may take the census of the village, and the assistant the census of the country.

The division of territory in townships may be made by the township board, and in cities by the common council, but in case it is not so made, then it is the duty of the chief enumerator to make such assignment of territory.

COMMON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

OFFICIAL.

A regular meeting of the common council of the city of Marquette was held in the council room on Monday, the 7th day of May, A. D. 1894, President Farnsworth presiding.

The warden, Brown, Hallstrom, Holley, Jameson, Moore, Mullaly, Pearl, Rosetter, Schoch, Sherman, Tobin and Vandenberg.

The minutes of the last six preceding meetings were read and as amended approved.

Petition of Johnson and McCarthy for an appropriation to be made to assist them in the publication of their new map was read.

Moved by Alderman Hennessy and supported that the city appropriate \$500 for the cost of maps.

Alderman Brown moved an amendment which was supported and carried that the city order of Johnson and McCarthy a number of maps, sufficient to make up that amount in maps.

Petition of Clovis F. Duval for compensation for injuries from falling on city property sidewalk in Marquette received to committee of grievances and litigation.

Petition from Marquette Opera House Building company asking to be relieved from paying the license fees and license tax is denied, etc., was referred to the committee on finance and taxation.

Petition of D. W. Watt and others for a sidewalk on the west side of Adams street between Jackson and Genesee streets, granted and the street commissioners instructed to proceed with the work.

The following resolution was then adopted:

Resolved, That the street commissioners and the recorder be and they are hereby directed to give notice to the above named owners and occupants of the lots and parcels of land abutting on the east and west side of Adams street between Jackson and Genesee streets to have and to keep a sidewalk in accordance with the ordinances of the city of Marquette relative thereto in front of the said lots and parcels of land on the west side of the aforesaid street within ten days from the receipt of notice to construct said sidewalk.

Resolved, That the street commissioners and the recorder be and they are hereby directed to give notice to the above named owners and occupants, and those who may be interested in the lots and parcels of land abutting on the west side of Adams street between Jackson and Genesee streets to have and to keep a sidewalk in accordance with the ordinances of the city of Marquette relative thereto in front of the said lots and parcels of land on the west side of the aforesaid street within ten days from the receipt of notice to construct said sidewalk.

Ayes—Aldermen Brown, Hoelmer, Hallstrom, Holley, Moore, Pearl, Schoch, Tobin and Vandenberg; nays—Alderman Brown, Hennessy, Jameson, Mullaly and Rosetter.

Application of William Fraser for post of street commissioner, read.

The petition of S. M. Klarquist, agent, stating that in consequence of his bondsmen being non-residents he was required to give an additional bond in the sum of \$10,000, which he did, and that local sheriffies must be paid to get the construction of the city hall should be delayed a longer time, he had to deposit the said amount in a bank, and as the collection of the same is beyond him and as the city hall is now well under construction and he needs the money to aid in the work, he asked to be released from said additional bond.

Alderman Hennessy moved that the petition be granted and the money refunded, which was supported and carried by the following vote:

The liquor bonds of Andrew Trudeau, Charles Meeks and Ferdinand Bending, and of John J. Neish, sureties, Peter Petri and William Fandever, were on motion accepted.

On motion of Alderman Hoch five thousand dollars were ordered to be transferred from the general fund to the high school.

The street committee to which was referred the resolution to have Bluff street improved from Fifth street to 100 feet west of Park avenue, voted.

Moved by Alderman Hennessy and supported that the report be adopted and that the street commissioner be instructed to proceed with the work.

The street committee to which was referred the petition of M. E. Astro and twenty others asking that Presque Isle avenue be graded and macadamized from

where the grade stops, going north, to Hawley street in North Marquette addition, voted favorably and on motion carried.

The following resolutions were on motion adopted:

Resolved, That special assessment roll No. 5, covering the cost of the construction of a sewer in High street from the manhole in Hewitt avenue to the manhole in Ohio street, be and the same is hereby approved by the common council.

Resolved, That the recorder be and is hereby directed to give notice by public notice to all persons liable to pay the same for a period of twelve (12) days, that the common council will meet at 10 o'clock on the morning of the 1st day of June, A. D. 1894, in the common council room of the city of Marquette to consider the final confirmation of said assessment roll.

The following resolution was on motion adopted:

Resolved, That the special assessment roll No. 5, covering the cost of the construction of a sewer in Ohio street from a manhole in High street to the manhole in Third street, be and the same is hereby approved by the common council.

Resolved, that the recorder be and is hereby directed to give notice by public notice in THE DAILY MINING JOURNAL for a period of twelve (12) days, that the common council will meet at 10 o'clock on the morning of the 1st day of June, A. Resolved, that a suitable and comfortable discussion was returned back for consideration, that said committee might formulate some mode of procedure to establish a police commission, laying cornerstone of city hall reported and recommended that the ceremony take place May 14, 1894, and that Judge Stone, Peter Walke, Frank L. Smith, the principal operators and that the different fraternal and civic societies of the city be invited to participate, and that the stone be laid by the Mayor, with the members of the council, the mayor and the mayors and commissioners, honorary guests of the city and be entertained and that a picnic be held in the park to be determined by the council.

Moved by Alderman Hennessy and supported that the resolution be adopted.

Three bids were presented to furnish the city with lumber.

That of F. W. Sanbrook: Pine, \$11 per thousand feet; hemlock, \$10 per thousand feet.

G. H. Fraser: Pine, \$11 per thousand feet; hemlock, \$10 per thousand feet.

D. Johnson: Hemlock, \$10.50 per thousand feet; cedar, \$12 per thousand feet.

On motion the contract was divided between Sanbrook and Fraser.

The street commissioner's report was accepted.

The controller called attention to the note of K. Hawley, maturing May 15, of \$10,000, at interest, amounting to \$10,504.15, for the 400 acres of land purchased by the city.

On motion of Alderman Moore said amount was ordered to be paid out of the general fund.

On motion, it was ordered that \$500 be taken out of the general fund and placed to the credit of the park and cemetery fund.

On motion of Alderman Brown the special committee was authorized to O. K. Kline for that amount to incur in laying the corner stone of the city hall.

The following resolution was on motion of Alderman Hennessy adopted:

Resolved, That all labor employed by the street commissioners and park commissioners receive not less than \$1.50 per day, and that nine hours be constituted a day's work.

On motion, an ordinance relative to the preservation of the public health and the safety and liabilities of the board of health, was adopted.

On motion, the recorder was instructed to issue an order for the payment of the 400 acres of land of K. Hawley, maturing May 15, and interest amounting to \$10,504.15.

Ayes—Aldermen Brown, Hennessy, Hoch, Homeler, Hallstrom, Holley, Jameson, Moore, Mullaly, Pearl, Rosetter, Schoch, Sherman, Tobin and Vandenberg.

Nays—None.

On motion, the Bluff street improvement was recommended.

Moved by Alderman Brown, supported and carried that the macadamizing on Bluff street be done up to the west side of Park avenue.

On motion, the expense of same was ordered to be taken from the highway fund.

The council then on motion adjourned.





An adjourned meeting of the common council of the city of Marquette was held in the council room on Monday, the 11th day of June, A. D., 1884, Mayor Kaufman presiding.

The following present: Aldermen Brown, Hennessy, Hoch, Hallstrom, Holley, Jamerson, Mullally, Pearl, Rossetter, Schoch, Sherman and Tobin.

Alderman Hommel appeared later and took his seat.

The reading of the minutes was dispensed with.

Peter J. Joseph Beckman to build a shed, also a fence eight feet high on and around the lot he has rented of Mrs. Harlow on South Third street, referred to fifth ward.

Petition of Sampson Rice and J. H. Blee to have their names erased from petition for sidewalk on west side of Champion street read and on motion of Alderman Holley, carried.

Moved by Alderman Pearl, supported and carried, that ordinances relating thereto be suspended north of Mrs. Shee's lot.

The resignation of John W. Putnam as alderman of the Eighth ward was read and accepted.

The bonds of Marshal James Moloney, sureties, James Moloney, Sr., and James Alford, and of City Engineer, James E. McIntosh, sureties, Hampton Gregory and Charles C. Van Isertstein were presented and approved.

The health officer urged the necessity of extending the High street sewer from Michigan street to Ohio street, and also of draining off the water accumulated near Sixth and Michigan streets, for sanitary reasons.

The matter was referred to the street committee.

The finance committee reported by its chairman and the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That it is resolved, and that there be levied by taxation for the current fiscal year eighteen hundred and ninety-five (1895), for the purposes herein set forth, the sum of \$18,500.

1. For the use of school district number one (1) of the city of Marquette, in addition to the amount now appropriated, the sum of ten thousand five hundred dollars—\$18,500.

2. For the use of the Peter White Public Library, minus the amount appropriated, assessed valuation of the taxable property in the city of Marquette.

3. For the general fund of the city of Marquette one (1) per centum of the assessed valuation of all property in the city of Marquette for the year A. D. 1894.

4. For highways nine thousand dollars—\$9,000.00.

Resolved, That the controller be and he is hereby directed to levy on taxable property in the city of Marquette the above amount.

The committee on parks, cemeteries, public buildings and grounds, reported and recommended that two thousand dollars (\$2,000) be appropriated for the park and cemetery funds. Said report was on motion sustained and adopted and ordered placed on file.
