Sir:-- A special meeting of the Common Council of the City of Marquette is hereby called, to be held in the Common Council room of said city on Saturday evening, the 28th day of April, A.D. 1894, at eight o'clock P.M. The objects of said meeting are as follows:

1: To consider and pass upon the liquor bonds of the saloon keepers of the City of Marquette, which may be submitted to the Council for approval.

2: To appoint a census enumerator, and such assistants as may be necessary for taking the census of the City of Marquette, as required by the statutes of Mich.

The State census is to be taken in June of this year. The law seems to be very explicit, but as it is not in the hands of every one, there is much inquiry as to its provisions. The inquiries relate mainly to the appointment of enumerators, and are all answered by the first section of the census law, which is act 178 of 1893. It provides:

- 1st. That enumerators and assistants shall be appointed after the annual township meeting, and on or before the first Monday in May.
- 2d. That they are to be appointed by township boards in townships and common councils in cities.
- 3d. That if not appointed before the first Monday in May, the appointment is to be made by the Governor. And
- 4th. That enumerators are to be appointed for each assessment district.

It is clear from the above,

- 1st. That appointments made before the annual township meeting are illegal.
- 2d. Appointments by any other than township boards in townships and common councils in cities are illegal.
- 3d. Appointments after the first Monday in May can be made by the Governor only. Enumerators and *assistants* are to be appointed before the first Monday in May. In case a sufficient number of assistants are not appointed before that date, the additional number required must be appointed by the Governor.
- 4th. Enumerators and assistants are to be appointed for each assessment district. If a township, a city, or a ward is divided into more than one assessment district, each district is to have one chief enumerator, and such number of assistants as may be necessary to complete the census within the time prescribed by law. Neither an incorporated, nor an unincorporated village, can have an enumerator unless it constitutes a distinct and entire assessment district. In other words, where the township forms one assessment district, there will be one chief enumerator for the entire township, including the villages within such township. An assistant may be appointed to take the census of the village or villages under the supervision of the chief enumerator, or the chief enumerator may take the census of the village, and the assistant the census of the country.

The division of territory in townships may be made by the township board, and in cities by the common council, but in case it is not so made, then it is the duty of the chief enumerator to make such assignment of territory.

COMMON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

OFFICIAL.

A regular meeting of the common council of the city of Marquette was held in the council room on Monday, the 7th day of May, A. D. 1894, President Pearl presiding. There were present Aldermen Brown, Hennessey, Hoch, Hallstrom, Holley, Jamerson, Moore, Mullally, Pearl, Rosetter, Schoch, Sherman, Tobin and Vandenberg. The minutes of the last six preceding meetings were read and as amended approved.

Petition of Johnson and McCarthy for an appropriation to be made to assist them in the publication of their new map was read.

Moved by Alderman Hennessey and supported that the city appropriate \$500 for 125 of said maps.

Alderman Brown moved and carried that the city order of Johnson and McCarthy a number of maps, sufficient to make up that amount in maps.

Petition of Clovis F. Dural for compensation for injuries from falling on slippery sidewalks in March, referred to committee on police, grievances and litigation.

Petition from Marquette Opera House building company asking to be relieved from paying the hundred dollar license, stating that instead of a profit an actual loss is entailed, etc., was referred to the committee on finance and taxation.

Petition of D. W. Watt and four others for a sidewalk on the east and west side of Adams street between Jackson and Genesee streets, granted and the street commissioner instructed to proceed with the work.

The following resolution was then adopted: Resolved, That the owners and occupants of the lots and parcels of land abutting on the east and west side of Adams street between Jackson and Genesee streets be and they are hereby directed to construct a sidewalk in accordance with the ordinances of the city of Marquette relative thereto in front of their respective lots and parcels of land on the aforesaid street within ten days from the receipt of notice to construct said sidewalk.

Resolved, That the street commissioner be and he is hereby authorized to serve notice of this resolution upon the above named owners and occupants, and

Resolved, That the street commissioner be and he is hereby directed in the event the said owners or occupants do not cause the sidewalks aforesaid to be constructed within the said time to forthwith construct the said sidewalk and to assess the cost and expense of the said sidewalk upon the lots and parcels of land in front of which it is constructed according to the benefits thereby accruing to the said property.

Petition of James O. Kelly and thirteen others for sidewalks on west side of Chasson street from north side of Fisher street to north side of Genesee street, granted.

The following resolution was then on motion adopted:

Resolved, That the owners and occupants of the lots and parcels of land abutting on the west side of Chasson street from the north side of Fisher street to the north side of Genesee street be and they are hereby directed to construct a sidewalk in accordance with the ordinances of the city of Marquette relative thereto in front of their respective lots and parcels of land on the aforesaid street within ten days from the receipt of notice to construct said sidewalk.

Resolved, That the street commissioner be and he is hereby authorized to serve notice of this resolution upon the above named owners and occupants, and

Resolved, That the street commissioner be and he is hereby directed in the event the said owners or occupants do not cause the sidewalks aforesaid to be constructed within the said time to forthwith construct the said sidewalk and to assess the cost and expense of the said sidewalk upon the lots and parcels of land in front of which it is constructed according to the benefits there by accruing to the said property.

Petition of J. H. Aitken and sixty-six others, asking that no license be granted for the saloon at corner of Third and Prospect streets ruled out of order, the license being already granted, and the council having no jurisdiction in the matter.

Petition of A. J. A. Walden and forty-three others to have electric light placed on corner of Fourth street and Hewitt avenue referred to the electric light and power committee by the following vote:

Ayes—Aldermen Hoch, Homier, Hallstrom, Holley, Moore, Mullally, Pearl, Rosetter, Schoch, Sherman and Vandenberg; nays—Aldermen Brown, Hennessey, Jamerson, Mullally and Rosetter.

Application of William Fraser for position of street commissioner, failed.

The petition of Neil Bruce, by S. M. Klariquist, agent, stating that in consequence of his bondsmen being non-residents he was required to give an additional bond in the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars with local sureties until he should get the construction of the city hall under way, and being a stranger here he had to deposit the said amount in a bank here as collateral to secure a bondsmen, and as the city hall is now well under construction and he needs the money to aid in the work, he asked to be released from said additional bond.

Alderman Hennessey moved that the petition be granted and the money refunded, which was supported and carried by the following vote:

Ayes—Aldermen Brown, Hennessey, Hoch, Homier, Hallstrom, Mullally, Rosetter, Schoch, Vandenberg.

Nays—Aldermen Holley, Jamerson, Moore, Pearl, Sherman, Tobin.

The board of City Treasurer August Macht, surties, James M. Wilkinson, Mirza H. Manhart and C. H. Call was on motion accepted.

The liquor bonds of Andrew Trudeau, surties, Charles Mesko and Ferdinand Bending, and of John K. Nesbit, surties, Peter Rasmussen and William Fassbender, were on motion accepted.

On motion of Alderman Hoch five thousand dollars were ordered to be transferred from the general fund to the highway.

The street committee to which was referred the resolution to have Bluff street improved from Fifth street to 110 feet west of Park avenue, reported favorably.

Moved by Alderman Hennessey and supported that the report be adopted and that the street commissioner be instructed to proceed with the work.

The street committee to which was referred the petition of M. E. Aspre and twenty others asking that Presque Isle avenue be graded and macadamized from

where the grade stops, going north, to Hawley street in North Marquette addition, reported favorably and on motion said report was adopted.

The following resolutions were on motion adopted:

Resolved, That special assessment roll No. 4 covering the cost of the construction of a sewer in High street from the manhole in Hewitt avenue to a point forty feet north of the north line of Ohio street, be and the same is hereby approved by the common council, and

Resolved, That the recorder be and he is hereby directed to give notice by publication in The Daily Mining Journal for a period of twelve (12) days, that the common council will meet at 8 o'clock on the evening of Monday, the 4th day of June, A. D. 1894, in the common council room of the city of Marquette to consider the final confirmation of said assessment roll.

The following resolution was on motion adopted:

Resolved, That the special assessment roll No. 5, covering the cost of the construction of a sewer in Ohio street from a point forty feet east of Fourth street to the manhole in the sewer in Third street, be, and the same is hereby approved by the common council, and

Resolved, That the recorder be, and he is hereby directed to give notice by publication in The Daily Mining Journal for a period of twelve (12) days, that the common council will meet at 8 o'clock on the evening of Monday, the 4th day of June, A. D. 1894, in the common council room of the city of Marquette to consider the final confirmation of said assessment roll.

Special assessment No. 1 for sewer in High street from the manhole in Hewitt avenue to a point forty feet north of the north line of Ohio street, was ordered recalled and cancelled.

The committee on police, grievances and litigation reported numerous complaints concerning cover running at large and recommended that the city be divided into two districts and that two poundmasters be appointed and after considerable discussion the matter was referred back for further consideration, that said committee might formulate some mode of procedure.

The special committee on laying corner stone of city hall reported and recommended that the ceremony take place May 14 next, and that Judge Stone, Peter White and F. O. Clark be the principal orators and that the different fraternal and civic societies of the city be invited to participate, and that the stone be laid by the Masons with the ceremonies of the order, and that the mayors and city council of Negaunee and Ishpeming be honored as guests of the city and be entertained and that a picnic be held at Presque Isle Park or a banquet be given as the council should determine. The chairman further stated that the South Shore road will make the round fare trip to fifth cents, and the street railway tax on the round trip if arrangements are made to entertain the public at Presque Isle Park, etc.

Moved by Alderman Sherman and supported that the report be adopted.

Moved by Alderman Hennessey as an amendment and supported that a banquet be held instead of a picnic and that an invitation be extended to the mayors and common councils of the cities of Negaunee and Ishpeming which was lost by the following vote:

Ayes—Aldermen Brown, Hennessey, Hoch, Homier, Hallstrom, Mullally and Vandenberg.

Nays—Aldermen Holley, Jamerson, Moore, Pearl, Rosetter, Schoch, Sherman and Tobin.

The original motion was then carried.

Moved by Alderman Hennessey and supported and carried that the council reconsider the report.

Moved by Alderman Hennessey and supported that that portion relative to a picnic be not adopted.

Moved by Alderman Brown and supported as an amendment that the report be taken to the mayors and councils visiting us a banquet, which was carried by the following vote:

Ayes—Aldermen Brown, Hennessey, Hoch, Homier, Hallstrom, Mullally, Rosetter, Schoch, Vandenberg.

Nays—Aldermen Holley, Jamerson, Moore, Pearl, Sherman, Tobin.

Moved by Alderman Hennessey, supported and carried that the committee be empowered to make proper preparations to perfect arrangements and appoint sub-committees.

Moved by Alderman Holley, supported and carried that the said banquet shall cost less than a hundred and fifty dollars.

Alderman Brown moved that the matter relating to the hundred and fifty dollars be not placed on the record, which was ruled out of order by the chairman.

The following bills and claims were then on motion allowed and ordered paid:

The controller presented a claim of Chas. Carlton of three dollars and 37 cents for repairs to a carriage from breaking a spring caused while driving in Washington street over a spot where the sewer had been laid, and stated he had rejected the said claim, and on motion said rejection was sustained.

Three bids were presented to furnish the city with lumber.

That of F. W. Sanbrook: Pine, 611 per thousand feet; hemlock, \$10 per thousand feet.

G. H. Fraser: Pine, \$11 per thousand feet; hemlock, \$10 per thousand feet.

F. D. Johnson: Hemlock, \$10.50 per thousand feet; cedar, \$12 per thousand feet.

On motion the contract was divided between Sanbrook and Fraser.

The street commissioner's report was accepted.

The controller called attention to the note of R. K. Hawley, maturing May 13, of \$10,000, and interest, amounting to \$10,204.16, for the 400 acres of land purchased by the city.

On motion of Alderman Moore said amount was ordered to be paid out of the general fund.

On motion, it was ordered that \$500 be taken out of the general fund and placed to the credit of the park and cemetery fund.

On motion of Alderman Brown the special committee were authorized to O. K. any bills that may be incurred in laying the corner stone of the city hall.

The following resolution was on motion of Alderman Hennessey adopted:

Resolved, That all labor employed by the street commissioner and park commissioner receive not less than \$1.20 per day and that nine hours be constituted a day's work.

On motion, an ordinance relative to the preservation of the public health and the duties and liabilities of the board of health, was adopted.

On motion, the recorder was instructed to issue an order for the payment of the 400 acres of land purchased of R. K. Hawley and interest amounting to \$10,504.16.

Ayes—Aldermen Brown, Hennessey, Hoch, Homier, Hallstrom, Holley, Jamerson, Moore, Mullally, Pearl, Rosetter, Schoch, Sherman, Tobin and Vandenberg. Nays—None.

On motion, the Bluff street improvement was reconsidered.

Moved by Alderman Brown, supported and carried that the macadamizing on Bluff street be done up to the west side of Park avenue.

On motion, the expense of same was ordered to be taken from the highway fund. The council then on motion adjourned.

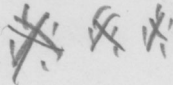

COMMON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

OFFICIAL.

An adjourned regular meeting of the common council of the city of Marquette was held in the council room on Monday, the 11th day of June, A. D., 1884, Mayor Kaufman presiding.

There were present Aldermen Brown, Hennessy, Hoch, Hallstrom, Holley, Jamerson, Mullally, Pearl, Rosetter, Schoch, Sherman and Tobin.

Alderman Homeler appeared later and took his seat.

The reading of the minutes was dispensed with.

Petition of Joseph Dreckman to build a shed, also a fence eight feet high on and around the lot he has rented of Mrs. Harlow on South Third street, referred to the wardens.

Petition of Sampson Rice and J. H. Rice to have their names erased from petition for sidewalk on west side of Champlain street read and on motion of Alderman Holley granted.

Moved by Alderman Pearl, supported and carried, that ordinances relating thereto be suspended north of Mrs. Shea's lot.

The resignation of John W. Putnam as alderman of the Eighth ward was read and accepted.

The bonds of Marshal James Moloney, sureties, James Moloney, Sr., and James Atfield, and of City Engineer Edward E. McIntosh, sureties, Hampton Gregory and Charles C. Van Iderstein were presented and approved.

The health officer urged the necessity of extending the High street sewer from Michigan street to Ohio street, and also of draining off the water accumulated near Sixth and Michigan streets, for sanitary reasons.

The matter was referred to the street committee.

The finance committee reported by its chairman, and the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That it is necessary and that there be raised by taxation for the current fiscal year eighteen hundred and ninety-four (1894), for the purposes herein set forth, the following amounts, to wit:

1. For the use of school district number one (1) of the city of Marquette, in addition to the one mill tax allowed by law, eighteen thousand five hundred dollars—\$18,500.00.

2. For the use of the Peter White Public Library one mill on the dollar upon the assessed valuation of the taxable property in the city of Marquette for the year 1884.

3. For the general fund of the city of Marquette one (1) per centum of the assessed valuation of the taxable property in the city of Marquette for the year A. D. 1884.

4. For highways nine thousand dollars—\$9,000.00.


