It is my understanding that your city will receive bids this year on a large quantity of asphalt road oil, and I should like to have the opportunity of bidding on your requirements. When in your city early this week, I called on Mr. G.S.Webb of your commission, and laid our proposition before him. He gave me to understand that he had decided to buy nothing but Bermudez asphalt sold by The Barber Asphalt Paving Company. For your benefit as one of the commissioners, I wish to inform you that County Engineer Coons of Houghton County told me in his office that Mr. Webb had been made selling agent for the entire Upper Peninsula for the Barber Asphalt Company, so it is plain to be seen why he has taken this stand, as it will entitle him to commissions on your city's purchase. Mr. Coons showed me some correspondence which he had received from Mr. Webb as representative of the Barber people, regarding asphalt requirements in Houghton <sup>County</sup> Company, copy of which you can secure by writing to Mr. Coons.

The writer represents one of the largest producers of asphalt. This asphalt sold under the trade name of Texaco is one of the highest grades of material to be obtained and one which is used in all parts of the United States and Canada. I can show you recommendations from most of the leading engineers and chemists in all parts of the United States and Canada in which they state that Texaco asphalt is not only the equal but the superior of Bermudez asphalt.

If Mr. Webb's statement that the buying power for materials for your city was vested entirely in him is well-founded, and inasmuch as he stated that his intention was to buy Bermudez asphalt, The Texas Company will not have an opportunity to submit their price. We should like to bid in open competition with all other asphalts for your requirements, and should be pleased to hear from you just how this matter stands. We feel certain that we will be able to quote you a better price than the Barber asphalt people will, and furthermore, our freight rate to Marquette is lower than that of the Barber Company.

Would ~~you~~ thank you if you would let us know at least a week in advance of the time when you intend to make your purchases, and can assure you that we will be in position to save your city a great deal of money on your asphalt purchases.

In the absence of the clerk the city attorney was designated to act as clerk of this meeting.

Communications received:

From the Department of Light and Power, relative to the condition of the bridge over Dead River near the old electric light station. Referred to the Department of Public Works.

From the Department of Light and Power, reporting the construction of a road north of the old electric generating station, leading in a south-easterly direction, crossing the penstock about two hundred feet west of the surge tank, and of a bridge crossing the penstock. Referred to the Department of Public Works for inspection of the work and report as to its sufficiency.

From the Department of Light and Power, submitting estimates of the values of the buildings on city lands at the old powder mill. Referred to the Department of Accounts and Finances for insurance of the more valuable of the buildings in amount not exceeding four thousand dollars.

Yeas- Mayor Clark, Commissioners Pearce, Sherman, Webb and Werner.

From the Department of Public Works, reporting back the proposed rules for the conduct of the municipal boat livery, with suggested amendments; and after amendment thereof said rules, herein following, on motion of Commissioner Pearce, supported by Commissioner Sherman, were adopted, and ordered placed on file.

Yeas- Mayor Clark, Commissioners Pearce, Sherman, Webb and Werner.

RULES FOR THE MUNICIPAL BOAT LIVERY.

The following rules and regulations shall be hereafter observed by all persons to whom they apply, viz:

Rule 1. Boats to be at the service of the public at the published rates from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. of each day of the season suitable for boating at Presque Isle Park.

Rule 2. The boat keeper is authorized in his discretion to refuse to rent any boat to any minor or to any person whom he consid-

ers incompetent to handle boats and to refuse the use of boats by children not accompanied by an adult person.

Rule 3. The boat keeper is authorized in his discretion to refuse to rent boats or to make trips in launch if in his judgment weather and lake conditions are not satisfactory.

Rule 4. Renters and users of any boat are chargeable with liability for all damages to such boat and its equipment from the time taken until return, such damages to be assessed by the boat keeper. Lost and broken oars are to be charged to the renter.

Rule 5. Renters of boats are forbidden to sublet the same, and the boat keeper may forthwith take possession of any boat so sublet and terminate the rights of the original lessee therein.

Rule 6. If required by the boat keeper payment must be made in advance for the time any boat is engaged, and the boat keeper is authorized in his discretion to require a deposit or any sum of money up to \$5.00 as security for the payment of boat rental and damages to boat and its equipment and payment for lost or broken oars.

Rule 7. Boats reserved in advance for use commencing at any particular time will be charged for such time whether used or not.

Rule 8. Renters and users of boats returning them after 10 o'clock will be subject to a double charge if such delay necessitates the boat keeper being retained because of the delay.

Rule 9. There shall be no free list or gratuitous use of boats by anyone except city officers and employes while in the discharge of the duties of their office or employment, in which case the boat keeper shall indicate for whom service was rendered and for what purpose in his daily report.

Rule 10. The boat keeper and assistants shall charge the uniform rates printed on coupon tickets, and shall issue a coupon for each payment without exception. All rentals and charges are to be on a strictly cash basis. The boat keeper shall charge rates and keep cash and ticket records and submit daily reports on forms furnished by the Department of Accounts and Finances. These reports and the cash receipts will be turned over to the superintendent of parks, who shall make the returns to the Department of Accounts and Finances at least once a week.

Rule 11. RATES FOR USE OF ROW BOATS: The following rates shall be charged and collected by the boat keeper for the use of row boats: One hour or less 25 cents.

The second and succeeding hours divided into periods of twenty-four minutes, and a charge made of 10 cents for each such twenty-four minute period or any fraction thereof.

Charge for broken oars - \$3.50 each.

Charge for oar locks - 35 cents each.

Other damages to be charged based on judgment of boat keeper.

Rule 12. TIME RATES FOR LAUNCH WITH MAN: The following rates shall be charged and collected by boat keeper for the use of launch with man:

\$3.00 per hour from time of leaving boat house until return, irrespective of size of party, but not exceeding the rated capacity of launch.

\$1.50 per hour for time of launch when at anchor at points on trip when such stops amount to one-half hour or more.

Rule 13. TRIP RATES FOR LAUNCH AND MAN. Trip rates shall be charged and collected by the boat keeper for trips and passengers based on published schedule indicating destination of trip. Rates as follows:

Trip No. 1. -- 25 cents each.

Trip No. 2. -- 30 cents each.

Trip No. 3. -- 35 cents each.

Trip No. 4. -- 40 cents each.

Trip No. 5. -- 50 cents each.

Trip No. 6. -- 60 cents each.

Trip No. 7. -- 70 cents each.

Children under six years of age free if accompanied by adult. Half fare for children six to twelve years of age inclusive.

Baggage limited to 50 pounds per person.

Excess baggage to be charged at rate specified per person.
