December 26th, 1916.

A regular meeting of the commission of the City of Marquette, was held in the commission chamber of the city hall on Monday, December 26th, 1916, at 7:30 o'clock p.m. Mayor F. H. Begole presiding.

The city clerk's report of fees collected by him for the week ending December 23rd, 1916, amount \$.50, was presented and ordered filed.

The communication from S. R. Sisson, relative to his claim of \$233 was taken from the table, and after a thorough discussion of the matter, it was moved by Commissioner Sink, supported by Commissioner Sherman, and adopted, that said S. R. Sisson be allowed \$50in full settlement of his claim.

December 26th, 1916.

To the City Commission.

Gentlemen: -

On December 23rd, 1916, pursuant to the authority of Sec. 4 of an ordinance relative to the powers and duties of mayor and heads of departments, adopted April 6, 1914, I suspended in writing, filed with the city clerk, the operation and effect of the city license issued to Samuel and Michael Lafkas to conduct a pool room at No. 121 W. Washington Street, in this city, for the current years.

My reasons for such suspension are as follows:

- 1. That said Samuel and Michael Lafkas did keep and permit to be kept in such pool room a certain device for gambling, known as a punch board, whereby money or other thing of value is played for or disposed of as the result of chance, and whereby a greater or lesser quantity of property, depending upon chance, is given for the same consideration.
- 2. That said Samuel and Michael Lafkas did on said day keep and permit to be kept in said pool room a certain machine, device and form of play and game known as a punch board whereby a stake, money and things of value were and might be won, acquired, and lost as the result of chance in the operation of such machine of device, and as the result of participation in such play or game.

The mayor announced that the Messrs. Lafkas were entitled to a hearing upon the charges contained in his written reasons for suspending license as above set forth.

Samuel Lafkas being present stated that he was not aware that the keeping of a punch board was against any ordinance, and that he had kept one becaus an agent had told him every pool room in town was keeping them; He promise that if the commission would not revoke the license, they would strictly obey the laws of the state and the city ordinances relative to gambling devices.

On motion of Commissioner Sherman, supported by Commissioner Werner and adopted, said Samuel and Michael Lafkas were given permission to continue business under their license. Yeas - Commissioners Pearce, Sherman, Sink and Werner. A proposed ordinance amending section four of "An Ordinance Regulating Pool Rooms" was presented and read, and on motion of Commissioner Sink, supported by Commissioner Sherman, and adopted, said proposed ordinance was laid on the table for one week.
