Regular meeting at city hall April 24, 1922, 7:30 p.m.

Present - Mayor Clark, Commissioners Sherman, Pearce and Webb.

Fees reported collected by city clerk, \$9.00

Moved by Commissioner Sherman, supported by Commissioner Pearce, and adopted, that the department of accounts and finances be authorized to advertise for bids for the laying of 2034 lineal feet of concrete curb, on the proposed Cedar and Ohio Street Improvement.

Yeas - Mayor Clark, Commissioners Sherman, Pearce and Webb.

Maxaxixby The mayor submitted the bond of James Lattrel and Company with the American Surety Company as surety.

Moved by Commissioner Sherman, supported by Commissioner Pearce, and adopted, that the bond of James Lattrel and Company with the American Surety Company as surety, be accepted upon condition that the terms of the contract be affixed to the bond and that the work be completed by the 1st of July.

Proof of publication of notice of the annual estimates, hezring thereon, etc., was presented and filed, and a hearing on the annual estimates and passage of the annual appropriation bill was entered upon.

Moved by Commissioner Pearce, supported by Commissioner Sherman and adopted, that the following annual appropriation bill and tax levy order be and the same is hereby adopted and passed, viz:

Whereas, on April 10, 1922, this commission made and adopted estimates of all the expenditures which will be required to be made from the several funds of the city during the current year, and for the payments of interest and indebtedness to fall due during the year, for departments, objects and purposes therein specified; and also fixed the date of April 24, 1922, for public hearing upon said estimates; and

Whereas, said estimates and notice of said meeting, and the purpose thereof, have been published in The Baily Mining Journal, a newspaper published in the city, at least one week before said

meeting;

Resolved, That the several sums and amounts of money estimated and determined upon in the said estimates are hereby determined to be required for the respective effects and purposes specified in said estimates, to defray the expenditures and liabilities of the corporation for the current fiscal year; and

Resolved, That there is hereby appropriated for the present fiscal year out of the money in and to come into the city treasury, not otherwise appropriated or belonging to any other general or special fund, the following sums and amounts for the several departments and particular objects and purposes respectively specified in said estimates and the above determination, viz;

For the Department of Public Affairs; the amount of said sums, to-wit, thirty-four thousand three hundred twenty-five (\$34,325.00) dollars;

For the Department of Accounts and Finances; the amount of said sums, to-wit, thirteen thousand (\$13,000.00) dollars;

For the Department of Public Works; the amount of said sums, to-wit eighty-seven thousand five hundred (\$87,500.00) dollars;

For the Department of Public Health and Safety; the a mount of said sums, to-wit, forty-six thousand nine hundred five (\$46,905.00) dollars;

For the Department of Light and Power; the amount of said sums, to-wit, one hundred fifty-one thousand three hundred seventy-five (\$151,375.00) dollars; to be derived from the income of that department.

For the Department of Water; the amount of said sums, to-wit, thirty-four thousand eight hundred sixty-six (\$34,886.80) dollars; to be derived from the income of that department.

Resolved, That it is hereby determined that the moneys now in the city treasury, together with the estimated revenues and income for city purposes to be derived from all sources other than the taxes during the current fiscal year, are not sufficient for the requirements and appropriations aforesaid, and that it is necessary for said objects and purposes, and to meet the appropriation aforesaid, that there be raised by taxes with the next general tax levy and paid into the several funds of the city, the amount of one hundred sixty-four (\$164,418.61) and be it further

Resolved, that said sum of one hundred sixty-four thousand four hundred eighteen dollars and sixty-one cents (\$164,418.61) be and the same is hereby ordered to be raised by tax upon the general tax roll of this city for the current year, in the column on said roll to be designated "General Tax"; and be it further

Resolved, that there also be raised by tax upon said tax roll, for the public schools of the City of Marquette, the sum of one hundred six thousand (\$106,000.00) dollars; together with and in addition to the one mill tax required by law.
