- 10e) Committee of the Whole Recommendation that the County Board fund the Economic Development Corporation on a monthly basis and only if the EDC does not have other sources of funds.
- 10f) Committee of the Whole Recommendation that the County Board approve the request to subordinate a home mortgage for Ms. Patti Koepp, 242 Allen Street, Marquette.
- 10g) Committee of the Whole Recommendation to approve a contract with Ameritech for Central Dispatch Telephone System Maintenance for \$5,200 per year.

ACTION ITEMS CONTINUED

10a1) The County Board considered the Seventh Amendment to a Sublease for 12 buildings with Sawyer Property Management, Inc. at KI Sawyer which would extend the lease terms to March 28, 1998 and also delete Building No. 642 from the Sublease. Steve Powers, County Administrator, explained the intent of this Seventh Amendment is to have Sawyer Property Management, Inc. release the rights to Building 642 (the Bowling Alley) so that removal of the Bowling Alley equipment can proceed and along with the allocation of the proceeds for the sale of the equipment.

Harley Andrews, Civil Counsel, explained that two meetings ago the County Board approved an amendment to the Prime Lease which was extended to the end of March, 1998 at which time the Prime Lease will automatically renew. The present amendment before the Commission amends the subleases with Sawyer Property Management to also end on March 28, 1998 so that new subleases are not required.

Civil Counsel Andrews further explained that Paragraph 2 will delete any and all reference or applicability of the Lease to Building 642. The effective date is left blank at this time but will be filled in as soon as the date is known. Paragraph 3 authorizes the County to remove the Bowling Alley equipment, however, there is still some question as to its ownership. Paragraph 4 explains how the parties agree to allocate the proceeds from the sale of the bowling alley equipment as follows: A. First pay the expense of advertising and sale including cost occurred in preparing and circulating the RFP's and the actual sale itself. B) Any remaining proceeds shall be used to reimburse the Subleasee (Sawyer Property Management) for any expenses it occurred to purchase or otherwise acquire the items of personal property being sold, and C) Any remaining excess proceeds shall be applied to the cost of providing heat conversion to the Building commonly known as the Pizza Hanger.

Civil Counsel Andrews noted rather than delay for two weeks, the Seventh Amendment to the Sublease is being presented to the County Board tonight for consideration and approval, however, because of timing he has not had an opportunity to meet with William Pesola, President of Sawyer Property Management, Inc. The paragraph regarding proceeds of sale will accommodate Mr. Pesola's needs for his cooperation in allowing the PICO Project to proceed. If Sawyer Property Management won't sign the Lease Amendment then different terms will have to be negotiated and brought to the County Board in two weeks. PICO's time table has an April 20, 1998 occupation date.

It was moved by Comm. Arsenault, seconded by Comm. Roberts and unanimously carried by voice vote that the County Board approve of the Seventh Amendment to the Sublease extending the term to March 28, 1998 and deleting Building No. 642 and authorize Chairperson Corkin to execute the agreement.

10a2) The County Board considered a recommendation from Ed Bailey, KI Sawyer Development Department, regarding the KI Sawyer Bowling Alley Equipment Removal Project. Bids for removal of the Bowling Alley equipment from Building 642 were opened at 2:00 P.M. January 20th. Bids were received from D.J. Beauchamp, Inc., Little Lake, MI, Schemm Bowling, Inc., Jefferson, WI, and Bowl-Rite Resurfacing, Inc., Butler, WI. The focus of the project is to maximize the sale price of the bowling equipment while having the equipment removed from the building no later than February 1, 1998 to facilitate the refurbishment of the building for occupancy by PICO by April 17, 1998.

The high bidder for the bowling related equipment removal in Building 642 is Schemm Bowling, Inc., Jefferson, WI. The company has been in business for 20 years and recently removed bowling equipment from the Eastwood Lanes in Marquette, and prior to that removed equipment from Northern Michigan University Center. The Company acknowledges the insurance requirements and the tight timeframe by noting that the personnel are on standby ready to start immediately upon notification.

Chairperson Corkin noted that the \$56,300 bid is the amount that Schemm Bowling, Inc. is paying Marquette County for the equipment which they will remove.

It was moved by Comm. Rapport, seconded by Comm. Roberts and unanimously carried by voice vote that the County Board award the K.I. Sawyer Bowling Alley Equipment Removal Project to Schemm Bowling, Inc., Jefferson, WI, payment to Marquette County for the equipment removed.

10b) The County Board considered a Committee of the Whole Recommendation to approve a Sublease with Progressive Tool & Industries Company for Building 642 at KI Sawyer. Harley Andrews, Civil Counsel, noted that negotiations are continuing with PICO and the AFBCA. The Federal Government has language in the Prime Lease, and requires the County to insert similar language in the Sublease, that makes available during the terms of the Lease and three years thereafter any financial records pertinent to the lease. Federal Government requirements generally are not negotiable. The County has attempted to amend a Prime Lease in the past which has been time consuming and unsuccessful.

Brian Watson, PICO, Marquette Operations Manager, was present and explained that PICO is a private Company, however, the language in the Prime Lease and Sublease requires that their books be open to the Air Force Controller for review. Legal Counsel for PICO has concerns about the matter. He understands that the County has no options. As a practical matter, the Air Force Controller has not looked into financial records of any company, however, PICO still has problems with such language being included in the Lease. Mr. Watson will attempt to convince his legal counsel that this lease only pertains to the KI Sawyer operation but he may not be successful.

Administrator Powers pointed out that if PICO and the Air Force cannot resolve the language matters, or if Sawyer Property Management won't sign the Amendment to their Lease, then the County will not remove the bowling alleys.

Comm. Cihak expressed concern that this issue will repeat itself in the future because the Air Force can be very difficult to deal with.

Comm. Tuominen also noted the taxable value of Building 642, or any building at Sawyer, would include the cost of any alterations or improvements to the building.

It was moved by Comm. Arsenault, seconded by Comm. Seppanen and unanimously carried by voice vote that the County Board approve the Sublease with Progressive Tool and Industry Co. for Building No. 642 at KI Sawyer and authorize the Chair to execute the Sublease.

10c) The County Board considered a recommendation from the Committee of the Whole to adopt a resolution limiting the Airport Board's power at the present County Airport by having leases, concession agreements, and rental agreements subject to the approval of the County Board.

Steve Powers, County Administrator, distributed a copy of the resolution adopted on September 21, 1993 by the County Board granting the Airport Board lease authority, and conferring the privilege of operating concessions, and the power to determine charges and rentals, etc. with the amended language inserted and underlined as per the Committee of the Whole Recommendation.

Comm. Rapport, Airport Board Liaison, noted the resolution was discussed at the last Airport Board meeting. The Airport Board will still make recommendations to the County Board, however the County needs control of the land, leases, and property at the present Airport.

Dan Bengstrom, Airport Board Chairperson, was present and explained that if some of the leases were renewed. They would extend beyond the proposed Airport move and tie up the future sale or reuse of the present Airport.

Comm. Cihak questioned the Committee of the Whole Recommendation. Even though he supported it last week he now thinks that the Airport Board understands the issues involved and that the County Board should continue to empower them with control over leases, concession agreements, and rental agreements.

It was moved by Comm. Arsenault, seconded by Comm. Rapport and carried by voice vote 9 Ayes to 1 Nay (Comm. Cihak) that the County Board adopt a Resolution limiting the Airport Board's power at the present County Airport, resolution as follows:

MARQUETTE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

WHEREAS, by Resolution duly adopted on September 21, 1993, the Marquette County Board of Commissioners created the Marquette County Airport Board, effective January 1, 1994, pursuant to the authorization granted by MCL 259.133 et seq, as amended; and,

WHEREAS, in the sixth paragraph of said Resolution of September 21, 1993, the Airport Board was granted:

"...all of the powers to manage the Airport that are listed in MCL 259.133, with the exception that the Board shall not have the power to sell real property that is under its management and control without the concurrence of the Marquette County Board of Commissioners...." and,

WHEREAS, In numbered Paragraphs 8, 9, and 10 of that Resolution of September 21, 1993, the Airport Board was given the authority to:

- "8. Lease for a term of years or rent real or personal property, aeronautical facilities, or buildings and structures relating thereto, to any person(s), corporation or government entity for operation and/or public use;
- 9. Confer the privilege of operating concessions and/or of supplying the Airport goods, commodities, things, services and facilities; to enter into leases, contracts, agreements, or grants of privileges or concessions with any person(s) or any other political subdivision or department. The terms, charges, rentals, and fees for such concessions shall be equal and uniform for the same type of facilities provided, services rendered, or privileges granted with no discrimination between users of the same class for like facilities provided, services rendered, or privileges granted. The terms, charges, rentals and fees may vary where necessary, to provide security and funds for repayment of bonds to the (sic) issued as authorized by the Aeronautics Code to finance improvements in or on the Airport;
- 10. The power to determine charges, rentals, or fees for the use of any properties under its control, and the charges for services or accommodations, and the terms and conditions under which the properties may be used, which rentals, fees, charges, terms and conditions shall be uniform and equal for the same type of use provided. Terms, charges, rentals, and fees may vary where necessary, to provide security and funds for the repayment of bonds issued as authorized under the Aeronautics Code. Liens may be had and enforced by law, as provided in such cases, for repairs to, or improvements, or storage, or care of any personal property;" and,

WHEREAS, it is now the desire and intent of the Marquette County Board of Commissioners to amend the above quoted provisions of its Resolution of September 21, 1993, so as to require the concurrence of the County Board of Commissioners in any lease, concession, or rental agreements involving real or personal property under the control of the Airport Board, thereby maximizing the ability of the County Board of Commissioners to insure consistency with its decisions to relocate the Airport and to maximize the reuse potential of this Airport Site;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the above quoted sixth paragraph of the Resolution adopted by the Marquette County Board of Commissioners on September 21, 1993, shall be, and hereby is, amended by the addition of the following underlined language:

> "IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Marquette County Airport Board shall have all of the powers to manage the Airport that are listed in MCL 259.133, with the exception that the Board shall not have the power to sell, rent, lease, or otherwise encumber real or personal property that is under its management and control without the concurrence of the Marquette County Board of Commissioners. The Airport Board shall have the power to:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the above quoted numbered paragraphs 8, 9, and 10 of the Resolution adopted by the Marquette County Board of Commissioners on September 21, 1993, shall be, and hereby are, amended by the addition of the following underlined language:

- "8. With the concurrence of the County Board of Commissioners, lease for a term of years or rent real or personal property, aeronautical facilities, or buildings and structures relating thereto, to any person(s), corporation or government entity for operation and/or public use;
- 9. Confer the privilege of operating concessions and/or of supplying on the Airport goods, commodities, things, services and facilities; to enter into leases, contracts, agreements, or grants of privileges or concessions with any person(s) or any other political subdivision or department. The terms, charges, rentals and fees for such concessions shall be equal and uniform for the same type of facilities provided, services rendered, or privileges granted with no discrimination between users of the same class for like facilities provided, services rendered, or privileges granted. The terms, charges, rentals, and fees may vary where necessary, to provide security and funds for repayment of bonds to be issued as authorized by the Aeronautics Code to finance improvements in or on the Airport;
- To enter into or amend existing leases, contracts, agreements, or grants of privileges or concessions, involving real or personal property, with any person(s) or any other political subdivision or department with the concurrence of the County Board of Commissioners;
- 10. With the concurrence of the County Board of Commissioners, to determine charges, rentals, or fees for the use of any properties under its control, and the charges for services or accommodations, and the terms and conditions under which the properties may be used, which rentals, fees, charges terms and conditions shall be uniform and equal for the same type of use provided. Terms, charges, rentals, and fees may vary where necessary, to provide security and funds for the repayment of bonds issued as authorized under the Aeronautics Code. Liens may be had and enforced by law, as provided in such cases, for repairs to, or improvements, or storage, or care of any personal property;...'

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the amendments hereinabove set forth shall be effective immediately upon the adoption of this Resolution by the Marquette County Board of Commissioners.

LATE ADDITIONS

11a) The County Board considered a resolution presented by Comm. Roberts regarding the Department of Natural Resources Forest Recreation Fund. The Michigan DNR has approximately 6,200 miles of roads in its forest road system however lack of funding for this system has increased a hazard to safety and fire laws. Comm. Roberts had been approached by the Charlie Lakes Camping Association regarding a DNR Forest Road. The Association graded the road at their expense and requested DNR reimbursement however the DNR won't pay.

Comm. Roberts will be attending his MAC Taxation Committee meeting Friday in Lansing and would like to bring the resolution requesting that the DNR take decisive action to finance the forest road system through the Forest Recreation Fund. The bottom line is that if the DNR is responsible for the road system and has jurisdiction over it then the system should be maintained.

Chairperson Corkin pointed out that this issue is an important one all over the Upper Peninsula and Northern Lower Michigan. The Michigan DNR has been working with MAC regarding the issue however it needs the Legislature to appropriate the necessary funds.

It was moved by Comm. Roberts, seconded by Comm. Seppanen and unanimously carried by voice vote that the County Board adopt the following resolution:

RESOLUTION DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES FOREST RECREATION FUND

WHEREAS,	the DNR has approximately 6,200 miles of roads in the DNR's "forest road system" of which over 5,000 miles are unimproved; and
WHEREAS,	the funding for this system of roads, historically, was channelled to the Forest Recreation Fund; and
WHEREAS,	the lack of proper funding by the DNR has increased hazard to safety and fire laws, there have been lawsuits; and
WHEREAS,	the DNR Forest Recreation Fund budget has neglected to address this issue since 1987; be it
WHEREAS,	the Forest Recreation Program has had a devastating affect on the part of Michigan's economy derived from resource management and tourism. Now, therefore, be it
RESOLVED,	that the DNR take decisive action and address this problem, finance the "forest road system" through the Forest Recreation Fund; and, be it further
RESOLVED,	that the Marquette County Board of Commissioners convey its endorsement of this maintenance of effort by the DNR.

Adopted this 20th day of January, 1998, at Marquette, Michigan Gerald O. Corkin, Chairperson Marquette County Board of Commissioners

11b) The County Board considered a Community Development Block Grant from the Michigan Jobs Commission for \$550,000 for the expansion of Progressive Tool & Industries Co. at KI Sawyer.

Steve Powers, County Administrator, noted that today the County Board received the \$550,000 grant from PICO. The Board authorized its application for the grant on December 6, 1997. The County's share of the grant is \$61,000 which will come from one of several sources or a combination of them which include: The KI Sawyer Development fund, the County Revolving Loan Fund, or possible in-kind contributions. The Progressive Tool & Industries Co. share is \$854,000 bringing the grant budget total to \$1,465,458. No general fund dollars are required for this project.

Brian Watson, Marquette Operations Manager for PICO, was present and noted that the grant is tied to PICO's commitment to create 80 jobs. Although the County of Marquette and PICO coshare the responsibility to meet the job requirement of the grant, it would be considered PICO's responsibility for any shortage of jobs.

Steve Powers, County Administrator, also noted that CUPPAD informed him on a statewide basis the Michigan Jobs Commission required repayment only once. Usually the State will cooperate or extend the time period if there should be difficulty creating jobs. Even then if a repayment is required, it would be prorated by the number of jobs created rather than the total required.

It was moved by Comm. Rapport, seconded by Comm. Arsenault and unanimously carried by voice vote that the County Board accept the \$550,000 Community Development Block Grant from the Michigan Jobs Commission to be used for the expansion of Progressive Tool & Industries Co. at KI Sawyer.

11c) Comm. Cihak distributed an informational item regarding Upper Peninsula Airport funding. At the last meeting John Fallon, of JBF Associates, indicated that the FAA would not fund two Airports in Marquette County. A recent article in The Mining Journal noted that four Northern Michigan Airports would receive a total of \$1.5 million in State and Federal funds, and one of the Airports, the Sault Ste. Marie Municipal Airport is going to receive \$150,000 to construct a new terminal building. There are two airports in Chippewa County, one being the International Airport and the Sault Ste. Marie Municipal Airport, both receiving funds.

Chairperson Corkin opened the meeting for public comment.

Earl Yelle, Sands Township Supervisor/Assessor, thanked Comm. Tuominen for the update on the taxable value of buildings at Sawyer. He also noted that there is a delinquent tax bill against the KI Sawyer Bowling Alley of approximately \$25,000-\$28,000.

Comm. Rapport, Airport Board Liaison, noted that Comm. Roberts has been appointed a Temporary Airport Board Member in place of George Keskimaki.

Chairperson Corkin reported that the Board of Commissioner's Committee Appointments List for 1998 is in the Commissioners' mailboxes. He thanked all the Commissioners for their hard committee work in 1997.

Comm. Joseph requested that Civil Counsel look into the delinquent tax issue with the Sawyer Bowling Alley.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 8:17 P.M.

The Marquette County Board of Commissioners met in Regular Session on Tuesday, January 20, 1998 at 7:00 p.m.in Room 231 of the Henry A. Skewis Annex, Marquette, Michigan.

Chairperson Corkin called the meeting to order. Present: Comm. Angeli, Comm. Arsenault, Comm. Bergdahl, Comm. Cihak, Comm. Joseph, Comm. Rapport, Comm. Roberts, Comm. Seppanen, Comm. Tuominen, and Comm. Corkin. Absent: None

A Salute to the Flag was given, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

It was moved by Comm. Arsenault, seconded by Comm. Roberts and unanimously carried by voice vote that the minutes of the January 13, 1998 Special County Board Meeting be approved and also the minutes of the January 6, 1998 Organizational Meeting be approved with the following correction: Page 15, Paragraph 3, "Comm. Cihak also noted that the Ad Hoc Committee on reassessing plans to move to the present County Airport will be meeting at the Negaunee Township Hall Thursday, January 8th at 7:00 P.M."

Chairperson Corkin opened the meeting for public comment.

Earl Yelle, Sands Township Supervisor/Assessor, explained the process he uses when appraising buildings at KI Sawyer, however the main thing which determines the true value of a building is its selling price. A CUPPAD study of 1996 placed the value of KI Sawyer Air Force Base at a depreciated replaceable cost of \$48 million which would result in a taxable value of \$24 million. Recently the County Board has proposed the sale of Building 825 for approximately 25% of the depreciated replaceable cost. If we use that as an example for the selling price for buildings at Sawyer that means the \$24 million taxable value would drop to \$6 million. This would result in the possible amount of operating taxes to drop to only \$36,000. In several years, when federal monies are no longer available, the only source of revenues will be the tax base at Sawyer which would have been severely eroded due to these special sale prices for the buildings. Will there be enough funds to run the operation?

There being no further public comment Chairperson Corkin closed this portion of the meeting.

It was moved by Comm. Roberts, seconded by Comm. Tuominen and unanimously carried by voice vote that the agenda be approved with the following changes: Item 10a be removed.
