- 10th Motions and resolutions must be in writing, except motions to adjourn
- 11th Any member desiring to speak shall rise and address the chair and

remain standing while speaking.

- 12th No person other than a member shall be allowed to address the board except with unanimous consent.
- 13th Upon any question, the names of those who voted for or against the same shall be entered alphabetically in the minutes, and each member called upon, unless for special reasons he be excused by unanimous consent of the board, shall declare openly and without debate his assent or dissent to the question.
- 14th When two or more members shall arise and address the chair at the same time, it shall be the duty of the chair to decide which one shall be entitled to the floor.
- 15th It shall be the duty of the chair to preserve order, and to call to his aid for that purpose the sheriff of the county. The chair shall suppress any disorderly conduct and shall strictly enforce the rules and regulations of the board.
- 16th It shall be the duty of the Auditing Committee to meet at least one day previous to each meeting of the board, to carefully examine and consider all claims against the county which may have been filed with the clerk five days previously, in order that their report may be ready for the action of the board upon its assembling.
- 17th Cushing's Legislative Manual is hereby adopted for the government of the board, except as above provided.

Presentation of Claims, Petitions and Communications-

Several claims were presented and referred to the auditing committee

The following communication was received, read and on motion of Supervisor P. Pascoe, referred to a special committee of three:

To the Chairman and Board of Supervisors
of Marquette County

Gentlemen: There is a Mrs. Cousin a resident of Clarkburg, who has been an invalid for some time, and also a county charge. Several medical men of the county have treated her - one from Marquette - she has paid out of the county poor fund. I took charge of the Humboldt and Edwards mines in November, and was told this woman was a county patient, and had not to be treated here as a mining case. Although her husband was working off and on in the Humboldt mine, he could not make enough to support his family, being forced to leave him to nurse his invalid wife.

I took hold of the case through humanity, and without any recompense for my services from the county, the superintendent of poor agreeing to furnish medicines. He continued to do so, paying as much as fourteen dollars per month to Mr. Schaller, our druggist here at the time, until April. I had private reasons to withdraw my prescriptions from Mr. Schaller. Mr. Stern then notified me I had to continue to get my medicines from him, although I proposed to furnish them cheaper than he was doing at cost.

Mr. Stern, for private reasons, would not allow me to furnish any. Mr. Schaller has moved away since then from Humboldt.

Mr. Stern comes and notifies me he will furnish no more medicines. The patient is improving so much so that when I took hold of her she had to be lifted when wanting to move: now she can sit up all day, and do considerable work. This woman still requires medical and surgical treatment, and as the superintendent has refused to furnish medicines, I am forced to give up the further care of this case. The woman will suffer, and her husband is too poor to pay for medicines and medical attendance.

All the above facts can be substantiated by competent testimony I remain yours etc.

The following communication was presented, read and our motion of Supervisor Peter Pascoe, referred to the prosecuting attorney:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Marquette County Mich: - Dear Sirs:

I wish to call your attention to the matter of my salary as Judge of Probate. The Supreme Court has recently made a decision in regard to the salaries of Judges of Probate under which I am entitled to that portion of my salary which was ordered by the board of Supervisors. During the first two years that I held the office the board allowed only \$500 per annum, which was on an average \$500 per year less than I was legally entitled to. The board afterwards increased my salary to \$1,500 per annum which I received for two years. This was then cut down to \$1,200, and afterwards to \$1,000, and again increased to \$1,100, at which it now stands.

I have now acquiesced in the reduction made in my salary, and have relied on your honorable body ultimately doing me justice in the matter.

The Supreme Court having now decided that the salary of the Probate Judge being fixed cannot be diminished during his term of office, I now earnestly request your honorable body to investigate the matter and give due effect to the law.

I claim that I am entitled to at least \$1,000 additional during the two years that I received only \$500 per year, and further that I am entitled to the amount deducted from my salary from the time it was fixed at \$1,500.

The duties of the office are very important, and in the language of the Supreme Court, one of the most important branches of our judicial system. There are no fees to

of said office, and it is necessary and required that the office should be open at all times for the transaction of business

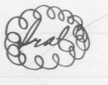

Reports of Committees

By the special Committee appointed to investigate certain charges
against Mr. Edwin Stern, Superintendent of the poor:

To the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors
of Marquette County.
Gentlemen.

Your Committee to whom was
referred the communication of James M. Duillan, has investigated
the charges therein contained against Edwin Stern, the
Superintendent of the poor of the Third district, and has found
the following facts relative thereto:

1st James M. Duillan was employed as mining physician at
Humboldt and Edwards mines November 1st, 1878, and is yet
so employed.

2nd The mine employs at these mines pay the mining physician a
monthly medical fee for which said physician furnishes to said
mine and their families medicines and medical attendance.

3rd Christ Clauson is one of the mine employes at the Hum-
boldt mine, and he has paid his medical fee each month from
the 1st of November, 1878, to the 1st of June 1879, and he is willing to contin-
ue to pay it.

4th Mrs. Clauson, the invalid mentioned in James M. Duillan's
communication, has been sick for some time and has been
attended by Dr. M. Duillan since he became mining physician
at Humboldt and Edwards mines. Dr. M. Duillan receives no
compensation for his attendance to said invalid but the month-
ly medical fee paid by her husband.

5th The Superintendent of the poor supplied medicines for said
invalid for some time back and up to the first of May 1879.

His reasons for discontinuing to supply medicines was long as
said Clauson is not in want of relief from the County.

Secondly: that it was really no benefit to Clauson for the Superinten-
dents to furnish medicines for his wife.

Thirdly: that it is his object and duty to curtail relief to the
poor when no want or suffering is occasioned, and that in
this instance he was actuated by no other motive than a
desire to lessen the expenditures of the poor fund.

It is the opinion of your Committee that the Superintendent
of the poor was justifying in the course he took. All of which your
Committee respectfully reports, asking for a decision of the full
board upon the matter and your Committee ask to be discharged from
further consideration of this subject. - James Pagor

You will observe that the average number maintaining the past year is less than the year previous, and that while the total cost of maintenance is slightly less than in 1878, the average cost is somewhat greater. It should be remembered that certain items of expense, as keeper's salary, fuel etc. remain the same though the number of immigrants may vary somewhat and this error, with a less number of immigrants, to increase the average cost.

The stock kept at present consists of cow (1) horse, two (2) cows, five (5) pigs and thirty (30) fowls

The improvements during the year consisted only of an addition to the barn made necessary by an increase average of hay for building which bids was received and the amount made to the lumber dealer. The addition made was 16x16, 14 feet posts, and a beam to 12x16 in which to house rags and elights, boarded and battened, with shingle roof and the entire cost as shown elsewhere, was thirty (30) dollars.

From the foregoing you observe that the total expenditure in the amount expended in giving temporary relief as compared with 1878 was \$1,656.95 - about 6 1/2 per cent; that the decrease in the first district was \$1,810.53, about 35 per cent; in the second district - \$1,022.24, about 1. per cent, while in the third district the increase was \$556.37, about 11. per cent.

There was a decrease of forty seven (47) in the total number of persons relieved, and of forty eight (48) cents in the average amount given to each person.

From the note last purchased by your board in January last 301 cords of wood, about one third of which was hard wood was taken last winter at a cost - piled up at the poor house - of \$1.49 per cord; adding the stampage paid by you, makes the entire cost \$1.89 per cord. Not only is this a much less price than the wood could have been bought for, but the chopping was done principally by persons who, but for the employment thus given would have required aid from the County. Of the amount of wood above stated there is remaining on hand 154 cords; the cost of chopping and hauling, which is in the foregoing statement charged to the poor house and first district, if admitted from their accounts

they would be reduced \$45 and \$180, respectively. Accompanying this report are all bills paid by this board during the year, which you will find to be full and complete vouchers for its entire expenditures.

Having had under consideration the communication of Hon. Edmund S. Hardy, Judge of Probate, presented at the last meeting of your honorable board, and by your request to me for my opinion thereon, I beg leave to report that the Supreme Court has decided that the Board of Supervisors have no power to alter or change the salary of the Judge of Probate whom once they have fixed and established it, and that it must remain as established at the time of election.

The Court say: "If they can do anything in the matter, it is only to exercise the delegating power of acting over, until directed by the Legislature to act again." This delegating power was conferred by the law of 1873. Now therefore the board of Supervisors had acted over under that law they had no power to act again, without a new delegating of power by the Legislature. It follows that the action of the board in fixing the salary of Judge of Probate at \$1100. from January 1st 1879, was illegal and void.

The Prosecuting Attorney to whom was referred the questions of the legality of the charges for rail roads and made by County Officers having passed over the two rail roads in this County would by law to report that the law allows to

all officers a certain mileage for travel to execute process. It makes no difference whether they travel on foot, in a wagon or by rail road without having to pay fare, they are still entitled to mileage but not to mileage and rail road fare both, nor to either as matter of right unless to execute process.

The Board of Supervisors have a legal right to allow such compensation as to whom shall serve just to any officer for time and actual expense expended and laid out in investigating and arresting of the perpetrators of crime. This is a matter entirely in the discretion of the Board of Supervisors.

Your special committee who was instructed by you to confer with the Superintendent of Poor in regard to the system of contracting for medicinal and medical attendance for the County poor by law to submit the following report:

That they have conferred with the board of Superintendents of the Poor in relation to this matter, and your committee conclude that it would be for the best interests of the County - with a proper regard for the welfare of the poor - to enter into contracts with responsible physicians to furnish medicinal and medical attendance for the County poor to the lowest responsible bidder in each district, and your committee recommend that the board of Superintendents of the poor be instructed to advertise for bids, enter into contracts as above stated, commencing with the first day of January next. Proposals have already been received from responsible physicians in each district to furnish medicinal attendance and medicinal to the poor for the sum of \$2,175 per annum. Last year, under present system was \$3,470.61 making a saving of \$1,295.61, and your committee are of the opinion that a still greater saving can be effected when all bids are received.
