gentlemen: - According to instruction, I have examined the books and records in the officers of the county treasurer, county clerk and the criminal dockets of the justices of the peace in the City of Marquette, Negaunee and Ishpeming from Jan.1,1906 to Jan.1,1907 and herewith submit my report:

I find vouchers for all disbursements from Oct.1,1906, to Jan.1,1907, vouchers for disbursements from Jan.1, to Oct.1,1906 were previously checked by the auditing committee of board of supervisors.

I have checked the monthly and quarterly statements of the auditor general with the county treasurer's books and find the same to be correct.

The accounts with the townships and cities have been correctly kept, and having been credited with all tax corrections of the county treasurer and auditor general and debited with the auditors general's refunds and rejected and charged back taxes. They have also been credited with their respective portions of primary school funds, library funds, and liquor taxes.

I have examined the circuit court calenders and court journals and find that

the fines and costs m criminal cases, amounting to \$1,358.30, and the entry, jury and stenographer fees, amounting to \$241.00, have all been paid to the county treasurer by thee county clerk.

Inhave examined the criminal dockets of Justices Blanchard, Byrne, Crary and Donovan of Marquette: Justices Kronberg, Thoren, Trathen and Verran of negaunee and Justice Andrews of Ishpeming for the year of 1906, and find that the fines collected as shown by the several dockets and papers on file, have all been paid over to the county treasurer.

The dockets of Justice Byrne, Thather, and Verran have not been written up for the past three or four months. Notwithstanding the excuses of ill health, press of business etc. it is unnecessary to mention that they are required by law to have all cases properly entered at time of trial and I endeavored to impress them with this fact.

In connection with the rejected and charged back lists would say ,I find that the supervisors have, generally speaking, reassessed these taxes at large, whereby lands on which taxes were rejected because of incorrect, incomplete or indefinite descriptions, have escaped taxation. Care should be taken in order, as far as possible to reassess these descriptions on the lands which are properly liable for same and not spread them at large on the rolls.

In conclusion I desire to mention that the county officers have promptly furnished any information required.
