Dear Sir:- Replying to your letter of April 11th, I will say that I shall be glad to appoint a warden in your county with the understanding that he is to act one-half of the

year as county warden and be paid by the County, and the other half of the year as state warden and be paid by the state. I should, of course, prefer to pick out a man myself, as I want to get the best available man in the County for the position, but should be glad to have the Board recommend a man, and I would be glad to follow the recommendation, providing in my judgment and from my investigations he was the proper man for the position. In my judgment the one appointed should be from Marquette, inasmuch as there is a regular state deputy at Negaunee, and a man at Marquette would be in a position to look after the commercial fishing without taking very much of his time and he would also be better located to look after the good hunting territory along the Marquette and Southeastern, that is, up in the Big Bay country and west of there. One of the men that was recommended to me when I was there a few months ago impressed me very favorably and I think he has the making of a good warden, and if the arrangement goes through I think I should appoint this man. I think the arrangement spoken of would be a first class one for your county for the reason that you have some three or four hundred dollars that must be spent in this way or turned into the state treasury. Under this arrangement you would have one deputy that would spend practically all his time in the County and another state deputy who would spend considerable of his time in the county. If the Board takes favorable action at its meeting on April 27, I shall be glad to make the appointment at once so that the man may begin work on May 1st.

The report of the building committee of the Tuberculosis Hospital was read and adopted and ordered filed:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Marquette County, Michigan.

Gentlemen: Your committee having in charge the erection of the Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Morgan, would respectfully report that the contract for the main building let to Mr. Wilson at \$14,347.00, has been completed and accepted by your committee, except a small amount of painting to be done on the outside in the spring, which we allowed to stand over until that time.

The contract for steam heating, to the Lake Superior Steam Heating Company for \$1,390 is also completed, as is also the contract let to Mr. E.J. Sink for the plumbing at \$955. We have, after consulting authorities on sewage, installed the Ashley Ceptic sewer system with proper manholes and tanks, at a cost of \$81.50. The installation of same, including ditches, pipe, manholes and tanks, cost \$1,195.34. Have also sunk a well 85 feet deep through clean sand and gravel and put in a five inch galvanized iron pipe in same at cost of \$616.10, and have thirty feet of clear pure water standing in well. Have also installed the Keweenaw pumping system for supplying water to be run with an electric motor. Have installed a small gasoline engine in connection with same to be used in case of emergency. Cost of pumping plant delivered was \$630. Cost of gasoline engine delivered was \$111.60. Installation of same cost \$95.36. After excavating the ground for the pumping plant, forms were put up for a cement wall around it, and then covered for the winter. The cement wall

and roof are to be finished in the spring. We arranged with the Electric Light Board of the City of Marquette to erect a pole line from MrVandenboom's farm to the Sanatarium for light and power purposes for \$1,959.48. This has also been completed and the current turned on. We have shipped to the plant one car of coal and have installed a man temporarily to look after the building and keep it warm until such time as a permanent nurse and other efficient help is engaged and the building properly equipped with furniture and other paraphernalia ready to open to the public for the purpose it is designed for. Arrangements are being carried out for installing the proper fixtures for lighting by electricity, power for same to be furnished by the Electric Light Commission of the City of Marquette. Since installing the water plant we have tested the well by pumping 6,000 gallons per day continuously for five consecutive days, without any sign of the water diminishing, thus assuring us an abundant supply of pure water, and samples of which have been sent to the laboratory of the State Board of Health, at Lansing, Michigan, for analysis, but have not yet received returns from same. We have also the matter up of installing a plant in the laundry as early as possible and after this is completed and a few other things finished up, according to the resolution passed by the board July 27th last, your committee will consider their work completed; unless further instructed by the board. Total cost to date is \$21,431.38.

The following report of Special Committee was approved and ordered filed.

To the Chairman and Board of Supervisors of Marquette County.

Your committee appointed at the meeting held February 15th, last, to represent the Board of Supervisors of Marquette County at the meeting of the Upper Peninsula Development association, held in Menominee, February 21st, beg leave to report briefly the work undertaken and the organization accomplished, although we presume the members of the Board have already learned through the newspapers of what was done at such meeting.

There was a large and enthusiastic attendance, all of the fifteen upper peninsula counties being represented.

The object of the association is to conduct an advertising campaign and bring to the attention of the country at large the great agricultural possibilities of the upper peninsula and bring in settlers who will develop and make valuable these resources.

To this end it is proposed to raise a fund of \$ 50,000 to be apportioned to the different counties on a basis of population. Land holding companies and corporations to be assessed one cent an acre; the railroads to be asked to contribute on a mileage basis and the various county boards to be requested to give their share.

The plan of organization is that each county shall be represented by five directors, making the total number of such Board of directors seventy-five. The directors from each county shall select one of their number as a member of the executive committee of the association which shall have charge of the active management of its affairs.

The officers of the association shall be selected from the members of the executive committee, with the exception of the secretary, who is to be the active advertising manager and who shall be a man whose experience and training fully qualify him for that work.

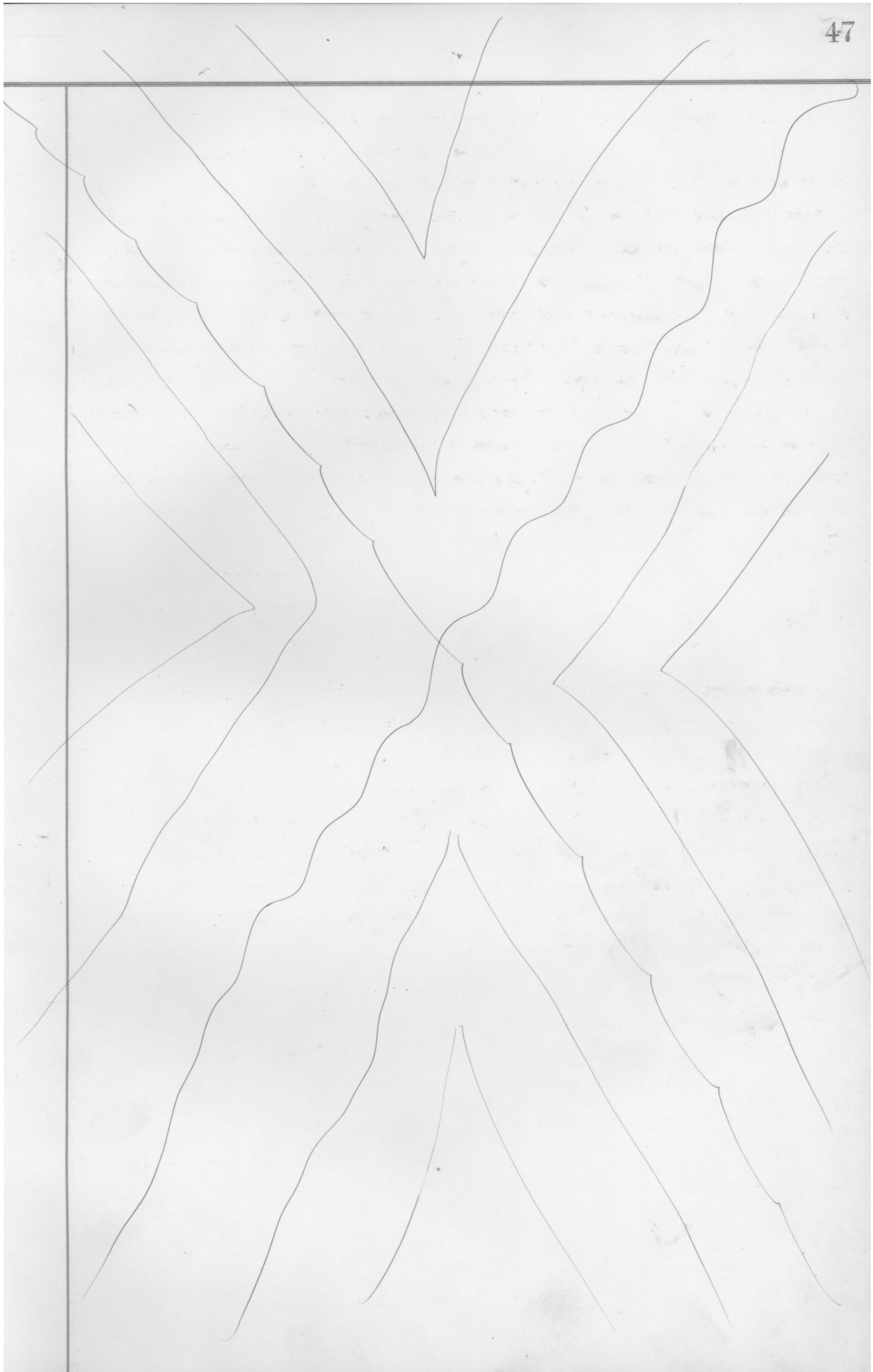

Gentlemen:- Your committee on the Morgan Heights Tuberculosis Sanitarium would respectfully report that since our last statement to the Board we have installed the necessary help for opening the sanitarium, and who have since been very busy cleaning up and installing the furniture, previous to the opening of same. this work has been somewhat delayed, owing to tardiness of the arrival of some of the furniture, which is still coming by piecemeal, a little at a time, but is very nearly all here now, and we expect to be in shape to begin receiving patients in about a week or so more.

The building of the barn, chicken coops, ice house, etc., we have had to delay owing to the great depth of snow that has been lying on the ground until the present time. We shall now proceed at once with the erection of these buildings, and already have some men on the ground doing extra work, previous to commencing on these outside buildings. In the meantime, we erected a temporary quarters for a team, which we have purchased, also between fifty and sixty chickens, some of which have been donated by Capt. Trebilcock, the balance we have purchased. We are now looking for two cows that we think would be suitable for the place. Expect to purchase same and have them on the ground within the next few days. With the favorable weather conditions now existing, we shall prosecute the balance of the building work, and bring it to a conclusion as fast as possible. There will be still remaining a great deal of work to do, such as building roads, grading the grounds, which will be necessary to do during the coming summer. All of which is respectfully submitted.
