To the Honorable Board of Supervisors, Marquette County, Michigan.  
Gentlemen:-

Your Morgan Heights Sanitarium committee respectfully report that up to October 1st, the cost of all buildings, the installing of sewerage system, water supply plant, the building of electric light and telephone lines and roads, improvements on the farm, and installation of furniture, and other paraphernalia, also team, cows and poultry and necessary farm implements now amount to Forty-two thousand one hundred fifty-two dollars and ten cents (\$42,152.10).

The improvements on said institution are now about completed, except what may be necessary in the way of building additional shacks, for the accomodation of more patients, and clearing up more land otherwise beautifying the place.

The said institution was opened May 1st, for the reception of patients, since which time there has been admitted twenty-seven of which nine have been dismissed. In comment on those that have left the institution, of this number one was cured, four received great benefit, and four left of their own accord, after being there for a short time, being able to follow treatment in their own homes.

Deaths resulting from tuberculosis has been two, both were advanced cases when admitted to the institution, cases in the hospital at present are sixteen, one insipient case, eight moderately advanced, and seven far advanced.

We found on starting this institution that we had a large number of advanced cases to take care of, most of which are incurable, but we believe that in the future the cases admitted, will be of a more insipient nature, and more liable to be benefited from the treatment at said institution, and percentage of cures will be very much greater in the future. And your Committee are very much gratified at the excellent results so far attained, and believe with careful management and proper support, the institution should receive at your hands, it will prove a great benefit to Marquette County.

It will be noticed that the quarters for ward patients are now overcrowded. Provision should be made for additional quarters as the large majority of the cases admitted are advanced cases, which cannot occupy porch quarters.

There are at present three applications from this county: two of which are advanced cases, for which we have no room at present, the other is an incipient case, and will be admitted as soon as arrangements are made by the doctor. It is of the utmost importance to accomodate the advanced cases for which the capacity, as stated above, is already overcrowded.

During the year there was received from patients and paid over to the County Treasurer \$945.31. There is at present outstanding \$141.00. This is considered collectable, which will make a total of \$1085.31. some of which has been paid by patients who are paying in full and some only in part for their keep.

The present cost for keep of each patient is about \$2.00 per week. This includes meals, medicines, heating, lighting and the running expenses. This cost has been decreased as the number of patients has increased, and would be still further reduced with more patients. It is expected that during the coming year the cost for each patient will be somewhat further reduced, as we expect to raise all of the farm and garden produce necessary to supply the institution.

It is the earnest desire of the committee to have the citizens of the county interested in this institution. We desire particularly to have them visit and inspect the building and grounds so that they can judge as to the attention and care the patients are receiving.
