From the reports which I receive from other Counties we expect all these subscriptions to be renewed for 1913.

Marquette County has received its full share of the benefits of the Bureau's work since its inception. It may be said that no new settlers can be credited directly to the Bureau. Of course it is not to be expected that direct results in the way of land sales are to be shown during the first few years of the life of an organization of this sort. Our first duty has been to exploit the resources of the Upper Peninsula and to offset throughout the country at large the fallacy that the Upper Peninsula is a land of snow and ice, not suitable for agriculture. We believe that we have succeeded in a large degree. Inquiries and letters from all over the country indicate that our advertising campaign is bearing fruit. The people of the country are beginning to realize that the agricultural possibilities of the Upper Peninsula have been practically unknown and untouched. Our first problem was to educate our own people and to show them what can be done and ought to be done in the Upper Peninsula. In this work we have certainly been successful.

The lack of evidence of new settlers during the past 18 months is very largely due to the lack of proper facilities and organization in the effices of the land owners for following up the work of the Bureau. No land Company to my knowledge has definite plans for meeting the inquiries of land seekers from outside of the State. The Bureau has been successful in stirring up interest among the agriculturalists of the Middle West, and we find the land owners are not ready to meet the work where the Bureau must necessarily leave off and to follow up inquiries with definite offers of land for the purpose for which it is sought. The Bureau expects to begin some development work along this line immediately. At the November meeting of the Executive Committee of the Bureau representatives of large and small land owners will be asked to be present. Our Manager, Colonel Mott, has definite plans for a land selling campaign which he will offer at this meeting and it is hoped that closer co-operation between the Bureau and its own subscribers will result in a more satisfactory handling of the work.

Marquette County has received several visits from Col. Mott, the Manager, and he has done excellent service in furnishing inspiration and help for our local organization

In the advertising which the Bureau has sent out Marquette County has received its full share of attention. In the forth coming booklet, to be issued by the St.Paul R.R. on the possibilities of the Upper Peninsula, a special article is to be devoted to Marquette County. Within the next six weeks the Editor of the Evening Wisconsin will visit Marquette Co. for the purpose of writing up the County as a summer resert country and as an objective point for automobile tourists. Our pride in our County

Read system welcome investigation by the automobile owner. Marquette County was well represented in the exhibit of the Upper Peninsula Development Bureau at the Detreit Fair, so we feel that we are helding our own with other Counties.

The efficiency of the Bureau has been greatly increased by the employment of Col. C.W. Mott as Manager. Co. Mott was for 17 years imigration agent for the Northern Pacific R.R. and no man in the country is better equiped for this work than he.

If you again favor us with a subscription of \$1000.00 we can assure you that through Col. Mott and his organization the money will be well spent.

It was also suggested that considerable saving could be made by using coke and your committee instructed the janitor to give this a fair trial.

Your committee would also suggest, and ask permission to equip the windows in the court house that are loose with a suitable weather strip similar to those that were put in last year, as we have found that the windows are very satisfactory, causing a considerable saving in fuel.

We also ask permission to install two electric lights at the Jail, which are asked for by the Sheriff and are needed badly. All of which is respectfully submitted,

The following report of the Special Committee appointed to attend the State Tax Conference was read and ordered filed.

Marquette, Mich. Oct. 9th, 1912.

To the Board of Supervisors of Marquette County, Michigan.

Gentlemen: - Your committee appointed at last session of the Board to attend and represent this county at the State Tax Conference, held at the City of Detroit, Sept. 18 and 19, respectively report:

That the meeting was called to order on Wednesday, the 18th, at 10 A.M., by George Lord of Detroit and after and address of welcome by Mayor Thompson and responses to same, the meeting organized by electing a chairman and secretary and then settled down to business at once. There were two sessions on Wednesday and two on Thursday, at which veryable speeches were made, by men who seemed to be well posted in all phases of taxation matters. The object of the conference was to afford an opportunity to those in attendance, representing different property interest throughout the country, to jointly consider and discuss the problems of taxation and existing assessment difficulties, and to promite co-operation in an effort to bring about a more equitable distribution of the tax burden. Following each address there was a general discussion on the subject of each speaker on all sides of the question of taxation. It was the sense of the conference that the State Tax Mommission should

should continue their work of bringing valuations in every county in the State up to actual cash value, and that those counties already up to cash value should not be equalized as such at the next state equalization unless all the counties at that time had been gone over and put upon the same basis. It was also thought that state supervision of assessments was a good plan to follow and the advalorem system of taxation was the best and proper plan to adopt, and could be carried out so as to secure just taxation to all kinds of property. The meeting was a very harmonious one and conducted in a spirit of fairness to all concerned, and was very edifying to those in attendance. A resolution was offered and passed by the conference to form a permanent organization of a State Tax Conference and a committee was appointed for that purpose, who now has it in hand to perfect such an organization, the purpose of which is to meet representatives from every county in the state at least once a year to talk over and discuss the various problems of taxation, out of which to gather and formulate the best ideas, and to recommend such measures to the legislature to be enacted into law as may be deemed wise and for the best interests of all classes of property, out of which there is no doubt much good will come and your committee recommends that Marquette County be represented at all of its sessions.

Gentlemen:- Your committee in charges of the Morgan Heights Tuberculosis Sanitarium respectively report:

First: We call your attention to the report of Mr. Farrell showing receipts and disbursements which includes all improvements etc.,

Also the report of Dr. Bottum, the physician in charge, from which you will notice there has been 6 incipient cases cured, 10 advanced cases have died, 4 after receiving considerable benefit have left of their own accord and returned to their own home expecting they would get well bu usually proves fatal, besides exposing those of their own families and others, largely through ignorance of the right way of living to successfully combat this dread disease. In the erection of this institution Marquette County has undertaken a great work for the benefit of suffering humanity, and we must not sit idly by and watch the progress unconcerned, as the responsibilities and success of the institution lie, to a large extent, with the Board of Supervisors as well as to its management. We have the hearty support and best wishes of the tax payers of the county and they look to us for the best results obtainable, and your committee believes that a more aggressive and intelligent effort should be put forth in the line of educating the people as to the danger of pulmonary tuberculosis, and as to the means and manner of living now well known that ought to be adopted for its prevention, and we believe that our Superintendent of Public Schools should be instructed and requested to talk to the children on his visits to the different schools. Also to make it a part of his duty to enter into correspondence and obtain literature on the subject from the best institutions throughout the country as well as from professional men, and distribute them through all the schools both in cities and townships, and in this way enlist the help of all good citizens throughout the county in trying to prevent and stamp out the white plague.

And we further suggest the organization of anti-tuberculosis societies in this county with branches in the larger cities for the purposes of distributing literature and in other ways carry on the work of education along this line.

The following report of special committee was adopted, and the committee was instructed to ascertain the cost of securing an expert to aid our county superintendents of Poor in systemizing their work, and to report back to this board at their next regular meeting.

Marquette, Mich., March, 26th, 1913.

To the Chairman and Board of Supervisors of Marquette County.

Gentlemen: - Your special committee, appointed to investigate the administration of and accounting for poor relief funds in Marquette County, with a view of effecting improvements and economies, if possible, beg to submit the following report.

We have obtained from the office of the Secretary of State at Lansing such published statistics as they had giving compilation of reports made by the various Counties of the State for the six fiscal years previous to June 20,1911. (Nothing more recent being yet available.)

We find the figures as shown in such reports from the fifferent Counties so widely at variance and misleading as a basis of comparison.

The figures given as to the total number of cases receiving aid in each County should however, be correct and we have compiled for the information of the Board the following statistics, covering the mining Counties of the Upper Peninsula.

The figures for Iron County are so low as to indicate that some other system of handling poor relief must be in use there, and the showing for that County should be eliminated in making comparisons. The conclusion to be drawn from these figures is that the giving of temporary relief is more general in Marquette County than in the others.

The Chairman of this Committee visited Iron Mountain and saw Mr. W.A. Prater, Secretary of the Board of Superintendents of Poor of Dickinson County to obtain information as to the changes which he has introduced in their system since he was placed in full charge of the Poor relief work for the entire County in March, 1912.

Their present plan of organization entirely relieves the Superintendents of the Poor of the active work of administering poor relief, their duties now being limited to that of an auditing committee or board which meets monthly to audit bills and draw the necessary orders on the County Treasurer for their payment. The salaries of the Superintendents have been reduced from \$500.00 each to \$100.00 each per annum.

Mr. Prater has been able to bring about about a marked saving in that County, which has been accomplished principally through a personal effort on his part to assist dependents to become self supporting and by enforcing the provisions of the existing laws relative to the support of poor persons by their relatives.

Such changes as he has introduced in their accounting system, while desirable and valuable from an accounting standpoint are not in themselves features of actual economy.

Figures which were obtained from him show that he has from March 1912 to February 1913 inclusive made a reduction in expenditures of \$5,924.82, an average of

\$493.73 per month as compared with the same month for a year previous.

In February 1912 they were giving relief to 134 families with a tot al of 386 dependents, which has been reduced at the present time to 76 families with a total of 201 dependents.

One of the foremost citizens of Iron Mountain a man who is in close touch with public matters, makes the statement that as far as he has been able to learn, Mr. Prater has accomplished these results without causing hardship to the worthy and needy poor.

Mr. Prater came to Dickinson County originally on a contract to remain six months, thinking that would be sufficient time to complete the work of establishing their poor relief work on the new basis, but at the expiration of that time he found that the work was not sufficiently advanced so that he felt that he could leave it. He therefore remained and continued the work.

He states that he only contemplates staying there until such time as the work has reached a point where it can be turned over to some other man to continue.

He has had long experience and has given special attention to poor relief matters and it is doubtful if another man, lacking such experience, would be able to show results as he has done.

The situation in Dickinson County is such that this plan of putting the entire work in charge of one man works out admirably for them, Nine tenths or more of their temporary relief cases being concentrated in the cities of Iron Monntain and Norway.

Whether or not it would be practicable or desirable for Marquette County which has considerably over twice the area and population and whose poor relief work is scattered over the entire County is an open question.

The census of 1910 shows a population in Marquette County of 46,739. Estimating the increase at the rate shown between the census of 1904 and that of 1910 for two additional years would give us a population in 1912 of 48,981.

Using this estimate on population, we show the following comparison relative to population and total poor expenditures in the County between the years 1905 and 1912

For fiscal year ending September 30,1905. Population, 40,010: Total of all expenditures for poor purposes, \$44,112.70: Rate per unit of population \$1,102.

For fiscal year ending September 30,1912. Population,48981: Total of all expenditures for poor purposes, \$54,157.12: Rate per unit of population \$1,105.

Increase in population in seven years, 8,971.

Increase in total of all expenditures for poor purposes in seven years, \$10, 044.42.

Increase in rate per unit of population in seven years, \$0.003.

This comparison shows that the ratio of cost to population is for all practical purposes the same as it was several years ago.

Your committee is of the opinion that the results that Mr. Prater has accomplished in Dickinson County can to a considerable extent be brought about in Marquette County but the work will have to be taken up on lines similar to those he has adopted, and will necessitate a much closer investigation of the merits of each individual case by our Superintendents of Poor than has in many instances been heretofore.

We also believe, that inasmuch as Mr.Prater is not permanently to remain in Dickinson County that it would well repay the County for the necessary expenditure, to secure if possible, his services for a resonable length of time to assist our Superintendents of Poor and direct the reorganization of poor relief business in this County. The Committee makes the following recommendation, viz: lst. That all persons now receiving County aid and all future applicants be required to make a written statement, under oath, which shall give full particulars as to applicants and also show all property which they may own and what relatives they may have who are liable under the laws 67 the State for their support.

2nd. That the Superintendents of Poor be instructed to enforce the provisions of Chapter 110 of the Compiled Laws of 1897 relative to the support of poor persons by their relatives.

3rd. That card indexes of all persons receiving temporary relief be made and kept up for each of the three poor districts of the County, to be kept either in the office of the Secretary of the Board at Marquette or in the offices of the Superintendents for each district as may be decided is most desirable. Such cards should be in a form that will give full and complete information as to each beneficiary.

4th. That all orders issued by the Superintendents of Poor for supplies of any kind shall be given in writing and no order shall cover more than one month. Such orders should be attached to the bills remdered to the Superintendents of Poor by the person or firm who furnishes the supplies.

Dear Sir: -

Your letter of the 21st received and in reply would say that it will be impossible for me to give up the work in this county entirely before November next, as I have promised to stay until the fiscal year is finished.

There are some matters pending that may make my stay here somewhat permanent. My agreement with the Board here holds me to a three month notice of resignation so that would prevent me accepting an immediate position in your county.

As I understand the situation there the board do not wish or, under the present condition can they, adopt the system we have here entirely. You wish to retain your Board of Superintendents of Poor, but wish through them to adopt as much of our system as can be used with them. If I am right in this, I think I can make you a proposition that will suit you and also will not cost as much as it would for me to give up my position here and take up the work there, before you are in a position to make full use of the system.

My proposition is this to come to Marquette County for two or three days each week, as I can arrange and work each district with the Superintendent of that district. Make a thorough investigation of each of the permanent charges, and make a card index in each district with all the information I can gether of each case. Work out a duplicate system whereby all the cards will also be in the office of the Secretary at the Court House, and be kept revised to date. To use in this investigation the affidavit, and contract, in regard to property qualifications, and also with regard to residence and relatives.

In this way each Superintendent would go over his entire district with me, and this would help to understand my method and also shorten the time it would be necessary for me to take in the work as in the main he would know where the parties lived and we would cover the ground quicker.

I am not at all unwilling to work with any or all the officials connected with this matter and as far as possible assist you to get matters on the best possible business basis. This plan would involve extra expense for me as I will have to pay my stenographer for her extra work and it will be necessary for me to board at the hotels probably as the work will be scattered all over the country. There will be my railroad fare back and forth from Iron Mountain. I mention all these things so that you can understand my position and situation. I am sure I can so arrange it with our board

to take up the extra work with you so that it will not stand in the way.

My proposition then would be this, if the above statement of the situation is correct and meets with the approval of your board. I will take up the work as outlined giving two or three days per week as the situation warrants for \$7.50 per day and my expenses. I would suggest that if this is accepted that the Superintendent of the district where I work furnish the livery, or auto, as may seem best, so that we can cover the ground in the quickest possible time. I will guarantee that I will put in as good time as I can get out of your Superintendent.

If there are suggestions or changes that you would make to this plan or if it would not meet with the approval of your Board and could be changed without materially affecting my position please let me know.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Marquette County, Michigan. Gentlemen:-

At a meeting of your Committee on Supplies and Expenditures on the above date, bids for supplying the County with coal for the ensuing year were submitted by the following companies: Jas.Pičkands & Company, Spear & Sons, Consolidated Fuel & Lumber Co.

The bids, as submitted by each of above companies, being the same, viz., \$7.75 a ton for Bourt House and Jail, and \$7.10 a ton for Morgan Heights Sanitarium, f.o.b. Morgan Heights siding. There being no difference in bids, your Committee allotted one third (1-3) to each company.

Your committee instructed the clerk to ask for bids on weather strips suitable for equipping the various loose windows and doors of the Court House. The windows that have also ready been equipped have proved to be satisfactory, and your committee asks permission to have the remaining windows and doors so equipped: believing a considerable saving of fuel could be effected: as well as personal comfort. The cost of equipping with weather strips, the windows and doors not now equipped, will be from \$225.00 to \$250.00.

Your committee on Highways & Bridges to whom was referred the petition of Richmond Township asking for aid in repairing the road leading South from the Village of Palmer in said Township, would respectfully report that they have examined said road, and in view of the fact that this road will in the future become one of the main roads of Marquette County, and that any money spent on it should have in view a permanent road, would therefore recommend that this petition be referred to the County Road Commission.

The report of M.J. Kennedy, prosecuting attorney regarding the legality of form of comtract for use in Superintendents of Poor office was read and ordered laid upon the table.

The following report of W.A. Prater was read and ordered filed.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of MarQuette County:

In compliance with your request, I herewith submit the report of my work in Marquette County, up to theand including the present time. On account of extra building that we are doing at the Dickinson County infirmary. I have been unable to give the work in Marquette County as much time as I had hoped to on taking up the work.

Your superintendents of poor have shown me every courtesy and have given me every possible assistance in cunducting the investigation, and from observation of them and their work, will say that they have conducted the affairs of their office conscientiously and economically as far as the methods in use at the present time permit. I have visited 42 number of cases in District No.1 under Superintendent Handford, and 99 number of cases in District No.2 under Superintendent Sporley, and 24 number of cases in District No.3 under Superintendent Chase. We have completed Wards 1,2,3,4 and 5 of the City of Marquette and Marqette Township. We have completed Wards 1,2 and 5 of the City of Negaunee, and Wards 1,2,3,4,5 and 7 of the City of Ishpeming, and the greater part of Ward No.6. I would estimate that two days would entirely complete the work in Ishpeming and Negaunee.

On tabulating the above cases, I have made the recommendations of an increase in 36 number of cases, a demand for a deed or contract in 43 number of cases, a continuation of the present allowance in 80 number of cases, a demand upon the children to support in 17 number of cases, and to discontinue aid in 19 number of cases.

I would earnestly recommend that the publication of the names of those receiving public aid be discontinued, that the Superintendents of Poor be required to personally and that no orders be issued for public a visit and thoroughly investigate each case applying for public aid for a longer period than one month in advance.
