One hundred and thirteen persons have been inmates of the County House at different times during the year, and thirteen hundred persons have been aided outside the County House during the year.

Your Superintendents are pleased to report that we end the year with a cash balance of Seven Thousand Two Hundred Twenty Dollars and Twenty-eight Cents, (\$7220.28), but we think we are up against it good and hard for the coming Winter and hardly know what appropriation to ask for, but would suggest that you make it the same as last year, viz: \$55,000.00, with which amount, and the cash now on hand, we shall be able to care for the indigent poor of the County, also the Doctors' and Hospital bills, and, unless the demands on your Superintendents should be much

more than we hope for, we should end the year with a good cash balance, therefore we respectfully request that your Honorable Body appropriate the sum of \$55,000.00 as relief for the poor of Marquette County during the current year.

Gentlemen:-

You will find enclosed a statistical survey of the agricultural townships of Cloverland, which is the fifteen counties of the Upper Peninsula of Michigan.

I hope you will examine this carefully, as it is the most reliable report the Bureau can make of its efforts.

The work of the Bureau is a commercial proposition, and its duties are to educate the people in other states and acquaint them with the opportunities that exist in Cloverland for general farming, fruit growing, dairying, cattle raising and truck growing, also opportunities for commercial and manufacturing enterprises.

If you will stop for a moment and reflect you will agree that it is not reasonable for farmers in Ohio, Wisconsin, Indiana and Illinois to come here and locate without reliable information is furnished them regarding Cloverland, the same as furnished by the two hundred and fifty or more development bureaus in other states, all seeking to increase their rural population.

In the two years that the Bureau has been in existence, according to your own reports of each township, there has been 2804 families located on agricultural lands, which on a basis of four to a family shows an increase in rural population of 11,216, and these 2804 families have purchased 249,678 acres of land for farming purposes.

You will agree with me that this increase would not have come to us if it had not been through the efforts of the successful publicity furnished by the Upper Peninsula Development Bureau.

An appropriation from your county is needed in order to sustain and enlarge the work of the Bureau. Can you afford to withdraw your support for work of this character.

Many believe that this kind of work is only profitable to the land men, but every new family locating in your township is worth \$600.00 revenue per year. This estimate comes from the United States Department of Commerce and Labor, and all the people in your township derive a direct and indirect benefit through the spending of this \$600.00

I feel assured that when a resolution comes before your board of supervisors for an appropriation to the Upper Peninsula Development Bureau it will receive your earnest support, as the Bureau can not exist without it can receive the financial support of your county to help pay its operating expenses.

The following was adopted as the constitution of the Marquette County Farm Bureau.

Constitution of the Marquette County Farm Bureau.

Name: This organization shall be known as the Marquette County Farm Bureau.

Purpose: The purpose of this organization is to develop the agricultural resources and to promote the best social educational industrial interests of the country.

Membership: All persons residing within the county are eligible to membership and become members upon paying the annual fee and subscribing to the constitution.

Fees and Dues: A minimum annual fee of 50c shall be charged for membership in this Bureau, but there shall be no restriction on voluntary subscriptions by the Finance Committee for special purposes.

Officers: The officers of this bureau shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer and County Agriculturist all of whom, except the County Agriculturist, shall be elected for a period of one year and shall serve, without compensation until their successors shall be elected and qualify. The County Agriculturist shall be appointed for such time and given such compensation as the contracting parties may determine.

Advisory Board: The Advisory Board shall constitute the governing body of the Bureau and shall be composed of the officers of the Bureau and one Township Director from each Township and ward in the County: in addition to this there may also be on the advisory Board one Director from each Chamber of Commerce of the different cities of the County. A quorum shall consist of a majority of the members of the Advisory Board.

The Township directors for the first year shall be chosen by a committee appointed by the President. After the first year all Township Directors shall be elected by the members of the Bureau residing in the respective townships.

Duties of the Officers: The President shall perform such duties as usually pertain to the office. He shall have power to fill such vacancies as may occur in any office or committee. He shall in conjunction with the Treasurer, sign all checks and vouchers for disbursements, contracts and other instruments of writing of the Bureau. He may call meetings of the Advisory Board or any of the committees whenever he deems advisable; and upon the application of three members of the Advisory Board shall call special meetings provided such application is made in writing setting forth the object of the meeting.

The Vice-President shall perform the duties of the President in case of his absence or disability.

The Secretary shall perform such duties as usually pertain to the office of Secretary.

The Treasurer shall in conjunction with the President sign all checks and vouchers for disbursements, contracts, and other instruments of writing of the Bureau. He shall deposit the funds of the Bureau in the bank or banks designated by the Advisory Board.

Township Organization: It shall be the duty of the Township Director to solicit members in his township, and to turn into the Treasurer of the Bureau all membership fees received. He shall call together all the farmers of his township, and others residing in his township interested in the development of agriculture, and effect a Township Organization of the Bureau of which he shall be the director and Presiding officer. The Organization shall be a Secretary and a Treasurer both of whom shall be chosen from the members of the Bureau residing in that township.

Object of Township Organization: The object of the Township Organization is, in general to make the work of the County Agriculturist more efficient in that particular community.

Committees: The standing committees of this Bureau shall be: The Executive Committee, which shall consist of the officers of the Bureau and two members at large chosen by the Advisory Board: the Finance Committee and the Marketing Committee, both of which shall consist of three members appointed by the President: and such other committees as the Advisory Board may deem necessary to the efficiency of the work.

Duties of the Committee: The Executive Committee shall transact such business of the Bureau as the Advisory Board may direct.

The Finance Committee shall audit the books of the Treasurer, and shall solicit and collect all funds, other than membership fees, necessary to carry out the work of the Bureau.

The Marketing Committee shall make a study of the markets effecting the county and report their findings in writing to the Bureau.

The duties of the Committees may be determined by the Advisory Board.

Meetings: The Advisory Board shall hold regular monthly meetings at such place and hour as it may determine. The annual meetings shall be held on the date of the regular monthly meeting in the month of September.

Order of Business: The order of business of the Advisory Board shall be as follows: roll call, reading of minutes, report of committees and consideration of same, report and recommendations of the County Agriculturist, suggestions for improving the work, Treasurer's report, new business, adjournment. In addition to this, at the annual meetings there shall be submitted in writing the annual report of the officers.

Amendments- The constitution of the Bureau may be altered or amended at any regular meeting of the Advisory Board, provided that notice in writing of such proposed change or changes had been given as the previous regular meeting. All members absent when such notice is given must be informed by the Secretary sending a copy of the proposed changes.

The Hartford Steam Boiler Inspection Company makes the following report of the condition of your steam boiler inspected on the 9th day of July, 1915, by Inspector J.P.Parkin:

Two H.F.B. boilers, Nos. 1 and 2 Court House.

Internally: Shell plates and tubes coated with slight scale, the 4th-5th tube in top row of No.2 counting from left is almost pitted through in places, advise they be renewed. Crown sheet tubes and water leg sheets of No.2 show considerable pitting and water leg sheets of No.1 shows light pitting: not serious at present. No other defects noted on shell plates, heads or tubes, Seams and flangings intact. Braces sound and taut. Openings to attachments clear.

Externally- Rear water leg sheet around blow-off flange of No.2 shows light corrosion, not serious. Otherwise shell plates, heads and fire sheets show no defects. Seams and tube ends are tight. Steam gauge correct. Safety valve free. Horizontal ell in blow-off flange of No.2 shows light corrosion, not serious, otherwise blowoff pipes and other appliances in good order. Settings and lining in good condition.

Bids for Coal

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Marquette County.

Gentlemen:- At a meeting of your Supplies and Expenditures Committee held on this date, bids for supplying Marquette County with coal for the ensuing year were received from the following companies, Consolidated Fuel & Lumber Co., James Pickands & Co. and F.B.Spear & Sons. The same being opened it was found that the Consolidated Fuel & Lumber Co., and James Pickands & Co., had submitted the lowest bids. We therefore recommend that the

contract for coal be divided equally between them. All coal delivered to the Court House and Jail to be accepted on weight of Court House scales. Coal delivered to Morgan Heights accepted on Railroad weights.

We also recommend that the Chairman of this Committee be authorized to arrange with the Marquette Boiler & Sheet Iron Works to make all necessary repairs to the Court House Boilers.

We advise the installation of a sanitary drinking fountain at foot of steps leading to Court Room, and placing of sanitary paper towels in all the toilet rooms. These changes to be made to comply with the laws of this State.

We further recommend that the County Clerk be instructed to revise the indexes by making a new loose leaf index for declaration of intentions and one for certificates of citizenship at an expense to this County not to exceed two cents per name.
