They also asked the Board to hire a boy club leader, for the purpose of working among the boys on the farm to encourage them to make more exhibits at the Fair, and aid them in getting better stock and more suitable crops. Supervisor VanRiper stated that he did not think this as nearly necessary as to have club leaders for other lines of work. Lansing, Mich., Jan. 5, 1921.

County Clerk, Marquette, Michigan.

Dear Sir: Under the provisions of Act 116 of the Public Acts of 1917 the money received by each county from the tax on homestead lands and state swamp lands is required to be expended under the supervision of the Board of Supervisors upon trunk line highways within the county in manner prescribed by law and in accordance with recommendations of this department. This act must be construed in connection with the Aldrich Act, Act 19 of 1919, which is controlling in so far as the construction and maintenance of trunk line roads are concerned. It seems to us that money derived from the tax under the Act of 1919 should be used by the county for trunk line maintenance purposes. It is my recommendation therefor that your Board of Supervisors adopt a resolution directing that money received by your county from the tax on swamp land and homestead land shall be used in maintaining the county's portion of trunk lines through the county.

Will you kindly call the matter to the attention of your Board of Supervisors at the next session thereof, and place this recommendation before them.

Your committee on county roads and bridges reports in the matter of a project to build a State Trunk Highway between Little Lake and Lathrop, officially known as Job 35-8.

Your committee met with the Board of County Road Commissioners and a representative of the State Highway Commissioner on June 8, 1921, at which time bids were received by the State Highway Commissioner for the constructing of the above mentioned road, with the Board of County Road Commissioners sitting jointly in the letting to recommend thereon and to act as to concurrence for the counties interested in the project.

We found that there was keen competition in the bidding. After analysis of all figures presented, the lowest bidder was asked to appear before the meeting. From his statements it was found that his bid was incompetent, being too low to properly construct the job. It was recommended that this bid be rejected, and the State Highway Commissioner later confirmed the recommendation.

The next to the lowest bidder was then called. His figures were also some sixteen thousand dollars under the engineers estimates of cost, but he showed possession of such machinery and equipment as would make it possible to do the job at his figure using the high grade equipment in his possession. Therefore the bid of W.S.Peters was determined as the lowest competent bid.

The matter of the unemployment of large numbers of residents of the county was then brought into discussion and consideration was had of the advisability of the county bidding this road in, so as to place the employment of men to accomplish as much relief to unemployment as was possible. This being possible under the statute of placing a bid in the name of the county less than the lowest competent bidder and this less the bond premium, as a bond is now required from the county

Pertaining thereto, after considerable discussion, the following resolution was unanimously passed by your committee and a copy thereof subscribed for use of the Board of County Road Commissioners in negotiating the contract with the State.

The resolution passed reads.

Resolved, that the Board of County Roads Commissioners be instructed to enter into agreement with the State Highway Commissioner of Michigan for the construction of

They have organized an employment board to recommend persons for employment so as to investigate and make employment as far as practicable, this Board being W.H.Moulton, Ishpeming, Chairman; Peter Trudell, Negaunee; John Stickney, Marquette.

Work of installing camps is started and we are advised that the main crew should be started after the 4th of July.

Gentlemen:- As reported to you at the last meeting, Michigan has a new statute pertaining to the erecting of signs at all railway crossings outside of incorporated cities and also pertaining to making smooth all the railway crossings.

As also reported to you, the Michigan Public Utilities Commission has requested that the County Road Commission attend to the matter of erecting all signs, both on the county roads and on the other roads.

Seventy-five persons have been inmates of the county infirmary during the year and fifteen hundred thirty persons have received temporary aid during the year, two hundred eighty-seven in first district, nine hundred seventy-three in second district, and two hundred seventy in third district.

We regret that we are again ending the year with a deficit, namely, fourteen thousand one hundred ninety-eight and five one-hundredth dollars (\$14,198.05).

Owing to the fact that there are many men out of employment and in all probability the poor board will have many calls during the coming winter, we feel it would not be wise to ask for less than one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000.00)

Therefore, your superintendents of the poor respectfully request that your honorable body appropriate the sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000.00) as relief for the poor of Marquette county for the ensuing year.

The crops at the poor farm were poor this year, owing to the fact that there were so many potatoe bugs and grasshoppers. We note the following supplies on hand, estimated, viz:

300 bu. potatoes, 100 heads cabbage, 90 bu. carrots, 18 bu. parsnips, 20 bu. beets, 12 tons hay, 3 tons wheat straw, 300 heads, celery and 314 cords of 16-inch wood.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors:

Sirs- Your committee on county roads and bridges reports:

In the matter of assistance to Skandia township for the construction of a highway between the end of a highway in Turin Township at the Skandia township line and the county road east of Carlshend, petition for which was received by your board and referred to this committee.

Your committee did on the 5th day of August view the site of this proposed road, did look over this territory in Skandia and Turin townships to be benefitted and did determine that this is a worthy project and one which should have assistance and be built.

Further, your committee did meet with the board of county road commissioners on the 19th day of September and consulted with them thereon. It develops that this project may be handled so that this road can be used as a detour to State Trunk Line job 35-8, providing this road can be used as such in the early spring and thence during the time this latter job is under construction, and that the state is willing to assume its share of not exceeding five thousand (\$5,000) to make this road into a detour.

Therefore, if twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2500) is made available to the county road commission to use on this road, it will be possible for them to work with Skandia township, construct this road, expending not over five thousand dollars (\$5000) of county money, and receive a refund of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2500) from the state. To that end we recommend that the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2500) be appropriated from money not otherwise appropriated to the use of the board of county road commissioners to be used in co-operating with Skandia township for the constructing of this road in Skandia township.

Gentlemen:- Your committee on county roads and bridges begs leave to report:

That on the 19th day of September they met with the board of county road commissioners at their request.

Figures, estimates, plans of future work and the agreements with the state highway department and budget estimates for the ensuing year were presented and discussed. The board of county road commissioners adopted a resolution, which has been reported to you in their determination, and is before your board at this meeting. Your committee unanimously adopted a motion that the action of the county road commission in this matter be approved and we respectfully report that in our opinion the determination as given should be received and the taxes levied.

The matter of marking railroad crossings as provided in a new statute, was then discussed and action was had by the board of county road commissioners and approved by your committee, directing the superintendent of the board of county road commissioners to address a letter to the board, suggesting that signs be erected by the board, as requested by the Michigan Public Utilities Commission, and reported to your board at the July meeting, and requesting an appropriation of one thousand dollars (\$1000) be made for that purpose, and your committee respectfully reports that in our opinion this request, when made, should be granted and the work handled in this way.

A proposal made by Frank Klotz, to sub-contract major portions of the Little Lake Lathrop road, was brought before me by the board of county road commissioners. In this matter your committee had viewed the work at the time and together with your board while making the inspection trip over the county roads. We examined the books and accounts, and after careful consideration the following resolution was unanimously adopted.

Whereas, as has been heretofore reported to the board of supervisors, this committee did on June 8, 1921, after careful consideration of the bids for constructing the Little Lake Lathrop road and consideration of the present condition of lack of employment within the county, advise the board of county road commissioners to bid this job in from the state in competition with a contractor's bid which was nineteen thousand dollars below the engineer's estimate in order that the county could control what men to be employed and thereby use the job for relief so far as practicable; and

Whereas, the board of county road commissioners did bid this job in as advised and reported, and both of which actions were approved by the board of supervisors at the time when reported, and

Whereas, the county road commission now has a proposition to sub-let the job

so that no loss in money would accrue to the county, but the county would lose control of the employment of men, and

Whereas, an inspection of all costs and earnings upon the job seems to show that the job is proceeding about along the lines as originally shown on the engineer's estimate; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this committee advise the board of county road commissioners to continue the control and operation of the little Lake-Lathrop road and to reject the proposition of Frank Klotz for sub-contracting the same, providing that they may at their discretion deal with him for hauling on contract as with any other party; and be it further

Resolved, That this action is reported to the board of supervisors with the recommendation that such action by the Board of county road commissioners be approved.

The board of county road commissioners complied with our recommendation in this matter by a motion, which was unanimously adopted therefor.

Your committee respectfully recommends that the action of your committee in recommending the rejection of the sub-contract offer and the action of the county road commission in rejecting the same and continuing jurisdiction by force account be approved.

It was moved and supported that D.S.Yape be re-elected as county school commissioner for the ensuing two years. The motion was unanimously carried.

Supervisor Bush presented the following resolution, which was, on motion duly made and seconded, unanimously adopted:

Whereas, due to industrial conditions now prevailing in Marquette county, a large number of men are working part time or out of work entirely, it appears desirable for this board, through its individual members to keep in close touch with the superintendents of the poor in their respective communities, in order that every worthy case entitled to county aid shall be found and proper assistance furnished therefore be it resolved.

One. That the superintendents of the poor of the several districts be and are hereby instructed to furnish each supervisor, each month, a list of persons receiving county aid in his community.

Two. That each supervisor be and is hereby requested to keep in close touch with the Superintendents of the poor in his district, and be diligent in assisting him in his work,

Three. That the chairman of the committee of this board on "Superintendents of the Poor", be and is hereby instructed to attend the meetings of the superintendents of the poor, thereby becoming familiar with the conditions throughout the county and act as the agent between this board and the board of superintendents of the poor. Said chairman to report to the board of supervisors from time to time such facts and information deemed necessary by said board. Said chairman shall also report upon his own initiative any information that may come to his attention by virtue of his attendance at the meetings of the board of superintendents of the poor, or otherwise, as may be of value to the board of supervisors.

Four. That all bills against the county for aid be referred, after being approved by the board of superintendents of the poor, to the auditing committee of the board of supervisors for audit and payment.

Five. That the superintendents of the poor be and are hereby instructed to avail themselves of and request the aid of the Red Cross, public, industrial and private nurses the health officers and other officials of the different communities to assist them in the work of locating and investigating needy persons, and in following up and caring for such cases as may develop.

Six. That the clerk of this board be and is hereby instructed to write to each superintendent of the poor, furnishing each of said superintendents with a copy of this resolution with instructions to put same into immediate effect.

Seven. Realizing as we do that the present industrial conditions are exceptional, we feel that more than ordinary methods of handling this matter are necessary; therefore, this resolution is presented with the object in view of making sure that every person in Marquette county entitled to aid is adequately cared for from this time forward.

Supervisor Deadman reported that the Yellow Dog river bridge was unsafe and requested that the clerk notify the county road commission.

Supervisor Bush reported that in accordance with the instructions with this board his committee had employed Miss Wixon as home demonstration agent for this county at a salary of \$1800.00 and necessary expenditures \$1,000 to be paid by the state and \$800 by this county, and asked that his committee be continued in this work and be authorized to approve expense bills. Upon motion, duly made and seconded the committee was continued and request granted.

In August last the county treasurer made demand of the Auditor General for the payment of \$7,009.37, being amount due for animal bounties paid by the county on birds and noxious animals, but the claim has not yet been paid.
