Gentlemen:- In making an appropriation to the County Road Commission for the purpose of making it possible to relocate the road in the vicinity of Michigamme, there was a condition placed upon the appropriation that the Township transfer certain properties to be used for industrial purposes.

So far as I know the Township has not transferred these properties to date, but it is my understanding that they do intend and expect to do so. In any instance, the job is well worth its cost and I believe should be carried on at this time when the State is willing to carry it on and the State does carry 80 percent of the cost of the project.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors, Marquette County, Marquette, Michigan.

Gentlemen: The State Highway Commissioner has assured the Board of County Road Commissioners that he will call for bids about the 4th or 5th of May, for the construction of a penetration macadam job running west of Ishpeming.

As you are aware, the County last year bid in the job between Little Lake and Lathrop, so as to use this job to relieve the unemployement situation in the County, desiring to control the employment of this labor so as to make the selection of labor as effective as possible in relieving the unemployment situation and to that end an employment Board was formed and their advice and assistance has been used in the employing of men upon this job. This job has up until within a week ago, employed better than 100 men continuously since the 1st of last July and during the peak of work last season, there were upwards of 200 men on the job and throughout the winter months there were from 140 to 150 men upon the job. This job will, by the 1st of May be completed to the point where it will require the services of but few men and these will necessarily be mechanics or similar trades, that is roller men, truck drivers, etc., and it will be of no further use as a labor relief proposition.

The State law provides that a County may bid in any job such as this west of Ishpeming job, at a figure less than the lowest competent bidder.

Your Board of County Road Commissioners would like an expression from your honorable body as to whether you consider the unemployment situation in the County still such as to make it advisable to bid in this west Ishpeming job, provided the figures are such that it appears feasible for the County to do the work.

Further, if your honorable body feels that the Board of County Road Commissioners should handle the construction of this proposition, we would thank you to authorize your Committee on County Roads and Bridges to meet with the Board of County Road Commissioners at the time when bids are received and recommendations made to the State Highway Commissioner, with power to act in the matter,

For your general information we desire to inform you that the camps, camp equipment, machinery and tools now upon the job between Little Lake and Lathrop can, with the single exception of rollers and a few trucks, be released to this other job by the date of letting.

Further, the County is adequately equipped with all machinery and tools to handle this job, with the single exception that in order to handle both jobs with the necessary speed, it will be necessary to lease for a short time, at least one or two rollers and the Board knows where these are available and subject to lease.

Gentlemen: Your Committee on Fair Ground Buildings report as follows:

It is planned to add 64 feet to the grandstand, move the baseball diamond, erect bleachers along the first and third base line, extend fences around tracks to provide better protection; to build bleachers along the race track west of grandstand. Also, it is planned to make some other needed improvements to buildings on the ground.

We were allowed \$5,000 for repairs and new construction at the October meeting of the Board. We figure that it will cost at least \$2,500 to make the contemplated improvements covered by the preceding paragraph. This leaves the sum of \$2,500 for new buildings.

We were informed by the Executive Committee that they wish an exhibit building constructed for housing cattle. We have had plans prepared for such a building, and bids have been received, indicating that the cost of this building will be in the neighborhood of \$5,000. Before proceeding further we wish to have authority and sufficient money appropriated to cover the cost of cattle barn; otherwise, we recommend that the work enumerated in the first paragraph be done and \$2,500 held over until next year when additional moneys will be available for construction of the new building. Appropriations for the year 1921 were exceeded by your committee, and money was voted which permitted the work under way to be completed. In view of the present financial condition of the county, your committee does not wish to exceed their appropriation without the authority of the Board.

Resolved, In order to improve the methods of supporting and maintaining poor persons in the county of Marquette and to secure a just and equitable expenditure of the county poor fund for the benefit of those persons in the county who are unable to maintain themselves, that the districts into which the county of Marquette has heretofore been divided for the administration of poor relief, viz., first, second and third, be, and the same are, hereby abolished and that the board of superintendents of this county shall hereafter act as a board in the exercise of the powers vested in them by law and shall have charge of and exercise control over the superintendence of the poor and the expenditure of all poor funds in the county.

Resolved, further, that the Board of Supervisors shall appoint three qualified electors, residents of the county, to be superintendents of the poor within the county of Marquette, and that said persons be appointed for the terms and in the manner provided by statute, and that said persons be allowed their actual and necessary expenses in the performance of their duties and the sum of ten dollars (-10) per day for actual attendance and services at meetings of said Board, and that the compensation of each of said superintendents of the poor shall not exceed the sum of one hundred and twenty dollars (120) annually, and that said superintendents of the poor, when appointed, shall have all the

powers and duties fixed by law for the superintendents of the poor of Marquette county.

Resolved, further, that said superintendents of the poor shall have authority and are hereby directed to employ a qualified person as secretary, who shall hold office during the pleasure of said superintendents of the poor. Said secretary shall maintain an office in the court house and shall have exclusive charge under the orders and direction of the superintendents of the poor of the maintenance of poor persons by the county of Marquette, and the expenditure of poor funds. The secretary shall give all of his time to the duties of his office and shall be engaged in no other work or business. He shall keep such accounts and records and make such reports as are required by the superintendents of the poor and the Board of Supervisors. He shall make personal inquiry into the circumstances of all applicants for poor relief and shall visit from time to time all persons and families receiving county aid, and a record of such visits shall be kept in suitable records in his office subject to the inspection of the board of superintendents and the board of supervisors. The superintendents of the poor shall have authority to remove said secretary at any time at the pleasure of the superintendents of the poor and to appoint a successor.

Resolved, further, that the superintendents of the poor shall have authority to employ a clerk and bookkeeper who shall be continuously in the office of the Board during business hours, and who shall be removable at the pleasure of the superintendents of the Poor and shall receive a salary to be fixed by said board.

Resolved, further, that no officer, supervisor or other person except said secretary shall furnish or give poor relief to any person or persons. Any case requiring county aid shall be reported to the secretary, who shall make immediate personal inquiry into the circumstances of the applicant and shall furnish or deny aid, as the circumstances warrant. In every case a suitable written record of the action of the secretary, and signed by him, shall be made and filed in the office of the Board, subject to inspection.

Gentlemen: In the matter of the appropriation of \$4,000.00 recently made by your Board to be used in connection with money to be raised by Skandia Township for the construction of road in Skandia township, starting from the county's road No. 15, about three miles east of Carlshend, running thence south to the township line, I beg leave to report as follows:

On the 10th of this month, bids were called by Skandia township for the construction of this highway. The road had been heretofore laid out to be built with a twenty-foot grade and was broken into four sections of approximately one mile each for the purpose of letting.

Upon taking the bids, it was found that the money available was not sufficient to award the four sections and purchase the necessary culverts and build the necessary bridge.

We found this situation as to the finances.

Skandia township had heretofore cleared the right of way over the entire distance and still has left \$3,000.00 to be used with the county's \$4,000.00, which, when combined with the new appropriation, makes the sum of \$7,000.00, and the combined bid with the necessary culverts and bridge runs to approximately \$9,000.00.

After consideration of the bids, the town boards, with sanction of the undersigned, decided to award the three southerly miles on this job. These three miles start at the township line and run north, and for that purpose the south mile was awarded to Walter Lattrel, and the other two miles to six residents of Ruse, bidding together. The figures received on these miles were very satisfactory. The dirt work being at 32, 33 and 40 per yard on the various sections respectively, and the balance of the bid in proportion.

It was considered by this action that an earlier opening of the road would be secured than otherwise, as there is an old trail paralleling the section which was not awarded which can be put in usable shape at a nominal figure and which the township agreed to put in shape from their repair fund.

We, the undersigned poor committee beg leave to report that on Saturday August 19, we visited the county poor farm. The grounds about the building are well taken care of and the crops are in fine condition. The barns and storage buildings are clean and well kept. Some of the emmbers who visited the Farm on previous inspections commented on the improvements that had been made this year.

In regard to the home, we found everything in first class shape and the inmates are very well satisfied with the food and management. Several were uestioned about conditions and without exception they spoke in the highest terms of Mr. and Mrs. Morrison. The committee voted the management a vote of thanks for the fine dinner served them.

At a meeting held after the inspection, we made the following recommendations.

1. The purchase of a new rug for the office. The rug now in use is nearly worn out.
2. The purchase of a new double wagon. About forty-five cars of slabs are handled each year from the farm and delivered to the poor families at Marquette. In previous years the unloading and delivery was let to outside parties at a cost of between twelve and thirteen hundred dollars. Mr. Morrison can do this himself without extra help, if the wagon is purchased, and this will be a great saving to the county. The wagon would cost about \$125.00.

3. The purchase of a Ford car or some other small make touring car. This car is to replace a driving horse that had to be shot, having outlived his usefulness. At present, when inmates are to be transported, a car has to be hired. During the winter months one of the working horses could be used for trips to town.

4. That a competent man be hired to make the necessary repairs to the ventilating system, which is in bad order.

5. That the plaster in the boiler room, which is in bad condition, be repaired before fall.

6. The purchase of a piano at a cost not exceeding one hundred dollars. Weekly religious services are held and the only instrument they have is an old worn out organ. This request came from the inmates, and Mr. Morrison told us that it would be greatly appreciated.

7. That the moving picture owned by the county be sent to the poor farm occasionally to entertain the inmates.



During the past year there has been a total of sixty-eight (68) inmates at the County Infirmary, with an average of forty inmates per month at the cost of twenty-nine dollars per month for each inmate.

Twenty-two hundred and fifteen persons have received temporary care, three hundred forty-nine from the First District, fifteen hundred fifty from the Second District and three hundred sixteen from the Third District, classified as to causes as follows: Widowhood 806; out of employment 688; sickness 397; old age 97; deserted 80; insanity 23; crippled 29; blind 3; husband in jail 61; orphans 11; shiftlessness 15; mother dead 5;

The following supplies are on hand at the County Farm, estimated; 4 tonhay, 8 ton rye straw, 2 ton green oat straw, 300 bushels potatoes, 350 stalks celery, 29 bushels beets, 80 bushels carrots, 4 bushels tomatoes, 50 bushels parsnips, 35 bushels apples, 125 lbs. dry beans, 100 lbs. dry peas, 100 quarts canned fruit, 17 gallons pickles, 750 head cabbage, 3 cord of 16 inch slabwood, 7 cord of three foot wood for furnace.

As we are again ending the year with a deficit, viz; sixteen thousand one hundred eleven and ninety four hundredth dollars \$16,111.94, and in order to wipe out same and care for the indigent poor of the county, we respectfully request your honorable board to appropriate the sum of one hundred twenty-five thousand dollars \$125,000 as relief for the poor of Marquette County for the ensuing year.

Gentlemen: I trust your Board will be interested in the following report of your County Fair which appears to be the vital and weak spot.

The weather was about as ornery as Stafford the Mule, which no doubt made a difference of two to three thousand attendance; farmers especially were scarce. It does not appear that the Fair is run on a good business basis as I do not think it can be done so under the present system; something must be done to get the farmers and their exhibits, the most practical way appears in engaging a Fair manager and giving him six months to stage the Fair, spending at least two-thirds of his time among the farmers and other exhibitors in addition to serving the Fair, he would be a great benefit to the improvement of stock in the county. Also make a trial next year of giving registered bull calves and swine as premiums to bona fide farmers exhibiting grade stock. If Marquette county is to hold honest to goodness fairs the farmers must be interested and induced to attend and exhibit liberally. Mr. Walker as secretary-manager worked hard and faithfully, but I am convinced that more time is needed than possible for him to give.

To sum up: The Fair Association can always buy good attractions and amusements, but they have got to get right next to the farmers and plug hard for exhibits before the Marquette County Fair will ever be a real Fair.

The Fair Association Board of Directors ask that your Honorable Board will again appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for the 1923 Fair.

We contribute annually to its support. We realize that the development bureau is

essential to carrying out a land policy For Michigan. We have numerous inquiries for farms. During the last three weeks we have had 240 letters asking about Michigan. When we receive these names we cannot send them to individuals, but we do send them to your development bureau to follow up and determine exactly where the settler wishes to go.

Our department, being a state department, cannot favor any particular locality, but each part of the state through its development bureau can advertise its section of the state and point out its advantages. Michigan's land values are low. People over the country do not know that Michigan has millions of acres of good land as well as poor land. Too often have we allowed unscrupulous men to sell sand and swamp to the man who had hoped to make his home with us and to live happily with us. You have seen the results.

We are working on a plan of certifying land before it is sold for agricultural purposes in carrying out this plan we need the development bureaus. We hope to see the time that they will only do business through certified dealers.

It takes time and money to work out these things and I hope you will try to be generous with your development bureau, so that we can help you make your part of Michigan well known and appreciated throughout the country. It is good business, We need to advertise. California spends millions of dollars for advertising her land, her products and her climate. We need to do that so that Michigan will take her place among the states whose land and climate is sought for and whose advantages, agriculturally, are known everywhere.
