Dear Sir:- I desire to again call your attention to the provisions of Act 116, of the Public Acts of 1917, which provides that the money received by each county from the tax on homestead lands and State swamp lands is to be expended under the supervision of the Board of Supervisors upon trunk line highways within the county in the manner prescribed by law and in accordance with the suggestions of the State Highway Commissioner. It seems advisable to the writer that the money derived from a tax under the provisions of the above act should be used by the county for trunk line maintenance purposes. It is my recommendation and suggestion therefore that your Board of Supervisors adopt a resolution directing that money now on hand or hereafter received by your county from the tax on swamp land and homestead land shall be used in the county's portion of maintaining trunk line highways in your county.

Whereas, this Board has appropriated thirty-five hundred dollars for the purpose of co-operating with the federal and State bureaus of animal industry in carrying out a campaign to eradicate tuberculosis among cattle in Marquette county, and

Whereas, the work of tuberculosis eradication in Michigan is now at a standstill due to a lack of funds by the State Bureau of Animal Industry and will so remain unless an effective program with adequate finances be provided for by the next session of Michigan Legislature, and

Whereas, we also recognize the importance of testing every herd of cattle in the State in as short a time as possible, due to the constant menace to the health of our citizens, and especially children, from using products from the untested herds, and

Whereas, we also recognize the importance to the development and protection of the livestock and dairy industries of Michigan of stamping out a disease that is annually costing this state hundreds of thousands of dollars in losses of animals.

Resolved, by the Board of Supervisors of Marquette County, that this Board go on record as favoring the enactment by the coming legislature of adequate measures for the expansion of the work of tuberculosis eradication now being carried out by the State Bureau of Animal Industry and a meeting of representative livestock owners of the State at a meeting at Lansing on December 21, 1922, providing for an annual appropriation of \$400,000 for paying indemnities and \$120,000 annually for expenses of carrying on the work during the next two years. Be it further

3. The State Bureau of Animal Industry.
4. The Committee on Appropriations of the Legislature.

Through many months of the year the people of this region are prevented in a large measure from outdoor life and activities, and it is exceedingly important for their well being that they should have the opportunity for all the outdoor life that can be obtained, and this is made possible in very many cases by the extra hour of day-light secured at the end of the day, by the adoption of the "fast time". There is nothing probably more important in the community than the health and well being of our people.

By the adoption of Eastern Standard Time the inconvenience of different times in adjacent cities will be avoided which is one of the advantages of a uniform state law.

Therefore be it Resolved, that it is the sense of this Board, that Eastern Standard Time should be adopted, as the legal time in the State of Michigan; and be it

That it is also desirable that the bounty on wolves and coyotes be restored as this will induce farmers, trappers and hunters to kill the destructive animals; said bounty not to exceed that paid by neighboring states. It is believed that this method will be more effective in destroying wolves and coyotes than the present system of hired hunters.

Be it further resolved, that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Governor, to the Department of Conservation, all members elect of the State Legislature from the Upper Peninsula, and also all Boards of Supervisors in the Upper Peninsula Counties.

Gentlemen: Your committee on Legislation to whom was submitted the resolutions on proposed changes to the Game Laws as read at the last meeting of the Board of Supervisors, beg leave to report:

March, 28th, 1923.

First- That we believe that the people of Marquette County are not in sympathy with the resolutions as presented:

Second- That the Board of Supervisors stand back of the constructive legislative program as adopted by the Northern Michigan Sportsmen's Association, an association composed of twenty-three clubs and 2,324 members, representatives of the best thought on matters that affect the game laws and the conservation of our wild life and forests.

We therefore submit the following resolution:

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of Marquette County support the following legislative program of the Northern Michigan Sportsmen's Association and respectfully urge its support by our Senator and Representative in the Legislature.

First- A change of the partridge season to correspond with the calendar month of October, which will conserve both the partridge and human life, by preventing the overlapping of deer and partridge season. It is possible that the partridge season should come at a different time in the Upper Peninsula than it does in Lower Michigan, due to a difference in season, but the October season for our counties has, we believe, the unanimous support of all our sportsmen, and it is generally recognized that the existing undesirable dates of October 15th to November 20th are the result of a misunderstanding of the wishes of the sportsmen in the Upper Peninsula by the last Legislature.

Second- The opening of the rabbit season on October 1st. This is necessary in order to have the partridge and rabbit season open simultaneously.

Third- The requirement of an angler's license from all males over the age of eighteen years, the proceeds of which shall be used exclusively for the propagation of game and fish. The streams and lakes of Northern Michigan are very seriously depleted and cannot be stocked properly without an adequate number of hatcheries located in the

Upper Peninsula from which fry can be delivered at a time of year seasonable for planting in our waters. The anglers license will provide the means with which to accomplish this, but it is vital that the proceeds of this license shall be devoted exclusively to the propagation of game fish and not thrown into the general funds available to the Department of Conservation for general purpose.

Fourth- The continuance of the onebuck law as now in use.

Fifth- Lowering the present dog license.
