Dear Sir:- Meeting of the Special Committee on the County Jail was held at Marquette, on Thursday, December 6th. There were present Messrs. Johnson, Sherwood, Yungbluth and Mr. Keese, Chairman of the Board, and we met Mr. Derrick Hubert, Architect of Menominee, Michigan.

We went over the matter more particularly with the view of extending and remodeling the present building, the committee believes this can be done effectively and give most satisfactory results. The work would consist of an addition approximately 24 feet to the north, tearing out the floors of the present building and installing new, and improving the cell blocks, etc.

It is the opinion of Mr. Hubert that the present building was very substantial, showing splendid construction, and he advised it should not be destroyed if it were possible to utilize it as it stood. This is what the committee is now considering and we have engaged Mr. Hubert to draw tentative plans and make an estimate on the cost of doing this work. His fee for services to be one per cent of the estimated cost and should he later engaged to do the work this amount would be deducted from the regular architect's 6 per cent fee for construction of building. The committee will take action as soon as they receive the architect's report.
