It was moved that the County Treasurer's bond for the ensuing two years be fixed at \$100,000 per year. The motion was duly seconded and unanimously carried.

The Clerk suggested that the Bond of the Coroner be reduced. The law provides that this bond shall be in such an amount as the Circuit Judge shall decide. It was suggested that this bond be fixed at \$3000 if approved by the Circuit Judge.

Supervisor VanRiper asked the County to keep M-15 open from Barnes-Hecker Mine to Michigamme, stating that a large number of farmers were employed at the Imperial Mine at Michigamme and unless the road is kept free from snow, or at least open for travel they could not keep their jobs. As long as they could use their cars to get to work they were able to go home at nights and take care of their stock and return to work the next morning. He stated that the Township affected would be willing to keep all side roads open and assist in paying the cost of clearing the County Road. Superintendent Sawyer of the County Road Commission stated that he would be willing to do his best with the equipment he now has on hand. It was moved by Superintendent Orr that the County appropriate \$1000.00 of the moneys now in the hands of the Treasurer not otherwise appropriated for removing snow on M-15 from Barnes-Hecker location to Michigamme on condition that the Townships of Champion, Ely, Humboldt, Michigamme jointly appropriate a like amount. Whereas, it is deemed desirous of destroying in the County of Marquette all hawks and owls which at present are dangerous to game domestic fowl and animals.

Be it Resolved, that from and after January 1, 1925, every person being an inhabitant and resident of the County of Marquette who shall kill a hawk or owl in any organized Township, Village or City in this County shall be entitled to receive a bounty of fifty cents for each hawk or owl thus killed, to be applied and paid by the County of Marquette in manner hereinafter provided.

Every person applying for such bounty shall take the heads of such birds to the County Clerk at his office in the City of Marquette, in a state of good preservation and upon being satisfied of the correctness of such claim, said Clerk shall require such claimant to fill out and subscribe, under oath, a blank in such form and giving such information as said County Clerk may require, and the Clerk shall destroy such heads so presented by burning.

The County Clerk of Marquette County shall thereupon draw a warrant for the amount so shown on the Treasurer of the County of Marquette, and said Treasurer shall, upon presentation of said warrant pay the same from the general of contingent fund of the County of Marquette.

Gentlemen:- Your Committee on County Parks reports:

On July 7th all members of the Committee met with the Superintendent of the County Road System and the Maintenance Superintendent and visited the parks at Champion Beach the park at Michigamme Beach, rode around the Cliffs Drive, so-called, and visited the park at Gwinn, utilizing the entire day in making these inspections.

We found the three parks, that is the two county parks at Champion Beach and Gwinn and the Township Park at Michigamme all were kept in very good shape. That chemical sanitary conveniences were installed at Champion Park and that they were in good order and neat and clean and all buildings kept clean.

We talked over the requirements of the Champion Park and concur with and recommend to the Park Board that additional land should be secured in the vicinity of Champion Park if possible so as to enlarge the facilities of this park, particularly by providing a ball diamond and providing room for parking cars at some other point than the one now used. In the near future when it is financially possible to do so additional larger bath house facilities should be provided at Champion Park.

At Gwinn Park we found the Park kept neat and clean including the buildings. We find that the Park Board is utilizing a tent for ladies and a tent for men as dressing rooms and that these tents are probably meeting the present needs all right but are not of a capacity to take care of any considerable increase in the crowds using the pools if this should happen. Bath house accommodations with shelter will probably be needed at this park sometime in the not distant future. We find that the Board has provided good water at Gwinn by two wells and has provided one additional well at Champion and that the wind can get into them and abate the mosquito nuisance.

We drove around the Cliff Drive while enroute between the other parks as we understand that there is a tentative move on foot to try and secure a park for the County in this vicinity. This is a very beautiful district and if some reasonable large portion of it could be preserved in its present state and made available for use we believe this to be a highly desirable move.

We visited Michigamme Beach at the request of the Supervisor of Michigamme Township and find that they have a good dancing pavilion and bath houses in their park comprising of approximately 40 acres, have a beach on the lake and a frontage on the river with the camping grounds extending along the river, also they are utilizing an old field for a ball ground and they have good water. Michigamme Township assisted by Spur Township is financing this park and doing a good service. Michigamme Township desires some additional help, particularly to provide additional equipment. This Committee recommends to the Board of Supervisors that the sum of \$300.00 be appropriated from moneys not otherwise appropriated and be paid to Michigamme Township for assistance in improving their park.

On August 3rd we met with representatives of the County Road Commission and went over that part of the proposed Princeton South Road North of the West Branch River, this being the road to Wells Township, talked the proposition and sequence of operations thereon over with the members of the Commission.

Our recommendation to the Commission is that they first repair the existing road as far as Mann Brothers farm, putting it in shape so that it will provide reasonable use by cutting brush on the sides of the road, shaping the road up on the North portion where the heavy soil is and patching holes across the plains.

That actual construction on the line of the final location be started on the West Branch River; that a bridge of the log abutment plank top type be built across the river and that work be done South of the river to establish communication with the least possible immediate out-lay of money but doing the work South of the river on the line of proposed road so that it will assist in final plan. Our reason for doing this is that it will immediately establish communication across this route and that the North portion therefore can later be built on the line of the proposed Road at the convenience of the County.
