Gentlemen--At a meeting of the Board of County Road Commissioners of Marquette County, Michigan, held in Ishpeming, Michigan, September 28th, 1927, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, by the Board of County Road Commissioners of the County of Marquette, State of Michigan, that it be and is hereby determined that the amount of tax to be raised in the County Road Fund in this County for the year nineteen hundred twenty-seven and spread on the assessment rolls of the Townships and Cities of this County for the said year be and the same is fixed at and determined at the sum of one hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000.00) being less than three dollars (\$3.00) on each one thousand dollars of assessed valuation according to the assessment rolls of the last preceding year in such County, such sum being the amount to be raised for County Road purposes as is provided in Act 283 of the Public Acts of Michigan, 1909, as amended and in succeeding and supplementary acts and to be expended in accordance with the following estimates to-wit

Gentlemen--At a recent joint meeting of the officers and directors of the Upper Peninsula Supervisors' Association and the officers and directors of the Upper Peninsula Development Bureau, it was the consensus of opinion that we should ask each of the Counties this year to give to the support of the work of the Upper Peninsula Development an amount, figured on the same basis as last year, i.e., one-tenth of one mill on the assessed valuation of each County, and not to exceed \$2,000 in any County.

Because of the splendid support given in the aggregate by the various Counties in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan at their October meeting in 1926, supplemented by contributions of individuals, corporations and municipalities, and the sale of advertising space, our budget has been materially increased this year, and consequently a more effective program has been made possible.

Supervisor Van Riper, Chairman of the Morgan Heights Sanatorium Committee, asked that the following provision, Act No. 314, P.A. 1927, be called to the attention of the Supervisors, and spread upon the minutes of this meeting. Upon motion duly made and seconded, the request was granted, Board of Supervisors of Marquette County.

The Morgan Heights Tuberculosis Sanatorium Committee wish to call to the attention of the members of the Board of Supervisors, Act 314, Section 3 of the Public Acts of 1927 which is as follows:

If it shall be determined by the Health Officer of the City, Village, Township, County or District, in case a health district shall be formed, that there is any person afflicted with tuberculosis residing within such City, Village, Township or District who requires care, treatment or hospitalization, and who cannot because of financial inability pay for such care, treatment or hospitalization, it shall be the duty of such Health Officer to provide such care, treatment or hospitalization as such person requires, in accordance with the rules and regulations made by the State Commissioner of Health. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to abridge the authority of the Health Officer in furnishing care, treatment or hospitalization to such person, pending his determination of the financial ability of such person so afflicted, but it shall be the duty of such Health Officer, immediately upon being apprised of any case reported to him, to extend aid and assistance to such afflicted person, and to promptly furnish such care, treatment or hospitalization as such person may require. Upon the determination of the Health Officer that such person is unable financially to pay for the care, treatment or hospitalization so furnished, it shall be the duty of the Health Officer to make a detailed report to the Board of Supervisors of the County wherein such Health Officer resides. The Health Officer shall present to the Board of Supervisors of such County an itemized statement of the expense incurred in the care, treatment or hospitalization of such person with his approval of the reasonableness of such charges. The County shall be chargeable with such charges as the Board of Supervisors decides are reasonable unless the Board of Supervisors finds that such person is financially able to pay for such care, treatment or hospitalization.

Whereas this act makes it mandatory by Health Officers to furnish aid and hospitalization to indigent tubercular patients and whereas Marquette County has in Morgan Heights Sanatorium furnished adequate and suitable facilities for their care and cure, we ask that all such hospital aid for such tubercular patients be furnished only in Morgan Heights Sanatorium. The members of the Board of Supervisors are directed to refer all applications for tubercular hospitalization to the Health Officer of their respective City or Township who will make application in turn to the Superintendent of the Sanatorium.

"Whereas, it is the opinion of the Board of Supervisors that wolves and coyotes are increasing rapidly in the County of Marquette and are becoming dangerous to farm stock and a menace to all wild life.

"Therefore, be it resolved that after January 1st, 1928, any resident who kills a wolf or coyote over 6 months of age in any organized Township, Village or City in this County shall be entitled to receive a bounty of \$15.00 for each wolf or coyote thus killed and any person who kills a wolf or coyote under the age of 6 months in any organized Township, Village or City in this County shall be entitled to receive a bounty of \$7.50, for each pup thus killed to be applied and paid for by the County of Marquette in manner hereinafter provided.

"Every person applying for such bounty must first apply to the Supervisor and Clerk of the Township or to the Supervisor of the ward in which he lives for their endorsement and then take the green hides of such animals so killed to the County Clerk at his office in the County of Marquette and upon being satisfied of the correctness of such claim said Clerk shall require such claimant to fill out and subscribe under oath, a blank in such form and giving such information as said County Clerk may require and the Clerk shall punch three holes in each ear of such animal so presented for proper identification and return the hide to the claimant.

"Each applicant receiving a bounty under this resolution shall sign his name in a book furnished to him by the County Clerk for that purpose.

The County Clerk shall thereupon draw a warrant for the amount so shown on the Treasurer of Marquette and said Treasurer shall upon presentation of said warrant pay the same from the General Fund of the County of Marquette.

"It is further resolved that the sum of \$3,000.00 be hereby appropriated for the payment of the above named bounties and in case this fund should become exhausted the Clerk of this Board shall notify the registered trappers by mail and by notice in the newspapers published in this County that the fund has been exhausted and no more bounties will be paid until additional funds are available."

The Prosecuting Attorney was asked to give his opinion and also get the opinion of the Attorney General on the question of payment of this bounty and report his findings to the Clerk, and, the Clerk, was also instructed to ask other counties in the Upper Peninsula to pass a similar resolution at their next regular meeting.

HON. RICHARD C. FLANNIGAN
A MEMORIAL BY THE MARQUETTE COUNTY BAR ASSOCIATION

At Mercy Hospital, Chicago, on the seventeenth day of February, A.D. 1928, after a prolonged attack of pleurisy, Richard C. Flannigan, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Michigan, and former Judge of the Twenty-fifth Michigan Judicial Circuit, entered into rest. His death was a cause of profound sorrow to the Bar of the Twenty-fifth Judicial Circuit, over which he had presided for so many years as Circuit Judge, to his associates of the Michigan Supreme Court, and to a host of friends throughout the State of Michigan, and elsewhere,

Richard C. Flannigan was born December 12th, 1857, at Ontonagon, Michigan. He was a son of Capt. James Flannigan, one of the pioneer settlers in that district. Later, the family removed to Marquette. At eleven years of age, he went to work as a clerk for the Marquette, Houghton & Ontonagon Railroad. After occupying several different positions, including that of station agent at Humboldt, he entered the office of Parkes & Hayden, (both since deceased) at Marquette, as a clerk and law student. Four years later, he spent a year as a student at the University of Michigan, and then returned to Marquette and entered the law office of the late M. H. Maynard. Shortly afterward he applied for admission to the Bar and successfully passed his examination.

In 1881, he moved from Marquette to Norway, where, under the firm name of Kruse, and Flannigan, he practiced his profession for a number of years. He served two terms as Prosecuting Attorney of Menominee County, which then included the territory now forming Menominee and Dickinson Counties. He was the first Mayor of Norway and served for eighteen years as a member of its Board of Education.

In 1890, he was appointed Michigan attorney for the Chicago & NorthWestern Railway Company. He continued in that capacity until 1909, gaining and retaining by his ability and careful attention to his duties, the confidence and respect of the officials of that Company.

Resolution re. death of Hon. R. C. Flannigan

He was a member of the Constitutional Convention of 1907-8, which framed the present constitution of this State, and much of the merits of that instrument is due to his sage and farseeing counsel and advice.

He was a loyal and prominent layman of the Roman Catholic Church and only a few days before his death he was designated by His Holiness Pope Pius XI for the Papal order of The Knights of St. Gregory for outstanding work in behalf of the Church.

In 1909, there being a vacancy in the office of Circuit Judge of the Twenty-fifth Judicial Circuit, he was appointed to that responsible position by Governor Warner, upon the recommendation of all political parties. Elected and re-elected throughout the years, he served this Circuit until September 29, 1927, when Governor Green appointed him to fill the vacancy on the Supreme Bench caused by the resignation of Justice Joseph H. Steere. He took office on October 4, 1927, but became ill soon after his arrival in Lansing, and went to a Chicago hospital for treatment. He resumed his duties after several weeks treatment, and during that period wrote a number of opinions that reflected his distinguished judicial ability. Early in January he again entered the hospital, where his condition became critical and his rather frail physique proved unable to withstand the strain.

Thus came to a close a remarkable and distinguished career as citizen, lawyer and judge, which had reached its zenith in his appointment to the Supreme Bench of Michigan.

An impressive funeral service was conducted at St. Mary's Church, Norway, with Pontifical High Mass celebrated by his old friend, The Right Rev. Joseph Pinten, Bishop of Grand Rapids, which was attended by a large number of lawyers, including representatives of the Supreme Court of Michigan, the Michigan Bar Association, and the Bars of the Twelfth and Twenty-fifth Judicial Circuits. His interment at the beautiful family Mausoleum at Marquette occurred later on the same day.

The Twenty-fifth Judicial Circuit, comprising the counties of Marquette, Dickinson, Iron, Delta, and Menominee, which he served as Circuit Judge for so many years, is the largest in the State. Every year Judge Flannigan held four terms of court in each county of the Circuit, or twenty terms in all, and frequently one term followed immediately upon another. This exacting schedule gave him small respite or opportunity for relaxation. It was only his ability to rapidly dispatch business in court, coupled with constant reading and study outside of Court, that enabled him to write the great number of opinions he was compelled to give, while keeping up with the business of the several courts over which he presided. This great labor was a constant strain on his vitality, and it is feared, had much to do with shortening his life.

He was tall and slender and in appearance austere. Mentally he was unusually keen and alert, tempered with a never failing sense of humor. He was a hard worker, and an untiring student. He possessed a high type of judicial temperament. He was straightforward and blunt in speech, outspoken in criticising mistakes or carelessness on the part of members of the Bar who appeared before him; but he was intensely human and kind at heart, so that many a shaft of ridicule was tempered by a kindly smile which robbed it of its sting. As a judge he aimed solely at accomplishing justice, and he was quick to cut through or brush aside whatever stood in the way of this purpose.

We shall long retain in our memory a picture of his aspect on the bench, with his head tipped back against the swivel chair, his eyes to the ceiling or casting an occasional glance at the witness or the jury or counsel, while the fingers of his right hand toyed with the black string tie which he invariably wore. We shall also long remember the "informal court" he held at chambers during recess or before or after sessions of the court when, puffing at his pipe, and surrounded by a friendly group of lawyers, he would spin yarns or comment on questions of the day.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Marquette County Bar Association, assembled at the opening of the May term of the Circuit Court for Marquette County on May 28, 1928, that in the death of the Hon. Richard C. Flannigan, the Bar has lost an able public servant and each of us a personal friend, whose memory as a man and as a distinguished jurist we shall always cherish.

RESOLVED, FURTHER, that we here record this tribute to his career of long and faithful service as Judge of the Twenty-fifth Circuit, over which he presided with exceptional ability and with unvarying fairness and kindness.

RESOLVED, FURTHER, that in common with his associates on the Supreme Bench of Michigan, and with the citizens of this State, we deplore his passing almost at the outset of an equally distinguished career of useful service as a member of that tribunal.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this memorial be spread upon the records of this Court, and that a copy be sent to his widow with heartfelt assurance of the sympathy of the members of the Marquette County Bar Association for her, in her great loss.

Gentlemen--Your Committee to whom was referred the motion of Edlore Patient relative to the adoption as a County Road of a road in Wells Township running parallel with the E. & L. S. Railroad from the Dickinson County line to the Delta County line report:

That, on July 24th we met with the Board of County Road Commissioners and considered the matter.

That, we find that surveys and estimates of this road have not been made by the Commission to date.

That, because of this fact it is impossible to tell what the adoption of this road would mean in cost.

That, the County Road Commission do not feel that they should take on additional mileage without having the necessary provision for funds made and

That, the project should not be considered until it is considered at a time when the annual budgets are being made up and for that reason

We recommend that, further consideration of this road be deferred until the time when the annual budgets are considered.

The Board of County Road Commissioners has authorized survey and preparation of plans and estimates on this project to be made at such time as it can be handled by the regular County forces in connection with their regular work.
