Dear Mr. Stakel:--Adverting to your letter of the 28th.
Yesterday afternoon, Mr. Pearce and I met with Superintendent Berry and made a preliminary survey in order that we might be in position to give you tentative figures as requested.

We did not attempt, owing to lack of time, to go into each item making up the various divisions of our accounts, but give you below a summary of our present ideas treating only the major divisions.

The foregoing indicates that our request for the County when definitely decided upon will be approximately \$10,000.00 less than we asked for last year; due to the fact that the increased state aid is effective the latter part of July and the further fact that we were able to economize in certain particulars somewhat more than we had thought possible, will bring our deficit for the year down to probably in the neighborhood of \$4,000.00 although I have, as you will observe from the foregoing, inserted the arbitrary sum of \$5,000.00 in making up the tentative figures. This naturally will be subject to correction later on.

Dear Sir:-- I herewith submit an estimate on the funds required for the Poor Commission for 16 months, that is, September 1, 1937 to December 31, 1938, amounting to \$105,000.00; and for repairs and improvements at the County Infirmary, \$2,500.00, which should be provided for in the General Fund.

The basis of the above estimate has been taken from our average monthly expenditure for the past 12 months, namely, \$6,566.11.

The above would indicate we need \$106,946.38 to carry us through until taxes come through in January, 1939. However, it is impossible for anyone to figure just exactly what the call will be against this fund and for that reason we have used as a basis our average monthly expense for the past year.

Dear Sir:-- Will you please bring to the attention of the County Tax Commission when they have their next meeting on the matters of tax allocation as follows:

It will be the intent of the Board of County Road Commissioners to request the Board of Supervisors to raise money as follows:

For general County Road purposes, under Act 283, Public Acts of Michigan 1909, the sum of thirty-four thousand seven hundred seventy-three dollars (\$34,773.00); also to raise, to be used for maintenance of McNitt roads, pursuant to Section 10 of Act 130, Public Acts of Michigan 1931, the sum of forty-eight thousand seven hundred dollars (\$48,700.00); and for County Park purposes they will request the Board to raise the sum of twelve thousand seven hundred forty-three dollars and seventy-five cents (\$12,743.75), being one quarter mill on the current year's valuation.

Gentlemen:-- At a meeting of the Board of County Road Commissioners of Marquette County, Michigan, held September 14th, 1937, the following resolution was adopted:

"WHEREAS the Board of County Road Commissioners has adopted all township roads in this county, including streets and alleys in unincorporated villages, into the county road system pursuant to the provisions of Act 130 Public Acts of Michigan 1931, and

WHEREAS under the provisions of this act there is to be received by the county a sum of \$69,538.35 per year for use in maintaining these roads so adopted because of said Act 130; and as is by such act provided and,

WHEREAS this sum of \$69,538.35 is not sufficient for the proper maintenance and provides no money for improvement of the highways adopted under said act; and,

WHEREAS provisions for raising money to provide funds necessary for the maintenance of these roads adopted under this Act 130 are set forth in Section 10 of Act 130 P. A. 1931.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED.

That the amount of money required for the proper maintenance during the next year of those roads adopted into the county road system because of provisions of Act 130 P. A. 1931, be fixed at and determined at, the sum of One Hundred Twenty-eight Thousand Two Hundred Ninety-three (\$128,293.00) Dollars, to be expended in accordance with the following estimates to-wit:--

AND WHEREAS there is to be received from the distribution of funds under said Act 130 P.A. 1931, the sum of \$69,538.35, which is to be used for paying for part of such maintenance, and that there will be additional money received by the county for aid in plowing snow, which is not certain in amount, but which we estimate at \$10,054.65, making an estimated total of \$79,593.00 to be received for providing maintenance on these highways and that therefor there are insufficient funds available for proper maintenance of these roads, as follows:

A. 1909 as amended, be fixed at and determined at the sum of Forty-eight Thousand Seven Hundred (\$48,700.00) Dollars, such sum to be spread on the assessment rolls of the cities and townships of the county, and when collected to be credited to the County Road Fund for use in the maintenance of roads adopted into the County Road System because of the provisions of Act 130 P. A. 1931."

Gentlemen:-- In accordance with the established policy of your honorable body, I submit herewith the following proposed budget for the office of Judge of Probate covering the period of the fiscal year ending August 31st, 1938.

The current business of the court and recently enacted legislation necessitates an increased allowance for clerk hire; wherefore the proposed budget allots \$800.00 to meet this situation. This fund is to be drawn upon the basis of not more than \$15.60 each week, or permitting the employment of a competent and experienced clerk not more than four days a week at sixty cents per hour.

The proposed budget also includes an item of \$300.00 for equipment. This sum will be appropriated for the purchase of additional document filing sections. At the present time we have only sufficient space to carry the court files for not more than the next four or five months. The cost price of the purchase of this equipment has not been to date ascertained. However, in comparison to the court's prior purchase of similar filing sections, the allotment of this sum should be sufficient to cover the necessary additions.

The other items included in the budget are substantially the same, with the exception of a few instances, as shown in the County Clerk's report for the preceding fiscal year.

Applications for appropriation from Starr Commonwealth for Boys, The Michigan Children's Aid Society-U.P. Branch, The Marquette County Historical Society, Good Will Farm and Upper Peninsula Development Bureau of Michigan were received and upon motion of Supervisor Dobson, supported by Supervisor Stakel, were referred to the Finance and Taxation Committee and the Prosecuting Attorney.

Mr. George E. Bishop, Sec.-Mgr. of the Upper Peninsula Development Bureau, also addressed the Board and asked for their continued co-operation as in the past.

✓ A communication from K. I. Sawyer, Superintendent of the Marquette County Road Commission, with copy of an agreement between the Oliver Iron Mining Company and County of Marquette, granting an easement to make possible the consummation of a proposed W.P.A. project, was presented to the Board. On motion of Supervisor Gribble, supported by Supervisor Dobson, it was referred to the Prosecuting Attorney.

✓ A communication from the Marquette County Road Commission with attached release of claim signed by Mrs. Quantz and her husband, was read. The claim was settled by the Marquette County Road Commission and the Prosecuting Attorney for the sum of \$100.00. Mrs. Quantz was injured by part of a snow fence post left in the ground in some unknown manner. The Road Commission admitted no legal obligation but said there was a moral obligation since the Quantz' gave permission to erect the snow fence on their property. Supervisor Dobson moved approval of the report. Supported by Supervisor Mackey and carried.

✓ The following communication from the Marquette County Road Commission with the attached letter from L. B. Reid, Director of Finance of the State Highway Department, were read.

Dear Mr. Sawyer:--Your letter of August 4 advised us that you did not intend to make an adjustment with the cities in your county for the year 1936 covering your use of funds under the so-called McNitt Priority in the Weight and Gas Tax Laws.

In view of the Attorney General's opinion, holding that the use of funds under Sub-section 4 of Section 34, Act 7, P. A. 1934, and Sub-section 4 of Section 19, Act 8, P. A. 1934, was illegal for 1936 and subsequent years, and in view of a decision handed down in Dickinson County, which held that the County was not entitled to use funds under these sub-sections, we wish to advise you that it will not be possible to approve further payments to you under Acts 7 and 8, P.A. 1934, until the payments to the cities have been adjusted.

We regret the necessity for this action, as this Department has nothing to gain by withholding your funds. However, the laws have placed the responsibility of seeing that the Weight and Gas Tax funds are legally expended on this Department, and no other procedure is open to us.

Your Morgan Heights Sanatorium Contact Committee hereby reports that during the past year, it has kept in touch with the affairs of the Sanatorium in various ways and that at a meeting of the Contact Committee held at the Sanatorium on September 28th, a thorough inspection of the institution was conducted and its affairs gone into in considerable detail.

Your Contact Committee reports to you that in its opinion the affairs of the institution are managed in an efficient and economical manner and it believes the thanks of the Board of Supervisors are due to the Board of Trustees of Morgan Heights Sanatorium. The Committee further reports that it is thoroughly satisfied with the management of the institution under the direction of Superintendent Robert F. Berry, M.D., and believes him to be a capable executive and a skilled surgeon. His ability as a surgeon is of particular benefit to the work carried on by the Sanatorium and it means that such skilled treatment is now available to the people of Marquette County who are afflicted with Tuberculosis; previously, it had been necessary to call in outside aid or send the patients to Ann Arbor.

We found the institution on the occasion of our inspection to be in excellent shape, both within the buildings and outside the same. Considerable improvements during the past year have been made in the grounds.

Dear Mr. Sawyer:-- Your letter of August 4 advised us that you did not intend to make an adjustment with the cities in your county for the year 1936 covering your use of funds under the so-called McNitt Priority in the Weight and Gas Tax Laws.

In view of the Attorney General's opinion, holding that the use of funds under Sub-section 4 of Section 34, Act 7, P.A. 1934, was illegal for 1936 and subsequent years, and in view of a decision handed down in Dickinson County, which held that the County was not entitled to use funds under these sub-sections, we wish to advise you that it will not be possible to approve further payments to you under Acts 7 and 8, P.A. 1934, until the payments to the cities have been adjusted.

We regret the necessity for this action, as this Department has nothing to gain by withholding your funds. However, the laws have placed the responsibility of seeing that the Weight and Gas Tax Funds are legally expended on this Department, and no other procedure is open to us.

Sirs:--Relative to disposition of money received on account of motor vehicle license taxes and gasoline taxes returnable to this county for the calendar year 1938, and in conformity to Public Acts of Michigan numbers 7 and 8 of the Extra Session of 1934, your Board of County Road Commissioners recommend:

Pursuant to such acts, one half of each settlement on account of the above mentioned monies, is to be credited to the County Road Fund to be used for administration, maintenance, betterments, and construction of County Roads.

Further, pursuant to such acts, that the remainder, hereinafter called the second half of such monies, as returned to Marquette County, shall be applied as follows and in the following order of priority:

First priority of second half--The sum of \$36,796.83 shall be credited to the Highway Bond Retirement Fund to pay principal, interest, and disbursing fees on the General County Highway Bonds for payments due thereon, to and inclusive of the interest payments payable in April 1939, which interest payment comes due prior to anticipated receipts on monies from these sources for the year 1939.

Second priority of second half--The difference between the second half of such above mentioned monies and the amount of money to be credited to the Highway Bond Retirement Fund is then to be divided and applied as follows:

Gentlemen:-- Your Budget and Executive Committee to whom was referred the question of add-

ing and auditor to the County staff of employees, are recommending to the Board of Supervisors that the hiring of such an auditor be deferred for the present. The principal reason for this recommendation is due to the fact that no provision was made in the Annual Budget adopted at the October 1937 meeting of the Board, for an office of this kind.

Your Committee is not unmindful of the value of adding an auditor to the County pay roll to keep the Board properly informed on all matters of interest to the Board. We believe, however, that the advantages to be derived in hiring an auditor, would be defeated if his tenure in office would be uncertain. Only when his duties can be clearly defined, and only, if and when it can be arranged that a competent person would be hired, who would serve in that position for at least a reasonable length of time, would the County benefit from the establishment of this new department. Your Committee believes that the Board would only receive benefits comparable to the increased cost of maintaining a County Auditor's department, only when he would be given the position long enough to familiarize himself with all of the ramifications of the various county department, so that proper and intelligent reports could be made to the Board.

In some of the other counties where this particular office has been created, it has been clearly demonstrated that the County Auditor is only valuable to the Board in the same ratio that his services are continued over a considerable period of years.

Your Committee believes that this matter should be given further study because the thought behind the question has real merit in it, but for the present we do not believe the time is propitious for making a change.

Your Salary Committee met in the Court House on Monday afternoon, November 15th, and after careful examination of the pay roll for county officers for the past ten years, report as follows:

FIRST--We recommend that the Board of Supervisors rescind the following resolution adopted by the Board of Supervisors at the October meeting of 1928, to-wit: "We also recommend that the maximum salary for deputy clerks and stenographers, after five years of service, shall be as follows: Deputies \$125.00 per month, and stenographers \$100.00 per month."

SECOND--We also recommend that any other motion or resolution or parts of resolutions in the minutes of the Board of Supervisors meetings relating to matters pertaining to the salaries of deputies, clerks and stenographers, be rescinded.

THIRD--In the place of the motions and resolutions that we recommend should be rescinded, we recommend that on and after January 1st, 1938, when new employees are added to the pay roll for the County Officers, that the monthly salary of any deputy shall start at \$100.00 per month. At the end of one year of service the salary shall automatically be raised \$5.00 per month, and this automatic raise of \$5.00 per month shall continue until the maximum of \$125.00 per month will have been reached.

We further recommend that the salaries of clerks and stenographers shall start at \$75.00 per month, and shall be automatically raised at the rate of \$5.00 per month after each year's service, until at the end of five years the maximum salary of \$100.00 per month has been reached.

FOURTH--It is understood that the salary schedule as recommended, is to apply only to deputies, clerks and stenographers that are employed in regular county departments over which the Board of Supervisors has the legal right and authority to fix salaries.

The salary schedule as proposed is not applicable to employees of departments over which the State and Federal governments have jurisdiction.

FIFTH--We also recommend that the salary of Ella Froling, clerk in the Register of Deeds office, be raised to \$75.00 per month, amount to be retroactive as of November 1st, 1937.





With reference to the amount applied on tractor renewals, the County Road Commission has repaired and rehabilitated and put in working condition, Tractors 102, 103, 106, 107 and 108. In doing this work, we have purchased \$2823.86 worth of parts and spent approximately the same amount in labor.

Also in addition to the purchases which we made from your grant, and for protection of the people in the County under the conditions which exist, the County Road Commission purchased with road monies after the big blizzard, but before your grant was made, one Snogo, so that there are now three Snogos owned by the County.

In addition to the above, the County Road Commission has purchased an Angle Dozer attachment for the LaPlant Choate Plow and also summer pads for the Diesel Tractor so that this tractor outfit may be used in Angle Dozer work both on snow, ice and in summer operations. This outfit has approximately 50% more power than any tractor outfit previously owned.

The addition of the machinery which has been made possible by your grant, has placed the County Road Commission in a position so that the providing of snow plow service is now much more secure.

Gentlemen:-- Your Committee on Buildings, Grounds and Insurance met in session at the Court House on Saturday, March 12, 1938, at 1:30 p.m. for the purpose of discussing the building of the new Detention Home as an integral part of and addition to the Deputy Sheriff's residence on Spring Street. This proposal was referred to our Committee at the November meeting of your Honorable Board to report back at a future meeting.

Tentative drawings were submitted and the following new construction and repairs to existing conditions are recommended:

1. That the building be a two story addition of cinder block fireproof construction with stuccoed exterior.
 2. Room to be 10x10x7 firred and metal lathed and plastered with cement.
 3. Bar joist construction throughout and ceiling to be insulated with a built-up roof.
 4. Each room to have one toilet and wash-basin, two cots, two stools and the tables fastened to the wall.
 5. Two doors at entrance; one steel door with screen and one wood.
 6. Steel sash to be used with a 6"x18" light to eliminate use of bars and covered with a 16 gauge galvanized iron screen.
- To facilitate this work, pantry in present house must be removed and cupboards built in kitchen of present residence.
Also that the present heating plant be adequately renovated in keeping with the rest of the project.

Your Committee has interviewed the Welfare Agent and the Probate Judge and find our recommendations are in compliance with statutes relative to this project. The total estimate of this project ready for occupancy is \$2,174.40. We recommend the adoption of this resolution and that plans and specifications be drawn up, but actual construction not to start until after organization of new Board and Committees.

Gentlemen:--Your Salary Committee after considering the letter of the County Welfare Agent, which was referred to this Committee by the Board of Supervisors at the February meeting, beg to report as follows:

We recommend that the request for an increase in salary of the Welfare Agent's secretary be denied, because of the fact that the Board of Supervisors on November 15th, 1937, adopted a resolution which embodied the following, to-wit:

April 14, 1938

"It is understood that the salary schedule as recommended, is to apply only to Deputies, Clerks and Stenographers that are employed in regular County Departments over which the Board of Supervisors has the legal right and authority to fix salaries. The salary schedule as proposed is not applicable to employees of departments over which the State and Federal governments has jurisdiction."

Because of the fact that the Board of Supervisors specifically adopted this resolution, your Salary Committee feel that the entire Board has already settled the question of salary for the Secretary of the County Welfare Agent's department, because, the Board of Supervisors has no jurisdiction over that particular department.

Furthermore, we wish to call your attention to the fact that in adopting the budget for the fiscal year September 1st, 1937 to August 31st, 1938, at the Annual Meeting held in October 1937, the appropriation of the County Welfare Agent's department was limited to \$1,100.00, which covered the salary of the stenographer, stationary, office supplies, telephone, telegrams and miscellaneous items. In the making up of this budget it was contemplated that the portion of the Agent's secretary's salary to be paid by the County, would not exceed \$55.00 per month.

We also recommend that the materials requested for conducting psychiatric tests, which were formerly conducted at the Branch Prison, be denied. We understand that the State has paid for these tests in the past, and we feel that if the Welfare Agent's department can show a saving by having the Welfare Agent himself conduct these tests, that the State should furnish the necessary materials.

Gentlemen: On July 25th, 1934 your Board approved a code of procedure pertaining to road work which had been passed by the Board of County Road Commissioners on July 17th, 1934 and which contained the following paragraph:

"If improvements are desired on any highways adopted after January 1, 1931, more than can be paid for as specified in Paragraph 8, the cost of such improvement may be borne jointly by the Township in which the improvement lies and the County; arrangements therefore are to be made between the County and the Township in accordance with said Act No. 130. In every instance of such improvement the Township shall pay the percentage of the cost thereof as shall be determined by the Board of County Road Commissioners, provided that on Secondary Highways and Trails the Township shall not be required to pay less than 10 per cent nor more than 50 per cent of the cost of such improvement."

In negotiations carried on with the various Townships over the past several weeks pertaining to improvements on McNitt Roads under the McNitt Act, your County Road Commission has indicated that it was their intent to have this work split on a 50-50 basis, which is in accordance with the code as adopted, but not necessarily limited to that basis by this code.

We have discussed this matter with several of the Supervisors and find that a 50-50 split would not result in a practical solution of this finance problem, and after thorough discussion we feel that there should be a difference in the amount of cost of improving McNitt Roads which should be borne by the different Townships and that it should include consideration of the ability of the Township to pay. Pursuant to that thought, we have taken the underlying idea of the Aldrich Act, under which the County participated building trunk line highways, as a basis and at a meeting of the Board of County Road Commissioners held yesterday, the following action was had:

"The Superintendent reported on negotiations concerning the participation of the various Townships in the cost of making improvements on the McNitt Roads under the McNitt Act.

The matter was discussed at length and on motion of Mr. Archibald, seconded by Mr. Elliott and unanimously carried, the following schedule for participation by the Townships was approved:

For Townships having a valuation up to \$400,000, 20 per cent of the cost of improvement to be borne by the Township and 80 per cent by the County.

For Townships having a valuation of over \$400,000 and not exceeding \$600,000, 30 per cent of the cost of improvement to be borne by the Township and 70 per cent by the County.

For the Townships having a valuation in excess of \$600,000 and not exceeding \$1,000,000, 40 per cent of the cost of improvement to be borne by the Township and 60 per cent by the County.

For Townships having a valuation in excess of \$1,000,000, 50 per cent of the cost of improvement to be borne by the Township and 50 per cent by the County."

Inasmuch as this pertains to matters which will be coming before your Board from time to time, and inasmuch as these percentages are subject to review of your Board, and inasmuch as fairness between Townships requires that some uniform rule be applied, we request that your Committee on County Roads and Bridges be instructed to meet with the Board of County Road Commissioners for further consideration of the above.

Supervisor DeGroat addressed the Board and read a few letters from traveling salesmen stating the deplorable condition of the roads in Wells Township. A previous request of Supervisor DeGroat was referred to the Highways and Bridges Committee, so no action was taken in the above.

Four reports of fines collected by Justices of the Peace were read. Supervisor Nicholas, supported by Supervisor Biegler, moved they be referred to the Auditing Committee.

Applications of Dr. C. L. LeGolvan and Dr. Charles N. Bottum for appointment as County Jail Physician and County Physician laid on the table at the last meeting, were presented.

✓ Supervisor Wm. J. Wiseman moved that the Clerk case a unanimous ballot for the appointment of Dr. C. L. LeGolvan as County Jail Physician for the next year. Supported by Supervisor Mongrain and carried.

✓ Supervisor Wm. J. Wiseman moved that the Clerk cast a unanimous ballot also for the appointment of Dr. Charles N. Bottum as County Physician for the ensuing year. Supported by Supervisor Mongrain and carried.

✓ Supervisor Nicholas brought up the question of the minutes of the meeting being prepared in pamphlet form for distribution to the Supervisors and asked for clarification of the matter. Supervisor Nightingale said the Chairman authorized him to investigate the cost, etc., and to report to the Board. Supervisor Nightingale stated the investigation was in process and cost would be submitted as soon as procured.

Supervisor Nicholas moved that the Auditing Committee be empowered to go ahead with this matter, thus eliminating any delay in the obtaining of these pamphlets for use of the members of the Board. The motion was supported by Supervisor Nardi and carried by the following Yea and Nay vote:

Supervisor Stenglein, Chairman of the Bar Association Committee for investigation, said the Prosecuting Attorney was contacted and that he would exchange offices with those in the Consultation Chamber. Supervisor Stenglein stated the County Bar Association wished to know if the Board would assume the cost of the necessary shelving for the law books and moved the request be referred to the Budget and Executive Committee. Supported by Supervisor Price and carried.

Supervisor Nightingale nominated R. S. Archibald to succeed himself as County Road Commissioner and moved the nomination be tabled until the next meeting. Supported by Supervisor Danielson and carried.

Supervisor Stakel addressed the Board and suggested Marquette County supply a stone for the memorial to Hugh Gray of Grand Rapids, head of the Western Michigan Tourist Association. He stated he had found a beautiful stone suitable for the purpose and suggested the Board authorize an inscription to be made on this stone. He stated the cost would be in the neighborhood of ten or fifteen dollars as the transportation was gratis and moved that the request be referred to the Budget and Executive Committee. Supported by Supervisor Nardi.

Supervisor Perring offered an amendment to the above wherein Supervisor Stakel and Supervisor Biegler be authorized to spend up to \$15.00 for the above request. Supported by Supervisor Muck and carried by the following Yea and Nay vote:

Supervisor Nicholas moved that the resolution above mentioned be referred to the Conservation Committee. Supported by Supervisor Nardi and carried.

Supervisor Nicholas moved that the Chairman be authorized to confer with City officials of the County in regard to Daylight Saving Time, so that the County and the Cities would go on the new time simultaneously. Supported by Supervisor Nardi and carried.

Sheriff Hansen addressed the Board and requested the Board to look into the matter of repairs to the Sheriff's residence. On motion of Supervisor Nicholas, supported by Supervisor Halmeoja, the request was referred to the Buildings, Grounds and Insurance Committee.

Supervisor Jernstad addressed the Board and praised Supervisor Van Riper for his able guidance in the past year. Also lauded the work of Supervisor Stakel of the Finance Committee, K. I. Sawyer of the County Road Commission, the Clerk and other department heads that have done much to make such a splendid record for the Board.

There being no further business, it was moved by Supervisor Mongrain, supported by Supervisor Nardi, that the Board adjourn until Wednesday, the 18th day of May, A. D. 1938, at 2:00 o'clock p.m.
